The annual Texico Volunteer Fire Department dinner was held Saturday at the Farwell Community Center.


Lynn McDaniel was named Outstanding Individual of the Department. Firefighter Doug Scioli praised McDaniel, noting how he was always available when needed.





A celebration of life and living the Christian faith will be held for Wilbert "Jimmy" Kalbas on Saturday, Dec. 5, at 10:30 a.m. cst, at St. John Lutheran Church in Lariat, Texas.

Wilbert was born on Jan. 28, 1927, to Ernest and Martha (Gloyna) Lingnau Kalbas in Lee County, Texas. He was given the gift of God's forgiveness and rebirth through the waters of Holy Baptism on Feb. 13, 1927, at Vernon, TX. They moved and settled



where Wilbert lived the rest of his life, south of Farwell in

They joined St. John Lutheran Church in Lariat where Wilbert was an active member, and made public affirmation of his faith in Jesus as his Savior on Aug. 11, 1940. His confirmation verse was Psalm 37:4 "Delight yourself in the Lord and he will give you the desires of your heart". He attended the West Camp school and graduated from Farwell High School in 1944. Wilbert married Mary Janhsen of Wildorado, TX, on June 12, 1960, at Trinity Lutheran Church in Amarillo. God blessed their marriage with three children -- Donna, Sharon and Allen.

Wilbert passed from this life to eternal glory on Dec. 1 at the Lubbock Heart Hospital after a brief illness.

During his walk here on earth, he served as father, teacher, mentor and role model. His passion in life was his faith and it guided him daily. He served the Panhandle-South Plains Lutheran Camp Association for most of his life, beginning as a camp counselor when he was a teenager and served on the Board of Directors until the time of his death. He also served on the Board of Directors of the Lutheran Outdoor Ministries of Texas for several years and held most of the elected offices at St. John Lutheran Church throughout the years as well as serving as a Sunday School teacher, Sunday School Superintendent and Walther League sponsor.

Wilbert served on the Farwell School Board for 12 years and was fortunate enough to hand all of his children their diplomas. After the kids left home, he and Mary took up square dancing, and were active members of the Muleshoe Squares. Many square dancers from all over West Texas and Eastern New Mexico have fond memories of his "watermelon barn dances".

While farming was his occupation, it also served as his hobby. He planted a huge vegetable garden every year and enjoyed the tens of thousands of people that came out to the farm to pick their own vegetables. Over the last several years, he enjoyed loading up his pickup and trailer and going to the Clovis Farmers Market with his grandchildren. He and Mary were honored by several groups at Cannon Air Force Base for supporting trips to the farm in the fall.

Wilbert really enjoyed the friends he made over the years through this part of his business. He continued to farm up until the day before he entered the hospital. He often said that if you enjoy working, why quit?

In the evenings, and during his down time, he enjoyed studying scripture, playing games and going rabbit hunting with his grandsons. He was honored by the Bailey County Soil and Water Conservation District as Farmer of the Year and by the Farwell Chamber of Commerce as Agriculturist of the Year.

He was preceded in death by his parents; brothers Alvin and Otto Lingnau, and his granddaughter Lauren Ratke.

Those left behind include his wife Mary, at home; son Allen and wife Edie and their children Keith and Kinley of Farwell; a daughter Donna Ratke and her husband Mike and their children Austin, Mitchell and Meredith of Farwell; and a daughter Sharon May and her husband Billy and their children Josh, Abigail and Ashley Baker of Farwell; as well as great grandchildren Jared and Karleigh Baker of Farwell.



project coordinator of the Ute Water Project, Scott Verhines, and Clovis Mayor Gayla Brumfield to discuss in detail where the project stands and where it expects to be in the next 10 years.

Right now the \$500 million project has received Federal authorization and is expected to be voted on by Congress in the next year. The project costs are expected to be split up with 75% of the cost being paid by the federal government, 15% by New Mexico, and 10% by the 8 entities involved.

The participants are Texico, Melrose, Elida, Grady, Clovis, Portales, Curry County and Roosevelt

As it stands, 30% of the overall project design, and 50% of the first phase design are completed.

On the to-do list for the project is to complete engineering, host an environmental assessment in Logan for public comment, form a water utility and be approved by Congress.

The City of Texico will have to start paying their portion of the 10% starting at the end of next year.

City Clerk Carolyn Johnson said Texico has been collecting fees already to help offset the cost of the project, but water bills will increase if Texico stays in the project.

Right now, water rates are approximately \$19 per month for city residents.

According to the estimates provided by Verhines, Texico would face an additional \$3.33 surcharge per month for the years 2011 and 2012. The surcharge would be \$7 in 2013, and would be \$13.33 per month from 2014 until 2019.

Assuming everything goes according to plan, the project would start providing water to Texico in 2019. At that time, water users would have an additional \$46.49 per month on their bills for Ute Water.

Verhines pointed out that city water bills might not increase the whole amount since Texico would not have to rely on water wells as much, but councilman Doug Scioli pointed out that the wells could not simply be turned off. Especially if they might be needed again in the future.

enough water to supply the project. Verhines said that New Mexico can only store 200,000 acre/feet of water in Ute lake. Anything over that has to be sent to Texas.

Most years there will be plenty of water for the pipeline, but in the event of a prolonged drought the cities would use their wells to supplement water usage. Verhines also stated that conservation measures would go into effect in that case.

Councilman Oran Jay Autrey asked about increased costs of construction over the next 10 years and who would pay for them. Verhines said the federal money would increase to cover any construction cost increases. Resident James Holland asked how the water

would be controlled. Verhines said a Water Authority would be set up and the current plan is to have 3 seats go to Clovis (who uses 75% of the projected water) 2 seats will go to Portales, Curry County will get one seat and the last seat will be alternated between Elida, Melrose, Texico and Grady. City Attorney Marion Rutter asked if it was fair for

Texico to only be represented once every four years, especially since Curry County had a permanent representative. Verhines said Curry County was included because of the amount of infrastructure that is in the county, but he did not believe the smaller cities needed constant representation.

Fire Chief Lewis Cooper asked if Texico would still have to pay full price if a drought reduced the amount of water we got. Verhines did not know, but said the cost of the infrastructure would still have to

Finally, resident Debbie Ryan asked the council if there were any other options for Texico besides the **Ute Water Project.**

Autrey answered, "No. Not if we want our kids and their kids to have water in the future.".

In other news, the council:

 Heard from Scioli that Police Chief Doug Bowman and city worker Tommy Nieto collected donations from city employees, including the fire department, police, EMS, as well as city hall officials and gave over \$400 to the Secret Santa program in

Over the last couple of years, the program has benefited folks from Texico. Scioli praised Bowman and Nieto for getting all of the donations together.

- Discussed the Phase II water project that will connect two water wells up to the city. Autrey said the city might want to look at only connecting one well right now, and connect the other well when funds become available.





'Sweat Suit Project' begins

I would like to share with everyone the reason for the 7th annual "Sweat Suit

About 12 years ago, my grandmother was put into a Clovis nursing home because of a stroke. My "little grandma" (which is what we called her) was blessed to have many children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren, and even great-great-grandchildren that she had more then one visitor if not ten every day.

My little grandma was so loved that many of us would bring her lotion, tissue, snacks, night gowns, socks, etc which would eventually overfill her small closet and dresser, forcing the staff to ask us to remove many of her items.

We did not have a need for these items, so I asked if anyone could use the extra clothing. I was told there were many people who lived in the home who were not as fortunate as my little grandma. The staff would be more then happy to distribute her clothing to other residents who were in need.

I learned during the time that sweat suits were the perfect outfit for her. Because of her stroke, she was not able to walk or stand alone so she used a wheelchair. Most important for my little grandma were the sweat suits that kept her warm. Also, she was able to maneuver her wheelchair with her one good leg and not have to worry about a blanket getting caught up in the wheels. The clothing needs no special care and if they need to be replaced, they are not expensive.

A few years after my little grandma's death God placed a mission on my heart to continue to help others. In Dec. '03 the wonderful employees of Cummins Natural Gas Engines banded together to donate enough money to give every resident a sweat suit for Christmas. We included a Christmas picture for each resident that was colored by my daughter's elementary school and hand delivered the presents to the home.

Over the years, we have had many fundraisers including raffles, burrito sales, bake sales, and individual donations to earn enough to help more then 80 residents each year.

We have an even bigger challenge this year. United Methodist Church of Bovina has taken over the project. This will be our first year to support three nursing homes - Farwell Convalescent Center, Laurel Ridge Nursing Home in Clovis and Prairie Acres Nursing Home in Friona.

I want to thank everyone who believes in this project and continues to give from their heart. It takes many people to raise money, wrap presents, and give their time and energy to get all of this done in time for Christmas.
