





Mr. White had been in ill health for a two year period; however he had only been seriously ill a few days at time of


He was a member of the Methodist Church and Woodmen of the World.

By fertilizing according to soil test recommendations I really believe you will be dollars ahead next Christmas time on the cost and returns from your fertilizer dollars.

SOIL FERTILITY VARIES

A soil test data summary recently completed by the Extension Service's Soil Testing Laboratory at Lubbock shows Parmer County soils rate from extremely deficient to very high in some of the plant nutrients. This summary is based on 372 soil samples analyized by the lab during the two year period ending August 31, 1964.

Nitrogen is the plant nutrient most commonly deficient as indicated by the soil organice matter level. As a very general guideline we can expect for crop use about 30 lbs., 40 lbs. and 50 lbs. or nitrogen from one percent organic matter in clays, loams, and sands respectively. The lower organic matter level, the higher the nitrogen fertilizer requirement will be for a given crop yield. In addition to the organic matter content it is necessary to consider past crop, yield response, and crop to be grown in arriving at a decision as to how much

nitrogen is needed. Organic matter in 14% of the soils is 1.0% O.M. or less, being lowest in the lighter textures. 71% are shown to be in the 1.1-1.5% O.M. group, and only 15% contain over 1.5% O.M. These relatively low values explain why nitrogen fertilizers contribute heavily to the high

yields commonly produced.

Phosphorus values found by soil tests show 61% of the soils to be very low in this element, with good response from phosphate indicated. In the 19% of the soils rated as low, response from phosphate can often be expected with the liklihood of response depending on actual phosphorus value and the yield potential. Phosphorus appears to be in adequate supply. in some 20% of the soils except for special crops with unusually high phosphorus re-

quirement. Potassium and calcium are high in all soils. No problems with soluble salts or sodium accumulation are indicated. Crops having high potassium requirement include alfa-Ifa, bermuda and potatoes, Periodic soil tests can be expected to detect potassium decline in a soil before yields are reduced due to deficiency.

FOR THE BIRDS

You don't need an elaborate feeder to share Christmas with the birds. You can trim an outdoor tree and decorate it with such things as pine cones dipped in suet, popcorn, bits of apple and grated carrot, even pie crust. Blue jays, woodpeckers, nuthatches, chicadees, warblers and brown creepers are "meat" eaters. Cardinals, juncos, sparrows and finches like vegetable seeds.

*Even though the 8 million acres formerly planted to cotton would be diverted to the next most profitable crops, gross income from this land could be expected to drop by well over 50 per cent, even if prices of the other crops did not decline.

*Soybean production would be increased by something like 69 million bushels -- adding to the danger of oversupply and lower

*Feed grain production would likely be increased by close to 5 million tons -- thus increasor around 58 per cent, in farm ing the already serious problems of oversupply.

> The study concluded that the change-over would have these long-term effects:

*Substantially larger supplies of animal products would have a depressing effect on prices throughout the whole livestock economy of the na-

*The impact on beef would be especially heavy because the Cotton Belt, with low-cost forage to go with its feed grain potential, would have a competitive advantage in cattle pro-

In considering what might be done with resources formerly devoted to cotton, the study stressed, it is important to remember that: (1) the 8 million acres of cropland involved are among the most productive in America; (2) from the standpoint of climate and geography, these acres are adaptable to a broad range of production possibilities; (3) the management of these acres is among the most alert and progressive in the nation; (4) while cotton has always been a regional crop, the major alternatives to it are critically important to other sectors of American agriculture; and (5) the output from 8 million former cotton acres would in many cases be competing in markets that are even now tormented by the problem of oversupply.



phosphorus. With the large amount of stubble plowed under, it is conceivable that these organic acids may have increased availability of the soil phosphorus in maize ground as compared to the fallow ground.

Another minor factor might be that soils were generally very dry following wheat harvest in 1963, thus, organic matter decomposition and release of nitrogen did not proceed as it normally does, Hence, one of the usual benefits from fallow-

ing land did not take place. Because of the added organic matter on maize ground, air and water relationships may have been improved thus resulting in better plant growth.
