Come on Albert, let's show 'em that the men can beat the women--even if Truitt Hardage can't.

The things you will do to pass the time is often amazing. While tenderly measuring the progress of Renal Calculi we read a summary of a report prepared by America's Sound Transportation Review Organization, a board created by the directors of the Association of America's Railroads. This group was formed and began work well before the Penn Central fiasco; so its findings have been driven home to the public in a most dramatic manner lately.

This summary was sent to us by our friend, George Grader, Santa Fe PR Chief in Amarillo. Had it not been for George, we probably would have never even heard of the report, much less even read it. It is too bad that more concerned people do not have access to these type reports. It could open the eyes of our citizenry before the indifference of our government bureaucracy and the greed of our various labor barons throws this vital American industry into government ownership and hence on the weary back of the American taxpayer.

In this short space, we can only say that we concur with the major findings of the report, and that the plight of the railroad industry must be recognized by the government at all levels. That labor must recognize its own enlightened self interest in a privately owned and operated system. This may well be the last gasp of a privately owned and operated transportation system in the United States. To abandon railroad industry to nationalization is in a large measure denying capitalism as an economic system.

If we in this country want to stave off socialism, we must insist that our government take its strangling fingers off the jugular vein of capitalistic free enterprise. We must insist that irresponsible labor unions and labor cartels be subject to the same laws of justice that management harks to.

Labor has the most to lose in a communistic society, but from the irresponsible actions and words of its leadership, this elementary fact has not got across to the present strikers.

Therefore, while the railroads need help, it is not for them alone that we are concerned but for our entire economic viability as a free enterprise economy. The majority of our readers may well shrug this off as not being within their scope, but we feel that every person through the Democratic processes can help effect changes in our government and in its laws and policies. Again the demands of citizenship require political awareness and the necessity for us all to exercise our franchise while we still may.

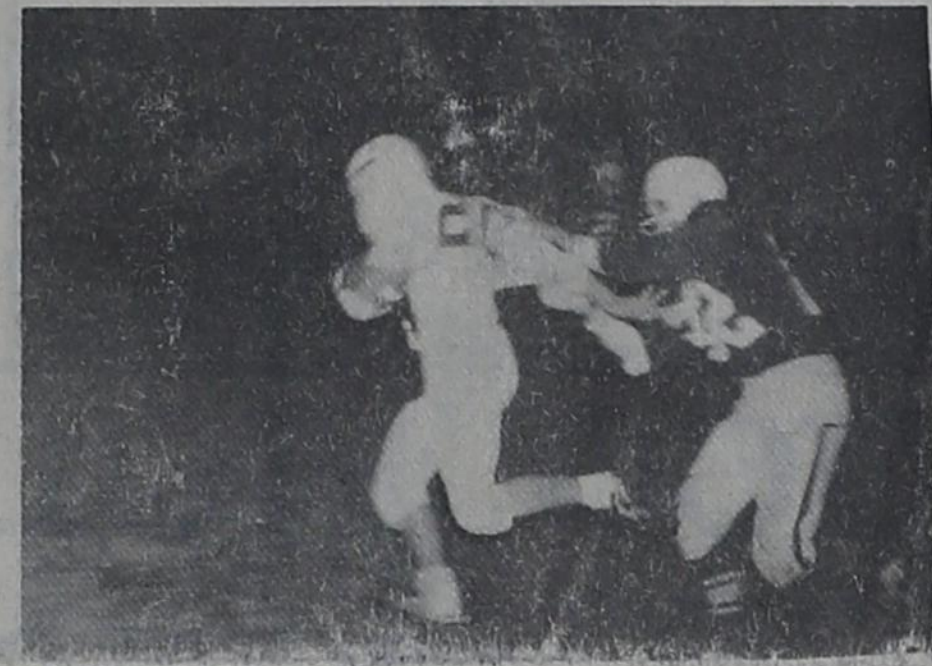
With Vaughn --

Texico Wins District Match 18-0

Texico's Wolverines opened District 4-A play with an 18-0 win over the Vaughn Eagles at Texico Friday night, setting their season record at 2-1. Johnny Dane of Texico received the opening kickoff and returned it to the Wolverine 35-yard line. Mike Casey, quarterback, called on fullback Marty White who failed to break through the Vaughn defense; so Texico faced a second and ten. Albert Steward then slipped on a pitchout losing five yards on the play. On third and 15, Ken Farmer picked up five, leaving the down at fourth and 10. The punting assignment went to Wesley Clark who kicked the ball back to Vaughn territory. Vaughn took over on their own 40-yard line and failed to go through the line on two plays; so the Eagles quarterback went to the air on third and nine. This play was broken up by Monty Lambert and Vaughn had to

punt to Texico from their own back 40 yards, ending up on the Eagle 34-yard marker. Vaughn Lambert returned the punt (Continued on Page 4)

Farwell Falls To Class AA Dimmitt

A much improved Farwell Steer team met defeat once again at the claws of the Dimmitt Bobcats in Steer Stadium Friday night, Dimmitt, of Class AA, delivered the 24-0 decision before a large and enthusiastic crowd in an exciting game. The visitors picked up their three touchdowns in the first quarter of play and were unable to score again until the fourth period. Randy Chandler took the opening kickoff for the Steers on the 15 and carried it to the 27. The tough Cat defense was stubborn and would allow the Steers only four plays before a punt was necessary. The Bobcats took possession on their own 46 and four plays later they faced a third and long yardage situation on the Steer 44. This was rectified by a beautiful pass from QB Mark Wohlgemuth to end Max Newman on the Farwell three. Dimmitt's first tally was made from there by swift Dan Frierson, with Hoyt Hestand adding the extra point.

Gary Erwin took the resulting Dimmitt kickoff on the 15 and was hit almost immediately. A punt to the Steers 39 after four plays gave Dimmitt possession again. The Bobcats got out of another third and long situation on the 43 with pinpoint passing. The final 16 yards for their second score were run by Dan Frierson. After another true kick, the Cats led the Steers 14-0.

This time Gary Erwin de-

livered the kickoff from the goal line to the Steer 25. The angry Steers found the visitors' line would yield but three yards, and these grudgingly. David Nino returned the Farwell punt to the Steer 30. The Steer defense tightened in this series and Brett Hargrove returned a pass interception from the six to the 27. The same process repeated and Farwell was forced to punt after four plays and gave the Cats the ball on their 42. (Continued on Page 4)

Steers Travel To Morton

Farwell's Steers will hit the road tonight (Friday) when they travel to Morton to be guests of the Indians in their third outing of the season. The Blue and White will be trying to move into the winner's column after suffering two straight defeats at the hands of Class AA ball clubs.

Morton, who edged the Steers 7-0 last year in a fumble-laden attempt by Farwell, was shut out by a large margin by the Freshman Tigers last Friday night; however, injuries to key Indian players aided in the huge margin of defeat.

Coach Toby Booth of the Farwell squad says that Morton fields a large ball club and that they are "quick enough." Their backs have really good speed, says Booth, and adds that they rely heavily on Elton Patton, a good and fast fullback. Standout returnees from last year's aggregation are Terry Harvey and McCollins, a 245-pound tackle.

Booth says that all the Steers should be in fairly good shape for the encounter and that if they all play well, Farwell could win the extra point.

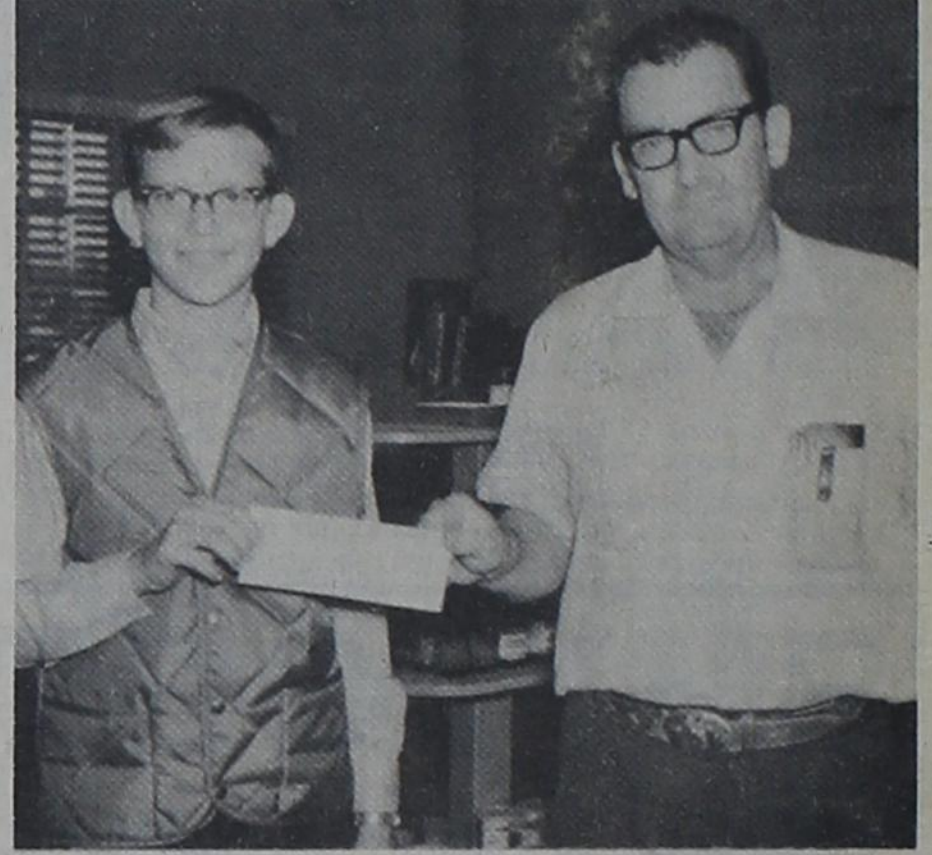

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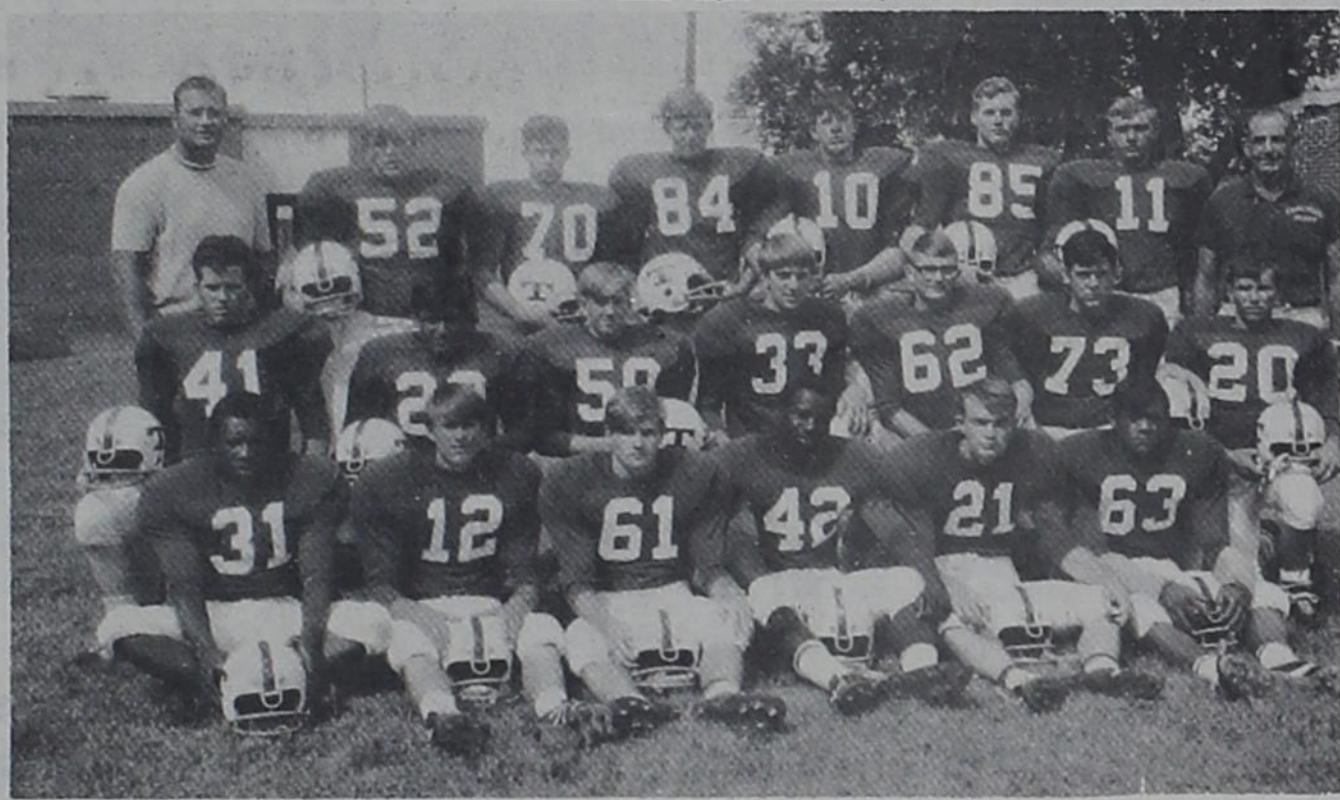

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ASC Community Committeemen Elected To Convene Fri., Sept. 25

Farmers of Parmer County have elected a total of 15 ASC community committeemen and alternates in a mail election conducted earlier this month, according to Louis Welch, chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

ASC community committeemen assist the County ASC Committee in administering farm programs in Parmer County, such as wheat, cotton and peanut acreage allotments, feed grain bases, sugar beet proportionate shares and agricultural conservation cost-sharing measures. They also help keep local producers informed of farm program provisions and regulations.

In addition, the just-elected ASC community committeemen have an important responsibility in the near future in fill-

ing vacancies on the County ASC Committee and determining the chairman and vice-chairman for the coming year, Welch said.

The new ASC community committeemen will convene September 25, at 8 p.m. in the ASCS office in a meeting open to the public. They will elect one county committeeman to serve a three-year term and two alternates to serve one-year terms. After the vacancies are filled, the community committeemen will determine which of the three regular members of the County ASC Committee will be Chairman and Vice-Chairman.

Each of the three ASC community committees are made up of three members and two alternates, who serve for a one-year period. The candidate in each ASC community who re-

ceived the largest number of votes is the committee chairman. Second highest is vice-chairman; third is regular member; fourth and fifth in the number of votes received are first and second alternates.

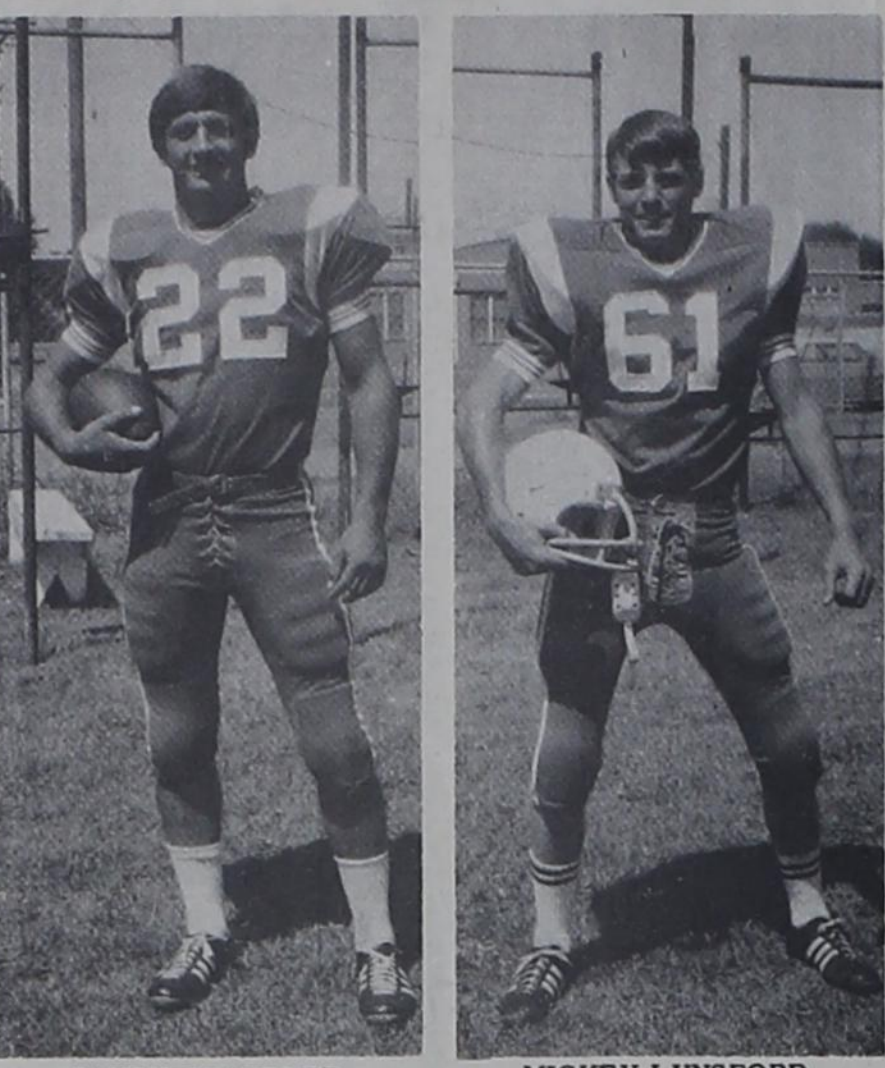

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Farmers Vote Saturday In Soybean Referendum

The Security State Bank of Farwell will be the voting site for the Saturday, Sept. 26, soybean referendum. Polls will be open from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. and a Texas Soybean Association representative will be in charge.

Voting for the referendum will be handled by the Texas Commissioner of Agriculture and the results from balloting will come through his office. All soybean producers, including farm owners, tenants and sharecroppers, are eligible to vote.

The purpose of this referendum being held is to decide if a check-off program will be initiated for the soybeans. The check-off would be one-half cent per bushel on those sold and would be deducted at the point of the first sale. If it has a

two-thirds "yes" vote or if those "yes" voters have produced 50 per cent of the total production in the area during a designated time, the referendum will then pass.

Parmer County Agricultural Agent Mack Heald says that voters must give a report of their production in the area for a designated period when they vote.

Soybean producers who do not wish to contribute to this program through the check-off are able to request a refund on paid-in assessments. They must make a written request within 60 days from the date of the check-off payment on a form that is furnished by the Producers Commodity Board.

A simple majority vote of qualified producers will terminate the program at any time.

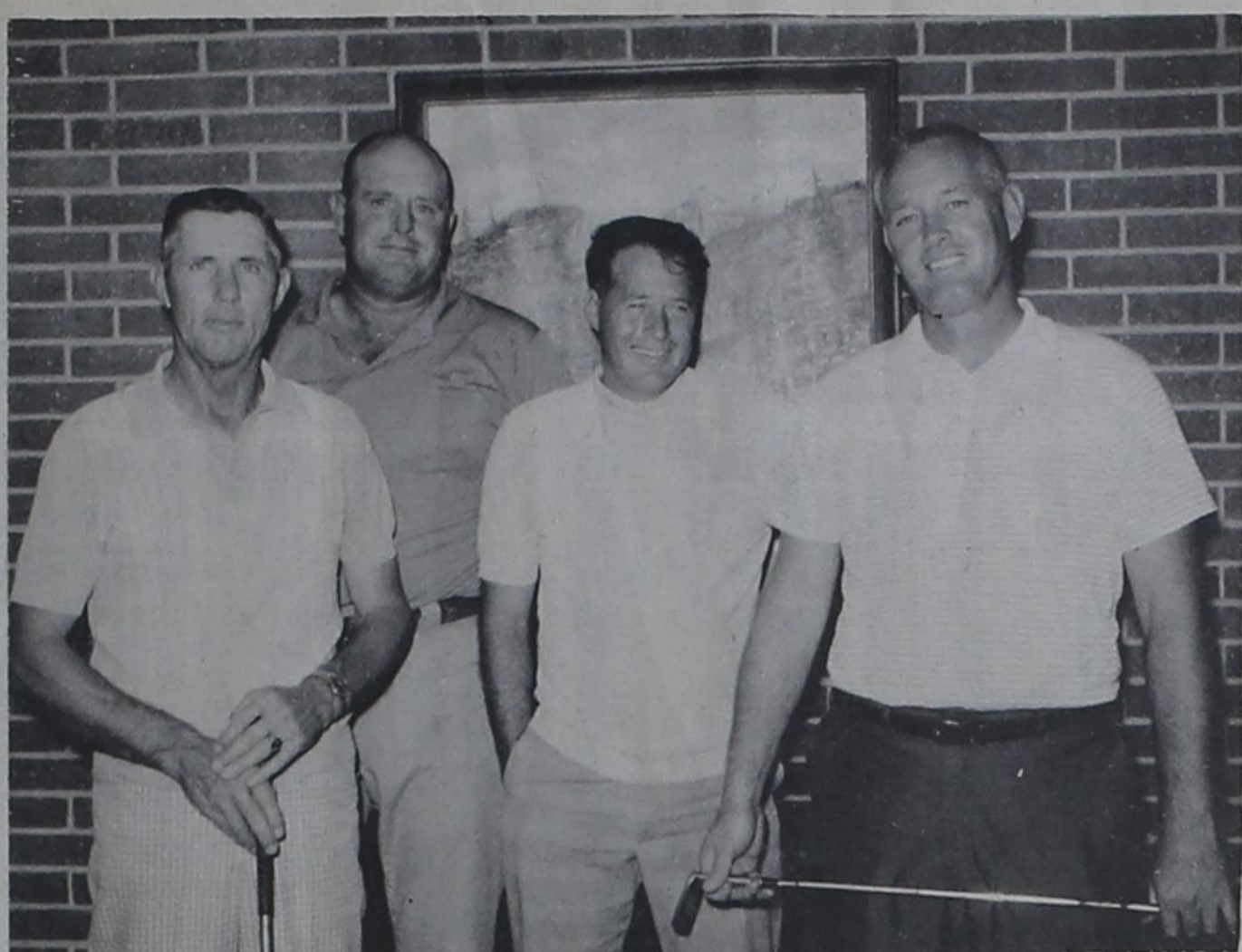

To Receive Degrees At Oklahoma State

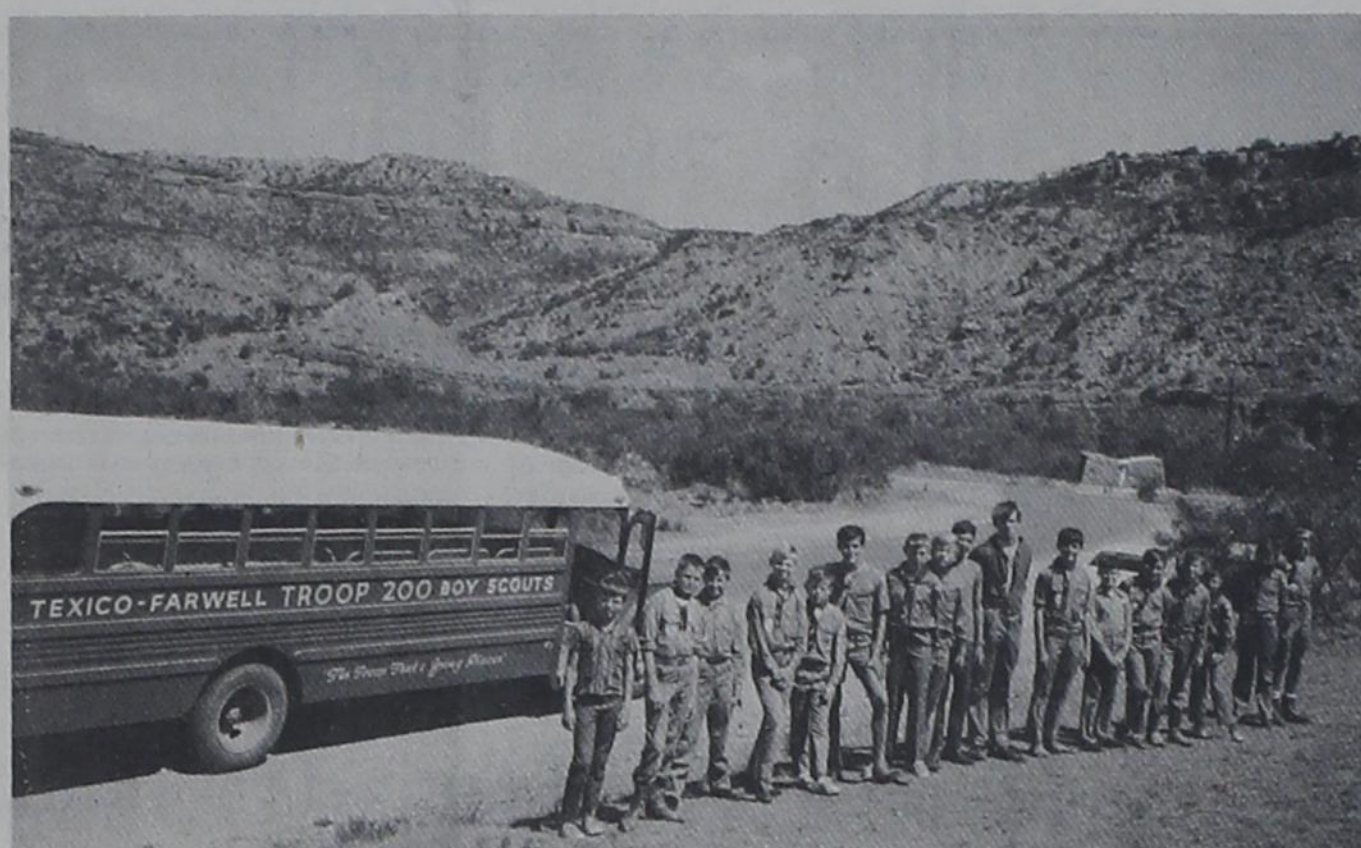
