

Texico pupils present Science Spectrum

Projects ranging from spider habitats to solar energy filled the center hall at Texico Elementary for their first-ever Science Spectrum.

Just like the Science Spectrum in Lubbock, each project teaches students about a science subject and offers visuals and models. Each elementary class at Texico will have a chance to view the projects to learn science concepts.

Instead of the traditional science fair this year, 4th and 5th grade teachers changed the format for the projects to a Science Spectrum. They thought the new format would focus more on the research and learning the subject as opposed to just constructing an experiment.

Also, as part of a change in New Mexico core standards, Texico has been focusing on the student's ability to write responses to open-ended questions. Thus, Texico teachers adapted their science fair to integrate this concept with science. Continued on Page 2



Students were responsible for writing all of the project information completely by themselves. Fourth grade teacher Brenda Wren said this was quitee an undertaking. Projects took almost six weeks to complete because all of the work was done at school during their computer classes.

"Students worked so hard to interpret the information they found on the internet and apply it to their projects. It was a great learning experience not only for science but also for technology, writing, analyzation and design skills," commented Mrs. Wren

Fifth grade teacher Melissa Durham added, "We were thrilled with the results of the projects. It took a long time to complete, but the kids really learned about their subjects."

Teachers feel like the Science Spectrum concept will be continued next year. Mrs. Wren confirmed, "The Science Spectrum fits so well with the technology emphasis for New Mexico schools and the kids really enjoyed the projects."



Request for Applicants and Notice of Public Hearing Since the official 2010 Census for Parmer County exceeds 10,200, the district judge having jurisdiction in the county is required by law to appoint a county auditor.

To be qualified for appointment as county auditor a person must be:

- 1. a competent accountant with at least two years experience in auditing and accounting.
- 2. thoroughly competent in public business details; and
- 3. a person of unquestionably good moral character and intelligence.

(There is no requirement that a county auditor be a licensed accountant or a certified public accountant).

The term of office of a county auditor is two years. The Local Government Code prohibits any personal interest in a contract with the county by a county auditor. The Texas Constitution requires a county officer to reside in the county.

This appointment is expected to be a part-time position with the county auditor required to be in the office approximately one-half of the time the courthouse is open. A salary commensurate with the time worked will be set; also, health insurance and retirement benefits will be provided in accordance with county policy.

Any qualified person interested in the appointment should submit a written resume of their qualifications to the Office of the District Clerk, Parmer County Courthouse, Farwell, Texas, 79325 prior to 5:00 p.m. on Monday, Dec. 12, 2011. The resume should include a statement of the positions of public or private trust previously held and the length of service in each of those positions.

A public hearing will be held in the District Courtroom, Parmer County Courthouse, Farwell, Texas, on Wednesday, Dec, 21, 2011, at 11:00 a.m. to determine the compensation for the county auditor.

Bovina pastor organized Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church

This story appeared in the State Line Tribune in 1976 when the Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church celebrated its 50th anniversary.

The Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church was organized on Sunday, Jan. 31, 1926, by Rev. Ira Ernest Walter, pastor of the Methodist Church at Bovina. On that Sunday, Walker carried water in a fruit jar so he could baptize a baby.

Prior to the establishment of the church, a Sunday School was organized in 1917. A visiting preacher from outside the community came to preach during the afternoon meetings.

In 1926 the Oklahoma Lane Methodist Church had 11 charter members: Mr. and Mrs. Luther Grissom, Mr. and Mrs. J. Frank Foster, Tom Foster, Carrie Foster, Mr. and Mrs. Ben Bates, Mr. and Mrs. John Gross, and Mrs. Fred Kepley.

Grissom and Gross were elected Stewards and Mrs. Kepley, church secretary. Services were to be at 2:30 p.m. on the second and fourth Sunday of each month at the community's school building.

Preaching and Sunday School continued in the school building until one acre of land was purchased from Jim and Lou Perkins for the sum of \$10. On that one acre a building for education and worship was constructed in 1930.

The first parsonage was a small three-room house located south of the present church. In 1950 a new parsonage was built and in 1967 additions were constructed, making it a three bedroom, two-bathroom parsonage.

The church purchased its present quarters after the Oklahoma Lane schools were consolidated with the Farwell system. The building which had housed the elementary school-gymnasium was bought in 1952 and remodeling for church purposes was completed in 1953.

Live Cattle prices took a hard hit on Monday with the bulk of the break taking place near the close of the day. Cash trade was strong last week, but about \$1 lower than the \$125 from the week before. Overall, prices remain inside a large sideways trading range, but for now, the market landed on the \$120 support level basis the February contract which has held the market for the last couple of months.

Feeder prices also broke alongside the Live Cattle on Monday for no apparent reason. Prices traded back down into the \$144.50 support area and held basis the January contract. Prices have more support around the \$143.25 which have held price declines since late in September. A break below these long term support levels would project a sharply lower leg just ahead and possibly indicate a long term top in place.

Soybean prices broke their long term support levels back in September and have yet to turn charts back higher. The market was able to rally over the few days, but sold off late Monday along with several other markets. Short term trends were able to turn down and a retest of the lows made around the \$11.00 level may be in order basis the January contract.

Corn prices have also remained under pressure since breaking below their 6 week sideways trading range. Prices made a short term attempt to move up, but short term trends have already turned back down. The market tested long term support around the \$5.90 level basis the March contract and held on Monday. A break below this level could send the market back to test the \$5.44 low of the year?

Wheat prices have also continued to decline along with the rest of the grain complex. There may be some support around \$6.50 low made just a couple of weeks ago, but many markets look like the next solid level of support will come in around the July low made in 2010. This level is roughly a \$1.00 away from current levels which would place the March KC contract down around the \$5.70 area?

Cotton prices continue to trade in a sideways fashion and have been for the last couple of weeks. The market moved down and traded below some long term support around the \$91.25 level basis the March contract before moving back up. Prices are now resting on support while waiting for some news to move prices. Overall, a lower U.S. Dollar would be supportive?




