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
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Lefors beats **'Horns**

Live Cattle prices exploded to the upside late last week and cash trade followed with most the trade taking place between \$117-118. Prices had to break out above the \$116.30 level basis the October contract in order to turn trends back higher. Prices should be in position to retest their old highs between the \$121-122 level. The trade was quiet on Monday coming into the week.

Feeder prices also followed the Live Cattle price, but it eemed to be much slower than rallies seen in the past? The market needed to breakout above the \$134.30 level basis the October to move higher. There is some fairly strong resistance around the \$146.40 basis the October contract. A close above this level could project a retest of their early August highs around the \$140 level?

Corn prices have continued to decline ahead of today's USDA Crop Production report. The report came in close to expectations, but sharply lower beans and wheat dropped the corn about a nickel off the open and finished up about nine cents on the day. The December contract should make an attempt to test their highs around the \$7.65-7.79 level over the near term?

Soybean prices closed below their \$14.10 support level basis the November contract. The USDA surprised a few traders with their yield estimates and beans pened about twenty cents lower and finished down about thirty on the day. Prices could rebound, but today's close was technically negative unless the market can end this week back above the \$14.10 level basis the

Wheat prices also came under pressure right after the JSDA Crop Production report, but prices were able to climb out of what looked like a hole off the opening. Prices ended the day only down about six cents basis the December KC contract and also above trend line support which came in around \$8.23 level. It may take a move back above the \$8.35 level in order to turn short term trends back higher?

Cotton prices held fairly well after today's USDA Crop Production report, but disappointed some traders as prices only closed up about 44 cents on the day Production numbers had dropped some, but not enough to give the market a huge push up. Prices technically turned long term trends higher after closing above the \$1.09 level last week. There should be a push up into the \$118 level basis the December contract.


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Famed XIT Ranch is just a memory

(Editor's Note: The following article was taken from the Fort Worth Star Telegram, Jan. 13, 1963.)

Cowboys who pounded leather on the famous XIT ranch more than 50 years ago have a right to shed a sentimental tear because the last vestige of the 3,000,000-acre spread in the Texas Panhandle has been moved.

Sale of the last 39 acres of the former cattle empire was announced n Fort Worth last week by Hamlin Y. Overstreet, of Farwell, last of the representatives of the ranch holdings.

Overstreet said he has passed a deed to the 39 acres to Hurshel R. Harding, of Farwell. The land, within the city limits of Farwell, now is industrial property, lying between two main lines of the Santa Fe Railway, one of which runs to Chicago and the other to Houston and Galveston.

The land transaction in Farwell, Overstreet reminded, marks the completion of a bright chapter in Texas history. The original spread of 3 million acres was given by the State of Texas in 1882 in exchange for the construction of the \$3 million state artists, clowns, Capital in Austin.

The XIT was the largest fenced ranch in the continental U.S., and perhaps the largest in the world.

Overstreet explained that in 1951 the Capitol Freehold Land Trust, owner of he ranch, was closed when the remaining 25,000 acres were divided among 10 shareholders. A part of the acreage went to James Douglas, Jr. of Chicago, including the 39acre tract that was sold to Harding.

The Story of the XIT goes back to 1875 when the state officials found they were getting cramped in the old capitol in Austin, and a constitutional convention set aside the 3 million acres of state land American children. with which to get a new capitol.

However, nothing was done about the proposed new capitol until Nov. 9, 1881, when fire destroyed the old building. Gov. Oren Roberts called a special sessions of the Legislature, and it struck a bargain with Charles B. and James V. Farwell, Chicago brothers, under which they agreed to build the new capitol and accept the 3 million Panhandle acres in payment.

The red granite Capitol stands in Austin today as the largest state capitol building in the U.S.

The Farwells borrowed money in England to develop the ranch. The debt was liquidated in 1909. The original ranch covered all or portions of 10

counties, Dallam, Hartley, Oldham, Deaf Smith, Parmer, Castro, Bailey, Lamb, Cochran, and Hockley. The 10-county spread perhaps helped perpetuate

the story that the XIT name meant "ten in Texas." In 1885, the first cattle started moving into the XIT astures from South Texas. Thousands of cattle

Most people don't remember the day in the early 1930s that the circus came to town in Texico-Farwell, and it wasn't just any circus, it was "The Greatest Show on Earth!"

People today know it as the Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey

This most famous of circuses was created in the 1870s in Delaven, Wis. traveling in horsedrawn caravans from town to town bringing lion-tamers, trapeze dozens of exotic ani-

It originally billed itself as "P.T. Barnum's **Great Traveling Museum,** Menagerie, Caravan, and Hippodrome."

By 1907, it was more commonly known as simply The Greatest Show on Earth as it dazzled generations also toured Europe, even providing a command performance at the request of the Queen to the British royal family.

With a reputation like that, how is it that this extravaganza ever erected its big-top in Texico-Farwell in the midst of the Great Depression?

By that time, the circus had long since grown too large to travel from coast to coast in its horsedrawn wagons, and it began to travel in trains to provide its entertain-

After the market crash in 1929, the circus was in peril of shutting down because money was scarce and the a circus did not rate high on the list of important car-

However, President Roosevelt determined that Americans had more than enough deprivation in their lives and on his direction the circus continued its rail trips across the country, bringing a few hours of enjoyment and amazement in some very grim times.

The Santa Fe railroad track by 1899 had extended from Amarillo to the new facility in New Mexico called Riley's Switch (now Clovis) and by 1910, the rails from Lubbock were extended there as well, joining as they do today on the state line between Texico and Farwell.

It was down one of these tracks that The **Greatest Show on Earth** travelled to present the shows it had scheduled in New Mexico; however, it was stopped cold at the state line in the Border towns.

New Mexico had its own laws about transporting exotic animals like elephants, lions, and tigers into its territory, and the train was halted on the Texas side of the border while details were ironed out to allow the journey to continue to its shows.

Finally exhausted by struggles obscure state regulations and unyielding officials, The **Greatest Show on Earth** decided to simply offload from the train and pres- Amarillo.

Brief Explanatory Statements of Proposed Constitutional Amendments Special Election November 8, 2011

Proposition Number 1 (SJR 14)

SJR 14 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to provide the surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran with an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the surviving spouse's residence homestead as long as the surviving spouse has not remarried, the property was the residence homestead of the surviving spouse when the qualifying veteran died, and the property remains the residence homestead of the surviving

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran.'

Proposition Number 2 (SJR 4)

SJR 4 would amend the constitution to authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue additional general obligation bonds on a continuing basis for one or more accounts of the Texas Water Development Fund II, with the restriction that the total amount of bonds outstanding at any time does not exceed \$6 billion.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of additional general obligation bonds by the Texas Water Development Board in an amount not to exceed \$6 billion at any time outstand-

Proposition Number 3 (SJR 50)

SJR 50 would amend the constitution to authorize the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successors to issue and sell general obligation bonds on a continuing basis for the purpose of financing educational loans for

students, subject to certain constitutional restrictions, including a restriction as to the maximum principal amount of bonds outstanding at any one time.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas to finance educational loans to students."

Proposition Number 4 (HJR 63)

HJR 63 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to permit a county to issue bonds or notes to finance the development or redevelopment of an unproductive, underdeveloped, or blighted area within the county, and to pledge increases in ad valorem tax revenues imposed on property in the area by the county for repayment of such bonds or notes. The amendment does not provide independent authority for increasing ad valorem tax rates.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit a county to issue bonds or notes to finance the development or redevelopment of an unproductive, underdeveloped, or blighted area and to pledge for repayment of the bonds or notes increases in ad valorem taxes imposed by the county on property in the area. The amendment does not provide authority for increasing ad valorem tax rates.'

Proposition Number 5 (SJR 26)

SJR 26 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to allow cities and counties to enter into interlocal contracts with other cities and counties without having to assess an ad valorem tax and set aside a specified amount of funds for the payment of costs under the interlocal contract.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment

authorizing the legislature to allow cities or counties to enter into interlocal contracts with other cities or counties without the imposition of a tax or the provision of a sinking fund."

Proposition Number 6 (HJR 109)

HJR 109 would amend the constitution to increase the amount of principal that is available for withdrawal from the permanent school fund each year and would also clarify certain references to that fund in the constitution. Increased access to the principal of the state public education trust fund would be based upon HJR 109 granting the authority to consider alternative market calculations when determining the amount of principal that is available for distribution to the available school fund. HJR 109 would also provide authority to distribute to the available school fund annual revenue from school fund land or other properties up to \$300 million per year.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment clarifying references to the permanent school fund, allowing the General Land Office to distribute revenue from permanent school fund land or other properties to the available school fund to provide additional funding for public education, and providing for an increase in the market value of the permanent school fund for the purpose of allowing increased distributions from the available school fund."

Proposition Number 7 (SJR 28)

SJR 28 would amend the constitution by adding El Paso County to the list of counties authorized to create conservation and reclamation districts to develop parks and recreational facilities financed by taxes.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit conservation and reclamation districts in El Paso County to issue bonds supported by ad valorem taxes to fund the development and maintenance of parks and recreational facilities.'

Proposition Number 8 (SJR 16)

SJR 16 would amend the constitution by requiring the legislature to provide for taxation of open space land devoted to water stewardship purposes on the basis of its productive capacity.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the appraisal for ad valorem tax purposes of openspace land devoted to water-stewardship purposes on the basis of its productive capacity."

Proposition Number 9 (SJR 9)

SJR 9 would amend the constitution to authorize the governor, on the written recommendation and advice of the Board of Pardons and Paroles, to grant a pardon, reprieve, or commutation of punishment to a person who successfully completes a term of deferred adjudication community supervi-

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: 'The constitutional amendment authorizing the governor to grant a pardon to a person who successfully completes a term of deferred adjudication community supervi-

Proposition Number 10 (SJR 37)

SJR 37 would amend the constitution by extending the length of the unexpired term that causes the automatic resignation of certain local elected officeholders if they announce candidacy or become candidates for another office from one year to one year and 30 days.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: 'The constitutional amendment to change the length of the unexpired term that causes the automatic resignation of certain elected county or district officeholders if they become candidates for another office."

Texico's loss to Portales Friday at home, 32-28, was a fast and furious affair.

After Portales scored a TD on its opening drive, it didn't take long for the Wolverines, now 2-1 on the season, to answer.

A fumble recovery by Brandon King started a round of dynamic Wolverine plays. Rallin Harris converted a 3rd and 5 with a 25-yard pass to Donovan Johnson. Jesus Rivera finished the drive off 5-yard TD run. Sergio Posada's kick put Texico up, 7-6.

The 2nd quarter saw big hits by linebackers Shay Harrison and Johnson. The defensive line, including DJ Griego, Elliott Pelfrey, Zach Madrid, Daniel Gomez and King contained the high-powered Ram offense.

When Texico regained the ball, Harris completed a 20-yard pass to Adrian Gomez. That drive ended with a Harris pass on 4th and 10 to Rivera who caught the ball in the corner of the end zone in what looked like an ESPN highlight play.

Silva, and Elesio Arinavez are also worth mention. Texico held Portales to a 3 and out, followed by a 35yard TD run by Harrison late in the first half.

Portales closed the half with a last-minute TD pass as Texico led 19-14 at halftime.

The 2nd half started out just as exciting as the first with a big kickoff return by Johnson, followed by a 48-yard TD run by Rivera thanks to great blocking by John Myers, Madrid, Uriel Munoz, Pelfrey, Griego, and D. Gomez.

An attempt at a 2-point conversion was unsuccessful as Texico went ahead, 25-14, Texico.

But that comfortable lead ended when scored again, closing the gap to 5 points. Good coverage by Justin Rucker stopped the Ram's 2-point conversion try.

The final quarter began with a Portales TD drive, putting the Rams ahead, 26-25.

Texico answered with a long kickoff return by Johnson, followed by a Harris to Myers 15-yard pass. The drive ended with an impressive 37-yard field goal by Posada, putting the Wolverines back on top, 28-26.

But Portales responded with a crushing TD drive to take the lead with 3 minutes left in the game, despite a sack by Rivera, and great defensive effort by Griego, Harrison, and Pelfrey.





Parmer County went all out in the various drives sponsored by the Red Cross which included donations to special war funds and the blood plasma cash donations plus going over the top repeatedly on bond quotas which appeared set higher than the county could possibly man-

News of our servicemen were most important. Seven local servicemen lost their lives this year -- two in action, two on routine duty, two in prison camps and one on a return trip on a visit home.

Killed in action were Arthur Parker, serving with the Marines on Guadacanal, and Claude Gober, lost on a bombing mission in Europe.

Four families went through the agony of having boys reported missing and one reported dead, before all four boys showed up. Lt. Bill Roberts and Lt. Tom Caldwell are both POWs in

Germany. Sqt. Tom Atkins and Melvin Treider were Japanese prisoners. The Silver Star award went to T-4 London for service

in North Africa. The unit in which G. D. Anderson Jr. was serving was cited for meritorious service.

Parmer County got its first WAVE -- Sarah Barnes.

The draft, drought, shortages and machine rationing have been major headaches. In the rush to get as much done as possible, several sustained severe injuries in combine accidents.

Wheat shipments were in a jam because of car shortages. Slaughter permits likewise gave producers trou-

Something new was tried in the assessment of taxes by mail, which went well.

The county's first deep oil well test was sunk to 8,160 ft. Granite was hit and it is believed the well will be aban-

Victory gardens abound with the start of point rationing of canned fruits and veggies. Backyard poultry lots were also popular.

Coffee lovers heaved a sigh of relief when rationing of their favorite drink was lifted. But heavy sugar users found little relief in the same allotments.

The double track being laid by Santa Fe between here and Clovis was finally completed and the local Baptist Church began work on a number of improvements some of which won't be completed until the war ends due to lack of materials.

Farwell students sponsored a "Buy a Jeep" campaign for bonds and stamps and wound up turning in over \$5,000.
