County finances very strong again

Once again, the Parmer County Commissioners on Monday received an annual audit from Michele Kirkland of Accounting & Consulting Group that shows the county to be in outstanding shape.

The county's tax rate isn't determined yet because the Appraisal District won't have the certified values until later. But a small tax rate hike may be coming.

The CPA firm reported that the count's total revenues exceeded expenses by \$403,337 during the past fiscal year, putting the combined fund balance at \$3,727,654, up from \$3,267,304 last year.

In the past, the CPA has advised the county to keep at least \$1.5 million fund balance (surplus). Thus, the current surplus is more than twice that.

Last year's tax rate was .4782 cents per \$100 assessed valuation, down from .4949 cents in 2010.

The audit was accepted.

County Judge Trey Ellis noted that in the previous year, the county received \$300,000 more than was spent. But last year, that number had dropped to \$45,000.

Thus, the commissioners are looking at a small tax increase as a possibility. In other business, the county commissioners:

He replaces Mike Prokop, who is the new athletic director and head football coach at Friona Schools.

At Monday's Farwell School Board meeting:

-- The Student Handbook was approved and the main changes were:

1. No visible tattoos are allowed. Previous language said no "visible" tattoos were allowed. The word "visible" has been removed.

2. No part of undergarments is to be visible at any time.

3. No "jeggins" (like skin-type pants) are allowed.

4. No colors are allowed in a student's hair that are not natural to human beings.

5. Shoulders on blouses should be at least 3 inches wide.

6. No pants that sag or appear to sag are allowed.

-- Destiny Banister, of Clovis, was hired as the high school art teacher, replacing Robin Gregory, who has taken a job at Floyd.

-- Andrew Eudy was hired to teach math and be an assistant coach. he recently graduated from West Texas A&M with a bachelor's degree and is close to finishing his master's degree, too.

-- Set the next meeting for Aug.6, to be followed by a budget workshop. The budget will be adopted Aug. 30 and the tax rate set. The tax rate will stay at \$1.10, said Supt. Mike Read.

-- Tabled the employee handbook.

-- Plans to write a policy with guidelines for care of students with food allergies, as required by the state.

-- Approved 3 percent salary raises for auxiliary paraprofessionals. Teachers receive step raises.

-- Heard that the projected enrollment for 2012-2013 is 595 to 600 students.

Coon farmed and helped build the road between Farwell and Muleshoe. He worked with Charlie Crume. He also helped build the gin at the Oklahoma Lane School.

Her mother, Addie, was active in the church and in home demonstrations. She canned veggies and cured beef.

Her father died in 1968 and her mother in 1964.

She recalls Christmas at Walnut Springs with the quilt boxes filled with pie and always eating Christmas dinner at Grandma Rundell's.







Doug has played softball for almost 25 years as an adult and loves the sport.

Doug decided to get involved with baseball when his son was 4 and wanted to play t-ball. He coached his first team and just stayed with it. The next year, a new league formed. Doug wanted to support the tradition of Little League, and was elected league president.

Doug feels the skills necessary for his real day job as Police Chief help him as Little League president. "I have learned to be organized and handle many different situations."

His volunteer 'job' is really quite involved. He is the link between local Little League and the national office at Williamsport, Pa. Live Cattle prices have remained stable as cash trade was up just a little last week at \$117.00. futures prices have drifted off last weeks highs, but have gone nowhere. The range between \$118.50-120.50 have held the market up to this point. It will take a close above last the \$120.65 level in order to push prices higher. Otherwise, a move below the \$118.50 level would do just the opposite. Market is trends are currently trying to move higher.

Feeder prices have continued trade off the price of corn and weather. With a substantial rise in grain prices, feeders have been met with a sharp decline in prices. Both short and long term trends remain down in the feeders. Until there is a change in weather across the Mid West, this market is expected to remain under pressure until grains change direction.

Soybean prices have continued to move higher based on weather. Technically, the market turned up during mid June and have continued to move sharply higher since. Until there is a change in weather conditions, prices are expected to remain strong. Yields are expected to decrease, but will probably not be reflected in this weeks USDA Crop Production report.

Corn prices which have probably been impacted the most from the weather have also seen a vertical move straight up. Yields are being adjusted lower on a daily basis, but still 3-5% above year ago levels with a range of 152-154 bushel projected yield. If weather does not improve, these numbers will be adjusted lower. Overall production is still pegged around 13.24 billion bushel which is still near record levels. Aside from a continuation of lower yields, there has been some discussion of a suspension of the ethanol mandate which makes up between 30-40% of total corn usage. Ethanol production along with stocks has dropped off substantially from year ago levels. Price targets range from \$7.22 up to \$7.97 basis December.

Wheat prices have moved up alongside the rest of the grain complex. According to the latest USDA estimates there have been little to no change in wheat production, wheat stocks or world wheat stocks. The move in wheat seems to be directly related to corn and beans. The market seems to be stalled out at this time, but all trends still point higher.

Cotton prices continue to drift sideways with no strong indication of price direction. Weather has played no role in price movement and the Dollar remains strong. Not much to say until prices can either breakout above resistance at the \$74.50 level or below \$65.00 support basis the December contract.







choose to opt out, so the commissioners tabled the appointments until a replacement is found, then they can approve the entire list at one time.

-- Approved the annual \$10 road and bridge fee for each vehicle registered in the county.

-- Approved the request by Lazbuddie School for about \$41,000 of the school's share of the Parmer **County Permanent School Fund.**

This money will go toward the planned courtyard improvements, including new playground equipment.

Lazbuddie School will still have more than \$100,000 in the county's Permanent School Fund to draw upon later for capital improvements.

-- Discussed the county's participation in the Regional Public Defender for Capital Cases Fund, out of Lubbock.

Many small counties, such as Parmer, participate.

The county pays \$5,000 for its participation in this fund. It's like an "insurance fund," in that if a capital murder cases occurs in Parmer County and the defendant asks for a public defender, instead of the cost to the county running into the hundreds of thousands of dollars, the Fund assists greatly.

The topic came up because there have been no Parmer County requests for Fund assistance, Parmer County just got a refund of \$3,000.

Bailey County has had to tap into this fund a couple of times in recent years.

-- Heard a report from County Tax Assessor-Collector Bobbie Pierson dealing with the sale of renewals of registration and license plates through her office.

Previously, this could be done at three sites: the office at the county courthouse in Farwell, Friona Chamber of Commerce office and Bovina City Hall.

The state has cut back its funding and the site at Bovina has been closed. The Bovina site was not bringing in much money, it was said. And the state no longer will furnish Bovina with the necessary computer equipment

The Friona location will remain open because it does a lot more business.

The county will need to buy an expensive printer for the Friona site and now won't have to buy one for Bovina. too.


