

There used to be an old song that said, "Brighten the corner where you are." Mary Sobin has brightened the corner of the Tribune for the past 14 months. We are sorry to see her have to leave us. From the expressions of the Twin Cities folks she has come in contact with during her duties as our news editor, many other locals will also miss her brash and sunny ways.

The Tribune has been fortunate over the years in the caliber of our employees, but replacing Mary will be an impossible job for us. The best we can hope for is for somebody to fill her job, but we cannot fill her place.

The battle of the budget rages on with a multitude of meaningless figures and no meaningful philosophy. For example, last Thursday night ABC TV interviewed an elderly lady about the President's message and asked her the question as to what he had done for the elderly. Her reply was a dour "nothing."

The question occurred to us as to just what the government should do for the elderly? Not counting the multitude of social welfare programs for the elderly, we believe that the basic role of the government is to protect the assets of the elderly from erosion due to government-foisted inflation. For the last 30 years, the profligate spenders in Congress have not done this for the old folks. Instead, the government has wasted the life's work and savings of millions of the old people.

This lady's problem is not that the Reagan administration hasn't done anything FOR her, it is the fact that previous administrations have done so much AGAINST her. Given the chance, the new direction in Washington can restore some of the buying power of that lady's assets that have been so depleted by inflation.

The greatest good the government can do for anybody is to preserve the integrity of the dollar, and remove them from public welfare. This the present administration is trying to do for us.

Harold Hudson, the perceptive publisher of the Perryton Herald, takes note of this and writes in his column:

"The Wall Street Journal had an indepth article last week about some of the things that are happening which takes a different look from that which we are used to reading.

"The most significant concerns unemployment and employment. While the national unemployment rate of around 9 percent is constantly in the news, it is less well-known that we have a record number of Americans at work, and the percentage of those of working age who are employed is only a shade below the record month in 1979.

"The number of households in which two or more people hold jobs is high. Women have entered the work force in record numbers. About half of all women of working age are now employed outside the home.

"There is no firm figure on the number of Americans who hold more than one job, but the number is large.

"A lot of these jobs are 'off the books' jobs which never show in the official employment statistics because they involve private deals between the worker and an individual doing the hiring. The so-called 'underground economy' in which barter and work swapping between individuals is growing rapidly and while not reported in the official employment statistics, has to be considered as substantial.

"Business failures, despite all the problems with the economy and high interest rates, are well below the 1961 rate. Last year was a record year for business investment, and with the new tax laws in effect, 1982 has started out even better.

"The biggest thing on a positive note is a drop in the rate of inflation to less than a

## Felts, Watkins Elected, Re-Count For Patterson

Two of the four contested races in Parmer County Democratic primary election were decided last Saturday, which means that since the two Democratic candidates are not facing Republican opposition in the November general election, they will take office come January 1.

Marjorie Watkins defeated Cynthia Thigpen in the county district clerk's race with a narrow 46 vote victory. Watkins totaled 699 votes, while Thigpen captured 653 votes.

In the county treasurer's race, incumbent Benna Felts was re-elected with 784 votes, defeating her opposition, Anne Norton, who had 589 votes.

In the county commissioner's race, precinct two, incumbent

Jack Patterson has asked for a re-count, as he is a mere one and one-half votes shy of being in a run-off with apparent victor, Tommy Williams. Williams took the election with 236 votes, while Patterson fell behind with 185. Also in the race was Radford Venable who had 48 votes.

Parmer County Clerk Bonnie Warren advises that the recount in that race will take place sometime Friday, May 7, with all the votes in commissioner precinct 2 being re-counted, including absentee votes.

Patterson will require an additional two votes to be placed on the run-off ballot on June 1 against Williams.

The winner of the Democratic precinct 2 election will face Dale Hart, who is on the Republican ticket in the general election.

In the other contested commissioners race, incumbent Raymond McGehee won his seat in precinct 4, defeating Raymond Treider, 176 to 68. McGehee will have no opposition in the general election.

Mrs. Warren said that a total of 1444 Democratic and 132 Re-

publican voters turned out for the elections, out of a possible 4200 registered in the county.

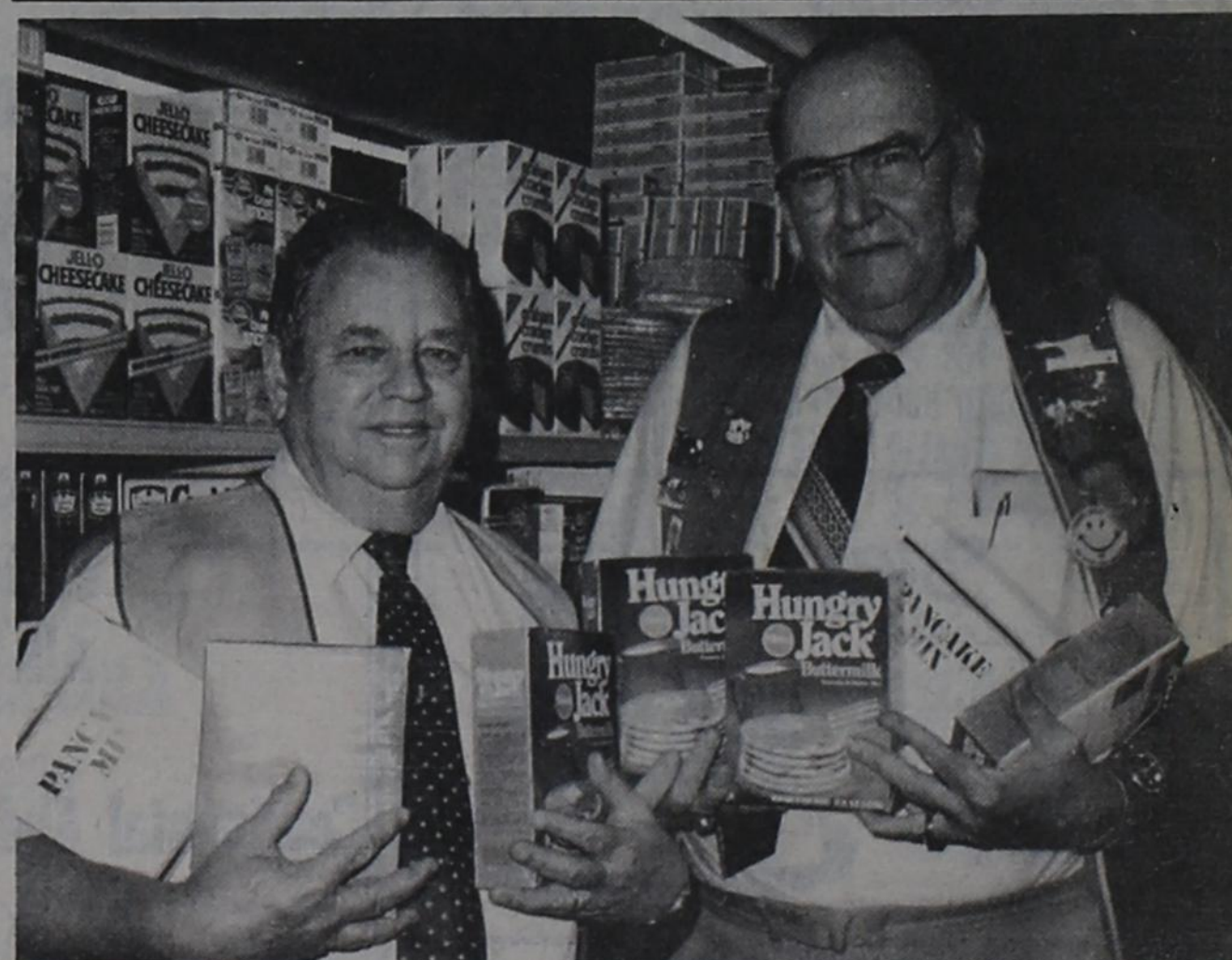
Now, we ask our readers and our news sources to be patient with us. We do not have a replacement for Mary and we do not have her ability or energy.

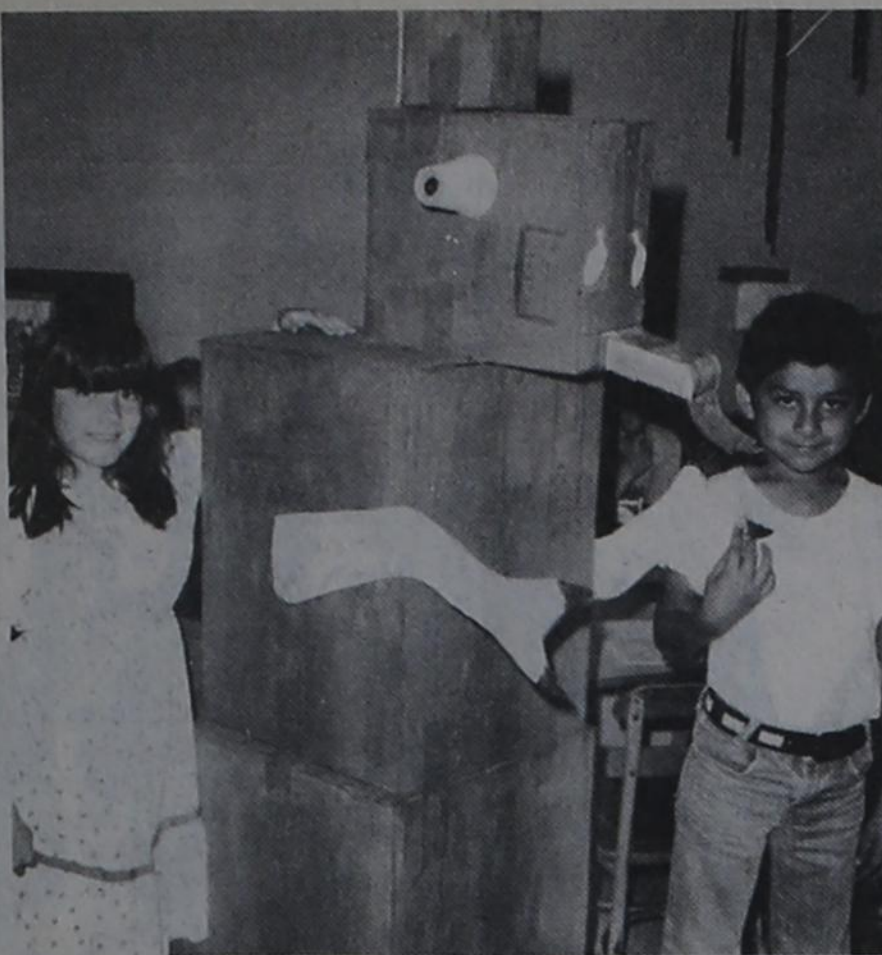

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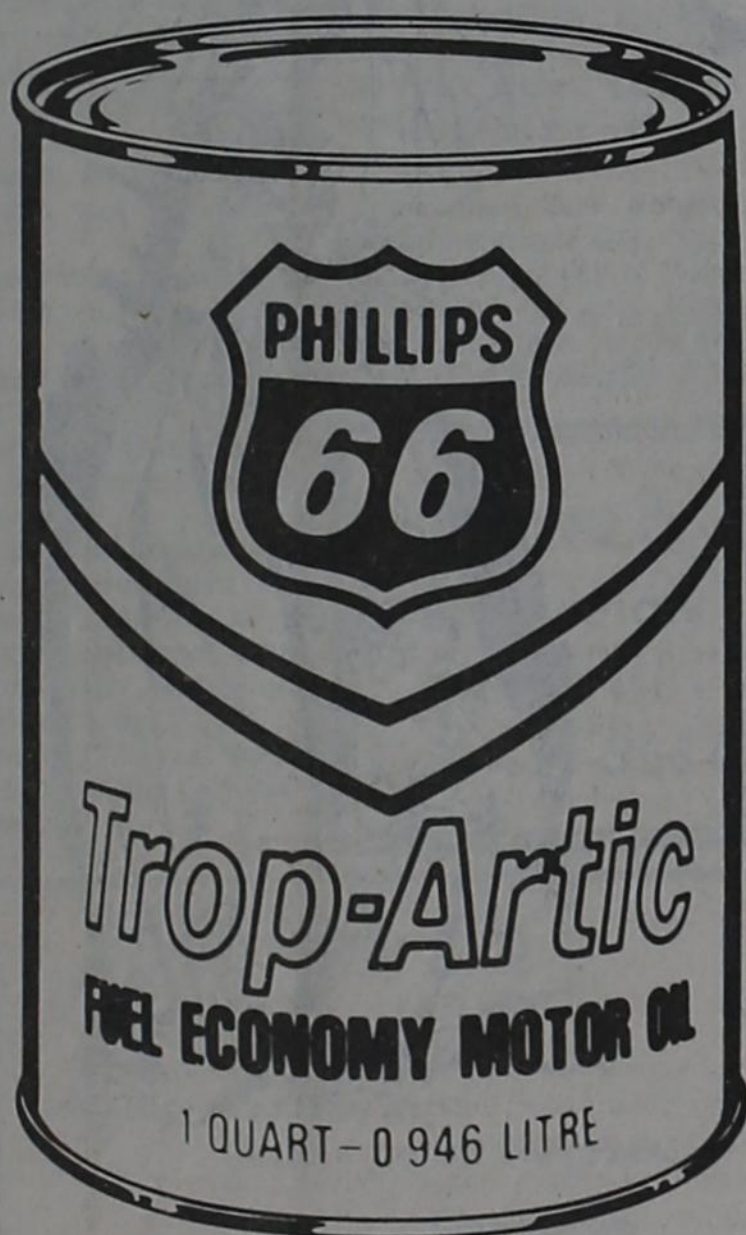

## New Mother's Day Tradition

Flowers, candy, a nice restaurant dinner. These are all the traditional gifts appreciative children have bestowed on mother on her special day through the years. But, when the flowers have wilted, the candy has been eaten or the family returns to its regular at-home meal schedule the next day, Mother's Day becomes only a memory.

However, a new Mother's Day Tradition has been evolving in the past 10 years, one that not only provides mother with the perfect present she will appreciate, but one which can be displayed forever as a constant reminder of her children's affection. The new tradition consists of giving mother a specially designed limited-edition Mother's Day collector's plate.

Actually, the new tradition stems from two cultures, the American and the Scandinavian. Mother's Day is an American phenomenon. It began in 1907 when a young woman named Anna M. Jarvis instituted a letter writing campaign to recognize mother on her special day. Woodrow Wilson made the first presidential Mother's Day proclamation in 1914.

Scandinavia is where plate collecting has its roots. The first collector's plates were issued by the Danish china company, Bing & Grondahl in 1895. In the early years, collector's plates generally commemorated Christmas. However, through the years the subject matter of the artwork on the plates became much broader in scope.

Plate collecting began to gain popularity in the United States after World War II and today it is the fastest growing segment of the collectibles industry.

Mother's Day and plate collecting came together in

1969 when Bing & Grondahl, again innovators, released the first Mother's Day plate. Titled "Dog and Puppies," the plate was originally available for \$9.75. Now, "Dog and Puppies" is valued at \$490, according to The Bradford Exchange in Niles, Illinois, the world's largest trading center for collector's plates.



In the decade since the first Mother's Day collector's plates were issued, plate makers around the world have entered the market. The Franklin Mint produced the first sterling silver plates for Mother's Day, and the Schmid Co. has recreated the famous Peanuts cartoon characters in its Mother's Day series. The American artist Norman Rockwell is frequently featured on plates for mom's special day. Several of his most touching paintings are issued in a Mother's Day series by the Rockwell Society of America.

Since all the plates are dated with their year of issue, once one plate has been given, the tradition can be continued annually as new plates are added to mom's collection every Mother's Day.

Of course, there is no guarantee that all Mother's Day plates will appreciate in value like "Dog and Puppies." But, regardless of their monetary value, they will always be something special to mom, from the day she receives her first one through the ensuing years as new plates are added to her Mother's Day collection.

**TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE**  
BY CORNELIUS R. STAM, PRES. BREAM BIBLE SOCIETY CHICAGO, ILLINOIS 60633  
**"NUMBERED WITH THE TRANSGRESSORS"**  
"And the Scripture was fulfilled, which saith, And He was numbered with the transgressors" (Mark 15:28).  
The progressive fulfillment of this passage from Isaiah 53 is the amazing story of our Lord's three baptisms.  
First, this prophecy must be applied to our Lord's incarnation. Born a babe in Bethlehem, He was baptized into the human race, becoming, not merely one with us, but one of us, a true human being, though still also "very God." This is how He was first "numbered with the transgressors."  
Later the Lord was baptized again, this time with water, by John the Baptist. John's baptism was unto "repentance for the remission of sins" and those who responded came to His baptism "confessing their sins" (Mark 1:4,5). Little wonder that John at first refused to baptize this Sinless One, saying, "I have need to be baptized of Thee, and comest Thou to me?" But the Lord insisted, saying, "Thus it becometh us to fulfill all righteousness" (Matt. 3:13-15). Thus our Lord joined repentant sinners in baptism and was, in this practical way, "numbered with the transgressors."  
But after His baptism into the human race and His subsequent baptism with water, our Lord spoke of a third baptism, saying: "I have a baptism to be baptized with, and how am I straitened (Lit. "What a spot I am in" till it be accomplished" (Luke 12:50). This third baptism was, of course, His death at Calvary, where He was baptized into God's judgment upon sin in order that He might save us from it.  
Finally, then, Isaiah 53:12 was fulfilled, for it is in connection with His death at Calvary that Mark 15:27,28 says: "And with Him they crucify two thieves, the one on His right hand, and the other on His left. And the Scripture was fulfilled which saith, And He was numbered with the transgressors."  
It is a touching thing to realize that our Lord from heaven should deign to identify Himself with us, even to taking our sins upon Himself. Now, as we respond, trust Him as our Savior and accept eternal life as the gift of God (Rom. 6:23), we become one with Him (1 Cor. 12:13,27).

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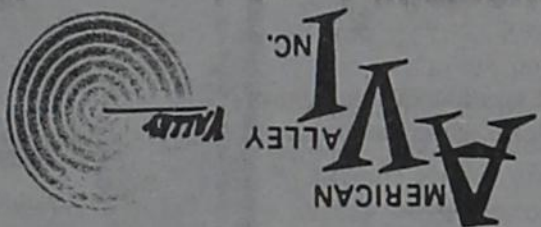


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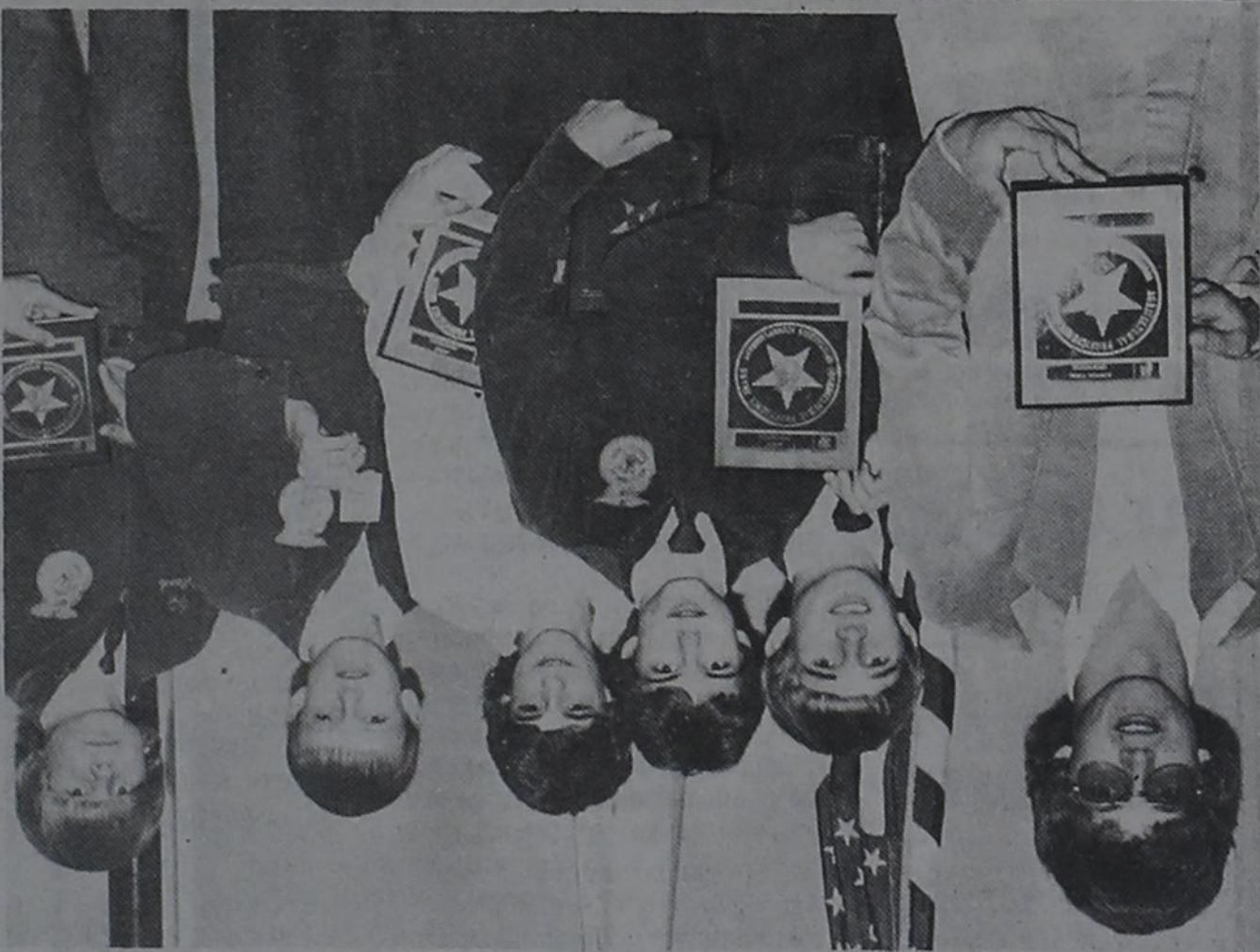
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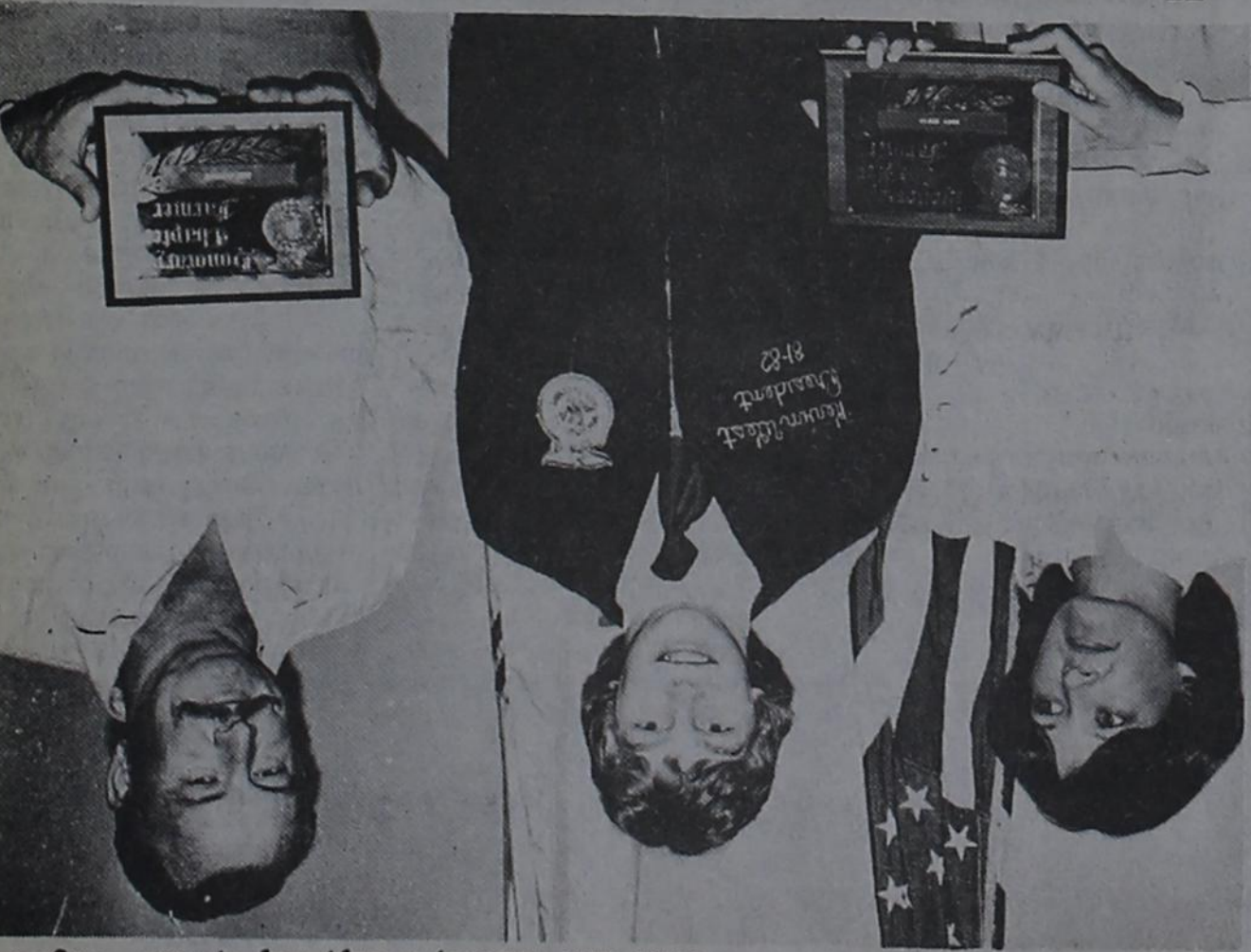
