Record 461 Entrants - -

Ken Horn Surges To Win Annual Football Contest

Ken Horn of Bovina, probably the dark horse of this year's annual Merchant's Football Contest, surged ahead in the final week of guessing to nab the contest's grand prize of two tickets to the Dallas Cowboys-Philadelphia Eagles game on December 13, \$50 in cash, an overnight's stay at the Regent Hotel in Dallas, and transportation to and from the game.

Most contest entrants and coffee-shop quarterbacks thought that the winner of this year's top prize was between Sam Drager and Mark Williams. What no one was paying attention to was entrant Horn, who each week moved up another notch in the guessing game. The final week, he not only scooped up to snatch the grand prize away from both Williams and Drager, but did so with a comfortable two-point lead.

Horn, with 102 total points, said he won by "going with the upsets" at the contest's end.

Last week, Drager sat alone in the first place position with 92 overall points, and Williams and Horn were tied for second place with 91 points.

But because of Horn's "upset guessing," he predicted 11 correct wins as compared to 9 for Williams and 8 for Drager. Consequently Horn grabbed up the contest's grand prize with 102 points, and Drager and Williams tied for second place with 100 points each. Also, with his 11 correct wins and a 29-point spread on his tiebreaker entry this week, Horn placed second in the weekly contest winning another \$5.

This week's first place winner was Donnie McDonald of Muleshoe who, with 11 correct guesses and being only 19 points off on the tiebreaker, won \$7.50.

Sheriff Optimistic For Crime Program

Although there are quite a few more details to be worked out before it actually gets rolling, Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan is quite optimistic about the county's new Crime Stoppers program.

The initial \$1,000 reward fund money was given to the program by the Parmer County Commissioners Court in October, and Morgan explains that the money was a "one time deal. I told the Commissioners that I would not be back to ask for more money. I don't think we should obligate county money for this program. It is in the public's interest and I think if the public is interested they will keep it up with both calls and money," the sheriff said.

Crime Stoppers is not a new program. Many county and state governments have the system in operation now, and Morgan points out that "It's worked so well in other places. Clovis for example has one that works real well."

So how will it work? Morgan

said that a particular crime will be advertised in all three Parmer County newspapers. Persons with information or clues about the particular crime will call into a central location. If the information leads to an arrest and conviction, a reward will be paid.

"Callers may remain anonymous if they wish," Morgan explained. "And if a person wishes to donate money to be designated as a reward for a particular crime, that may be done also, or money may be donated into the Crime Stoppers General Fund."

The sheriff, who will be working with County Commissioner Ernest Anthony, explained that many law departments have a similar program, but that it is not publicized. However, Morgan feels that publicity of the crimes "works better."

"People get mad and want something done. Also, the cash reward works as an in-

centive," he explained.

The sheriff said that he has hopes of getting the new program underway by the first of the year, but that a lot of details have to be worked out. "All kinds of things have to be ironed out. There are a couple of legal aspects to check on. But I'm optimistic, I really am."

It will be Morgan and Anthony who will decide on the amount of reward money, to range anywhere from \$50 to \$100, Morgan said.

Since the idea for the program was first published last month, the sheriff said he's gotten a positive response from the people of Parmer County.

Persons who wish to donate money to the Parmer County Crime Stoppers Fund should contact either Morgan or Anthony. "It has to work with the people in the community," Morgan said. "But I think it will. It's worked pretty good in other places."

During his most recent pastorate of four years, at Grandview Baptist in St. Louis, the Sunday School attendance more than tripled.

In 1974, baptisms totaled 101, among the top ten of the state.

Recently, after 17 continuous years in the pastorate, Chatman has launched out into full-time evangelistic work, having conducted more than 100 revival crusades both at home and abroad.

Miles, the song leader, was born and reared in South

Central Missouri and has served in churches in Texas and Missouri.

He has served in the music and education areas of the ministry for over six years. He was educated at Southwest Baptist College in both areas of music and religious studies.

Miles has worked as an evangelist in several of the 50 states as well as in four foreign countries.

If it does and Congress has just lopped a huge chunk out of our defense appropriations, our ace in the hole will be a deuce and Brezhnev will rake in the pot - again.

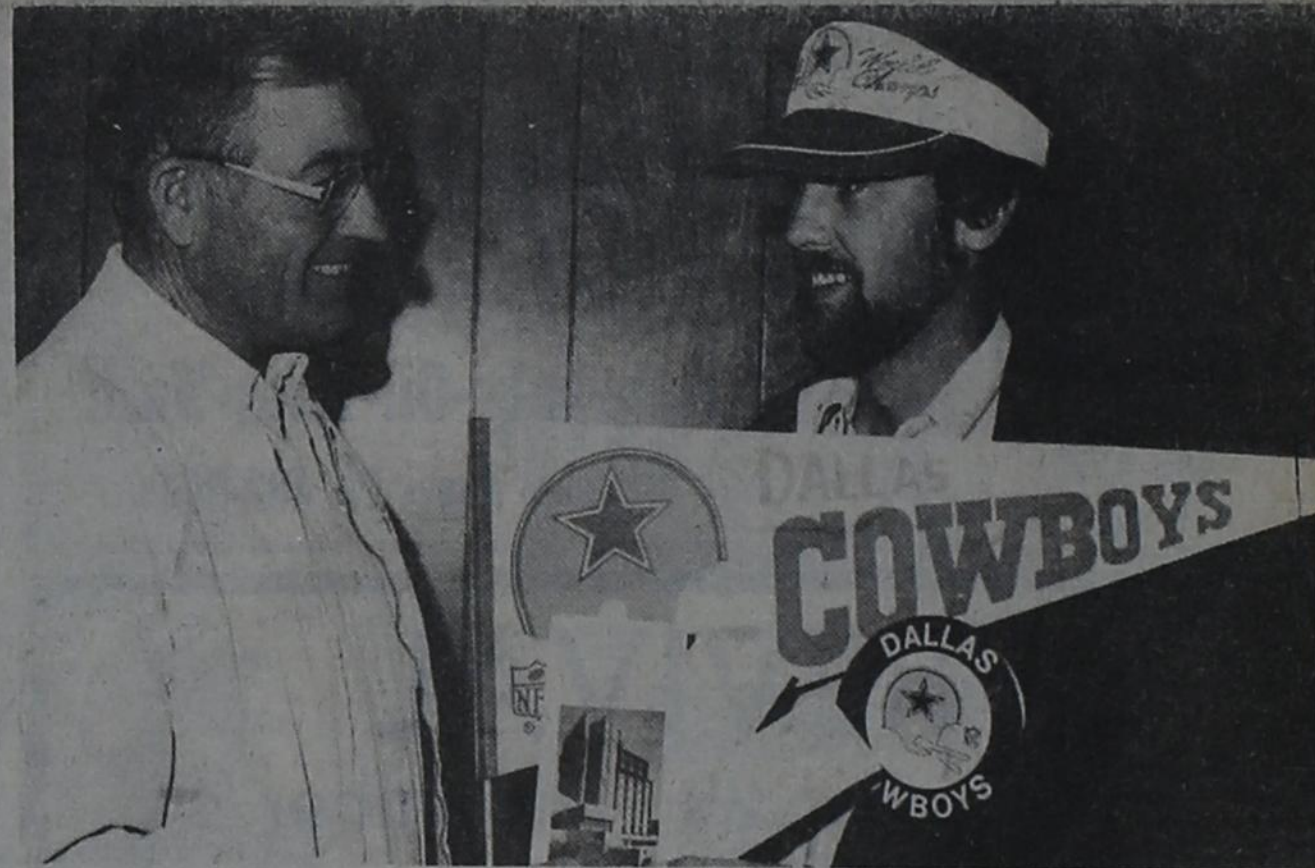

2 Hereford Men - -

Arrests May Solve Area Burglaries

The arrest of two Hereford men may be the solution to approximately 50 residential burglaries in Parmer, Bailey, Curry, and Quay counties, and several other New Mexico counties, "clear up to Colorado," according to Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan.

Although the names of the two men could not be released, Morgan said the two were arrested near Denver, Colo., and are currently in Curry County custody in Clovis, "because New Mexico had more charges out on them."

The two men were arrested on charges of carrying a concealed weapon, possession of a dangerous drug, LSD; attempted bribery of a police officer, felony menacing and possession of stolen goods, Morgan said.

One of the men is currently on felony probation from

Parmer and Deaf Smith counties, the sheriff said.

"It looks as if we have almost 50 residential burglaries solved," because of the arrests, Morgan said. "We have recovered two television sets that have been positively identified."

In connection with the arrests and in an attempt to locate some of the alleged stolen property from area burglaries, officers from Curry, Bailey and Parmer counties executed a search warrant on November 20 at a residence in Bovina, recovering one stolen TV.

During the search, four illegal aliens were discovered and arrested, Morgan said.

Currently in Parmer County custody awaiting the Mexican Border Patrol are Juan Luna, Juan Robles, Enselio Salazar

and Angel Barinito.

Morgan said that the chances of the two Hereford men being tried in Parmer County for burglary charges in this area are slim since the two both have several felony charges against them in New Mexico, but he says if he can locate the stolen goods he will be satisfied.

In other action this week at the Parmer County Sheriff's office, Gene Smith of Lazbudie reported that a transfer pump and two chrome air horns were taken off of his truck the night of November 19th.

Smith valued the items at \$250.

In the court of Justice of the Peace Albert Smith, Salvador Flores, 43, of Hereford was fined \$25 plus court costs on a charge of public intoxication.



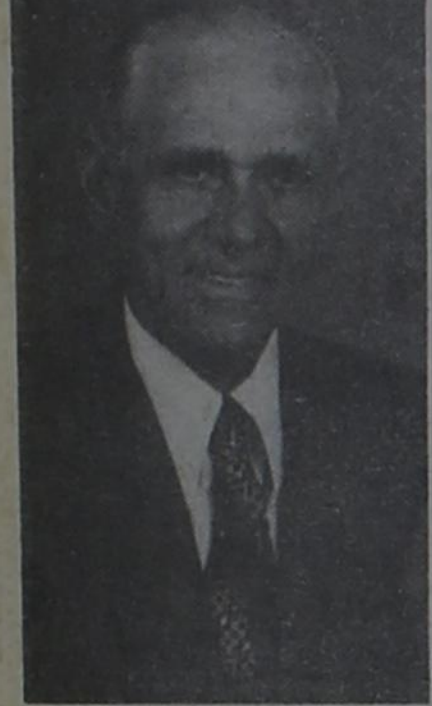

loan for the pagers. All of the department's new pagers were purchased with donations from Twin Cities residents and organizations.

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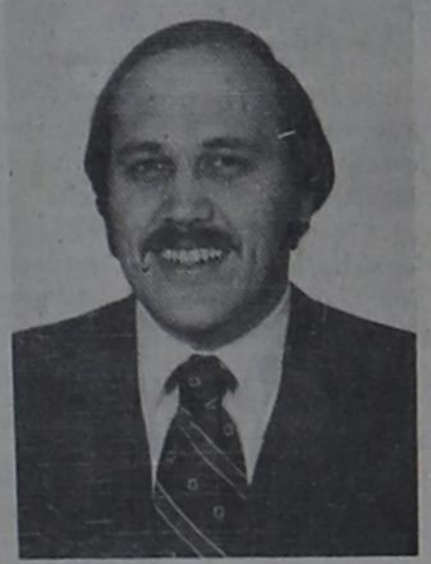

The program was opened with a welcome and prayer by Bro. Bob Reid, pastor of the Pleasant Hill Baptist Church.

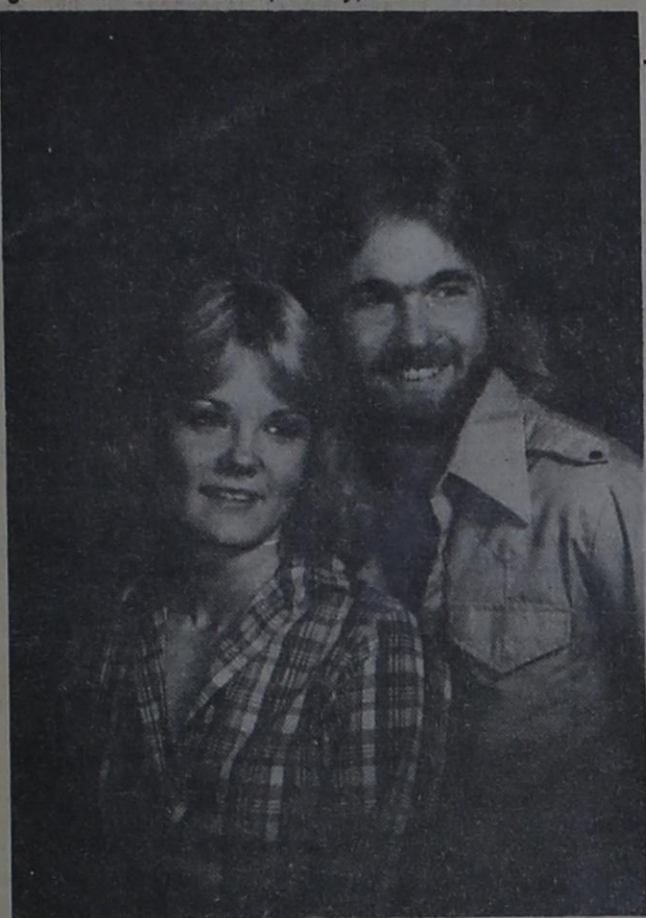
Ed Sumrall gave the roll call of churches present and also presented the treasurer's report.

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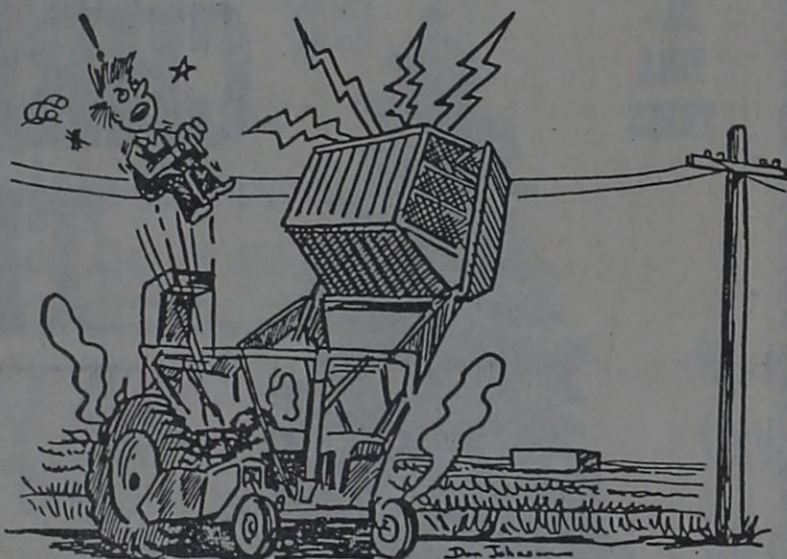
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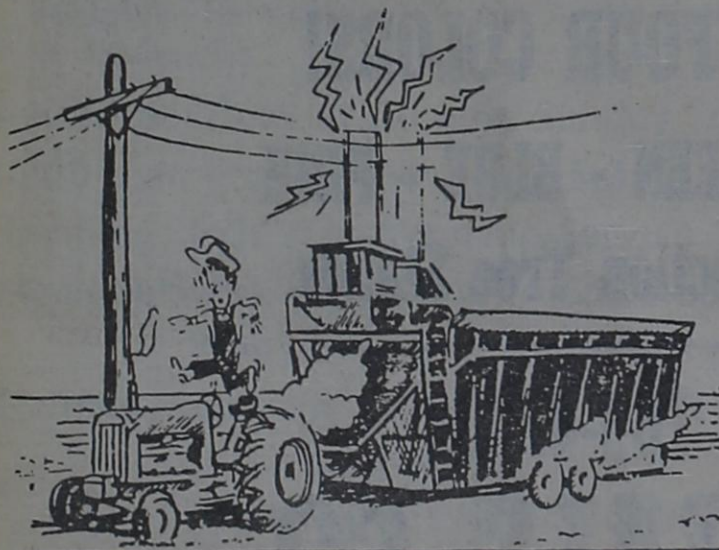
Look Up and Live

Cotton harvest is here and the Coop urges extreme caution when operating farm equipment near electric lines.



In recent years, many incidents have involved cotton module builders. The extended portion of the cotton module builder can easily come into contact with overhead electric lines if the operator is not careful. The same problem exists with overhead baskets on cotton strippers.

We urge farmers and their employees to be alert to these potential hazards and take every possible precaution to avoid serious injury or death. When moving a module builder, be sure the packer arm is lowered as far as it will go. When using a stripper with an overhead basket, be sure to check for overhead lines before dumping.

If some piece of equipment does contact these 7200 volt overhead lines, it's important that you or the operator not try to simply back away. The line could break, or if it's already broken, it could tangle in the equipment and break again, compounding the problem and increasing the danger.

Jump clear of the machine, being sure not to touch the ground and the machine at the same time. Move quickly away at a right angle to the power line. Then call Bailey County Electric Cooperative at (Area Code 806) 272-4504 whether the line is broken or not.

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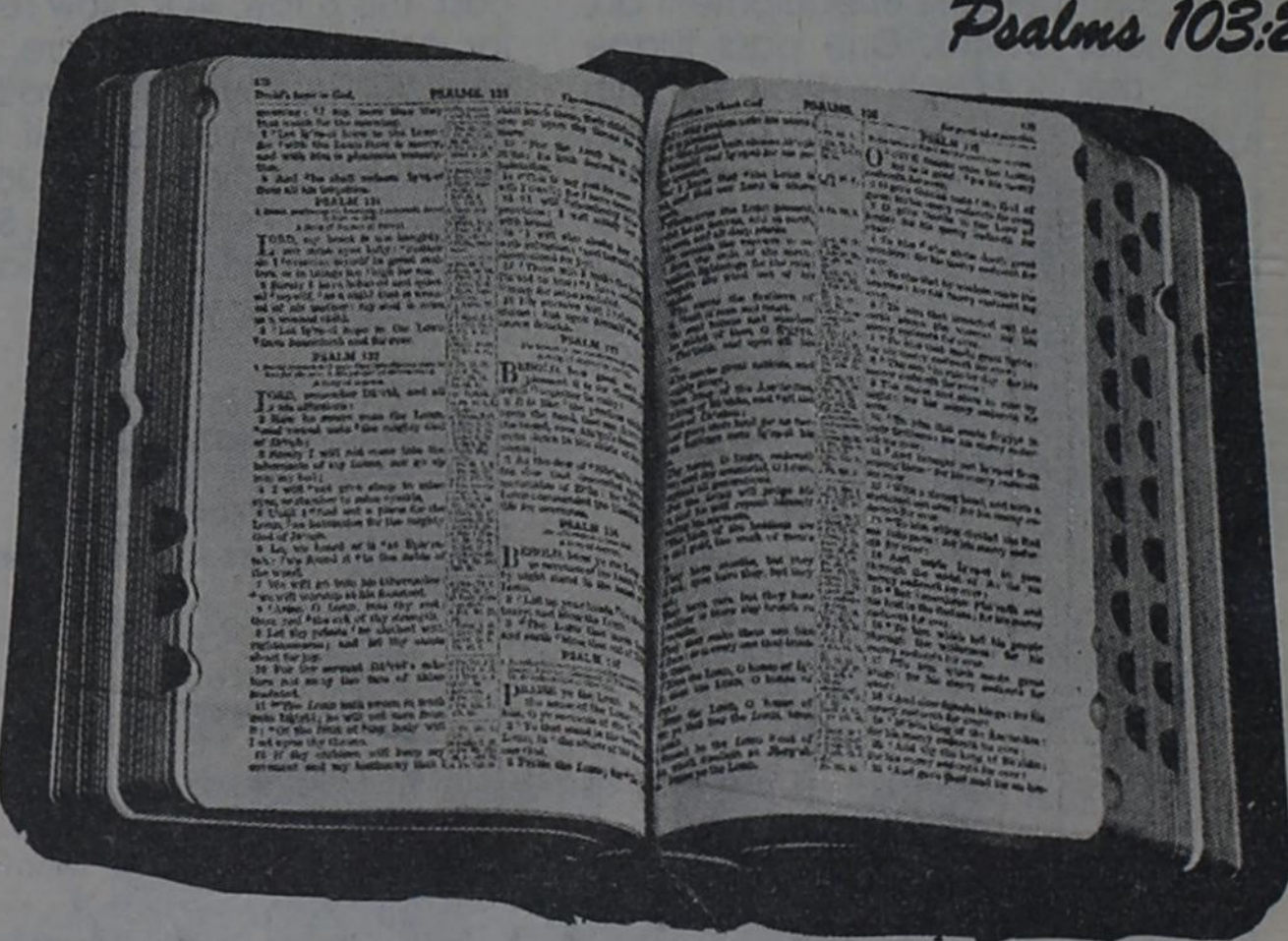

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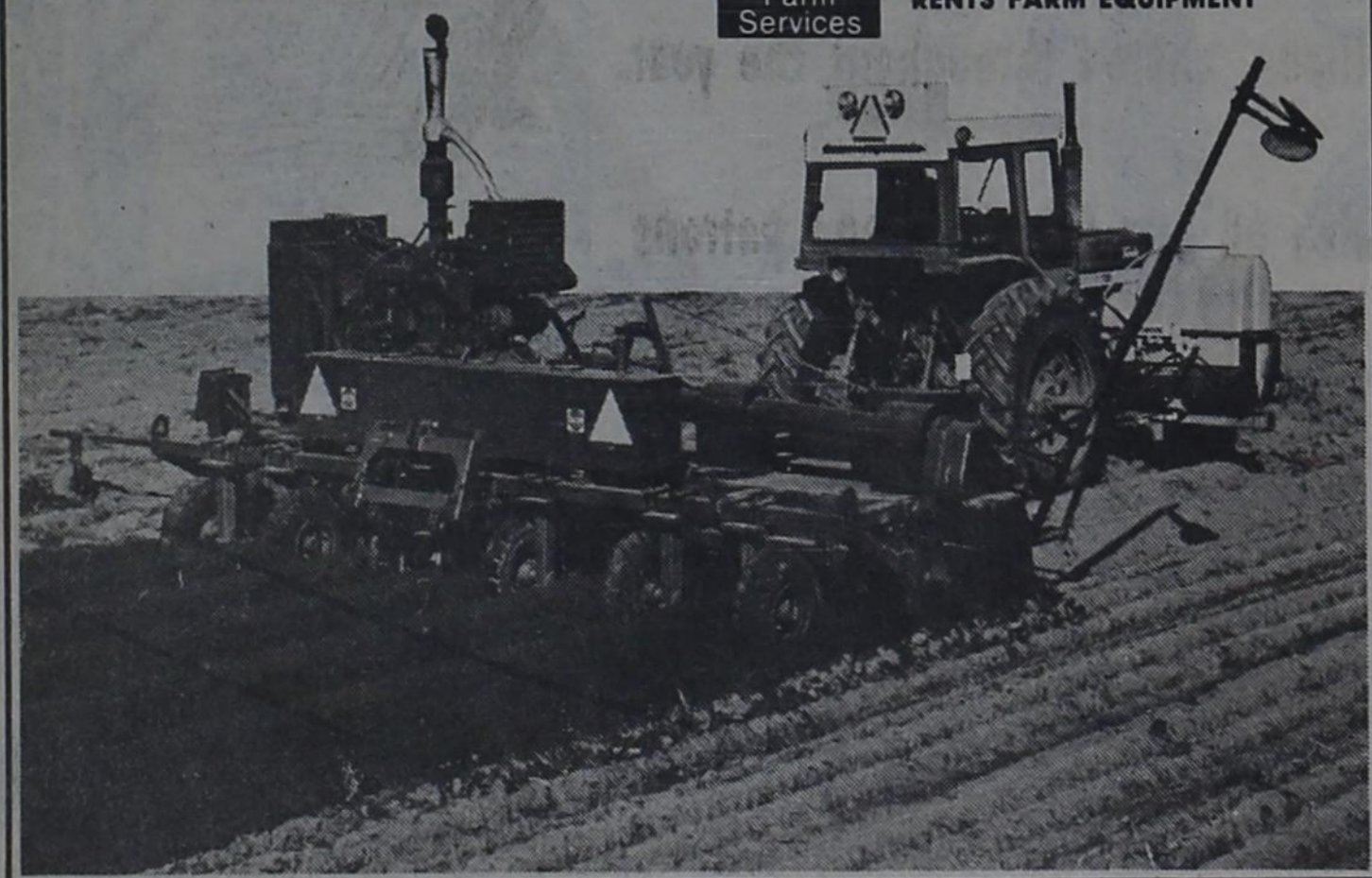

"We'll definitely be competitive. I still think our district is one of the toughest. This district is salty," Shaw remarked, adding that the two district foes to be the hardest to overcome will be Floyd and Melrose. "It'll be tough to get out of district, but that is the team's number one goal. We're not going for an undefeated season, but we are sure looking

Season Statistics Given For Gridiron Wolverines

Texico's football Wolverines may not have ended the season with the state title, but statistics prove that they definitely outplayed, outmaneuvered and outscored their season opponents.

"We had a real good year alright," said Coach David Lynn.

Before ending the 9-1 season, the mighty Green Machine grabbed up 3059 yards of turf as compared to 1297 yards by their competitors, rushing for 2487 of those yards on 508 ball carries.

Earl Bibbs stole 1474 of those yards himself, in addition to leading the squad's scoring effort with 72 points in 12 touchdowns.

For its 1981 season, which ended in the state championship playoffs at Reserve, Texico went to the air quite a bit more than last year, passing for 572 yards in 44 completions. Quarterback Jerry Wimberly threw 34 times for 87 yards, three resulting in touchdowns and three for PATs.

The Green and White averaged 21.9 points per game, compared to 6 points per game for the opposition. The gridiron squad began most games a bit slowly, statistics showing that for the season they scored 28 points in the first quarter, 67 points in the second quarter, 39 in the third and a whopping 85 in the fourth. For most of the

games, Texico held the opposing teams scoreless in the fourth stanza of play.

In fact, defense was the strong point of the Texico team, forcing the opponents to punt the ball 49 times this season, and having to do so only 28 times themselves.

Individual statistics indicate that Todd Gerles was second leading rusher behind E. Bibbs with 330 yards on 73 carries. Gerles also totaled in with five touchdowns and four PATs.

Willie Bibbs pushed for 279 yards on 50 carries, scoring 4 touchdowns. Jerry Wimberly had 213 yards in 61 carries; Steve Garrett, 69 yards on 15 carries; Ronnie Dunsworth, 49 yards on 16 carries; Brad Steward, 13 yards on 10 carries; James Kelley, 30 yards on 1 carry; Lynn Tubbs, 34 yards on 7 carries; Terry Tubbs, 3 yards on 3 carries; and James Robinson, 1 yard on 1 carry.

Kent Harding and Kevin West were leading receivers catching the pigskin 16 times each for 209 and 239 yards respectively.

Coach Lynn will lose 13 players to graduation this year, seven offensive starters and six defensive starters. "It'll be a little tough, but the attitude in our younger kids is great, and a year's time will be a big difference," he said, adding "We're still going to be competitive."

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State Highway Reps Meet With County

Representatives from the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation met with the Parmer County Commissioners Court Monday answering questions concerning the proposed paving of roads in the county.

The representatives advised the commissioners that 5.2 miles from Farm-to-Market Road 1731 to US Highway 60 had been selected for the paving.

In a previous report, Acting District Engineer C.W. Nall, Jr., of Lubbock, District Five, said that the road program would include that stretch of highway, provide Relocation Assistance, and construct

grade, structure and surface; \$500 relocation assistance, and \$625,000 construction.

Patsy Nance of the Parmer County Tax Appraisal Office presented a new contract to the county which began some of the services offered by the Parmer County Tax Appraisal District sooner than the original contract had stated.

Minicomputer use increases workload of bigger computers

COLLEGE STATION — The growing use of minicomputers is increasing the workload of the giant, more sophisticated computers like the two owned by the Texas Engineering Experiment Station (TEES) and used by agencies throughout the state.

Dr. Dick B. Simmons, director of the Data Processing Center located on the Texas A&M University campus, said he encourages agencies and departments contracting with his center to buy their own small computers. In the long run, it will mean more work for the bigger machines.

"They become computer-oriented and discover more and more jobs the computer can do. They also discover that their minicomputers cannot do all they need them to," he said.

Approximately 10 percent of the center's work, which involves two large computer systems, is done for state agencies and universities from Alpine to Amarillo through telephone lines. The institutions include the University of Texas at Tyler, Blinn College in Brenham, Sul Ross State University in Alpine and the Texas State Technical Institute in Waco, the Texas Industrial Commission, Texas Youth Council and the State Auditor's Office.

UNTIL WHEN?

One of the greatest prophecies of Scripture is found in Psalm 110, where David wrote: "The Lord said unto my Lord, Sit Thou at My right hand until I make thine enemies Thy footstool."

In Matthew 22:41-46 our Lord explained that this was a prophecy about Himself, David's Son and Lord. Men might hate Him and cry "Away with Him!" They might nail Him to a tree and laugh and sneer at Him, but God the Father would respond by saying: "Here, come sit at My right hand until I make Your enemies Your footstool."


We should never forget that, according to Bible prophecy, God's response to man's rejection of Christ was to be judgment and wrath. In Psalm 2 the question is asked, why the nations rage and the people imagine a vain thing—that they can get along without the One whom God has anointed to be King. The Psalm depicts God laughing at their attempts to thwart His purposes and predicts that "the Lord shall have them in derision" and "speak unto them in His wrath."

At Pentecost all was ready for the

judgment to fall. Christ had been crucified and "the last days" had begun as Peter declared in Acts 2:16-17, quoting from the prophet Joel. But strangely, while some of Joel's prophecy was fulfilled, or began to be fulfilled at that time, the rest of it was not, for God did not—and has not yet—sent the prophesied judgment.

Thank God, in infinite grace He interrupted the prophetic program, delayed the remainder of its fulfillment, and revealed to the Apostle Paul His secret purpose to offer to His enemies everywhere salvation and reconciliation by free grace, through faith in the crucified, risen Savior.

In his Ephesian letter the apostle asks whether they have heard of "the dispensation of the grace of God, which is given me to you-ward; how that by revelation He made known unto me the mystery" (Ephesians 3:1-3). Now, thank God, His eternal purpose in Christ is no longer a secret. While the day of grace lasts we may be "justified freely by His grace, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus" (Romans 3:24).

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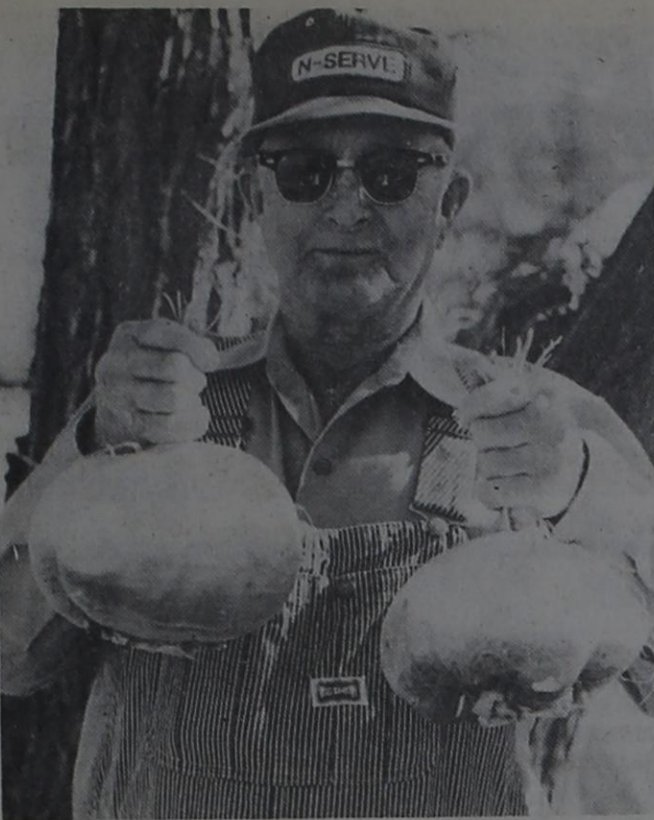

**ASCS Committee Election
Ballots Out November 27**

Farmers are reminded of the December 7 deadline for returning ASCS committee election ballots to the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office, says Prentice Mills, County Executive Director.

Voters will elect three committeemen and two alternate committeemen for each community in the county and those elected will serve during the calendar year 1981.

"The election of ASCS community committeemen is held by mail. Any producer of agricultural products is eligible to vote," said Mills. "An eligible voter will cast a ballot in the election in the county and community in which they reside or have farming interests."

According to an ASCS office spokesman, the ballots are to be mailed November 27 to all known eligible voters. "Anyone who feels that they are eligible

to vote and do not receive a ballot may pick one up at the ASCS office," the spokesman said.

Mills said that any eligible producer may vote, regardless of religion, race, sex, color or national origin. "A voter list is maintained in the local ASCS office and is open for public inspection through the final date for returning ballots, December 7," said the director.

Ballots will be counted in the ASCS office in Farwell. "The ballots are counted in public by members of the ASCS county committee," explained Mills.

All agricultural producers are urged to cast their ballot in this election. "After all, there are times when your ASCS committeemen are the most important elected officials that you have to deal with!" Mills concluded.

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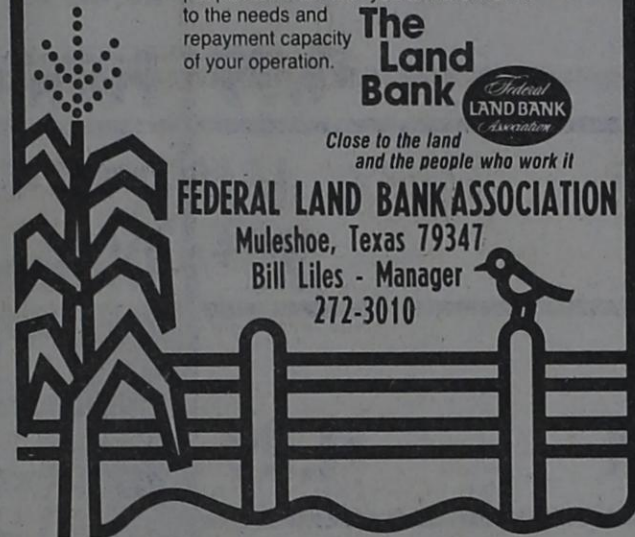
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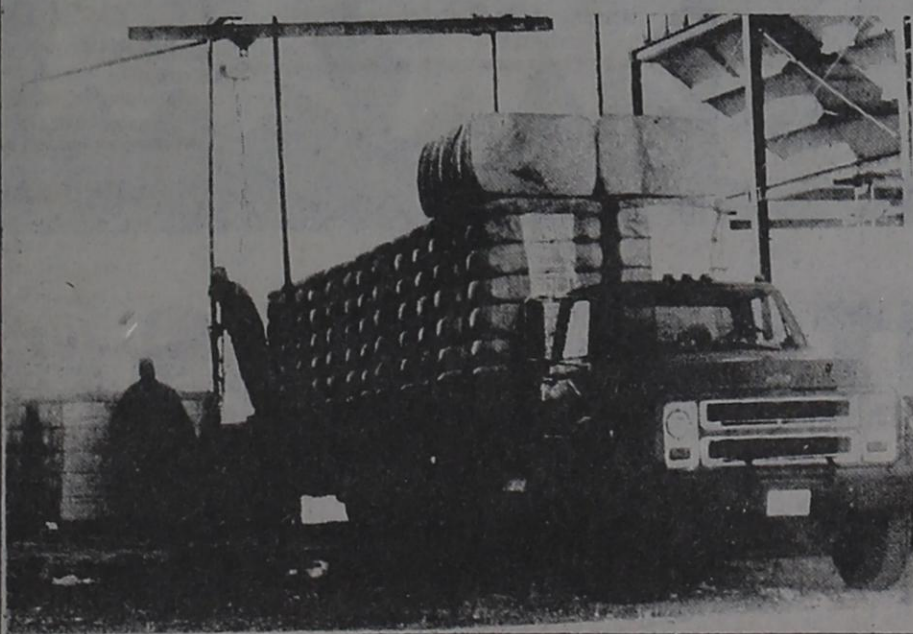
