The King and Queen will again be honored during the

football half-time festivities, along with past homecoming royalty.

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We admit that our columns have been politically oriented lately. So we were not entirely surprised at receiving a letter the other day that took us to task for our animosity to Jimmy Carter. The letter declared him to be an honest, hard working, Christian gentleman.

We agree: Carter, we think is honest, hard working and a "Christian." We bear no animosity to James Earl Carter as an individual or as a person. However, as a President of the United States Jimmy Carter is the political pinnacle of the political philosophy that we believe to be degrading and stultifying to the individual person. It is this, the representative of this political philosophy that we take to task, not the person.

Our disagreement with the philosophy currently entrenched in Washington, D.C., is so deep and wide ranging that it is almost impossible to tell of it in the limited space of our weekly column. Let us give you an odious example of the strangling tentacles of Big Brother in action as he chokes freedom from the individual.

Recently the federal government set some goals in the educational processes of handicapped children. One of the goals is the toilet training of the children. Here is a federal mandated goal—"Student will stay on potty chair and perform needed function at least once each day."

Now try as we might we cannot find a clause in the Constitution of the United States that says that the Federal government shall mandate the defecational routines of the citizenry.

This, we admit, is a far out example, but it brings the impact of the government to a very personal level. It is this desire on the part of those of the very "liberal" philosophy with which we take such strong exception.

This year's election will be an irretrievable branching of the road in our method of government. The decision that the electorate of this country makes this fall will affect not only those of us today but it will determine under what type of political philosophy our children and their children's children will live.

This is not a light decision. It is a decision that every American should ponder deeply, with soul searching and prayer. The question that will be answered at the ballot box on November 4th will not be who is President, Jimmy Carter or Ronald Reagan, but will be, rather, do we turn toward a more self-reliant form of government or do we continue our drift to a state-controlled form of socialism in which even the bowel habits of the people are subject to regulation.

Ponder not the party platforms as such, they are window dressing. Think well on the philosophy of government that has produced these documents. This is what you as a citizen will be voting on in November.

Well, the Oilers didn't knock the Steelers' door down as Bum Phillips prophesied last season. At the conclusion of last Sunday's mauling of the Oilers by the Steelers, Bum was asked to comment on the game. Replied Bum, "No comment, I don't have my losing speech ready."

Ryburn, Coffman Tops --

Tiebreaker Decides Contest's First Winner

for the funds to redecorate the School's Home Ec Cottage, and a Door-to-door American Heart Association Campaign.

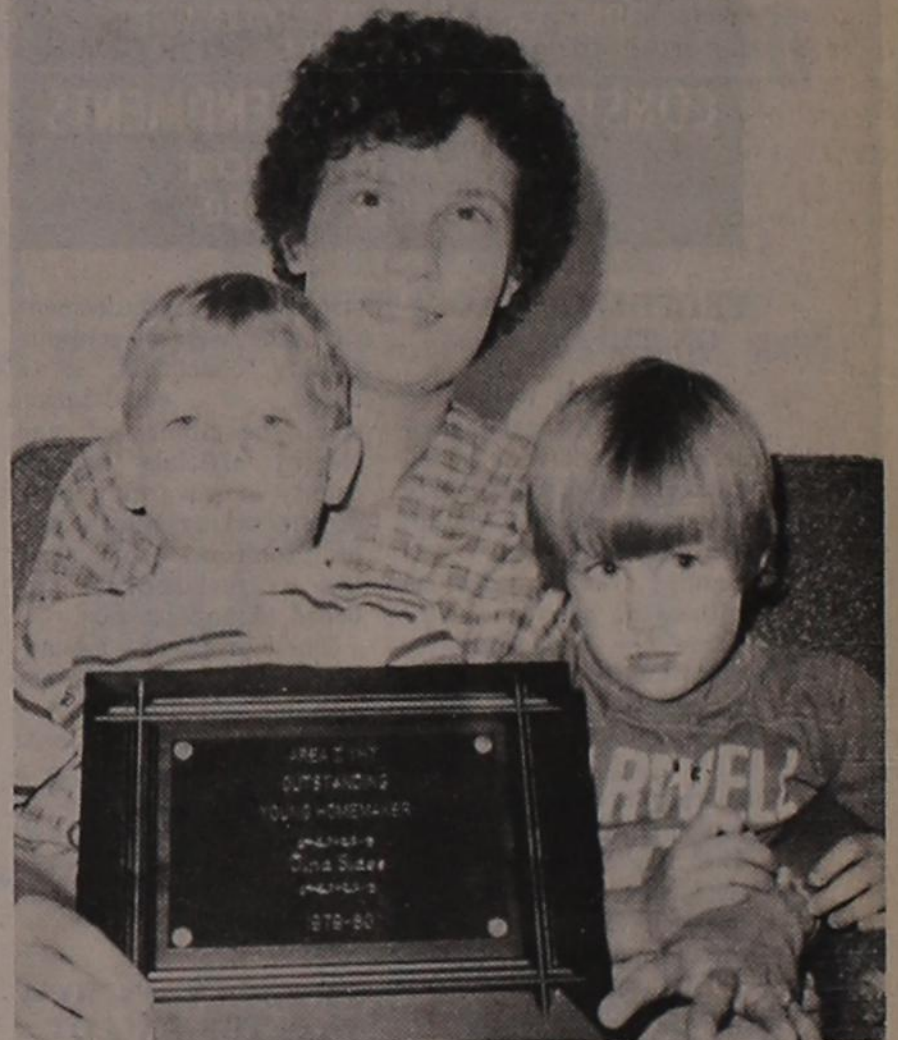

An open house has been scheduled by the Texico School Board, according to Jim Pierce, superintendent.

Set for Tuesday, at 7 p.m. MDT, Pierce advises that the entire school facility will be open and all teachers will be present.

"All parents, students and interested visitors are invited to attend," Pierce urged. "Those coming will be able to learn about all the upcoming school programs and have any questions concerning student's work answered by the teachers," Pierce said.

In their Tuesday night meeting, the board voted to buy a Chevrolet pickup and automobile for the Vo Ag and Driver's Ed departments.

Mrs. Mary Peyton, business teacher, will travel to Santa Fe to check into the possibilities and advantages of becoming a State Vocational Business Department. "This is something we would like to consider, providing the standards will serve as an advantage to our students," Pierce stated.

Board members learned that actual enrollment for the school system, including kindergarten, is 375, which is up a bit from their projected figures, yet still down from last

year's total enrollment.

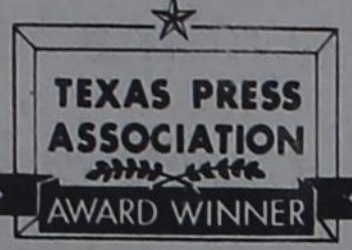

Law Officers Arrest Laborer

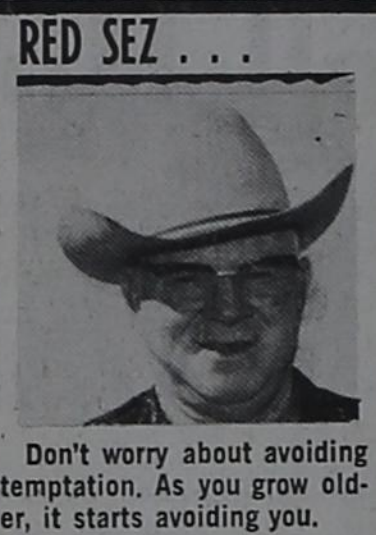
Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace reports that Jose Ruelas, 28, is in county custody after being caught in the Lazbuddie home of Myrtle Steinbock. Ruelas was arrested for breaking and entering and is being bound over for grand jury action. Bond has been set at \$500. Ruelas was reported to have broken the back door latch to gain entry to the Steinbock residence. "He was an alien doing labor work in the Lazbuddie area," Lovelace stated.
 The sheriff's department is investigating several other breaking and entering reports and several stolen items.
 The Lazbuddie home of Jim Everett was forcibly entered and he reported a Zenith T.V., stereo, speakers and one shotgun as missing. Everett had been away from home two

days when he returned to find the items missing.

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PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1980

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to permit banks to establish and operate unmanned teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with anti-trust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. The Legislature has already passed enabling legislation (H.B. 1510) for this proposed amendment.
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or the city of their domicile on a shared basis to serve the public convenience."
**PROPOSITION NO. 2
 ON THE BALLOT**
 House Joint Resolution 97 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the State and the accused the right to an interlocutory appeal from the following trial court rulings in criminal cases: pretrial rulings on the constitutionality of a statute; on a motion to quash, dismiss, or set aside an indictment; and on a motion to suppress evidence. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment authorizing appeal of certain pretrial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused."
**PROPOSITION NO. 3
 ON THE BALLOT**
 House Joint Resolution 98 proposes a constitutional amendment that would require a single appraisal of all property subject to ad valorem taxation and would provide for a single board of equalization within each county. The con-

stitutional requirement that the county commissioners court sit as a board of equalization would be eliminated, and elected officials of the county or governing body of the taxing unit would be prohibited from serving as members of the board of equalization.
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment requiring a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes."
**PROPOSITION NO. 4
 ON THE BALLOT**
 Senate Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the conduct of bingo games by certain specified groups for charitable purposes, subject to the limitations that operation of the games must be approved in local option elections and that all proceeds must be spent in Texas.
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games on a local option election basis if the games are conducted by a church, synagogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, nonprofit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or nonprofit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs and if the proceeds are to be spent in Texas for charitable purposes of the organizations."
**PROPOSITION NO. 5
 ON THE BALLOT**
 House Joint Resolution 86 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of certain appropriated funds, subject to any conditions and limitations provided by law and subject to the ap-

proval of a budget execution committee that would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives.
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment to grant the governor power to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of appropriated funds as provided by law."
**PROPOSITION NO. 6
 ON THE BALLOT**
 Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Governor who appointed a previously confirmed official to remove that official from office subject to the advice and consent of the Senate; and if the Legislature is not in session, to call a special session of the Senate which may last no longer than 2 days for consideration of the removal.
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment to authorize the governor to remove appointed officers with the advice and consent of the senate."
**PROPOSITION NO. 7
 ON THE BALLOT**
 House Joint Resolution 121 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize counties with a population of 5000 or less to construct and maintain private roads if they impose a reasonable charge for the work. The Legislature by general law may limit this authority. Revenue received from private road work may be used only for the construction, including right-of-way acquisition, or maintenance of public roads.
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment authorizing counties with a population of 5000 or less to perform private road work."
**PROPOSITION NO. 8
 ON THE BALLOT**
 Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitution-

al amendment that would change the jurisdiction and authority of the State's appellate courts. The amendment would change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals to Courts of Appeal and provide that these courts have intermediate appellate jurisdiction over both criminal and civil cases. The amendment would change titles for the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court to be attorneys licensed in this state while holding office.
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment to change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals and the names and qualifications of the justices of the Supreme Court and to prescribe the jurisdiction and authority of the appellate courts."
**PROPOSITION NO. 9
 ON THE BALLOT**
 House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment which defines separate property owned by either spouse as all property, both real and personal, of a spouse owned or claimed before marriage, and that acquired afterward by gift, devise or descent. Persons about to marry and spouses, without the intent to defraud pre-existing creditors, may by written instrument from time to time partition between themselves all or part of their property. Spouses may exchange a community interest in property owned or to be acquired for a community interest in other community property. The amendment would allow spouses to agree in writing that income or property arising from any separate property is to be separate property rather than as community property as it would be in the absence of an agreement. The amendment proposes that a gift from one spouse to another is presumed to include all income or property deriving from such gift.
 The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment allowing spouses to agree that income or property arising from separate property is to be separate property."

PROPOSICION NO. 1 EN LA BOLETA

Resolución Conjunta #35 del Senado propone una enmienda constitucional que autorice a la Legislatura permitir a los bancos establecer y operar máquinas registradoras automáticas (teller machines) dentro del condado o ciudad en donde están los bancos compartiendo el uso de las máquinas registradoras de acuerdo con las leyes antimonopolistas, si acaso esta operación resulta conveniente para el público. La Legislatura ya aprobó la autorización de esta legislación (H.B. 1510) para la proposición de esta enmienda.
 La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional permite a la Legislatura autorizar que los bancos usen máquinas registradoras automáticas (teller machines) dentro del condado o ciudad de su domicilio en un plan de cooperación para conveniencia pública."

revisar avalúos dentro de cada condado. El requisito constitucional de que la corte de comisionados del condado sea la junta de avalúos será eliminado, y a los oficiales electos del condado o de la comisión directiva de la unidad fiscal se les prohibirá servir como miembros de la junta de revisión de avalúos.
 La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional requiere solamente una evaluación y una junta para la revisión de avalúos en cada condado para determinar los impuestos de ad valorem."

PROPOSICION NO. 4 EN LA BOLETA

Resolución Conjunta #18 del Senado propone una enmienda constitucional permitiendo a la Legislatura autorizar juegos de bingo por grupos con propósitos caritativos solamente sujetos a las limitaciones de que la operación de los juegos tiene que ser aprobada en elecciones de opción local, y que todas las ganancias tengan que ser usadas en Texas.
 La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue: "La enmienda constitucional autoriza los juegos de bingo bajo elecciones de opción local si los juegos son dirigidos por, ya sea, una iglesia, una sinagoga, una asociación religiosa, un servicio voluntario de hombres, una sociedad no lucrativa de veteranos, una organización fraternal, o una sociedad no lucrativa que apoya la investigación médica o programas de tratamiento médico y si las ganancias son usadas en Texas para los propósitos caritativos de las organizaciones."

'79 Spending Shrinks For Farwell Schools

The 1980-81 tax roll was approved and the board also voted to turn over to attorneys property on the delinquent tax roll for collection.

An Amarillo Certified Public Accounting firm, Cornell and Company, has been selected by the board to do an independent audit of the 1979-80 fiscal year.

In other action, the school

board swore in Richard Haseloff as a new board member.

Also, permission was granted to the senior class, represented by Doris Ford and Annette Black, for the use of the old gym. It will be used for the upcoming homecoming dance.

Teachers will no longer be required to have a yearly physical examination as the board voted to delete this practice. However, the board did reserve the right to demand a physical if opinion considered one necessary.

Parmer County 4-H'ers will show livestock at Dumas and at the South Plains Fair later this month.

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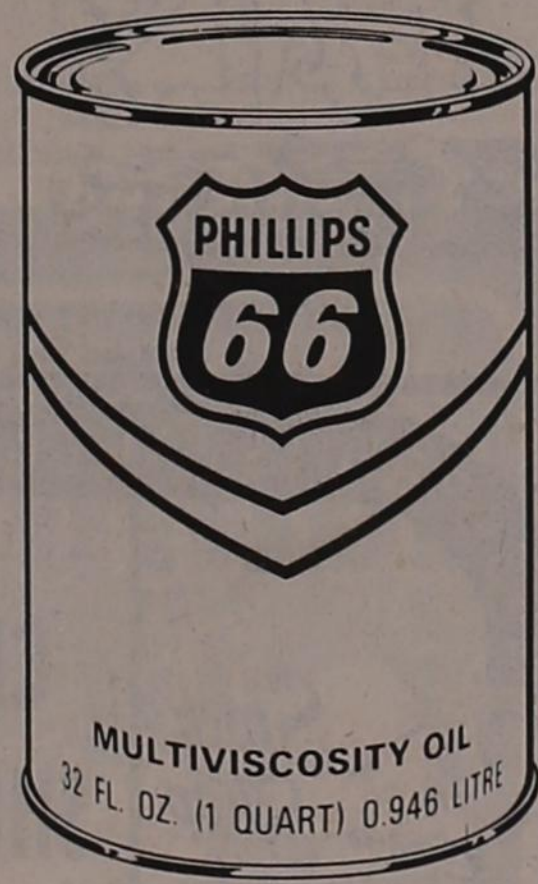
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Engrams Honored With Anniversary Reception

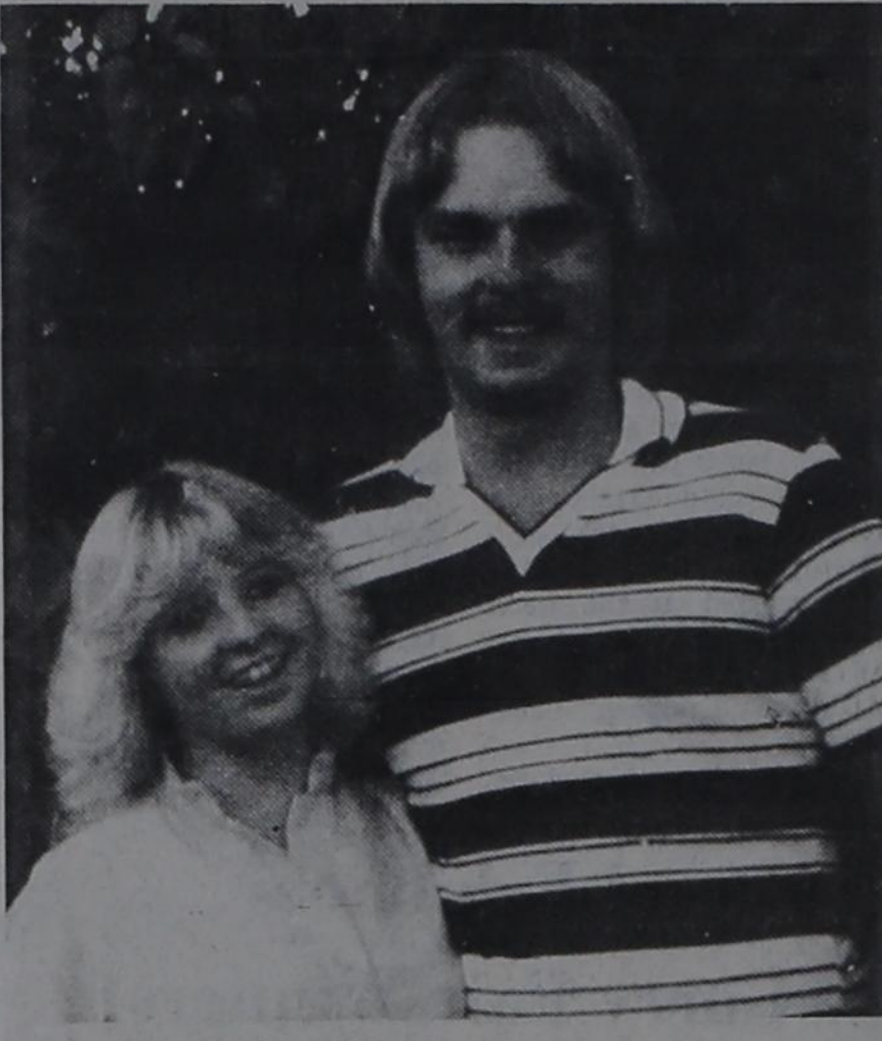

Carrizozo Grizzlies Edge Wolverines 8-0 In Opener

With 58 seconds on the clock Carrizozo scored the game's only touchdown to beat Texico in the Wolverine's season opener 8-0.

Wolverine quarterback Gary Mitchell had a pass intercepted on the Carrizozo 20 to set up the deciding touchdown in an otherwise scoreless game.

"They beat us on one pass play," said Wolverine head coach David Lynn. "Otherwise we outplayed them. We beat them both offensively and defensively," he stated flatly.

When asked for the cause of Texico's scoreless effort, Lynn responded "we just fumbled the ball every time."

"We were on the four-yard line twice in the first half," the coach recalled. "We had 11 fumbles and lost five of those."

In a game filtered with mistakes and penalties it seemed as though neither team could keep the ball long enough to score.

The Carrizozo Grizzlies were able to move the ball only 15

yards before relinquishing on a punt in the first quarter. Three plays later the Wolverines fumbled the ball over for Grizzly possession on the Texico 25-yard line.

The ball was later recovered by Texico on the Wolverine 15-yard line after Carrizozo running-back Beltran fumbled in a first down attempt.

A holding penalty stopped a steady pace made by the Wolverines which saw them at the Grizzly 17. The pigskin was put back on the 32. The penalty, coupled with an incomplete pass gave the ball back to Carrizozo.

After changing hands several times, the ball finally ended up in Wolverine possession again after Herbert Bibbs intercepted a Carrizozo pass. However, with the two minute warning given, Texico lost the ball on downs to their opponent.

Fans were more than surprised when Carrizozo crossed the goal line in the last minute of the game.

"We're short on experience

this year," Coach Lynn declared. "I hope we gained some experience the other night."

Lynn said first time quarterback Gary Mitchell "did good for first time out."

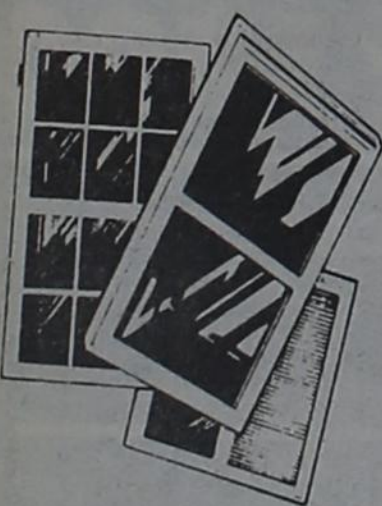
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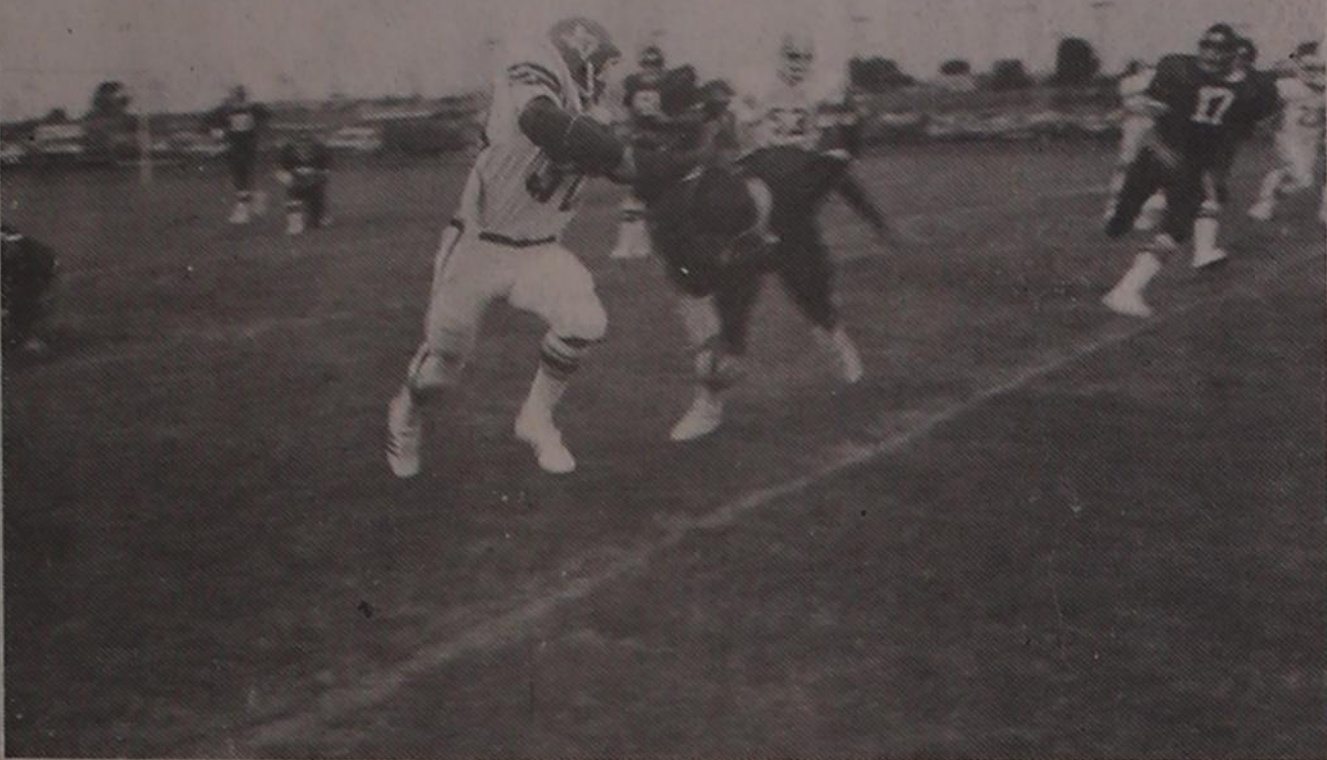

in the Farwell-Plains season opener played Friday night at Plains. White managed to chase the Cowboy ball handler out of bounds on the Cowboy 42.

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The season's first was a game where Farwell fumbled eight times, which was almost as many points as Plains scored, and consequently Farwell lost, 13-0. "It was a case of first-game jitters," said Steer head coach Randy Adrian. The victorious Cowboys grabbed their only two TD's in the first nine minutes of the game, leaving the rest of the contest pretty evenly matched, except for those ever-present fumbles. "We just couldn't hang on to the ball," Adrian stated. The Plains opening kickoff was received by Emilio Paez and Farwell started play on their own 25-yard line. But the Steers couldn't seem to go much further after being hampered by a five-yard penalty for illegal motion and the beginning of their "fumble streak" in the backfield. The fumbled ball was recovered and moved eight yards by Ralph Paez, but the fumble was to be the first of many setbacks for the Steer scoring effort. With a fourth down and five yards to go, the Steers relinquished the ball with a punt. Plains gained control of the ball and the game and scored their first touchdown with 7:26 left in the first quarter. Tailback Mike Cheatham went over from six yards out, and Martin Huerta kicked the extra point, and Plains led 7-0. A kick out of the end zone by Plains put Farwell at their 20-yard line, with Emilio Paez pushing the team forward in a 25-yard run for a first down, followed by a 17-yard run for another first down. The offensive strategy looked promising until the ball was fumbled on a

pitch-out to Jack Deaton, again giving Plains command. A 55-yard pass to Cowboy Martin Huerta, waiting patiently behind the entire Steer defense put the ball on Farwell's 15-yard line. The Cowboys then scooted the ball forward in three plays bringing the second and last TD of the night by Steve Crump, putting the Steers behind, 13-0. The PAT attempt failed as the snap was fumbled. Again Farwell seized the ball in an effort to score, and once again lost the ball to Plains on a fumble. But Plains couldn't move the ball enough for a score, and a 15-yard penalty for an ineligible receiver didn't help. A Plains fourth down punt game Farwell a scoring chance once more. But this time, not only were they hurt by a fumble causing an eight-yard loss, they began their short-lived control with an incomplete pass. Again they surrendered the ball with a punt to Plains. The two teams continued to push each other back and fourth on the turf, a series of penalties and fumbles for both teams keeping the pigskin from crossing the goal line. Additionally Farwell was hindered by two pass interceptions during the game, restricting their scoring efforts. Just before the second half, Farwell had their fans on the edge of their seats. The Steer goal venture looked as though a TD was in sight, but with 51 seconds left, the Steers had three incomplete passes before the buzzer sounded. "Fumble-itis" dominated the second half, in addition to penalties assessed to both sides.

However, the two teams proved to be almost equal in strategy as neither team let the other cross the goal line. The third quarter began with a Farwell kickoff to Plains, but outstanding defensive plays by Steers Byron Mayfield, Emilio Paez and Boyd White forced the Cowboys into a punting situation. Farwell kept control and once more had the fans expecting the long awaited TD, but the ever-present fumble caused them to yield one more time to Plains. It was a see-saw ball game for the duration. "We were inside the 25-yard-line four times and fumbled," Adrian said. "Once we were on the two-yard line and fumbled." "We could play any team in the league if we could just hang on to the ball," he said. Statistically Farwell stayed neck-and-neck with Plains. "Fumbles set us back, we need to hang on to the ball," the coach repeated. Coach Adrian was pleased with the Farwell fan support. "I was really impressed with the amount of people that came down for the game," he said. In closing comments, the football coach expressed that he "was very proud of the offensive line, they looked real good."

Farwell coaching staff named Emilio Paez and Ricky Armstrong as Steers of the Week following their performances in the Plains game. Paez carried the ball 18 times for 106 yards and Armstrong made eight tackles and recovered a fumble to earn the week's honors. Coach Adrian also had high praise for Alex Paez, defensive end; Richard Carpenter, tight end; Chris Bristow, left guard; and Ralph Paez, corner back.

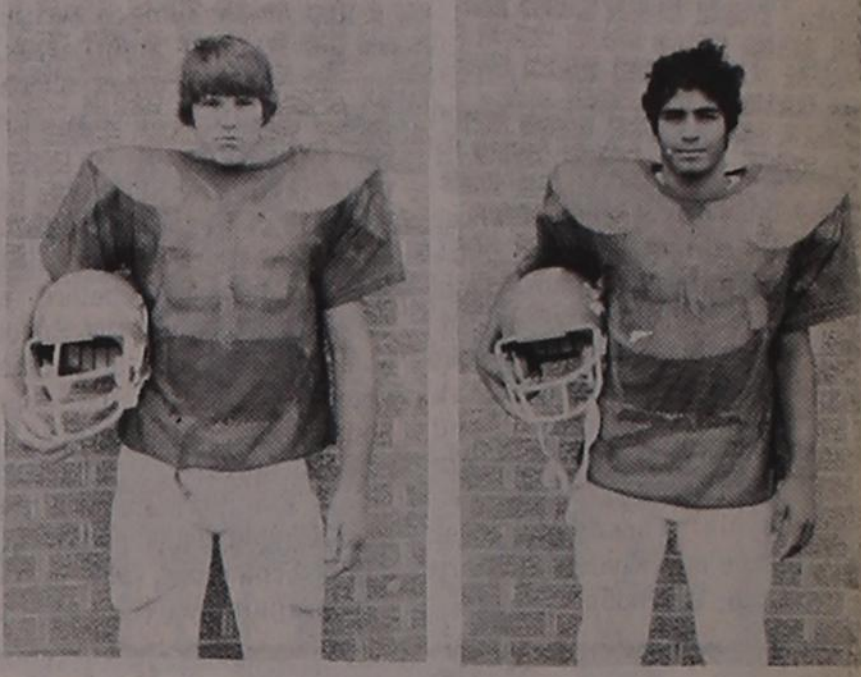

INEXCUSABLE

The second chapter of Paul's Epistle to the Romans is a dark, sad passage, but it opens the door to the richest blessing the human heart can contain: salvation by grace!

The opening words: "Therefore thou art inexcusable," are blunt indeed, but God exposes our sinful condition only so as to save us from it.

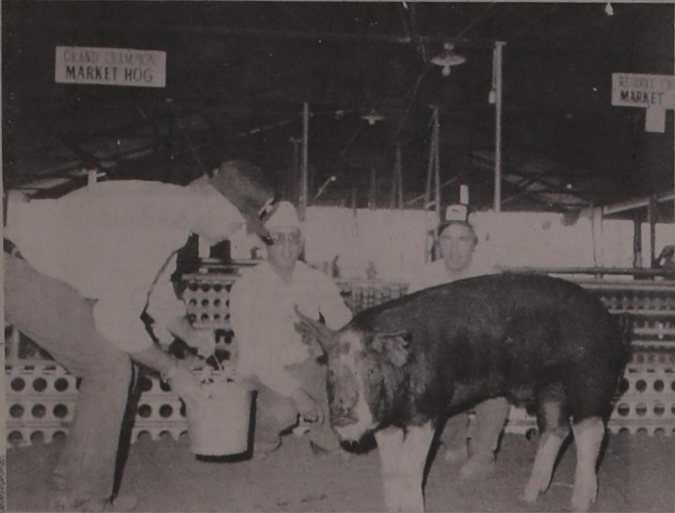
This is where most philosophies and the Bible clash head-on. Most philosophies close their eyes to the sinful nature of man. They argue by and large, that man is inherently good, while overwhelming evidence bears witness that he is bad. Therefore human philosophy offers no salvation from sin and its just penalty. Only the Bible does this by "the gospel (good news) of the grace of God."

In Paul's day the Greek philosophers condemned the uncivilized pagans for their open immorality and wickedness. But while preaching virtue, these moralizers practiced vice, and God said: "Therefore thou art inexcusable, O man, whosoever thou art that judgest: for wherein thou judgest another, thou condemnest thyself; for thou that judgest doest the same things" (Rom. 2:1).

It is the same today. Multitudes of self-righteous people are outwardly cultured and moral, but they forget that God looks upon the heart and sees hate as murder, jealousy as theft and lustful looks as adultery. He considers, not what we do, outwardly, but what we desire to do or wish we dared to do. He sees the desires and motives of the heart.

But thank God, "Christ died for sinners" - guilty sinners, and all who come to God by faith in Christ are "justified freely by His grace, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 3:24).

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
