The Chamber encourages all local churches to have special recognition of Veterans Day at their regular Sunday services.

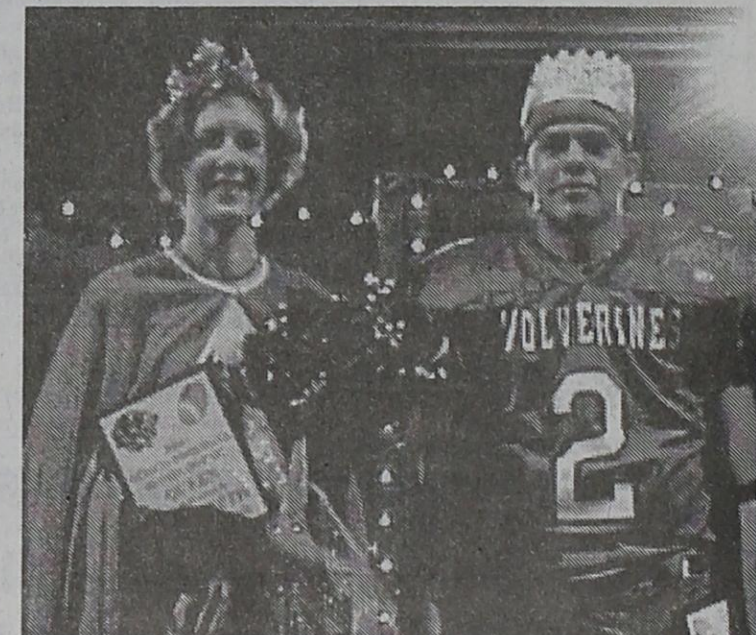
The Chamber expects to return to its traditional ceremony at the Parmer County Veterans Memorial at 11 a.m. on Nov. 11 next year.

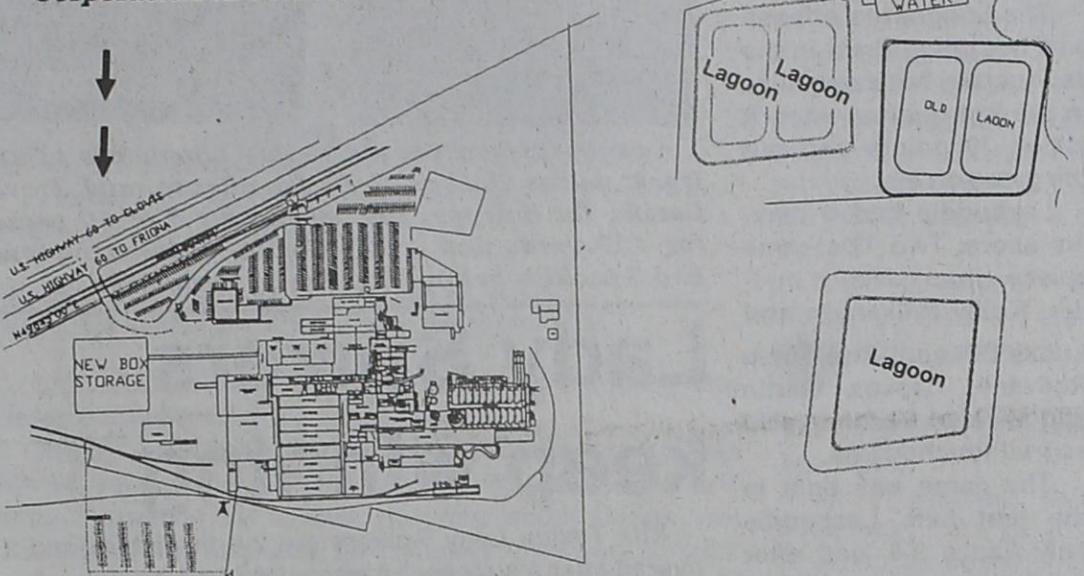

Excel expansion plans explained to commissioners

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday approved a tax abatement request by Excel Corporation, Friona, which is planning to build two new facilities.

Dave Dolinar made the presentation for Excel. It was noted that headquarters still needs to approve the projects, which are:

1) Build a new box storage handling facility, due to the limited capacity of the existing structure.

2) Install a new activated sludge wastewater treatment system to enable Friona to comply with the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission regulations and with the facility's fu-

ture TNRC wastewater discharge permit.

It is projected that the buildings will be finished by May 2003 and will bring in 12 technical jobs to Parmer County.

It is estimated that about \$25 million in real and personal property values will be added to

Benjy Dial to be inducted into ENMU Hall of Honor

Former Farwell High School athletic star Benjy Dial will be posthumously inducted into the Eastern New Mexico University Greyhound Hall of Honor the weekend of Oct. 5-6.

There will be a reception and open house in Greyhound Arena in his honor from 4 to 6 p.m. on Oct. 5.

The official presentation will be made at halftime of the Hall of Honors football game.

His widow, Phyllis, of Duncanville, Texas, has been invited to ride in the Homecoming parade.

The Dial family was in Farwell from 1946 through 1971 when Mrs. Hightower's mother, Clytie Dial, moved to Amarillo.

All four Dial's graduated from FHS. Benjy,

who graduated in 1961, was honored with many athletic awards, including a scholarship to ENMU. He played professional football after that -- for the Washington Redskins, Philadelphia Eagles and Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League.

He started teaching and coaching in 1972 in Albuquerque.

He had coached at DeSoto since 1989 and helped more than 100 players reach college football, including running back Byron Hanspard, who starred at Texas Tech, then played professional ball.

There were three separate services after he died April 5 of a heart attack at age 57.

The first was for family and assistant coaches.

The second was a "wake" held at the football field with about 1,200 people attending.

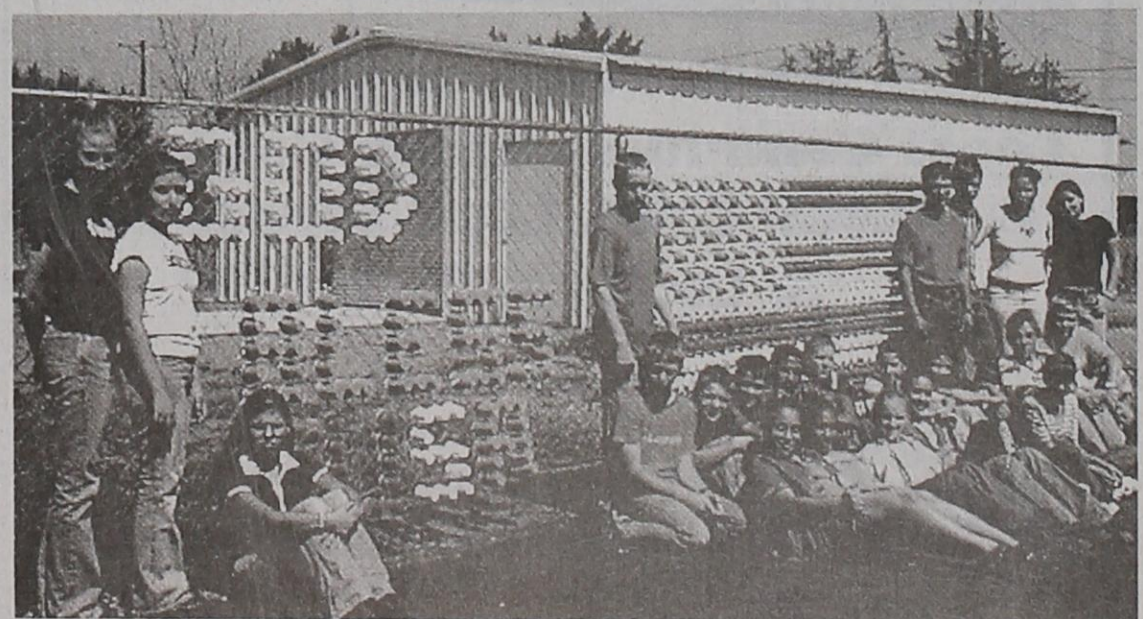
The third was a formal funeral which was attended by about 800 people at his church.

Benjy's nephew, Roger Dial, is an officer with the Clovis Police Department. Roger's mother, Laquita, teaches in Clovis schools.

Benjy was the topic of numerous newspaper articles in his area, remembered as a great inspiration by his players.

He was looked upon as a Christian role model by his players.

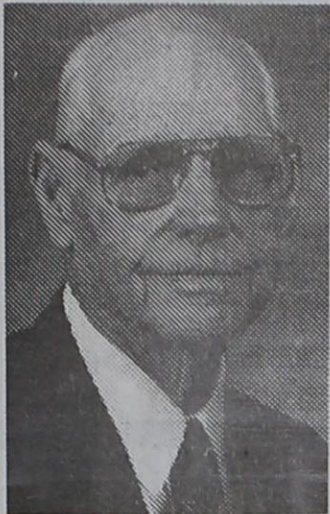
Among his honors was being named Texas State Christian Coach of the Year.

the tax role, and that about \$700,000 in direct sales tax will be generated, said Excel.

Here is how Parmer County's tax abatement for new facilities works:

After the facility is on the tax role, there is 100% tax abatement for the 1st and 2nd years; 75% for the 3rd year; 50% for the 4th year; and 25% for the 5th year.

Several Friona residents attended the meeting to support the Excel request, including Ron Davenport, Kathryn Goddard and Lois Norwood.

In other business, the commissioners:

-- Approved seeking a new roadgrader for the Farwell area precinct.

-- Adopted the proposed 2002 budget and tax rate (a 3 percent tax increase). There were no citizens present for the hearing outside of the elected officials.

-- Will offer flu shots for Parmer County officials and employes on Oct. 8.

-- Renewed the contract with Texas Tech's Health Services Center for autopsy services.

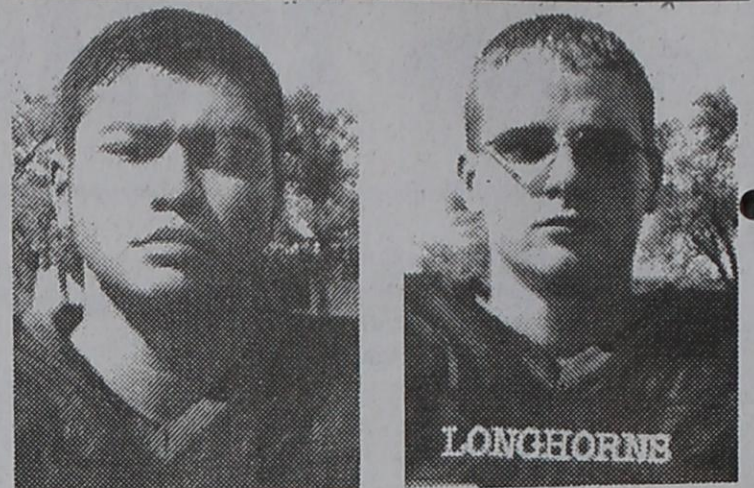

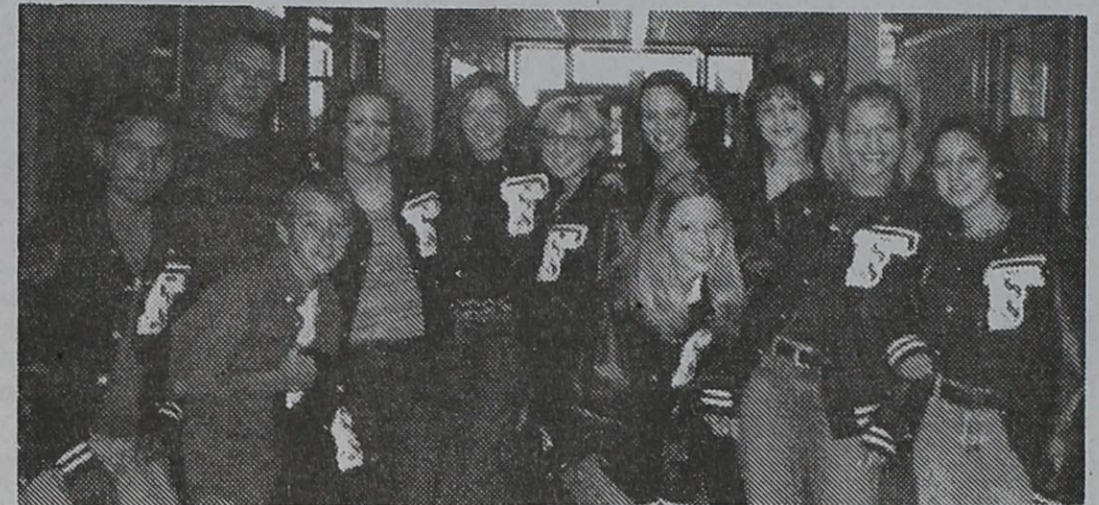

Texico whitewashes Loving

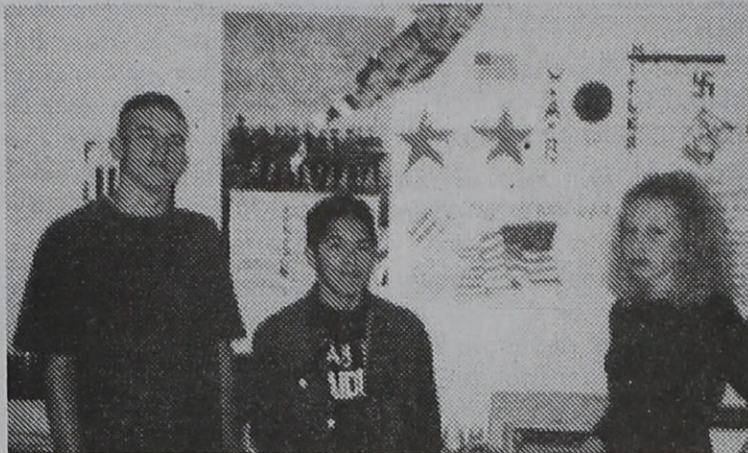

Letter to the Editor

Dear Mike,

The events of Sept. 11 will permanently define our country and its response to evil. I watched President Bush's speech to America and was touched by his sincerity. I admired his quotation from NATO's charter that an attack against one is an attack against all.

We certainly had our soft underbelly exposed. These terrorists should be brought to swift justice. However, I also believe that this should be a time of great introspection. It is extremely easy to emotionally or visceral respond to such a heinous act of cowardice.

These terrorists should, in fact, be called soldiers. Their training was on par with any military training which you can find. Their entire campaign followed guidance or tenets found in Sun Tzu's centuries old book "The Art of War." **THIS WAS AN ACT OF WAR!**

Now, back to our own introspection. It would be sad if we responded with the same "righteous indignation" that these soldiers did. The last count of folks killed in the World Trade Center attack was over 6,000. Introspection can prevent what President Abraham Lincoln feared, when he stated "a house divided cannot stand." Our resolve should be united. But what can we do here?

Our community has been spared recent tragic losses of sons and daughters in the military service. A quick scan of our local veterans parks and memorials show gradually dwindling numbers of folks lost in service to our nation over the last century. I hope it remains that way, but write this to bring out a point That point is about commitment.

A friend once described commitment as a ham and egg breakfast -- which is committed to your breakfast, the chicken or the pig? We do not have the right to grieve for lost souls from the Trade Center and Pentagon attacks, nor criticize the perpetrator's lack of regard for life, while not taking a second out of our day to grieve a greater number who die daily in our abortion clinics.

We cannot moan and wail about how unfair this attack was, while we gossip about our neighbor, and turn them in to the City Council if they do not behave as we do (especially without even talking it out with them first).

Nor can we even consider retaliation, retribution, or bringing the perpetrator of these acts to justice while we discriminate against fellow citizens based on race, creed, color, religion, national origin, or even educational status.

Biblically, this is the speck and plank lesson -- and we had better be very sure that before we remove a speck from the world's eye, that we can see through the plank of our own. This introspection is very painful, but necessary before we send our children off to risk their lives defending our freedom on foreign shores. We must decide what we stand for now -- we either fish or cut bait. Without thoughtful and decisive resolve, we are the "house divided."

God did and continues to bless us. Over 20,000 lives were saved directly on Sept. 11. God only knows how many were indirectly saved by those who perished in a Pennsylvania field. Now it is our turn to respond.

I do not recommend we sit quietly, wringing our hands in front of a TV. I recommend we meet our neighbor, help each other, discuss what happened, and decide how we will fight for what we believe.

Out of this tragic event, we finally have cause for introspection, identifying what we treasure, and standing up for it. God bless us and this great nation!

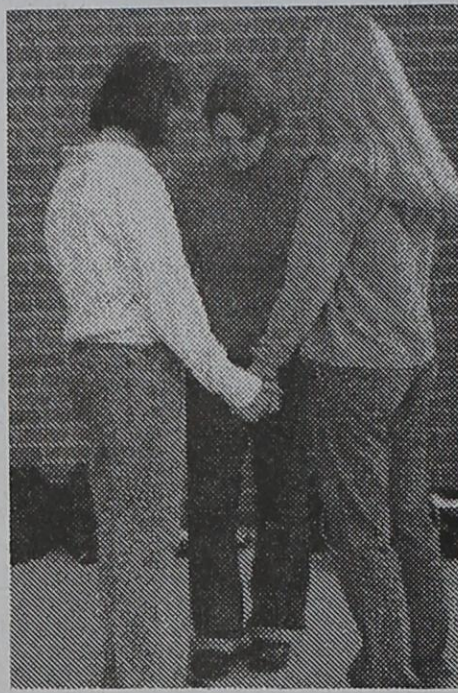

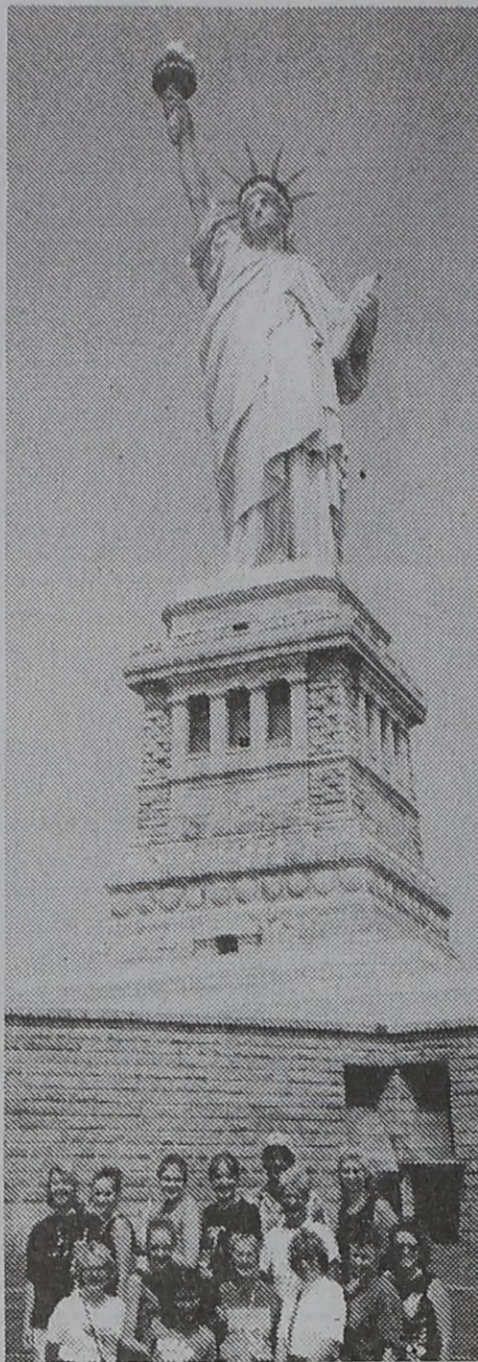

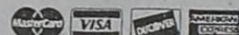

LIVE CATTLE: Cattle prices turned long term charts down the week of the attack in New York. Prices have fallen sharply lower on basically a shut-down in the economy. Beef sales are reportedly off 75% in some areas. Canceled conventions, flights and uneasiness in the market has pressured demand for beef.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeder prices have attempted to remain strong in the cash, but futures prices have followed the panic selling in the Live Cattle. Trends have all turned down since the attack. Cash feeders are still expected to remain in tight supplies this Fall which may eventually translate into higher prices in the first quarter of next year.

CORN: Corn price slipped this week as uncertainty in the world economy has moved buyers to the sidelines. Harvest pressure is expected to keep a lid on rallies. The impact a ware may have could be positive for prices in the future. Demand is expected to resurface over time, but uncertainty has taken its toll on commodity prices in general.

SOYBEANS: Bean prices are also moving down again as traders begin to focus more on domestic demand rather than global. News that China would be accepted into the World Trade Organization this week did little to support prices.

WHEAT: Wheat prices also pushed lower on expectations of export cancellations coming out of the Middle Eastern nations. Basically, buyers were leaving the market until there is more clarification as to the direction the U.S. will be taking overseas.

COTTON: Cotton prices found some support close to 35 cents this week and prices have stopped their decline for the time being. Again, because of the uncertainty after the attack in New York, sellers are on the sidelines. The NY Exchanges were located in the Twin Towers which fell. An alternate location with abbreviated hours will continue for several more weeks.


