

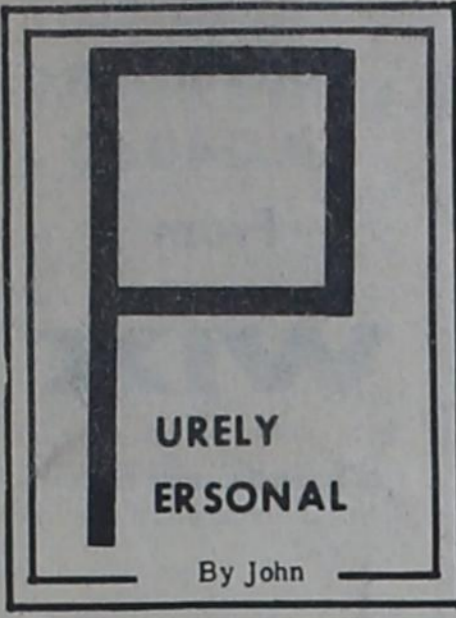

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Irrigation Tests To Help County Farmers

How should a farmer manage irrigation water for maximum profit? That's a big question facing farmers. Decisions that put available irrigation water to its maximum producing power are not always evident.

C. W. Bowman, who farms six miles west of Bovina, and County Agricultural Agent Ronnie McNutt have teamed up to provide some answers to this question.

The last plot received three irrigations. These were applied on July 15, August 6 and August 22. Every other furrow was irrigated during each application.

Bowman kept irrigation cost records, these being the application costs of fuel and labor. They can be deducted from the cotton income to determine the most profitable irrigation practice. A major factor influencing

cotton production and profit is quality. Cotton from each plot will be graded to determine quality variations from the different irrigation practices.

Bowman farms on one-half-mile rows. Siphon tubes were set on 15 rows and left 12 hours for each irrigation. Well or pump capacity was measured to determine the amount of the irrigations.

Bowman planted the four ir-

rigation plots to Paymaster 111 the last of April. He applied 150 pounds of 18-46-0 and 50 pounds of anhydrous ammonia. A fifth plot, irrigated three times, alternate row, is planted to Gregg.

Results will be available after harvest and will also be printed in the Farmer County Agricultural Demonstration Handbook which will be released by McNutt next winter.

A similar demonstration was conducted on grain sorghum on the Ronald Minyen farm.

terwards Ueki joined the other two people on the floor.

The when Evelyn Nunez who was shopping was told "Don't turn around; this is a stick-up," with a pistol in her back, all four people were led into the refrigerator.

Several other people, who had walked into the store to shop within the next few minutes, were also forced into the refrigerator.

Mrs. Ueki told police the gunman who approached her kept hiding his face with his hand and appeared very nervous. He was described as 5-foot-9 or 5-foot-10 in height, slim build, about 35 years, and was wearing a dark suit, dark hat and sunglasses.

The other gunman was said to be about 20 years old, about 5-foot-6, heavy build, and wore a topcoat or raincoat, light-colored hat and sunglasses.

Both gunman carried pistols. Leonard Ueki said he saw bullets in the chamber of the pistol held on him.

Cotton is being grown this year on Bowman's farm under four different irrigation practices or moisture levels. Results of this irrigation demonstration will be guides on which to base irrigation management decisions.

One plot has received only one irrigation during the growing season. It was applied on August 6 at peak bloom which is the maximum water requirement period for the cotton plant. Every furrow was irrigated.

Another plot received two irrigations, one on July 15 and the second on August 6. The first irrigation was applied when the first bloom appeared and the second, at peak bloom. Every furrow was irrigated during both applications.

Still another plot received the same two irrigations on July 15 and August 6. In this plot only alternate furrows were irrigated instead of each furrow.

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Two armed men robbed \$1021 from Home FoodBasket market at 1000 W. Main St. Sunday morning and forced several store workers and customers into a walk-in meat refrigerator.

Police said market part-owner Leonard Ueki of Guadalupe, his wife, Mary, employee Harry Ueki, customer Evelyn Nunez, and "several" other customers were forced into the refrigerator at gun-point.

The money, \$119 in currency and the rest in coin, was taken from the bottom drawer of a file cabinet in the store's office.

The people remained in the refrigerator about 20 minutes when a customer, Lee McDaniel, pushed open the second door of the refrigerator to permit exit, police said.

One of the robbers, in the store between five and 10 minutes, had approached Leonard Ueki at 10:30 a.m. and made him lie on the floor behind the meat counter where he was working.

The other gunman forced Mrs. Ueki at gun-point to leave the front cash register and join her husband on the floor. This same robber then approached Harry Ueki at the rear of store and ordered him to open "the safe."

Ueki, after saying the store had no safe, was forced to open the office door and lead the robber to the money. Af-

Portraying Area Homemakers

She makes most of her clothing and that of daughter, Debra, but confesses that she does not like to sew shirts, etc. Each year she cans many jars of assorted fruits and vegetables for winter eating and this year was no exception with Elaine putting up some 200 jars of foods.

The family is fond of hot breads and Elaine has found the following recipe for hot rolls (refrigerator) a great boon for always having hot bread at a few moments notice.

REFRIGERATED ROLLS
2 packages dry yeast
1/2 cup sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup Crisco oil
2 cups warm water
1 egg (beaten)
6 1/2 cups sifted flour

Dissolve yeast in 1/2 cup warm water; add sugar, salt, cooking oil, and egg beat mixing well; add an additional cup of warm water and three cups flour stirring until well mixed. Then add remainder of flour and water alternately. Knead five minutes on lightly floured board. Place in lightly greased mixing bowl to rise; allow to rise until double in volume. Either make into rolls and bake, or punch down, cover and place in refrigerator for future use. Keeps well for one week. Yields approximately three dozen.

CHOCOLATE CAKE
2/3 cup shortening
2 cups sugar
2 eggs
1/2 cup cocoa
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
2 1/2 cups sifted flour
3/4 cup buttermilk
1 1/2 teaspoon soda
1 cup boiling water
1 teaspoon each vanilla and red food color.

Cream shortening and add sugar, beat well, then add eggs beating well. Add cocoa, and mix; add salt and baking powder to flour; mix soda into buttermilk. Then add flour mixture and buttermilk mixture to first mixture alternately, mix well. Last, add boiling water, beat well and pour in vanilla and food color. Mix well and pour batter into three 8" cake pans, which have been greased and floured. Place in 350 degree oven and bake approximately 25 to 30 minutes or until top of cake springs up when touched lightly with finger tips. Allow to cool before icing. Use favorite icing.
