These so-called artists are not only weird but they possess so little talent that it boggles the mind to think this can be served to the American public as art or talent in any form.

This "trash" is served to the public week after week and month after month and will be, and apparently is, accepted as "talent". This must cause the true professional musician who has spent years studying in his field no end of mental pain and anguish and cannot help but tarnish the image for those who might want to excel in this field of personal feeling and beauty.

A manifestation of the worship of the cult of the bizarre is the current "style" of pant suits for women. Last Sunday's Amarillo paper contained one of the most flagrant examples of hideous design we have ever seen. This was surrounded by written copy designed to portray this outfit as something for which women yearn.

It indicated that if you do not look like this, you are not in the swim of society. To us it looked more like an old battle-axe going to the local YMCA for her weekly karate lesson than a beautiful alluring woman going out to charm her husband or boyfriend.

These trends if not checked will contribute to the decline of the American society that has produced the greatest amount of goods, services and luxuries for its people that the world has ever known. Of such things is the death of a civilization.

Discuss Water, Forages & Insects

"Irrigation Costs and Management Techniques," "Forage Crops for Year-Round Livestock Grazing Program," and "Insect Control Recommendations For Grain Sorghum, Cotton, Wheat and Corn" are three topics to be discussed Thursday, March 13, at 7:30 p.m. in Hub Community Center.

The most valuable natural resource that most county farmers have is their underground water supply. Leon

New, Extension Service Irrigation Specialist from Lubbock, will present information on management techniques on how to better utilize our underground water. Tips on how to determine irrigation costs will also be discussed by New. Of interest also will be a discussion on latest research findings in irrigation.

With the increased interest and build up of cattle feeding in the county and area, more farmers are adding a stocker-feeder program to their farming set up. This gives them an additional source of income as well as have a local supply of cattle for the feedlot. However, most stocker-feeder programs are on a seasonal basis (fall and winter) due to forage or feed available.

Dr. Frank Petr, extension service agronomist from Amarillo, will present information on forages and how farmers can fit them into a year-round livestock grazing program. Information on how to utilize small grains, legumes, grasses and sorghum-sudan hybrids will be presented in this discussion. This will be of great interest to farmers and livestock producers who presently graze cattle seasonally and want to start a year-round livestock grazing program.

Lyndon Almand, Extension Service Entomologist from Lubbock, will discuss the subject of insects and recommendations for their control. At present most wheat fields have greenbugs. Almand will present information on controlling this insect in wheat and what to look for on grain sorghum this year as far as this insect is concerned. Insect control recommendations for cotton, corn and other crops will be discussed.

This program is being sponsored by the Parmer County Crops Committee and the County Extension Service. All interested persons are encouraged and invited to attend.

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Parmer County Has Special N.F.O. Meeting

Tuesday March 4, the newly-organized Parmer County chapter of National Farmers' Organization met in Hub Community Center. Presiding over the group of 60 people was Elvin Wilson, Friona. Bob Wilson read the minutes of the previous meeting. Neal Bradshaw was sworn in as a grain committee member.

The program, presented by Gerald McCathern and F. A. Marnelle of Deaf Smith County, was specially oriented to give information to new and prospective members. Special emphasis was put on

working together with surrounding counties to strengthen the NFO's bargaining power.

Facts brought out in the program included the following: American farmers receive a return of 3 cents on the dollar they invest; while industry gets 25 cents per dollar invested. For each dollar the farmer turns, 6,8 to 7.2 dollars are added to the national economy. If a farmer received 100 per cent of parity, he would make three times his present income. Also farmers receive only

5 per cent of the consumers disposable income. Statistics also show that for every 10 farmers leaving the farm, one small businessman goes out of business.

McCathern emphasized that the NFO is completely non-political. Its primary purpose is to band farmers together nationwide in an effort to get higher prices for their products. By raising the farmer's net income by 35%, the

price of farm goods bought by the consumer would increase by a mere 1.7%. The NFO's legal basis is the Cooper-Volstead Act of 1922 which gives farmers the right to bargain collectively.

Farmers interested in learning more about NFO are urged to attend the regular monthly meetings which will be held the last Tuesday night of each month.


Attends Stockholder Meeting




Basketball Tourney Set

PUBLIC NOTICE OF THE REQUIREMENT FOR RECORDATION AND LIMITATION OF CERTAIN CLAIMS OF WATER RIGHTS

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN as required by Section 4 of the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 (Article 7542a, Vernon's Civil Statutes) that all claims of riparian water rights, all claims under Article 7500a, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, to impound, divert or use public waters for other than domestic and livestock purposes for which no permit has been issued, all claims of water rights under the Irrigation Acts of 1889 and 1895 which were not filed with the State Board of Water Engineers in accordance with the Irrigation Act of 1913, as amended, and all other claims of water rights other than certified filings, must be recorded with the Texas Water Rights Commission. Section 4 does not apply to use of water for domestic and livestock purposes as the same is defined by Commission Rules.

On or before September 1, 1969, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Commission a sworn statement setting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the Section applies shall be recognized only if valid under existing law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies.



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NURSERY NEWS

I would like to share some more thoughts on rose trimming this week. Those who have waited until now to do their trimming will be ahead whether we have a damaging late freeze or not. Of course, if we have a freeze late in April, there is no question but what it will be damaging.

Some ask why the freeze we had on May 1 a few years back killed some of the plants, such as the junipers, that can usually take temperatures well below zero. The effect of a freeze on new, fresh, sappy shoots is considerably different than it is on well seasoned wood.

By the same token, to start trimming on roses and thus get an abundance of new growth early in the spring-- then wham it off with a hard freeze--is enough to discourage the plant entirely. To trim now will still give you enough real good scares before spring really convinces winter that the time has come. Flareups of winter, such as we've had this week, is proof of this.

The dryer roots of roses will suffer more damage than ones that are properly watered. A dry freeze will buckle the ground and pull the roots apart, where moist roots and earth will give enough to save them from being pulled apart.

The same applies to fruit trees. Should you spot a tree blooming now, you may be sure that it hasn't had very much water since last fall. Another thought along this line is of soil conditioners and fertilizer applied during the winter months. We firmly believe that plants fed the proper amount of proper nutrients will do the very best with what they have; giving us many times return for our investment of effort spent. To give the plant only part of one or two elements without proper balance is courting disaster for the plant and, hence, the yard or garden we want.

To trim some more on roses: We suggest that you give some thought as to what the growth habit of each rose is; what you want it to do and how much you would like of each. If you like long stems on cut flowers, trim with that in mind. On the other hand, if you like to leave the blooms on the bush, trim with that as your aim.

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
