This will come as a shock to my more liberal friends in the newspaper business, I am going to pay tribute to a man I have considered a very fine representative of the people in Congress, our own Representative Walter Rogers. I will do this by reprinting his letter of September 17 to his constituents. It is as follows:

Dear Fellow Texan:
"Caveat emptor" is a Latin phrase meaning "Let the buyer beware." "Skulduggery at the crossroads" is an old western phrase meaning "keep one hand on your pocketbook and your other hand on your gun." The people of this country should take definite heed to both of these expressions before they are led into a trap commonly referred to as the "Truth in Packaging Bill." It could be said that the "Truth in Packaging Bill" is a modern day expression meaning "the people are so stupid the government must protect them from trading among themselves." About the only "truth" associated with this measure is the use of the word in its popular name title. As soon as the people find out what is going on the title will become an unpopular name.

The bill has been widely and notoriously advertised as a bill to protect the consumer. This approach is supposed to have an emotional appeal that will cause the populace to accept the measure at face value without any investigation as to its real purpose. The real purpose of this bill is to give the Federal government further bureaucratic powers of life and death over a substantial portion of the business community of this country. It is designed to add many more employees to the public payroll and to force absolute conformity to Federal standards in the packaging and distribution of goods, wares, and merchandise. In other words, the man who has built his business on the basis of honesty and integrity will be required to package his goods under the same standards as the crooks and mountebanks. The proponents of the bill seem to feel that they have been divinely appointed with great knowledge and understanding not enjoyed by the public generally. They seem to be confident that the average housewife is completely ignorant in the ways of the marketplace and totally unversed in reading, writing, and arithmetic. These self-appointed saviours are dead set on saving you from yourselves, even if it ruins the country. They fail to realize that this grandiose plan of theirs has been used in Russia for a number of years and has not been successful, even under the communist philosophy. Certainly, it could not be successful under the free enterprise system. About the only thing it can accomplish is: (1) it will put another burden and yoke on many small businesses which could very well bankrupt them; (2) it will definitely require many, many changes in packaging procedures of manufacturers and processors that will require increases in the price of consumer goods; (3) it will definitely increase inflationary trends and add to the burdens of the old people and those on fixed incomes who are presently beset by inflation; (4) it will stifle incentive and innovation in the sale of goods to the American public and will jeopardize many businesses associated with the sale and distribution of goods, wares, and merchandise.

I remember quite well an experience I had in Russia in 1955. I was in Leningrad and desired to purchase a Russian doll for my young daughter. The only doll available was a cheap replica of dolls that had been produced in this country before 1920. The arms and legs were held in place by rubber bands. The doll could have been purchased in any store in this country for fifty cents. I was quoted a price in Russian rubles that was equivalent of \$9.00 in American money. I told the NVD that I would not pay that price. He asked what I intended to do. I told him I was going to Moscow and would shop around. He began to laugh. I inquired what was so funny. He said, "The quality and the price are the same all over Russia."

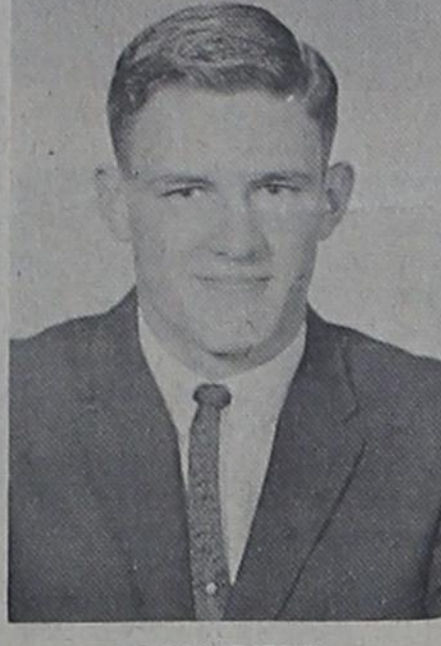

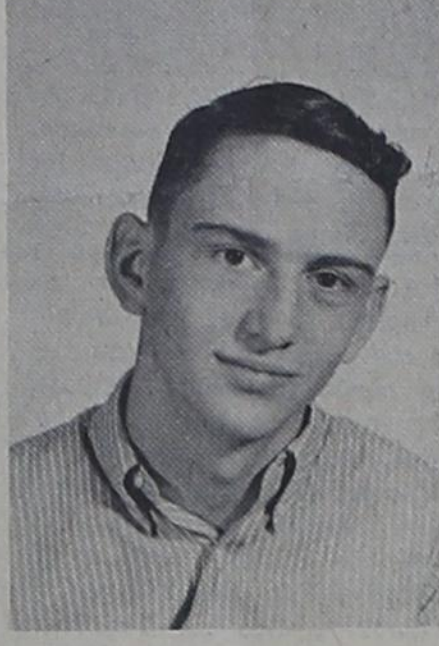

Ronny F. McNutt, 28, who is currently the assistant county agent in Lamb County, will become the new Parmer County Agricultural Agent effective October 16. He will replace Joe VanZandt who recently resigned to become the Moore County Agricultural Agent, according to a joint announcement made here by Parmer County Judge Loyde Brewer and Extension District Agent W. W. Grisham Jr., of Amarillo.

McNutt has been with the Extension Service in Lamb County since 1961.

He holds a B. S. Degree from Texas Tech where he majored in agricultural education.

A native of Stonewall County, McNutt was raised on a livestock farm there. He was active in the Future Farmers of America and 4-H Club work.

His parents are Mr. and Mrs. John McNutt, of Peacock. He is married to the former Miss Vera Sue Parker, also of Peacock.

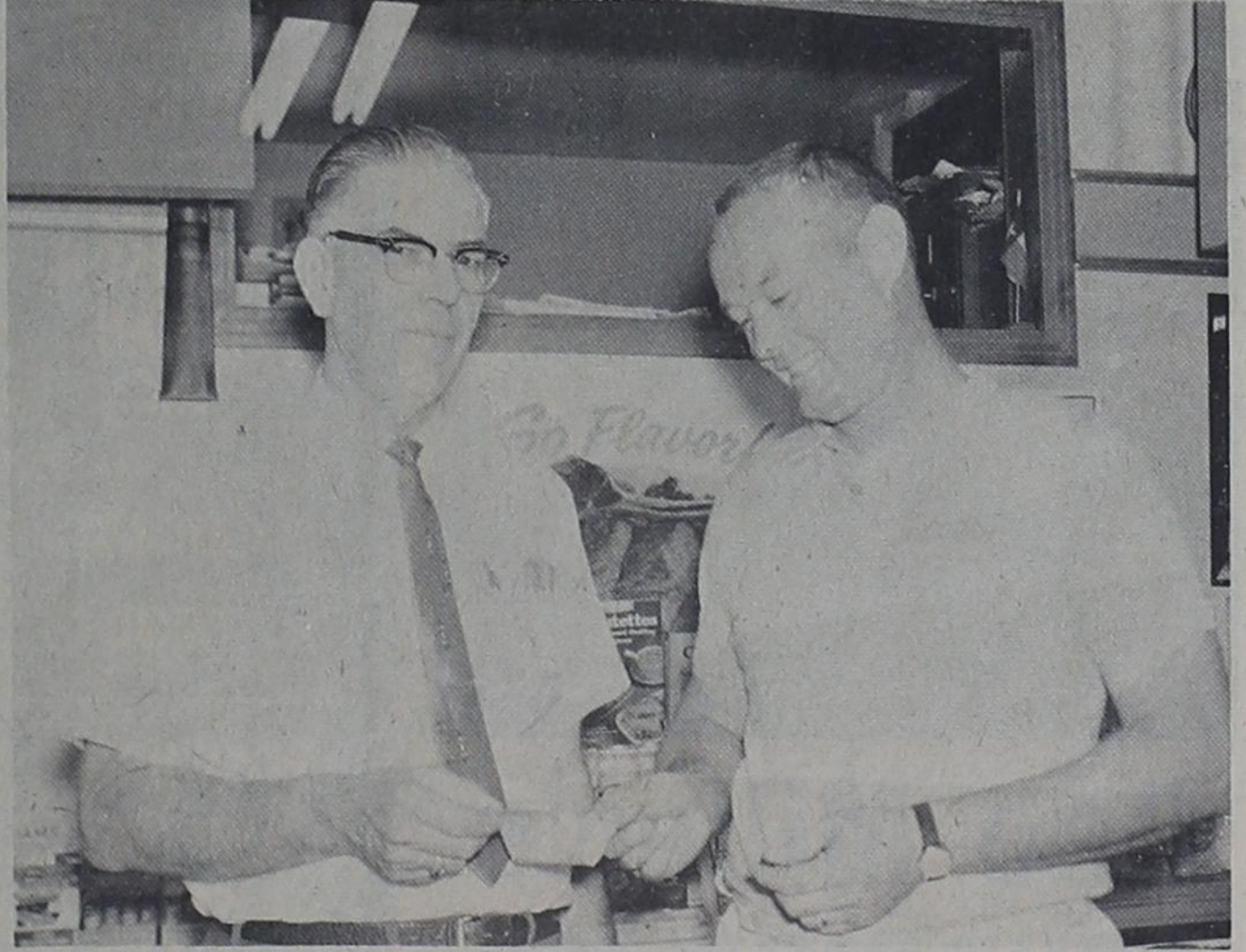

To receive this honor, Dale kept detailed records on a five-acre plot of Tascosa wheat. In the records he included the preparation of the ground where the wheat was sown, the type and amount of fertilizer applied, date the wheat was sown, number of times it was irrigated, the extent it was grazed, when it was cut, and the yield.

Dale also sent a 15-pound sample to Amarillo along with his records. From this sample flour was made and used in baking. The point of the contest that held the most weight was the nutritional value of the baked product, and Dale's wheat proved to be the most nutritious.

At the crowning ceremonies held on the Fair Grounds at the I. M. Gouldy Arena on the Rural Youth Day Program, Dale was awarded \$5 for entering the contest, \$50 for winning, and a trophy. This is only the second year that Parmer County had had an entrant in the wheat contest.

The Eskimo And The Wolf

The most powerful political vote getter today is the promise of something for nothing. For the past three decades, politicians have been elected to office simply because they offer a bigger handout than their opponents.

Time and time again we have been warned that the only money we get from the government is that which we put into it, minus of course a handling charge deducted as it passes through Washington, but we refuse to listen. Instead we have become indoctrinated with the so-called "free" money and continue to vote for the big handout.

Every so often, a politician comes along and advocates a tightening of the "free" money, runs for election on a platform of fiscal responsibility, and what happens? He is buried alive at the polls. America evidently does not want fiscal responsibility, she does not want a stoppage in the flow of "free" money, she does not want a reduction in the welfare roles. What she does want is the ever bigger handout.

With over 15 million welfare recipients, it is easy to see how the big promise candidates overwhelm their opponents. There is an old adage which states that you don't bite the hand that feeds you. How, very, very true.

America is evidently impervious to repeated warnings to the disastrous consequences of the course that she is following. Nothing sensible men can say or do deters her from her headlong plunge after the easy buck.

Paul Harvey tells an interesting story however, that if read and fully understood might help stop this mad thirst for the "free" dollar. The moral of the story is so strong that I feel that it is worthwhile to repeat it here. It is entitled, "How an Eskimo Kills a Wolf."

The Eskimo, being the cunning character that he is, has devised a devious method for killing the wolf. The first step involves sharpening his knife to a razor edge. The Eskimo then dips the knife into a cup of fresh blood and allows the coating of blood to freeze upon the knife. He then repeats the process, allowing another coat of blood to freeze upon the knife. Over and over again, the Eskimo freezes another layer of blood upon the knife until the sharp blade is covered with a thick coat of fresh frozen blood. He then buries the knife in the snow where the wolf will find it, leaving only the blood coated blade protruding above the snow.

That night, the half-starved wolf finds the knife in the snow. The tongue of the wolf is now in shreds but in his mad frenzy the wolf continues to devour his own blood, faster and faster - until the wolf is found dead in the snow the next morning, his stomach full of his own blood, but his veins empty.

Cowboys Lasso Steers

Fumbles, interceptions, mistakes, and a vastly more experienced group of Plains Cowboys spelled doom for Farwell last Friday night at Plains as the Cowboys romped and stomped for a 29-19 victory over the Steers.

In what was billed as a battle between the 5-A and 3-A district favorites, the Cowboys wasted no time in making their prowess known as they struck for two quick touchdowns before the game had barely gotten underway and with less than seven minutes gone in the first quarter, held a 14-0 lead which they never relinquished.

The Steers' chief misery was in the form of 175-pound Ricky Elmore, the bruising Plains fullback who rambled for three Cowboy touchdowns of 18, 1, and 8 yards respectively and returned a kickoff for 47 yards thereby setting up the other Plains touchdown.

Although the Steers rolled up more total yardage than their opponents, the fumbles told the story as Plains was

able to capitalize on several Farwell bobbles, turning them into touchdowns and providing the margin of victory. Twice a bobbled kick led to a Plains recovery and subsequent touchdown.

The Steers were presented with a number of breaks during the game in the form of penalties, etc., but for the most part were unable to take advantage of them due primarily to a badly hampered passing game which failed to produce the needed first downs.

The Cowboys' first touchdown came with less than three minutes gone in the first quarter. Elmore returned the opening kickoff out to the Plains 47 yard line for excellent field position. The Cowboys proceeded to march straight down the field behind the running of Elmore and Joe Pierce with Pierce crashing over from the ten for the first Plains touchdown. The try for point was good making it 7-0 in favor of the hosts.

The Steers were unable to move the ball on the ensuing series of plays as two passes fell incomplete. A punt rolled out of bounds on the Farwell 48 and Plains went to work once again. With 5:30 left in the first quarter, Elmore carried the final 18 yards for the second Plains touchdown. The extra point made it 14-0.

Perhaps the biggest factor working against the Steers in the first half was their passing game which failed to produce a single completion for the first two periods. Bobby Field, Steer quarterback, was hampered by a big Plains rush which forced hurried throws that missed their mark. The Steers' running game operated fairly well however as Al Phillips, Johnny Schell, and Field carried for several good gains thereby keeping Farwell in the game.

The Steers were presented with their first scoring opportunity late in the second period as a Plains punt went high and out of bounds giving the Steers a first down on the Plains 27

yard line, Schell carried to the 15 for a first down and on the following play Phillips took a pitchout from Field and skirted end for the remaining 15 yards and the first Farwell touchdown. The extra point attempt by Phillips was good making it 14-7. The remainder of the first half went scoreless with three more Field passes falling incomplete and when the two teams went in for halftime, the Cowboys still enjoyed a seven point lead.

Fans hoping for a Farwell comeback in the second half were rudely disappointed as the Steers bobbled the opening kickoff giving Plains possession on the Farwell 31. Elmore and Pierce combined to give the Cowboys a first and goal situation on the Steer three but a penalty set them back to the eight. Finally on a fourth and goal from the Farwell one, Elmore bulled over for the touchdown, making it 21-7.

On the ensuing series of plays Field connected with Schell for the first Steer completion and a first down on the Cowboy 31 but it was to no avail as Plains intercepted the next pass on their own seven yard line to halt the Steer drive.

Plains was presented with another scoring opportunity in

the closing minutes of the third period as the Steers bobbled another Plains punt giving possession of the football to the Cowboys on the Farwell 41. A Rollins to Cowart pass set them up with a first down on the Steer 17. Two plays later Elmore scored the final Plains touchdown with 11:50 left in the game. A two-point conversion try was good making it 29-7 in favor of Plains.

From that point, the Steers began a rally which, although it fell short, gave the Steer fans plenty of excitement.

With 10:50 left in the game, Field found Schell open and connected with him for a 37-yard touchdown play which cut the margin to 29-13 as the two point conversion effort failed.

After holding and forcing the Cowboys to punt, the Steers began a march on their own 15 which carried to Plains 34 before Lynn Rollins intercepted a

Springlake B and Farwell B teams fought to a 12-12 tie on Thursday evening with the local squad making a fine showing.

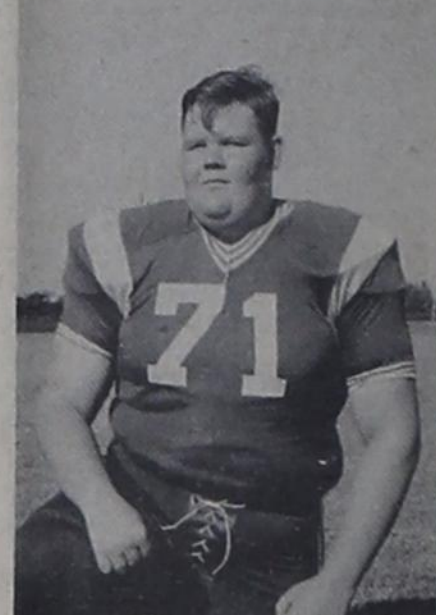
