


If you are a grower of wheat this may be of interest to you. In case you haven't read there will be no protein premiums on wheat next year, instead premiums due you for quality wheat will be based on sedimentation test. These tests are made by grinding and sieving about 1/2 pound of wheat from which a small portion is mixed with water and a lactic acid reagent in a glass cylinder. The cylinder is allowed to stand exactly , five minutes and the volume of sediment is read according to prescribed procedures.

This sounds like a very simple test, but it has complications that are not accurate and has shown little merit in determining baking quality.

What really takes the cake in this deal is that the Millers National Federation, the National Association of Cereal Chemists, plant breeders at our colleges were not consulted before the U. S. Dept. of agriculture announced their intentions of applying premiums based on sedimentation tests.


