Highway 60 - 70 - -

Meeting To Feature Refined Proposals

A public hearing concerning proposed construction improvements for U.S. Highway 60-70 through the Twin Cities is slated for Monday, Jan. 11, at the Texico Community Building on Wheeler Avenue.

Citizens are urged to attend this session as "refined" construction alternatives are to be presented for both Texico and Farwell roadways, by members of the New Mexico State Highway Department and the Texas Department of Highway and Public Transportation.

An informal review will be held from 5-7 p.m. MST with the official public hearing taking place from 7-9 p.m.

Most of the proposed construction work to be done in this area will occur in Texico, with two alternates being proposed.

In Farwell, 2.5 miles of construction is being presented, to occur on Amarillo highway, 2.5 miles northeast of the Texas/New Mexico state line.

Many Twin Cities residents attended the initial public hearing conducted in May 1981, and at that time were presented four proposals for the Texico area roadway.

The study team apparently listened carefully to all remarks given that night, and since that time has thrown out two of the highway improvement proposals, scaled down another, and will now present a refined package to the January 11 audience, to include an environmental impact assessment.

In addition, the proposed relocation of the Wheeler Avenue U.S. 60 intersection in Texico was eliminated to reduce the displacement of local businesses, and an alternative intersection widening improvement was developed, according to a report issued by the two state highway departments.

The two alternates being proposed for the Texico area mostly concern Wheeler Ave-

nue. One proposal would eliminate curb parking and provide a painted median, allowing left turn movements from either eastbound or westbound traffic.

The second alternate, termed 2B, would feature a raised median, rather than the painted one offered in alternate 2A, with median openings and left turn pockets provided.

Both alternates would require traffic signal installation. The two alternatives being offered for the Farwell area include a "no build" alternative, which would maintain the existing U.S. 60 as a two-lane, two-way highway.

The second proposal, alternative "A", would construct a four-lane undivided highway from the Texas/New Mexico state line to approximately the Texas state monument, where the roadway will transition to a four-lane divided highway, extending to the eastern project limit 2.5 miles northeast of

the state line. If one of the U.S. 70-60 alternates is selected and programmed, it is anticipated that approximately three to five years would be required to design the facility, acquire the right-of-way and construct the highway improvement, according to the report issued by both highway departments. The report also indicated that no schedule has been established for construction on the Twin Cities section.

Federal Connector Primary Demonstration Project funds would be used to meet 82 percent of the U.S. 70-60 costs, with state funds supporting the remaining 18 percent of the costs.

Estimated construction and right-of-way costs, using 1981 dollars, are reported at \$1.4 million for Texico's alternate 2A, and \$2.9 million for alternate 2B.

Estimated costs for Farwell's portion, Alternate A, is

given at \$1,723,050.

Those attending the informal review Monday will have the opportunity to view a variety of illustrations concerning the proposed roadway and to discuss the project with the study team, and state highway representatives.

Audience participation will follow the public hearing. During the official portion of the session, the audience will witness a formal presentation by the study team.

Map displays of all alternatives are currently on display at Texico City Hall, and will also be available for viewing during the January 11 gathering.

The work proposed in this area is being termed as a "traffic congestion relief route," and once completed the entire highway system is to link Amarillo to Las Cruces, connecting Interstates 40 and 10.

Cost of the course will depend on whether or not the course is taken for college credit.

Court Says Bovina Boy Can Be Tried As Adult

A Bovina youth has been certified as an adult and will now appear before a Parmer County grand jury on felony charges of two counts of robbery and one count of auto theft, according to Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan.

Armando Ortiz, 16, was originally arrested as a juvenile following the alleged robberies of two Parmer County Allsup's Convenience stores on October 30, 1981.

Ortiz was held in Parmer County custody from October 31 to December 22, in 10-day increments, but was released on bond when it was decided that he was mentally capable of standing trial as an adult.

Juvenile Judge Corky Green of Muleshoe heard testimony

from psychiatrists, doctors, law enforcement officials and representatives from the Texas Youth Council at the competency hearing conducted December 22.

"Immediately after that hearing he was taken before magistrate and bond was set as it is in all felony cases," said Sheriff Morgan. "Now his case will be presented to the next grand jury."

Following the October 30 incident, Ortiz and his 14-year-old female companion, appeared before Parmer County Judge Porter Roberts, accompanied by their parents.

Ortiz was ordered held in detention for 10 days and the 14-year-old female was released to her parents. No

charges were filed against the girl, Morgan said.

The two youths led Parmer County law officials on a three county high speed chase using an alleged stolen vehicle following the Allsup's robberies, and were eventually apprehended in Randall County near Amarillo.

Texico Man Injured In Accident

A two-car accident Tuesday night in Texico resulted in a Texico man being transported to Clovis High Plains Hospital with what City Marshal Mickey Fenn termed "visible injuries."

According to a report issued by Fenn following the incident, Edward S. Martinez of Texico was traveling east on US Highway 60-84 in Texico in the inside lane of traffic, moving approximately 25-30 miles per hour. The report indicates that one vehicle passed Martinez and as he looked into his rear-view mirror he saw a car

coming up behind him "fast."

Martinez stated that he thought the vehicle was going to hit him in the rear when in fact the car did collide with Martinez, causing his car to go out of control and off the roadway, colliding with a J.J. Mobile Home sign and overturning the vehicle.

Charged in the incident with DWI was the driver of the second vehicle, John Bruce Caldwell of Bovina.

Martinez was transported to Clovis High Plains Hospital by the Texico Volunteer Fire Department,

The incident occurred at 10:19 p.m. MST, the report indicates.

Both vehicles received extensive damage in the accident.

Deadline Set For County Candidacy

Democratic and Republican primary elections for Parmer County will be held May 1, with several county positions to be voted on.

Those who wish to file for candidacy for any of the elected positions have until February 1, at 5 p.m. CST to do so.

Declaration of candidacy may be done with Bonnie Warren, Parmer County Clerk, at the Parmer County Court-

house in Farwell.

Positions to be open for candidacy include county clerk, county treasurer, county attorney, county judge, county commissioner precinct 4, and county commissioner precinct 2; also, district clerk, district attorney and district judge.

General Election is scheduled for next fall.

Deadline to register to vote in the primary elections is April 1.

Texico Schedules Municipal Election

Persons wishing to hold public office in the city of Texico have until January 26 to decide to do so, according to Texico City Clerk Marie Christian, who said that a regular election will be held March 2 to fill the offices of mayor, two trustees and municipal judge.

Declarations for candidacy must be filed with Mrs. Christian on January 26 between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. MST, at Texico City Hall. This will be the only day on

which a person may file for candidacy, Mrs. Christian said.

Currently holding the office of Texico mayor is John R. Hadley. Trustees whose terms will end in March are Vane Doshier and Lewis Cooper. Municipal judge is Howard Billingsley. All offices will be filled for four-year terms.

Those who wish to register to vote for the election have until 5 p.m. MST Tuesday, Jan. 19, to do so.

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Parmer County SWCD Sponsors Tree Program

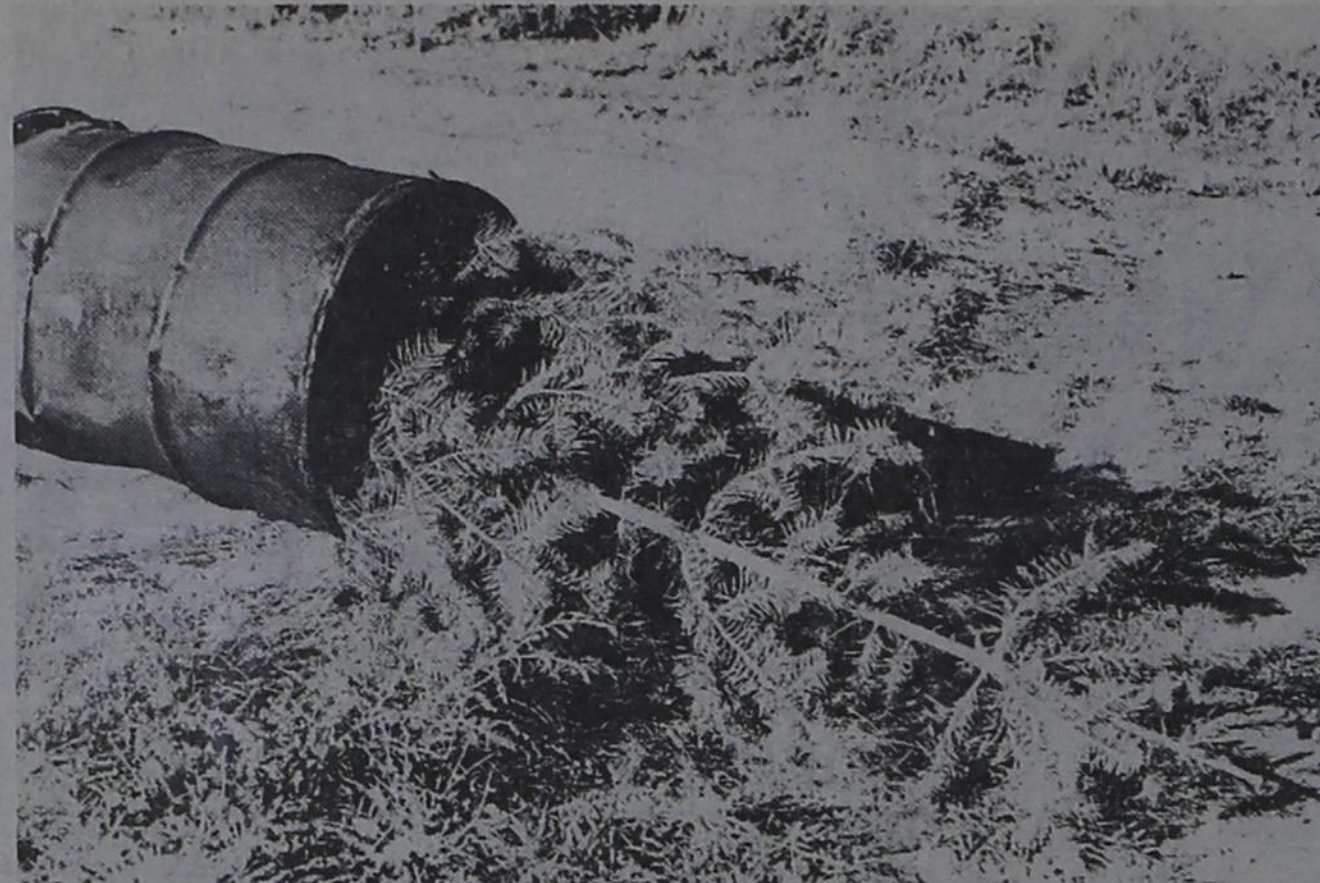
Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District is sponsoring the windbreak tree program, enabling farmers, ranchers and rural landowners to obtain trees at nominal cost. The purpose of the program is to encourage the owners to plant effective wind barriers to protect buildings, cropland, feedlots, and for erosion control. Many of the trees can be purchased as potted trees or bare rooted trees from the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District. Bare rooted trees range from

10 inches to 30 inches top height for deciduous trees, and five inches to 12 inches top height for conifers. The potted trees range from four inches to 10 inches top height. Bare rooted trees cost \$24 per 100 trees plus 50 cents per 100 trees, for delivery. Potted trees cost \$19 per 30 trees plus three cents per tree for delivery. Application forms for these trees can be picked up at the Soil Conservation Office in Friona at 1306 West Ninth Street.

Irrigation Conference Scheduled In Amarillo

Growers, engineers and irrigation specialists will put their heads together January 12 in Amarillo during the annual High Plains Irrigation Conference, looking for more efficient, cost-saving ways to irrigate crops. The daylong conference at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amarillo Blvd. West, will begin at 9:40 a.m. and conclude at 3:30 p.m. CST. Fuel costs for operating irrigation systems will be one of the major topics at this year's conference, said Leon New, agricultural engineer and irrigation specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Revised electric rates for irrigation will go into effect, probably in the 1983 season, New said. Discussing these changing rates and their effect upon High Plains farmers will be James Hull of the Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative. An economic comparison of costs for the various fuels available for irrigating will be provided by Dr. Ray Sammons, Extension agricultural economist-farm management.

Reducing pumping costs by repairing and maintaining pumping plants will be another key topic. New will report on several years of testing by the Extension Service and changes in efficiency after repairs are made. Some innovative approaches to pump repair will be presented by Don McElroy of Irrigation Pump and Power Co., Muleshoe. The use of furrow diking in conjunction with irrigation will be explained by Dr. Reggie Jones, research soil scientist at the USDA Conservation and Utilization Laboratory at Bushland. A popular feature of the irrigation conference each year, a growers' panel, will conclude the program. Panelists who will share their experiences will be Roman Friemel of Carson County, Layton Sawyer of Sherman County, Charles Schlabs of Deaf Smith County and Jack Thompson of Hartley County. The conference is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service with support of the Panhandle Economic Program.

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Emergency Care Course Offered In Lazbuddie

An emergency care attendant course will begin Monday night, Jan. 11, at the Lazbuddie School Cafeteria at 6:30 p.m. CST sponsored by the Lazbuddie Fire Department. A minimum of 20 persons are needed to conduct the course, according to fireman Glenn Lust, and cost will be \$10 per person. The course is open to everyone high school age or older. Training will be offered in the determination of vital signs, including blood pressure, pulse and respiration rates, cardiac arrest, cardiopulmonary resuscitation, airway obstructions, heart disorders, and stroke. Training and practice sessions will be scheduled in the control of bleeding and shock, bandaging, facial and eye injuries, head, neck, and spine injuries, fractures and dislocations of the extremities, splinting skills, and chest, abdominal and pelvic injuries. Medical emergencies, including diabetes, epilepsy, over-exposure to heat, asthma,

drowning, emphysema, and hyper-ventilation will also be discussed. Training will also be offered in caring for burns, poisoning, emergency child birth, ambulance operation, and the legal aspects of emergency care. Tests will be given at the conclusion of the course by personnel of the Texas Department of Health Resources, Lust said. Instructors for the course will be from the Bovina

Ambulance Service. No previous training is required. The course will consist of 28 hours of classroom instruction and training. Those attending the meeting Monday night will set the dates for the other classes, choosing week night, or Saturday and Sunday afternoon sessions. 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Mike Martin Named Golf Coach Of Year

Farwell golf coach Mike Martin has been named as Panhandle Hall of Fame Golf Coach of the Year for the second year in a row, and will be honored in ceremonies January 17 at Amarillo College Ordway Auditorium.

"It was certainly a surprise to me," remarked Coach Martin. "To receive this two years in a row is a real honor."

Martin, who also is the boy's varsity basketball coach and assistant football coach at Farwell, will begin his fourth year as girls golf coach this spring.

While at Farwell, the Tyler, Tex. native has led the lady linksters to one state championship title (1980), and two second place titles (1979, 1981).

Last season, Farwell Steerette golfers captured the District 3-AA title, placed sec-

ond in regional play, and nabbed the state's second place trophy in Austin.

"We graduated three top players off our state championship team in 1980," Martin said. "Last year's team accomplished a whole lot by

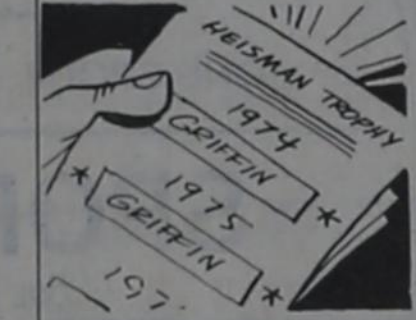

AROUND THE HOUSE

If good food makes you healthy, wealthy and wise you're in good luck this year. The U.S. Department of Agriculture predicts the New Year will usher in prosperous supplies of red meats and poultry, milk and dairy products, fresh fruits, raisins, prunes, rice and dry beans.

Even supplies of beef will be plentiful, although demand will be sluggish due to large supplies of competing meats, forecast USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service in its monthly Food Marketing Alert. Turkey supplies will climb to record levels, up 18-22 percent over last year, and 22 percent above the 1979-81 average for the month. Broiler-fryer and pork supplies also will be plentiful.

Record-large supplies of fresh grapefruit and winter pears will fill the winter market. Texas and Florida will harvest bumper crops of grapefruit. Winter pear production, though 5 percent less than last year's 244,000 tons will be large enough to guarantee plentiful supplies

throughout most of the shipping season.

Among the other fresh fruits, apple supplies will be plentiful and fresh oranges, tangerines and tangelos adequate or enough to meet normal needs.

If good luck is equivalent to supply of blackeye peas then you will have plenty of it this year! Blackeye peas and other dry beans will be abundant. Dry split pea production will be adequate.

Potatoes, onions and most processed vegetables will be adequate. Stocks of canned tomato and tomato products and frozen green peas will be light or not enough for normal needs.

Milk production will increase seasonally this month to record high levels. Stocks of milk and dairy products will be plentiful and egg production adequate.

Stocks of rice and peanuts will be plentiful or more than enough for normal needs.

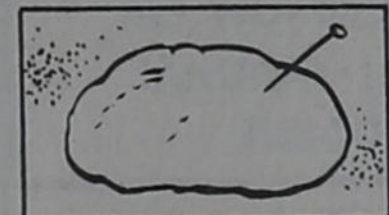

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Wolverines Begin New Year With Grady, Logan Victories

Texico varsity Wolverines began 1982 with winning ways, upping their season tally to 6-1 following victories over Grady and Logan.

The Green and White dampened Grady's homecoming Tuesday night, defeating the Broncos 57-50.

"It was a very close game. Grady played extremely well. Their press hurt us and slowed us down," said Coach Ken Shaw, adding, "We were able to control the boards with rebounds and I think that was a contributing factor in our winning the game."

The Wolverines were behind the entire first half, closing out the first two stanzas of play at 27-28. Both teams went on a scoring spree in the third quarter and Texico nabbed a narrow two-point lead 42-40.

Concentration and defense paid off in the final quarter and Texico took its sixth win of the season by seven points.

Pacing the Texico scoring surge was Tony Tubbs with 16 points followed by Jeff Day with 14 and Kent Harding with 12. Mike Arnold had 10 and Brad Steward pitched in 5. Leading rebounder was

Harding with 10, Tubbs had 9 and Day grabbed 8.

"Mike Arnold filled in for Kevin West and played terrific," Shaw remarked, "and Kent Harding played extremely well."

West was injured in the January 2 game against Logan, breaking his foot while going up for a lay-up, Shaw said.

Shaw pointed out that while Grady is not a district foe, the Wolverines may meet the Broncos again in regional play. "They are a tough team. They are really good," he said.

While the 92-32 pounding of Logan on January 2 felt good for the Wolverines, one disappointing side to the Texico victory was the fact that huster West broke his foot. "He'll be out for about six weeks," remarked Shaw. "But we hope he'll be back in action for the district tournament in March," he said.

Todd Gerles exploded for 26 points during the Logan duel, shooting 11 of 12 field goals and hitting 100 percent from the free throw line.

Other two-digit scorers were Jeff Dunsworth and Mike Arnold, each pitching in 16 points. Others adding points were Craig Horne and Jeff Day, 8 each; Earl Bibbs, 4; and Willie Bibbs, Kent Harding, and Lynn Tubbs, 2 each.

Leading rebounders were Dunsworth with 15 and T. Tubbs with 14. Day snatched back 10; E. Bibbs had 9 and Brad Steward, Harding, Gerles, and Arnold took back 7 each.

Others rebounding were Horne, and L. Tubbs, 6 each, and W. Bibbs, 3.

The Wolverines shot 34 percent from the field and 59 percent from the charity stripe.

On Friday the team will begin district play, hosting Floyd.

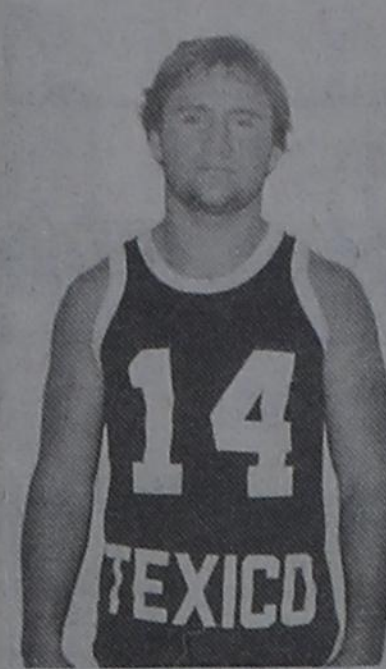

Lady Wolverines Lash Logan, Enter District Play Tonight

Texico Lady Wolverines may have grabbed their fourth victory of the season January 2 defeating Logan 48-29, but victory wasn't sweet for Coach Roy King. "We played well, except we lost the ball too much," he said. "Overall we're starting to shoot better; if we can just improve our ball handling, I'll feel better."

The Green and White grabbed an early first quarter lead and never allowed Logan to move ahead.

Texico allowed a mere four Logan points in the first quarter, and only three points in the second quarter, the Lady Wolverines leading at the half, 26-7.

Another 12 points in the third stanza for Texico put them ahead 38-17 and another 10 in the final quarter placed the girls at a 48-29 victory.

Ruth Scott discharged 28 points, shooting 63 percent from the field and 100 percent from the charity stripe.

Others scoring were Tracy Dobbs, 8; Sharlot Taylor, 6; and Jill Jesko, Lisa Crooks and Cheryl Scott, 2 each.

Jesko led the Texico squad in rebounds with 12, followed by R. Scott and Taylor with 9 apiece; C. Scott, 8; Dobbs, 3; Crooks, 2; and Valda Cavellero, 1.

As a team, Texico shot 45.4 percent from the field and 80

percent from the free throw line.

"I think we can play defense as well as anybody in our class, but we've got to get that ball up the floor," King said.

Tonight (Friday), the reigning state champions begin

district play, hosting Floyd under the Wolverine nets. "Floyd has always been one of Texico's biggest rivalries," the coach said. "This will be a good game."

The Lady Wolverines hold a 4-2 season record.

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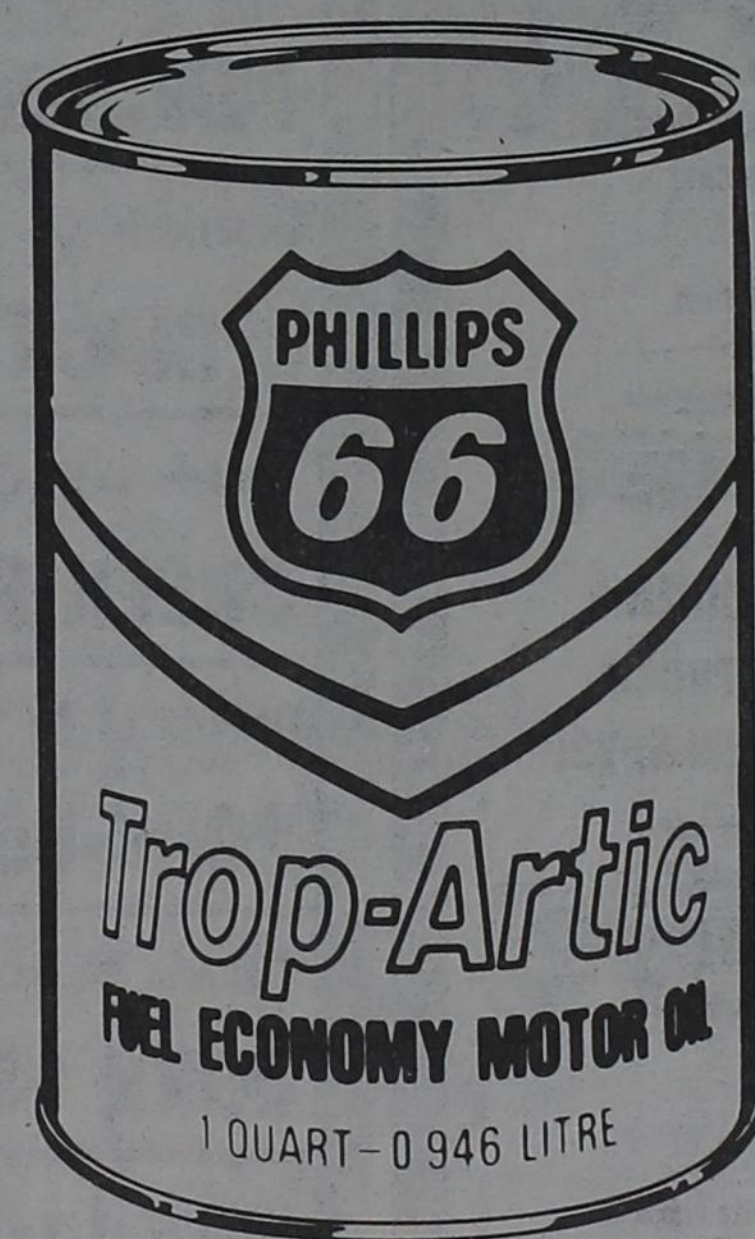
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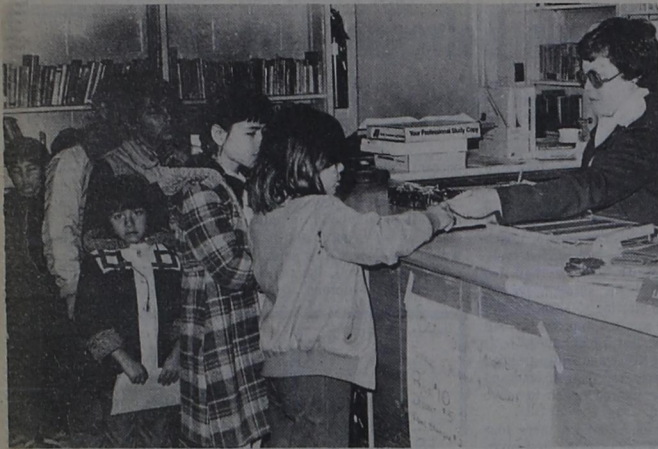

Twin Cities Fire Safety Tips

Heating equipment poses several potential hazards you should watch for, including:

1. All flue pipe connections should be inspected once a year. The connections should be tightly fitted and sealed at the joints.
2. When flue pipes and heating equipment are close to combustible material, the combustible surface should be protected by sheet metal, asbestos or plaster.
3. Chimneys should be inspected and cleaned at regular intervals, depending on amount of use.
4. A sturdy fire screen should be kept in front of every fireplace.
5. NEVER burn trash in a stove or fireplace.
