Elusive Robbers And Killers Evade Officers In Dashes Back And Forth Across State

\$1500 REWARDS POSTED

Series Of Bank Robberies, Kidnaping, And Slaying Blamed On **Barrow And Hamilton**

(By The Associated Press)

The elusive Clyde Barrow and Raymond Hamilton, robbers and killers, dashed back and forth across Texas Monday while state and federal officers sought clues to two slayings, bank robbery, kidnaping for which the desperadoes were blamed.

Spurred by a reward of \$1500 for the capture of Barrow and Hamilton, dead or alive, officers frantically tried to catch the gunmen.

Barrow was accused of killing E. B. Wheeler and H. D. Murphy, state highway patrolmen, near Grapevine Sunday. The two officers were shot down on a side road when they attempted to question occupants of a car.

Bonnie Parker, the gunman's "moll" was believed to have been with Barrow when the officers were killed. Barrow's fingerprints were found on a whisky bottle

near the scene. Two persons, believed to be Barrow and Bonnie Parker, held up a gasoline station at Blanket, near Brownwood, early Monday and escaped under gunfire laid down by a






