A pleased looking group if I ever saw one -- the Farwell School Board, that is. We have had two public presentations in the new school auditorium and everybody has been pleased with the new facility. Charles Turner and the music department presented an enjoyable band and choral concert to the public last Friday evening, and then on Sunday evening, the graduating Senior Class held their Baccalaureate services.

The new auditorium was a joy for all. The air conditioning worked well, the acoustics are excellent, the seats very comfortable and the general decor is quite striking. Yes, the school board deserves to look happy. They are due a big public thanks for their efforts in giving Farwell such a beautiful auditorium. I am sure the rest of the new school buildings will be as aesthetic and practical for their purposes as is this portion.

I have just read the interesting monthly publication of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, The Cross Section. On the front page is a short article on declining water tables. The average decline of the water tables in the thirteen counties of the Water District for 1965 was 2.06 feet. Parmer County had the greatest decline with 3.98 feet and Potter County the least with .50 feet. That means our county is losing its underground water at almost twice the rate of the average and almost eight times the rate of the least. There are many good reasons why we are the greatest spenders of our underground wealth. One might be that we are the greatest producer of above ground wealth in the field of grain sorghum production.

Parmer County, again, was the greatest producer of grain sorghums of any county in the United States. If we are to continue this pre-eminence in agricultural production, we must rigidly promote and practice good water conservation. I feel this is a matter for the individual to accomplish, but I do know this, if individual initiative is not enough, then governmental compulsion will follow. Water is too precious and vital to all residents of the High Plains to allow a few to promiscuously waste this irreplaceable commodity. The water waster had better feel a compelling responsibility to save his water or we shall all be the losers.

We will all lose when any segment of our society has to be curtailed by law and the water waster himself will lose even more because he will be over controlled by a rigid bureaucracy.

One of the basest bits of balderdash to come from Washington is the cry that the way to head off inflation is to raise taxes. Yes, soak pore ole John Q. Public. He has been the most easy going, softest tax sucker in history.

The plain unvarnished, inescapable, unarguable fact is that our present spiral toward uncontrolled inflation is a direct result of the fiscal policies of our government. No amount of smoke, fog, red herrings or downright twisting of the facts can hide this. Inflation is the child of Washington.

Our politicians may howl to raise taxes, but our people are beginning to buckle under the greatest tax load of any nation in history. We must have a return to fair representative government or we will go all the way to a controlled state economy via socialism or communism.

The most dangerous situation facing our nation today is inflation. We must come to grips with it in a real and effective manner, not just in a way calculated to garner the most votes.

The cures for inflation will be harsh and ill tasting, but if democracy is to exist we must begin to take our fiscal medicine, and soon.

Summer Vacation Begins

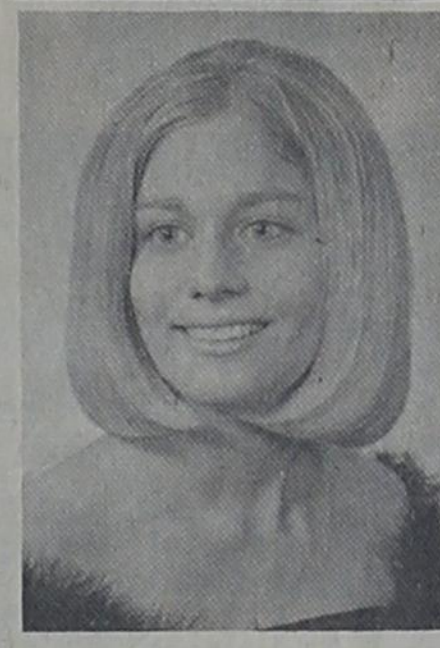
Whoops of joy are resounding today as students in the Farwell school begin their summer vacation. The students will be dismissed at 2:30 p.m. following awards assemblies.

Elementary students will hold their assembly this morning (Friday) and junior high school and high school students will convene for an awards assembly immediately after noon.

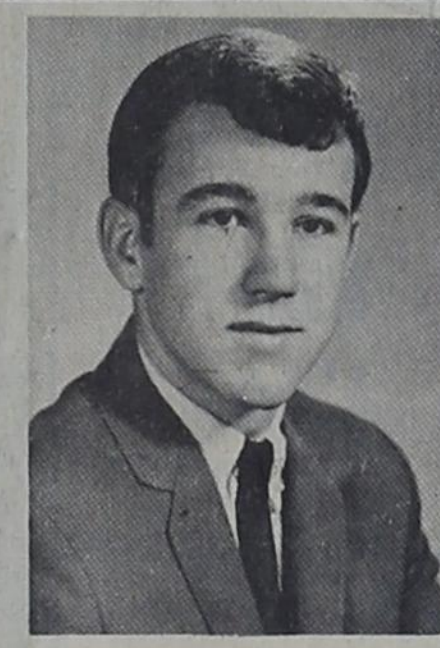

Cotton Referendum Underway In County

Cotton producers in Parmer County are now voting on the question of whether cotton farmers may be permitted to sell or lease their cotton allotment, in Parmer County, to

another cotton producer for use on a farm in a different county.

Transfers of cotton may not be made outside the State. If such transfers are approved by at least two-thirds of growers

voting, the transfers will apply to the next three upland cotton crops, 1967, 1968 and 1969, announces Prentice Mills, county ASCS office manager.

Ballots have been mailed to all known cotton producers in Parmer County, together with information on the purpose of the vote. Cotton producers who did not receive a ballot, should get in touch with the County ASCS Office where a ballot is available. Mills explains, A producer may vote by mail or in person. To be counted, the ballots must be in the county office by the close of business May 25, 1966.

This is the first time that a vote on a commodity referendum has been conducted by mail, and "we hope that this convenient method will result in a large vote," the ASCS manager points out.

Parmer County has led Texas in the past several years in "turning out" for this type of referendum.

"We urge our growers to maintain this record by returning their marked ballots to the county office by May 25," he says.

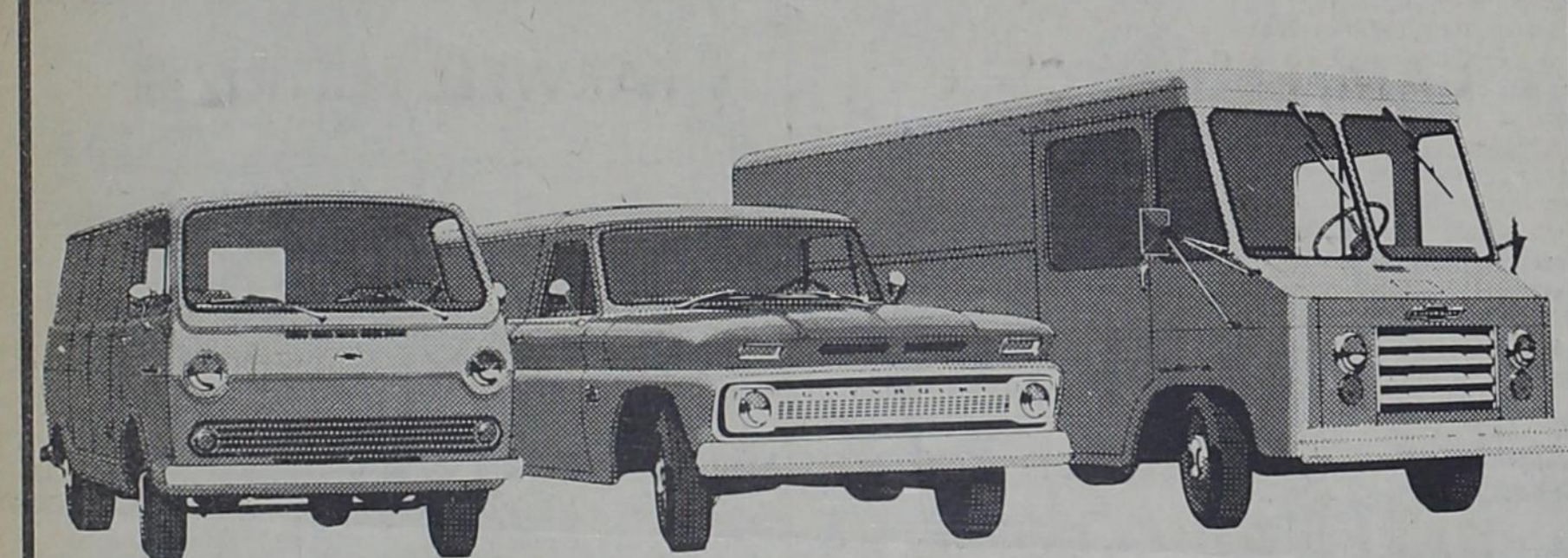

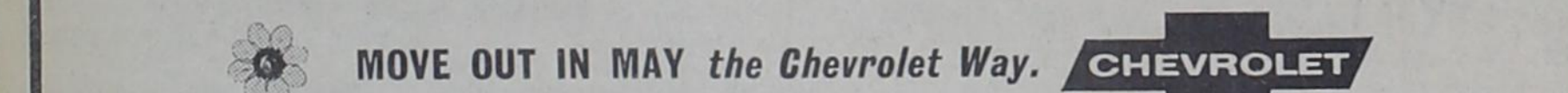

1967 National Wheat Acreage Allotment Increased

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman has announced a 15 per cent increase in the national acreage allotment for wheat for 1967 crop. This represents a regular allotment of 55 million acres plus small farm increases to make an effective allotment of 59.3 million acres.

Secretary Freeman said this means U. S. farmers will be permitted to plant an additional 7.7 million acres wheat this fall and next spring for harvest in 1967.

He forecasts a "substantial increase" in farm income as a result.

Effective allotment in 1966 was 51.6 million acres. The

1967 allotment is the largest in six years. It will mean that wheat acreage on most farms in 1967 will be at level equal to period of 1955 through 1961.

"The strong demand for wheat exports both for dollars and for food assistance programs has reduced our stocks sharply," said secretary Freeman. "For the first time in 13 years, our June 30 carryover will be under 600 million bushels." Six hundred million bushels is about one year's supply for domestic food consumption and seed.

"Stocks will be further reduced during the coming year despite good crop prospects," the Secretary said. "With continued strong demand in the market, and more acres of wheat, farm income will be substantially increased."

Production in 1967 is expected to range between 1.5 billion and 1.6 billion bushels, depending on yields and other program features to be announced later. This compares with a 1966 wheat crop presently estimated at about 1.4 billion bushels.

Secretary Freeman said the allotment announcement is being made earlier than usual this year so wheat producers will have every opportunity to make their plans for 1967 crop. Action came also in response to suggestions by members of Congress, during debate last

year on four year Agricultural Act of 1965, that early announcements be made once a long-term wheat program was enacted.

The Secretary explained there are, in effect, two acreage allotments for wheat under law. The basic 1967-crop acreage allotment applicable to most wheat farms in major wheat-producing states is 55 million acres, compared with 47.8 million acres this year. Another allotment of slightly more than four million acres will be available to producers who planted small acreages under previous legislation which gave farmers opportunity to plant wheat in excess of their farm allotment, up to 15 acres. Comparable total in 1966 was 3.8 million acres.

As in previous years, eligibility for price support loans and wheat marketing certificates is contingent upon a producer planting within his allotment and complying with other conservation or program provisions. However, because of increased allotments, no acreage diversion will be required for 1967 crops.

Further details of 1967 wheat program, including states and farm allotments, price support, and marketing certificates will be announced shortly, but no later than June. Farmers can expect to have their 1967 farm allotment notice by July 1.

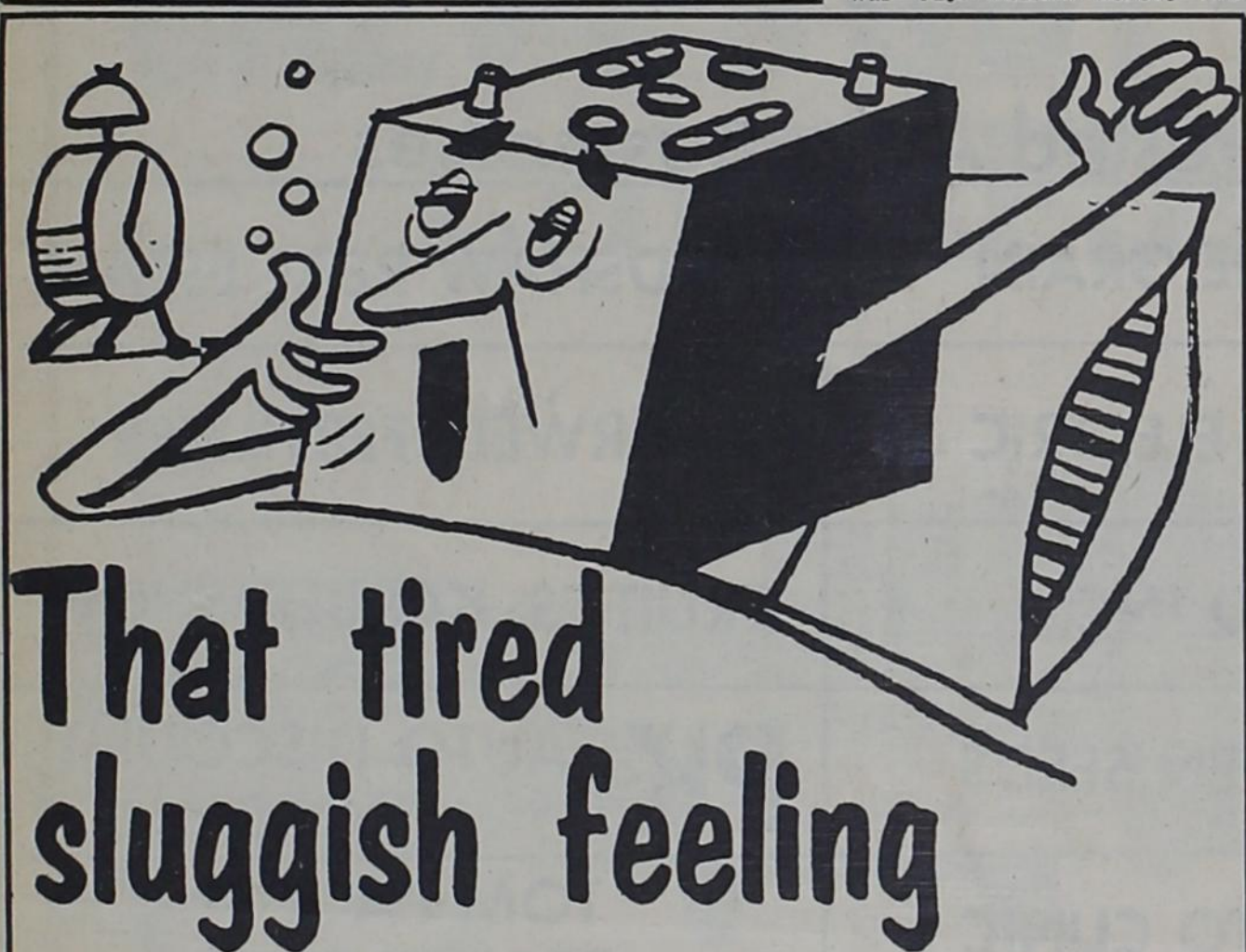

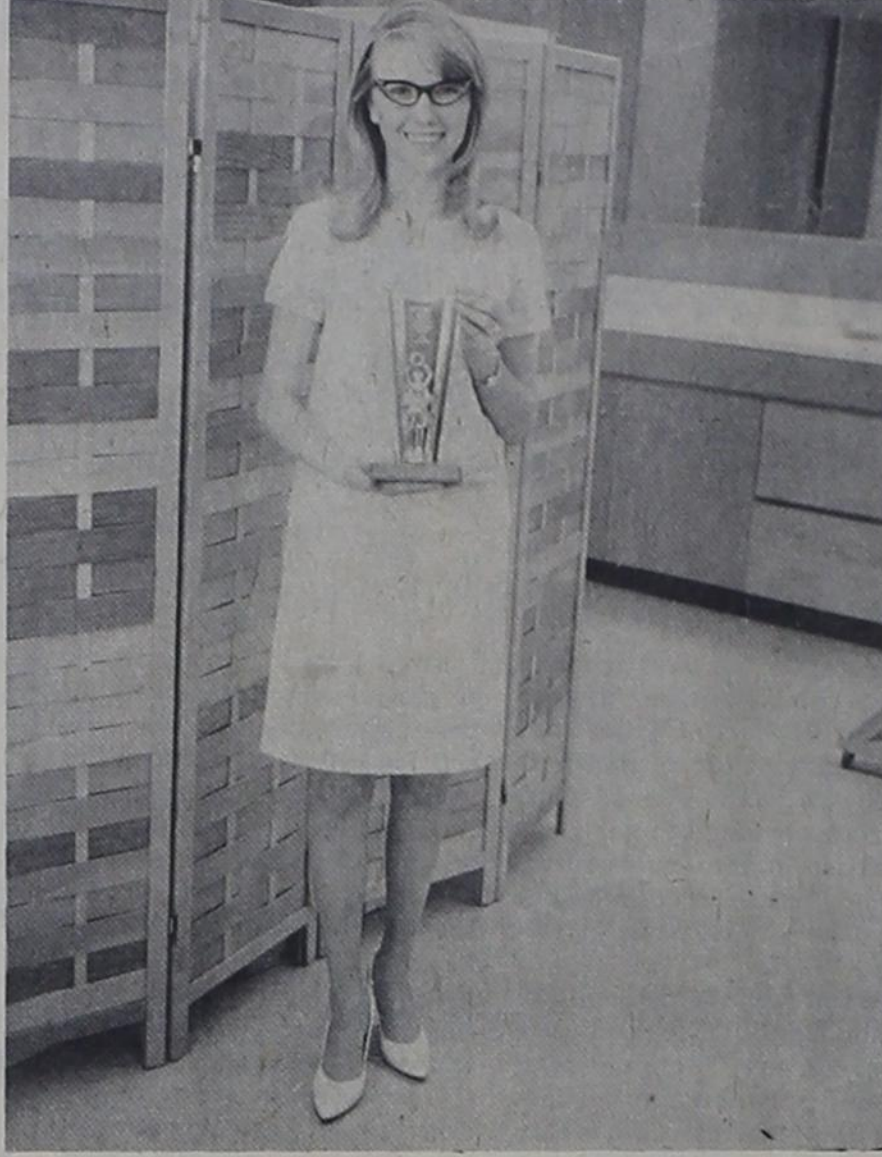
