lion in bonds for state construction projects and equipment needs.

5 - Allots city governments (under 10,000 population) to make pacts with property owners to limit taxes for five years (involving Texas Department of Agriculture programs).

6 -- Exempt certain vehicle owners from ad valorem taxes for one vehicle.

7 - Allows government to sell property acquired through eminent domain back to the previous owners at the price the entities paid to acquire the property.

8 -- Clarifies certain provisions relating to the making of a home equity loan and its proceeds use.

9 -- Allows the Legislature to exempt all or part of the residence homestead of certain totally disabled vets from ad valorem taxes, etc..

10 -- Abolishes the constitutional authority for the office of Inspector of Hides and Animals.

11 -- Requires the Legislature to publicly announce some of their votes.

12 -- Issues up to \$5 billion in bonds for the Texas Transportation Commission for highway projects.

13 - Authorizes denying bail to a person who violates certain court orders of conditions of release in a felony or family violence case.

14 - Permits judges who reach mandatory retirement age while in office to serve the remainders of their current terms.

15 -- Creates a Cancer Prevention Research Institute of Texas and issues up to \$3 billion in bonds for cancer research.

16 -- Issues up to \$250 million in bonds for the Texas Water Development Board to provide help to economically distressed areas

ticipated at Nationals and only 30 received gold emblems for their successes. All four Texico dairy judging team members received these emblems.

Also at the Nationals, Shay Anderson competed in Ag Science. They only announce the top 3 immediately and she wasn't on that short list. Full results will be announced later. "We're hoping she got 4th place," said Pinnell.

Four former Texico High students were present at the Nationals with their parents. These students received American FFA Degrees, the highest honors FFA can bestow. They were Skyla Cockerham, Lori Richardson, Logan Potts and Curtis Williams.

Less than one half of 1 percent of FFA students earn this honor, and Texico had four in one year, said Pinnell. You have to be out of high school for at least a year to qualify for the American FFA Degree.

Also attending the Nationals were six Texico Greenhand youths who had earned that right through competition, said Pinnell. They were Tyler Kelley, Mitchell Harrison, Morgan Pinnell, Garrett Foote, Morgan Mayfield and Delanie Crist.

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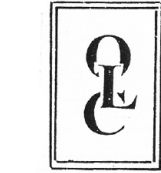

He was preceded in death by his wife; a grandson, Gary Throckmorton; 2 brothers, Boyce and Ross; and a sister, Tess Davis.

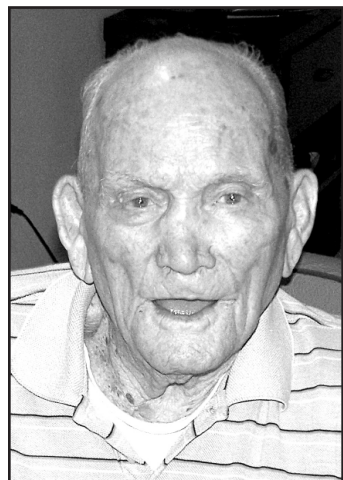

LIVE CATTLE: FMajor changes in the cattle took place this week when the nearby December contract traded below support at \$96.80 and then again on Friday at \$95.55. This has turned all our long term trends down and whether or not the fundamental situation improves or not, the attitude has changed and trends are now down. The market has had several opportunities to turn things around over the last couple of weeks and failed miserably on Friday. Short and long term trends are down.

FEEDER CATTLE: Trends turned down when the nearby November contract closed below long term support at \$114.20. Many analysts had believed that a bounce back up was coming especially if the Live Cattle contracts could have turned back up for one more rally. With Live Cattle prices coming under pressure this week, feeders look like they're headed for \$106.00 and possibly lower?

CORN: Even though the fundamental situation is negative in the corn, prices were able to muster a strong rally late in the week. Prices moved back into a strong resistance area around \$3.72 basis the December contract and close there on Friday. This level has stopped most the rallies since last July, but a close above this level should lead to a test of the \$3.90 again?

SOYBEANS: The market has made several attempts over the last few weeks to move above the \$10.00 level and hold, but prices failed once again on Friday to close above this level. Fundamentally, the market is set to move lower, but Fund buying has helped to support prices on each decline. The market will need a close below the \$9.50 in order to turn trends back down.

WHEAT: Wheat prices continue to move up and down in 30 cent increments (Limit moves) with no firm direction. Normally this would be a strong indication of topping action in the grain market, but prices can't seem to take out resistance or support. Need to see a close below the \$8.00 in order to turn long term trends down. The July 08 contract continues to do the same, hold sideways.

COTTON: Still no strong direction in the cotton market as prices have begun to consolidate between \$62.00-65.50 basis the December contract. There remains very strong resistance around the \$65.50 level. Exports are still stagnant and ending stocks large. A close below \$63.40 would probably push prices back to lower support levels as we move further into harvest.

It just makes sense to do everything possible we humans can do by reducing our man-made contributions to this climate phenomenon.

I appreciate the letter to the editor regarding my article on glaciers and polar bears. It's nice to know that somebody besides Mom reads my articles from time to time! I never want to offend anyone with my articles, and if I may respond to this letter, I'll try again to explain the way I perceive the issue.

First, the world is getting warmer, agreed. Earth temperatures are still trending up from what science calls the Little Ice Age (15th to the 19th Centuries). But the activity of mankind did not cause the Little Ice Age, and the activity of mankind did not bring its welcome departure. But now, suddenly, the activity of mankind is supposed to be causing this isolated fragment in the millennia-long cycle of warming and cooling. It's always valid to consider the hypothesis, but it's more likely that earth is warming for the same reason that the ice caps on Mars are melting, in which case the activity of mankind has nothing to do with it.

Second, there are indeed reductions in some of the sub-populations of polar bears, relying on the authority of the International Union for the Conservation of Nature and Natural Resources (IUCN). Comprised of 83 States, 110 government agencies, and more than 800 non-governmental organizations (NGOs), linking 10,000 scientists from 181 countries, with a multicultural, multilingual staff of 1,100 located in 40 countries and headquartered in Gland, Switzerland, the IUCN is clearly not some scientist hired by Inuit hunters.

The IUCN status reports on polar bear populations show ups and downs, sure enough, in the following estimations of the world population of polar bears over the last four decades. But in 1965, the estimate was about 10,000, and in 2006, it was 20,000 to 25,000.

Third, millions of people in the world still insist that man-made global warming is the culprit (despite facts like this.) The letter to the editor proves this by noting a Google-search for "Glaciers Advancing" yields 1,480,000 hits vs. only 115,000 hits for "Glaciers Retreating." However, that raises another point the article hoped to make. Majority rule is not a basis for science.

For example, in the 1970's and into the 1980's, the prediction was that the next Ice Age was just over the horizon. In those days, it was a cover story in magazines, the "consensus was settled," the discussion was ended, and dissenters had to be shouted down. The defenses made in those days by the next Ice Age prophets of doom were pretty much like the defenses being used now for man-made global warming. We might want to keep that in mind because those warnings of the next Ice Age are today seen as a joke.

In 1972, the use of DDT was banned based not on valid science, but largely on how it was manipulated by Rachel Carson in her book, "Silent Spring." That book was required reading in Coach Owens' science class, and the FHS Class of 1972, like students across the country, absorbed it as gospel. Today, that book is dismissed for its inaccuracies and distortions, but its damages have continued. Every year since then, more than a million children in the Third world have died of malaria that DDT could have prevented.

Fast-forward to today, and like students across the nation, my daughter had to watch "An Inconvenient Truth" in her high school here, with no contradictions to that film allowed in the classroom.

If a book like "Silent Spring" is still causing death and chaos, what damage could be produced by a film that generated such an international fan-base, an Academy Award, a Nobel Peace Prize, and the accolades of the United Nations General Assembly?

Great Britain's court system can't be based on individual preferences and political inclinations. Their rulings have to be based on facts. And on Oct. 2, 2007, a British court did just that. It ruled that because the film is "partisan political views" British teachers must now warn students of that bias before showing them the film, citing a number of examples:

-- The gradual retreat of the alpine glacier atop Africa's Mount Kilimanjaro has been proven to have no link to global warming, despite what the film claims.

-- Increases in carbon dioxide levels do not cause increases in the earth's temperatures; it's the other way around, another fact the film misrepresents in order to make its case.

-- Despite the film's claims that global warming caused Hurricane Katrina, the scientific evidence indicates that hurricane frequency and intensity are not affected by global warming at all.

-- Africa's Lake Chad is drying up, not due to global warming as the film says, but because of poor management of land resources in the area.

-- Despite the film's heart-wrenching cartoon sequence of the solitary polar bear drowning because of melting ice caps, the only documented drowning deaths occurred due to a freak storm, and again, the polar bear world population has more than doubled since 1960 anyway.

-- The film's warning that global warming threatens to halt the Gulf Stream and initiate a new Ice Age is rejected by the vast majority of scientists who have studied the issue. However, since this scientific "consensus" contradicts the film, this "inconvenient truth" is omitted from the film.

-- Science now finds the destruction of coral reefs is caused by processes unrelated to global warming, but again, because it contradicts the film, it is another omitted "inconvenient truth."

-- The film's map says my part of Florida will be under water when rapid ice melt in Greenland raises sea levels by 20 feet. That was so transparently false that it had to be rejected even by Al Gore's co-recipients of the Nobel Peace Prize, the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change.

-- Despite the film's warning that Antarctica is melting, only a sliver of Antarctica is losing ice mass, while on the rest of the continent, the ice mass increases every year.

These are the most glaring errors, and none of them are new discoveries. They were known by the film's producers when "An Inconvenient Truth" was being made.

The distortions and untruths were simply dismissed by Al Gore when he said, "I believe it is appropriate to have an over-representation of factual presentations on how dangerous it [global warming] is."

Environmentalism is an important pursuit, preserving species and ecosystems all over the world. Sincere and forthright environmentalism should reject association with any person or organization who justifies "over-representation of factual presentations" to make their case.

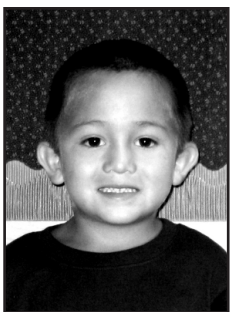

Reasonable Notice of Open Meeting Law

The Texico City Council met in a regular session on October 11, 2005, and decided that reasonable notice to the public as required in Open Meetings Act (NMSA 1978, Section 10-15-1 to 4) would be as follows:

Unless the business before the City Council dictates otherwise, the City Council conducts open meetings to take formal action on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month at 6:30 p.m. However, when that Tuesday is a City holiday, that meeting will be held on the next business day.

The City Clerk and staff were authorized and directed to publish an annual schedule of regular meetings as legal advertisement in State Line Tribune.

Emergency meetings will be called only under circumstances, which demand immediate action to protect the health, safety and property of citizens or to protect the public body from substantial financial loss. The City of Texico Council will avoid emergency meetings whenever possible. Emergency meetings may be called by the Mayor or a majority of the members upon four (4) hours notice, unless threat of personal injury or property damage requires less notice. The notice for all emergency meetings shall include an agenda for the meeting or information on how the public may obtain a copy of the agenda.

The Mayor or majority of the council members upon three (3) days notice may call special meetings. The notices shall include an agenda for the meeting or information on how members of the public may obtain a copy of the agenda. The agenda shall be available to the public at least twenty-four hours before any special meeting.

All other meetings which may be called for informational purposes at which no action is taken shall be held only after written notice is issued to the State Line Tribune no later than 12:00 noon of the day of such meeting, of four (4) hours before such meeting, whichever is greater.

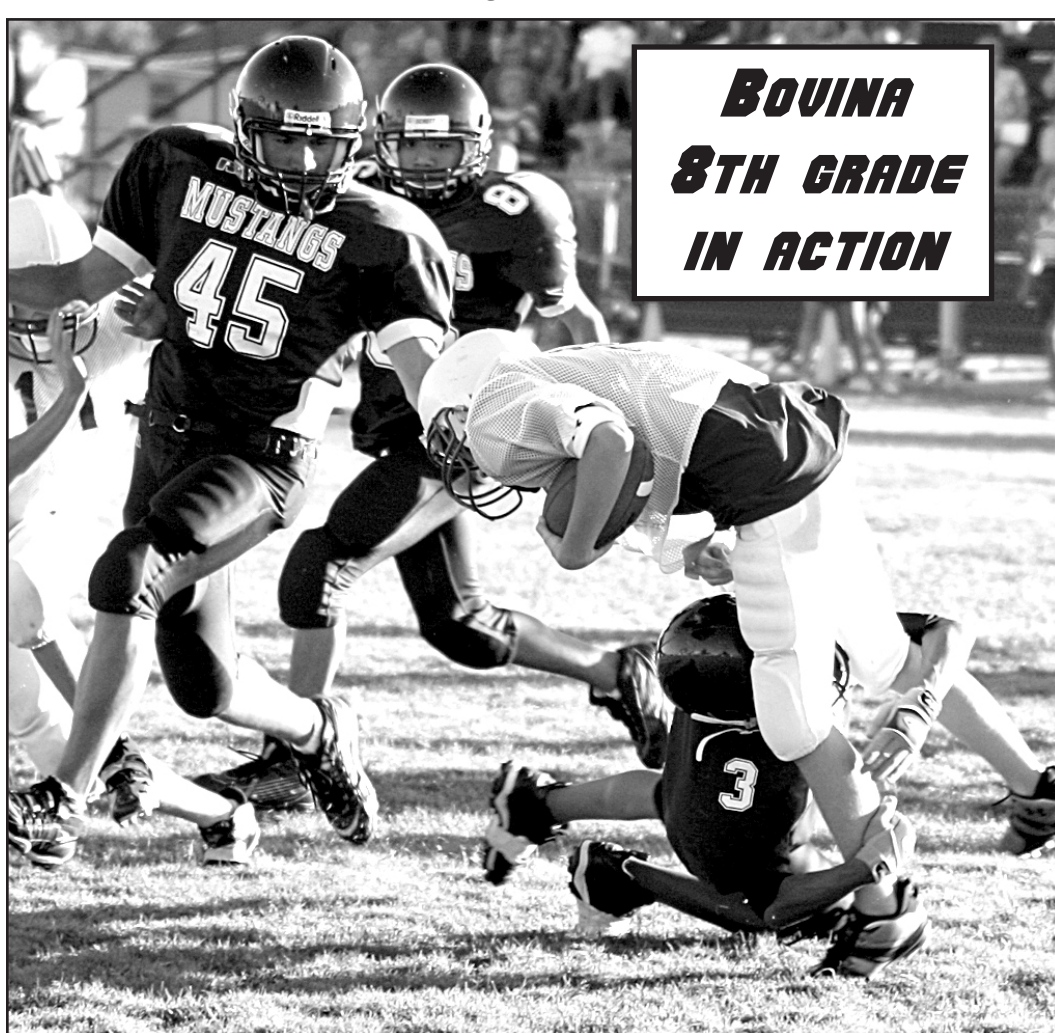

Coach Guevara commented that he was very proud of his team for their play against the Swifts.

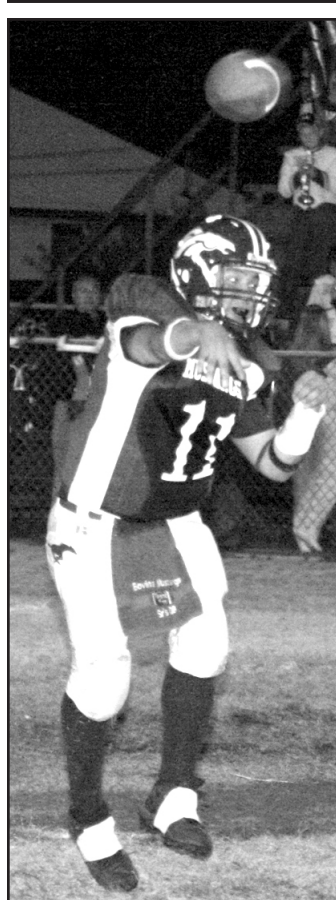

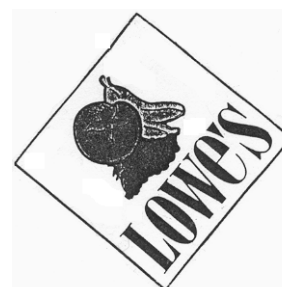
