The Hopping-Aldridge House

Farwell home named Texas historical landmark

One of Farwell's oldest homes has been designated a Texas Historic Landmark by the Texas Historical Commission.

Known locally as the Aldridge house, it is recorded by the Commission as the Hopping-Aldridge house in honor of the two previous owners. Located at 710 4th St., the structure is currently owned by Mack Heald.

The house was built at this site between 1915-1917 for R.C. "Coke" Hopping, Parmer County's sheriff from 1910-1918. It was purchased by James and Minnie Aldridge in 1918. Aldridge succeeded Hopping as the sheriff, with his term starting in 1919.

The Aldridge's two sons, Sam and John, grew up in the house. After John married Lillian Orr, they moved into the house with his parents. Their two daughters, Mary Bell Aldridge Washington and Nancy Aldridge Mehler, grew up in the home, and it remained in the Aldridge family until selling to Heald in 1981.

Architecturally, the house is a two-story, foursquare design-frame structure with two coats of wire and stucco applied over the wood siding. This technique was sometimes practiced in this part of Texas, with the resulting structure of this type called a Prairie Style building. The Hopping-Aldridge house is one of the few homes of this style to be found in this part of the Texas Panhandle.

In 1984, the house received an exterior restoration that consisted of replacing the bannisters that had previously been removed. All wood and stucco surfaces were painted in colors that were used in the era that the house was built.

The Hopping-Aldridge house is the first residence in Parmer County to receive a state medallion. Two buildings -- the Parmer County Courthouse and the old First National Bank building (currently part of the Aldridge, Harding, Aycock and Atkinson law firm office on Third Street) -- in Farwell have been designated Texas Historical Landmarks in the past.

Interesting and often unusual highlights of Texas history can be found on more than 8,000 historical markers that dot the state. These familiar markers are the results of a joint local-state program. Markers are initiated, researched, and funded by county historical commissions, and are approved and written at the Texas Historical

LaRue, 57, has been a Texico resident for 16 years. He and his wife, Verlene, have two children -- Steve Doolittle, of Texico, and Teressa Cary, of Farwell.

On the spring election ballot will be three seats -- the mayoral post held by Hadley and council posts



The markers on the front of the Hopping-Aldridge House.

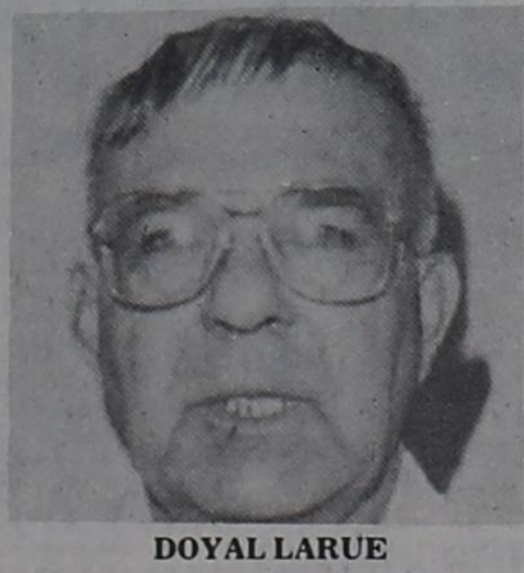
Commission in Austin.

A systematic program of historical markers began in 1936, in conjunction with the state's centennial. Granite markers, often containing brass plates, were placed to honor counties' roles in the state's first 100 years.

In 1962 the placement of official historical Medallion building markers began under the auspices of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, forerunner of the Texas Historical Commission. These markers are awarded to structures worthy of preservation because of their historical, cultural, and/or architectural value. Structures receiving the building markers are known as Recorded Texas Historic Landmarks and are afforded a measure of protection from demolition or alteration under state law. Currently there are approximately 2,000 of these building markers in Texas.

Soon after the placement of Medallions began, the marker program expanded to include interpretive plates with all Medallions. Subject and grave markers were also developed. With these additions, the program came to encompass a wide variety of historical subjects, including events, persons, institutions, cemeteries, archeological sites, ethnic groups, churches, and communities.

A marker dedication for the Hopping-Aldridge house in planned for sometime in 1986, in conjunction with the Texas Sesquicentennial Celebration. Details will appear in a future issue of this paper.

A look at our area's happenings in 1985

Here is an abbreviated look at 1985 in review:

JANUARY

After 215 days in an Amarillo Hospital, Parmer County Judge Porter Roberts returned to the bench.

Farwell boys won the Bovina Basketball Tournament.

Crowned Texico Homecoming King and Queen were Danny Powell and Cheryl Scott.

School officials from Friona, Lazbuddie and Farwell asked the Parmer County Commissioners to divvy up the Permanent School Trust Fund among them.

Cheryl Scott tied a Texico record for most points scored by pouring in 33 against Tatum en route to a Wolverine basketball win.

The Central Plains Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center in Plainview announced plans to open a counseling center in Friona.

Weldon Rainey became the new FmHA supervisor for Parmer County.

Farwell residents voted 163 to 107 to change the form of city government from three councilmen to five.

FEBRUARY

The Texico girls varsity basketball team won the EPAC Tournament.

It was announced that a New Mexico drug store owner had given a verbal commitment to the Farwell Hospital District Board to set up a new drug store here. A contract was signed later in the month.

Paul Barnes was elected without opposition to the Texico School Board. Incumbent Johnnie Rucker won re-election over Oran Autrey. Longtime Texico City Marshal Mickey Fenn resigned.

The Parmer County Commissioners voted 2-1 to divide up the Permanent School Trust Fund among the four county schools. Legal questions then were raised and the commissioners later voted to put the topic on hold, pending a state legal opinion.

The new chapel at the Farwell Convalescent Center was dedicated.

The Texico girls varsity basketball team ended its district season undefeated.

After a successful label collection, Texico Schools announced it would get a new computer.

The Texico City Council began discussing actions it could take to have long-time vacant buildings along the highway demolished.

MARCH

Representatives of area groups met to discuss fund-raising for the Farwell Community Center. One of the suggestions made, having a Celebrity Auction, was adopted.

Fred Hamner was appointed City Marshal by the Texico City Council.

Farwell's High School Band won the Sweepstakes for the first time at the UIL concert contest in Littlefield.

APRIL

Jack Landrum of Farwell was the new state champion in the New Mexico Bow Hunter Free Style Limited competition. He set a state record by shooting 294 of a possible 300.

Elected to the enlarged Farwell City Council were Martin Kube, Fred Chandler, Elizabeth Phillips, Curtis Smith, Ysleta Kittrell and Mayor Walter Kaltwasser.

Doyle Johnson, Joe Schilling and Maxine Williams were elected to the Farwell School Board. Re-elected to the Lazbuddie School Board were Nicky Nickels, Phil Brockman and Bobby Redwine.

Leon and Oneta Luce announced plans to reopen their Spur Restaurant in Texico.

Virgil Fiske was named the new Farwell Church of Christ minister.

A small turnout was present at a meeting to see if there was interest in Heritage Square Garden Apartments, a project of homes for senior citizens advanced by the Farwell Hospital District.

Eddie West was named Man of the Year and Mae Stone Woman of the Year at the annual Texico Chamber of Commerce banquet.

MAY

Cory McDaniel, Craig Tharp and

Karen Snodgrass received the top awards at the Texico Future Farmers of America banquet.

Named as Lazbuddie's top academic students were Chandra Engelking, Becky Schacher and Maureen Jesko.

Andy Pat Hughes of Farwell won the state all-around gymnastics championship in class 2, for 16 to 18 year old boys.

Farwell School Board voted to renovate the old gym.

Texico's top academic students were Doug Tornton, Danny Powell and Elaine Horner.

The Farwell Chamber of Commerce proposed to the City Council that a part-time person be hired to seek more housing, business and industry for the community.

JUNE

Farwell United Drugs opened with pharmacist Steve Breckenridge.

The Farwell Sesquicentennial Committee was organized under the leadership of Liz Phillips and Frances Kube.

Benny Haney was named Man of the Year and Frances Kube Woman of the Year at the Farwell Chamber of Commerce banquet.

More than \$7,000 was raised at the Celebrity Auction to benefit the Farwell Community Center.

JULY

Willie Roberts retired as Farwell school superintendent after being involved in education, either as a student or professional, for nearly 70 years.

The Farwell First Baptist Church membership voted to build an addition to the church.

Border Town Days attendance was a new record -- more than 2,000. Rain shortened the day's events for the third time in BTD's 19 years.

The Texico City Council voted to have Waste Control be the city's new private garbage collector.

AUGUST

Dutch Quicket announced he would be retiring as Parmer County adult probation officer.

Texico City Clerk-Treasurer Marie Christian was awarded the designation of Certified Municipal Clerk by the International Institute of Municipal Clerks.

Texico City Council discussed hiking its solid waste rates.

A Neighborhood Watch program was proposed for Texico by City Marshal Fred Hamner.

The Farwell Volunteer Fire Department agreed to build a new meeting hall.

A tourism information center was

placed by the Farwell Chamber of Commerce at Farwell United Drugs.

SEPTEMBER

The State Line Tribune Football Contest, sponsored by area merchants, began its 27th year.

Petra Breyne arrived from Belgium as a foreign exchange student under a Texico-Farwell Rotary Club program.

Texico's Mark Meeks was honored as a semifinalist for the National Merit Scholarship competition.

OCTOBER

Willie Roberts was honored as a regional winner in the Texas Superintendent of the Year competition.

The Farwell Homecoming King and Queen were David Rubio and Rhonda Lingnau.

The Texico Homecoming King and Queen were Kyle Snipes and Kelly Lynn.

Farwell was sanctioned as a Texas Sesquicentennial city.

NOVEMBER

Parmer County voters went along with the statewide results on the amendments concerning water plan issues.

A Town & Country convenience store was planned for Texico, it was announced.

Veteran councilman Vane Doshier resigned his Texico post after moving out of the city.

The Farwell City Council rejected the Chamber's proposal to hire a part-time person to seek more business, housing and industry for the city.

The Texico Lady Spikers won the state Class A volleyball title.

Carl Hahn was named the new pastor at the Assembly of God Church in Texico.

Charles Dannheim won the annual State Line Tribune football contest.

The Amarillo Area Foundation donated \$4,500 to the Farwell Community Center.

Kevin Owen of Farwell claimed national honors based on 4-H record books and attended the national 4-H Congress in Chicago plus receiving a scholarship.

DECEMBER

ESA Sorority sponsored a pheasant hunt.

The area scout council named Charles Aycock Scoutmaster of the Year and Judy Pomper Den Leader of the Year; both are from Farwell.

Possible construction of an All-sup's truck center was discussed by the Texico City Council.

ENMR schedules open house here

Eastern New Mexico Rural Telephone will have an open house Monday for its new office in the 100 block of Ave. A, Farwell.

The open house will start at 2 p.m. with ribbon-cutting ceremonies although the office itself will be open for business at 8 a.m.

The office hours will be weekdays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The service representative will be Shandra McIntosh of Farwell. If enough work warrants it, a second person will be added later.

On hand for the open house will be ENMR General Manager Robert Harris plus other company officials.

Farwell variance approved

The Farwell City Council Monday approved a variance to allow a trailer home on the back of Wanda Ratcliffe's property in the 400 block of Third Street.

The trailer home will be used by Mrs. Ratcliffe's daughter and two grandchildren.

The variance stipulated that the trailer home is for the immediate family's needs and must be removed when no longer occupied by family members.

In other business, the council

agreed to schedule its next meeting at 5:15 p.m. Jan. 7 because some members would be absent from its regular meeting date.

The council discussed the state's recent mandate that the pit must be compacted at least once a month.

It was the consensus that it would be cheaper to lease a backhoe and operator than having to buy the equipment. City Clerk Janie Bowery will check with Clovis firms on the availability of the needed compactation equipment.

Friona school fund request rejected

By a vote of 3-2 last Friday, a request from the Friona School Board for \$284,466 for school improvements was rejected by the Parmer County Commissioners.

Favoring the request were Tommie Williams and Robert White. Opposed were Ernest Anthony, Raymond McGehee and, breaking the 2-2 tie, Parmer County Judge Porter Roberts.

Friona has gone ahead with its improvements - four new high school classrooms, science lab equipment and sidewalks - and wanted the money as reimbursement for what was spent.

The county commissioners are in charge of the Permanent School Trust Fund, which contains \$946,500. Friona wanted a portion of its funds from this total.

The trust fund consists of monies gained from partial mineral rights in Gaines and Andrews counties. This system was set up by the state years ago. According to state law, the schools can only use money from the fund for either reducing bonded indebtedness and/or making permanent improvements.

State law also says that if the trust funds are divided up, it must be done on a scholastic basis - i.e., the number of children ages 6 through 18 in a school district, whether or not they attend public schools.

Also, in a legal opinion from the state's Attorney General's office, a

"need must be shown" for the funds to be given a school by the commissioners.

Weeks ago, school board members from Friona and Bovina had attended the commissioners' meeting, seeking a share of their funds. Bovina is in need of school roofing repairs.

At last week's meeting, both Bovina and Friona school superintendents attended.

Also present was Preston Cargile, who lives in rural Farwell. He spoke against the county divvying up the trust funds.

During the discussion, Friona Supt. Tom Jarboe said he felt the fund could be split up based on daily attendance figures or something similar to that yardstick. But County Attorney Charles Aycock said the Attorney General's opinion was clear in that "scholastics" were necessary first.

Anthony and McGehee both stressed the amount of interest being gained annually on the \$946,500. McGehee said it was good to keep that total intact because a large amount of interest goes to the schools (see adjacent statement by Roberts). "But if a disaster struck, I'd give you the money quick,"

McGehee told Jarboe.

Roberts said he didn't feel that it was the intent of the Legislature to break up the fund. He told Jarboe that he would support a bond issue or tax increase if the schools need more funds.

Jarboe's position was that since the Trust Funds can only be used for the reasons mentioned earlier, it was incumbent that they be given Friona now. If Friona School needs money for operating expenses later, the Trust Fund can't be touched, leaving two options - a bond issue or higher taxes. He also stressed that state mandates are making it more costly for local school jurisdictions to operate.

When the topic of possibly splitting up the fund arose early this year, Lazbuddie and Farwell school officials also supported it. But recently, the Farwell School Board agreed not to seek to participate at this time. Neither Lazbuddie or Farwell had immediate building plans.

In other business, the commissioners discussed the section of ceiling that fell recently at the rear of the district courtroom. They will be checking with carpenters on repairing it.

Judge Roberts issues statement

This statement was released by Parmer County Judge Porter Roberts following the vote on the Friona School request for Permanent School Trust funds:

In the beginning, the State of Texas set aside some land designated as Parmer County School Land. This land was given to the County with the stipulation that the income from this land be divided among the schools in the County to help with their support. The County Commissioners Court was appointed as trustee over this land, a trust and responsibility that has always been highly and seriously regarded by the Commissioners Court of Parmer County.

When the surface of the land was sold, the money was invested in ways set forth by the Legislature. Interest from this investment has been divided among the school districts through the years, as the County Available Fund.

From 1975 through 1985, the interest from this fund divided among the county school districts adds up to \$778,459.02, broken down as follows: Bovina \$157,119.97; Farwell \$146,454.56; Friona \$390,972.68; Lazbuddie \$83,911.81.

If you were to go back to the start of the fund, you can see that considerably more than \$1,000,000 has been earned in interest by this account to be divided among the school districts of the County.

The County Permanent School

Fund certificate of deposit in the bank at this time is \$946,500. This amount has accumulated through the years from the sale of the surface rights, the sale of part of the mineral rights, the lease of some of the mineral rights, and royalty from two small producing wells. In 1984 and 1985 this fund was enhanced by leasing mineral interests in the amount of \$82,489.42.

In a recent Attorney General Opinion, the County, acting through the commissioners court, may reduce the county permanent school fund of that county and may distribute the amount of the reduction to the independent and the common school districts of the county on a per scholastic basis to be used solely for the purposes of reducing bonded indebtedness of those districts or for making permanent improvements, with the final decision to be made by the commissioners court.

The commissioners court is not the power-mad, penny-pinching bunch of ogres that some people seem to think. They have been begged, pleaded with, cajoled, threatened and probably lied about on different subjects as well as being blamed for things over which they have no control. They persist in trying to do what they honestly think is the right thing to do to benefit the most people at that time, knowing all the time that no matter what is done, there will be someone who does not like what they have done.

Zoo funds raised

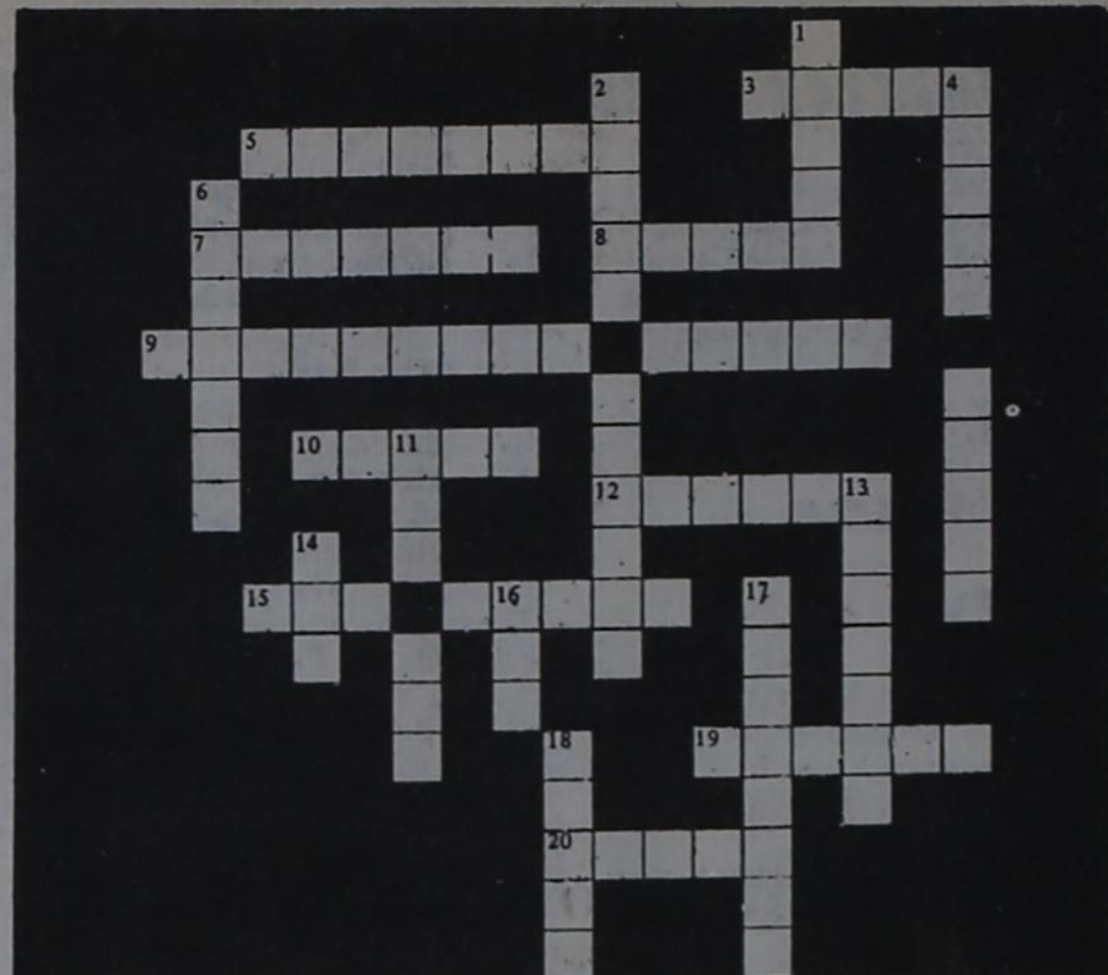
