

# Valedictorian, Salutatorian Named At Farwell School

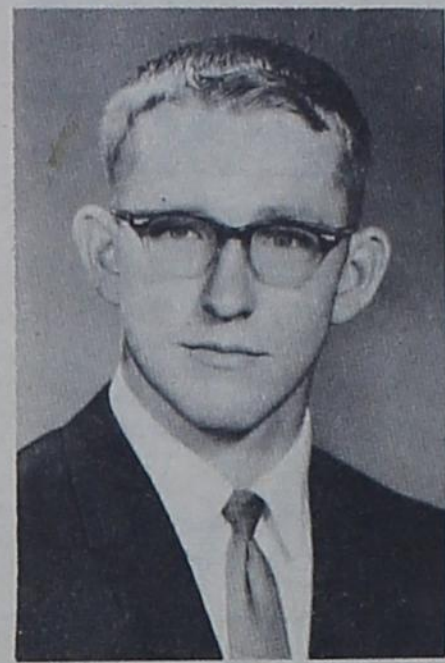

Maybe this is the reason for the strange lassitude. As the body slowly emerges from the folds and caresses of the blankets, the mind begins to function; the strangeness of the day is solved. Not only is it a Monday but it is the first Monday of the first week under Daylight Savings Time.

Horrors, shouts the mind; am I destined to feel this way for a full half a year? No, never, answers the body as it collapses back to the protection of the bed. But alas and alack, Duty, Honor, and Country take precedent; and so the average citizen of the Twin Cities bestirs himself, and commerce and industry surge forward. Not with the accustomed snap and verve but sufficient to assure the community that all is not lost and that the hardy spirit of our pioneer ancestors is not entirely departed the land.

Anatole France observed, "Time deals gently only with those who take it gently." Isn't it amazing how modern man abuses himself -- and looks it?

Three weeks ago we commented on Congressman Bob Price's attempt to get last year's ill-advised gun bill repealed. If there has been anything that has pointed up the failure of this bit of legislative nonsense, it has been the disturbances of the Eastern campuses.

With the great state of New York bragging about its strict Sullivan Law, and other assorted liberal crackpots trying to ram their gun laws down the country's throat, why do the Black Militants seem to have plenty of assorted lethal weapons? Why do you not hear about prosecution under these laws? Why do laws that affect you and me on a day by day basis do not seem to apply to a college campus? Do our laws have loopholes in them that say they specifically do not apply on the hallowed land of higher learning?

The questions are endless, the answers few, the actions of responsible officials are nil, and the country goes to Hell in a basket.

This project is a necessity if our area is to continue to grow and we are to keep our rightful place in the business-agricultural world. Nothing, absolutely nothing of any consequence will come to these Twin Cities without an adequate labor pool. With this labor pool the opportunities of the future for us are unlimited. All the agricultural signs point to greater diversity of farm cropping which will depend on both production and processing labor. We must not miss this opportunity.

This can be a truly community-wide effort as there is no state line in the operation, use, or membership in this association. Farmers and businessmen from both sides of the line can use the facilities on an equal basis.

This is an unequalled growth opportunity for the Twin Cities. Let us not drop the ball and let some other town recover it on our goal line.

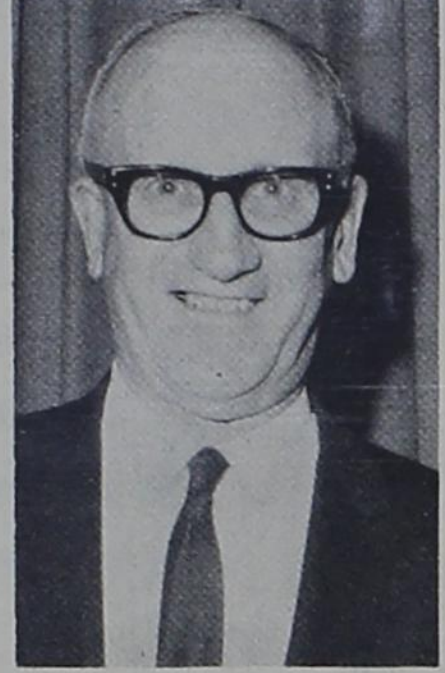

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Roy Melugin --

# Former Resident Named To Educational Hall Of Fame

"I've had a wonderful life and I wish to thank each person who has helped to make it so," said Roy Melugin recently after being notified that he had been named to the Eastern New Mexico Educational Hall of Fame.

Melugin, who has been in the educational field since 1921, lived in the Farwell area for many years and attended school and graduated from Farwell High School, completing his studies at the local institution of learning in 1916. He presently lives in Clovis but has farming interest north of Texico-Farwell.

Following high school graduation, Melugin attended and received a bachelor degree from Highland University at Las Vegas, N.M. He later received a master's degree from University of New Mexico and in addition has done graduate study at Peabody College at Nash-

ville, Tenn., and at the University of Colorado.

He began his teaching career at the "old Daniel School" District 15 north of Farwell, as janitor, teacher and principal-superintendent, since he was the only teacher. From this beginning in 1921, he went on to teach in the Pleasant Hill school as an elementary teacher for several years; from there to Eugene Field School in Clovis; to Dalhart, Tex., where he served as elementary principal; then back to Pleasant Hill to serve as elementary principal for a number of years. In Carlsbad, he taught high school mathematics for a number of years and in Lordsburg he was high

school principal for 11 years before returning to this area to teach at Marshall Junior High School in Clovis for ten years.

The last four years before retiring, Melugin devoted his time to counseling with parents as attendance counselor for Clovis Public Schools. "This was the best time I spent in the field," said Melugin, who stresses his belief in the youth of our country by saying, "They are much smarter than I was at that age and have had many more opportunities." He invited all persons who believe that the youth is "going to the dogs" to visit any of the high schools and watch the youth in action. . . and they will have a different picture to the one to which we are subjected by the news media who show the worst of the youth. "I believe that most of the trouble is stirred up by a small minority," he reiterated.

A counselor who works with the parents as well as the youth can many times find the reason behind a particular student's behavior and often times can help to correct the situation.

Since retiring on June 30, 1964, Melugin spends his time as a church worker, attending to his farming interests, working as a member of the Chamber of Commerce Educational and Agricultural committees, and as chairman of the Community Services Center for Curry and Roosevelt Counties.

During his years as an educator Melugin was instrumental, along with K. C. Lea, in organizing the Eastern New Mexico Educational Association. In addition he served on the New Mexico State Athletic Board of Controls, as treasurer of the New Mexico Education Association, and as chairman and secretary-treasurer of the Secondary Principals' Education Association of New Mexico. He is presently serving as treasurer of the REEA (Retired Education Employees of New Mexico Association).

Melugin says he is not sure how teachers are chosen for the Hall of Fame, but states that

he "is quite humble to have been chosen since it is such a distinct honor." Teachers are chosen for the Eastern New Mexico Hall of Fame from Curry, DeBaca, Roosevelt and Quay Counties, with no more than four or five selected each year.

The entire Melugin family is in the educational field (or has been) with Mrs. Melugin retiring from teaching along with her husband in 1964. Their only child, Roy Jr., is presently teaching classes at Austin College in Sherman, Tex., and their daughter-in-law was a teacher before retiring to become a housewife and mother. Pride

and joy of the family are the granddaughters, Annela, five years of age, and Cynthia, two years old.

Melugin states that he can think of nothing that would be more pleasing than to have his grandchildren go into the educational field, for as he said again and again, "It is such a rewarding and fulfilling life that I can think of nothing that would be of more benefit to future generations."

This educator concluded his reflections by saying, "I have all the faith in the world in our young people in spite of the uprisings and disrest we have on every hand."

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## PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR3)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Sections 42, 46, and 48 of Article III, Sections 3a and 7 of Article VII, Section 12 of Article VIII, Section 3 of Article IX, Sections 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 of Article X, Section 10 of Article XI, Sections 3, 4, 5, and 7 of Article XII, Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article XIII, Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 of Article XIV, Sections 3, 4, 7, 13, 29, 32, 34, 35, 36, 38, 42, 45, 46, 54, 55, 57, 58, and 60 of Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be repealed, it being specifically understood that the repeal of these sections shall not in any way make any substantive change in our present constitution.

## PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR7)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 64 to read as follows:  
"Section 64. All other provisions of the Constitution notwithstanding, bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority shall bear such rates of interest as shall be prescribed by the issuing agency, subject to limitations as may be imposed by the legislature."

## PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJRS)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Section 5, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 5. The Legislature shall meet in regular session each year at such time as may be provided by law and at other times as convened by the Governor. When convened in odd-numbered years in regular session, the Legislature shall devote the first thirty days to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of such session the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters then pending; and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as

## PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR6)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for, and is used in operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and sale of water as authorized as its sole legal purpose; actual places or (of) religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to

## PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:  
"Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of the elected members of both houses of the Legislature.  
(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund.  
(c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by such Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature.  
(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d and in addition thereto for the purposes of developing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the

State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.  
(e) Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe, the Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the State of Texas. Such contracts when executed may be secured by the general credit of the state, and if so secured shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds. If facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment. The aggregate principal amount of Texas Water Development Bonds authorized herein and in said Sections 49-c and 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas

# Ladies Reap Highest Rewards

Several ladies of the community have found a way to give their talent away and have reaped rewards beyond their highest expectations. These women assisting the children of Farwell Elementary School Special Education class. The class, made up of students ranging in age from six to 16, has been the proving ground for talent the women didn't even know they had.

The program started several weeks ago when Mrs. James Craig, teacher of the class, began to look for grandmothers in the community to assist with the younger children to leave her free to do further instructional work with the older students.

Mrs. Craig soon found that

there were also younger women who were glad to help, too. At first the children called the aides "Grandmothers," but it was soon evident that the name just didn't fit in every case. It was the children themselves who finally came up with a name, "the Special People." The ladies do not admit to being special, but to the children and Mrs. Craig they are certainly nothing short of Special with a capital S.

The Special People carry on a wide variety of activities that are not only instructional but also enjoyable. They assist the children in writing exercises, in making and displaying collections, and in cutting pictures from magazines about particular subjects, such as

"Clothes we Wear on Rainy Days." Some of the aides teach arts and crafts, some lead music games and other musical activities while others bring their own collections to share with the children.

Most of the helpers carry out plans suggested by Mrs. Craig; however, some make their own plans. One of the Special People made egg-shaped cookies for Easter and guided the children in icing them in delightful Easter-egg designs of several colors. One aide, prompted by the knowledge that some of the children were reading the "Life of Helen Keller," brought materials she had used in recording reading for the blind. She also brought a braille magazine. The children were excited about how people in another area of Special Education learned to read.

Mrs. Craig says, "It is hard to tell who profits most from this program, the Special People, the children, or me." She admits that it takes a tremendous lot of organization to keep such a program running smoothly but certainly believes it is worthwhile. The children love it. It gives them an opportunity to share their work and their feelings with adults other than their teacher or their parents. The Special People profit, too. They know they are loved and needed; therefore, they volunteer for extra jobs, such as giving parties and assisting with field trips.

Mrs. Craig says, "I have to insist that they go home when the time is gone. If they must leave while they are still excited about what they are doing, they will look forward to coming again!"

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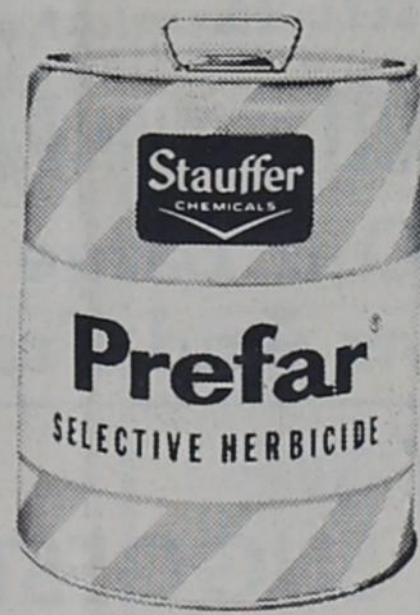

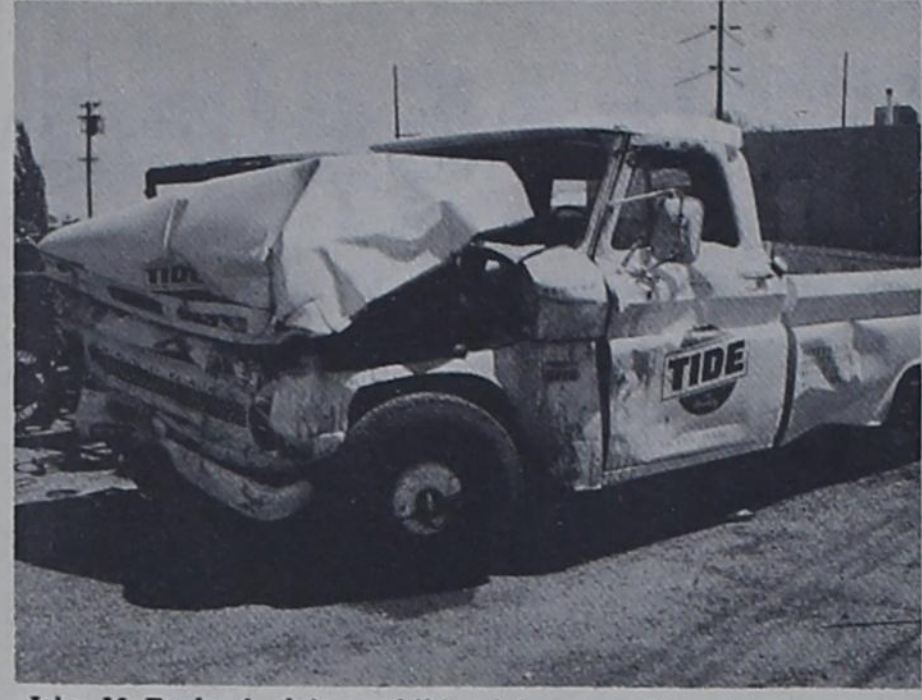
**Three Injured In Friday Accident**

A Farwell man and two Bovina men were injured in an accident on a county road 6.7 miles northeast of Farwell at 9:45 Friday morning.

Injured in the accident, which involved two pickups, were John McFarland of Farwell and Jimmy Lee Parsons and Lloyd E. Johnson, both of Bovina. All of the men were treated at Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona. Johnson, most

seriously injured of the trio, has been moved to HI-Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo for additional treatment. Parsons is still hospitalized in Friona; however, McFarland has been released from the hospital with only minor injuries. Johnson and Parsons suffered extensive internal injuries and also broken bones and severe lacerations.

The accident occurred at a county road intersection, according to Robert Shedd, investigating officer, who stated that both drivers said they were unaware of an approaching vehicle until seconds before the crash. At time of the accident the Parsons vehicle was headed west and the McFarland vehicle was going south. The Parsons vehicle allegedly was struck near the center of the door on the right side by the other vehicle.



John McFarland, driver of this pickup owned by Tide Products, escaped with only minor injuries when it was in collision with a pickup driven by a Bovina man Friday afternoon. McFarland was treated and released at a Friona hospital after the accident which occurred on a country road northeast of Farwell. An occupant of the other vehicle was taken to an Amarillo hospital for treatment.

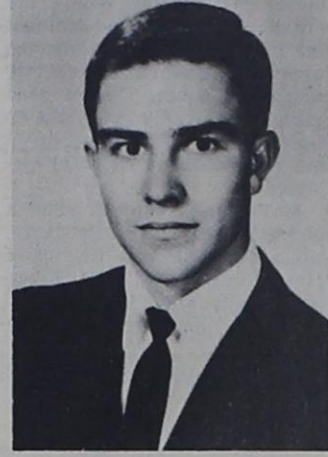

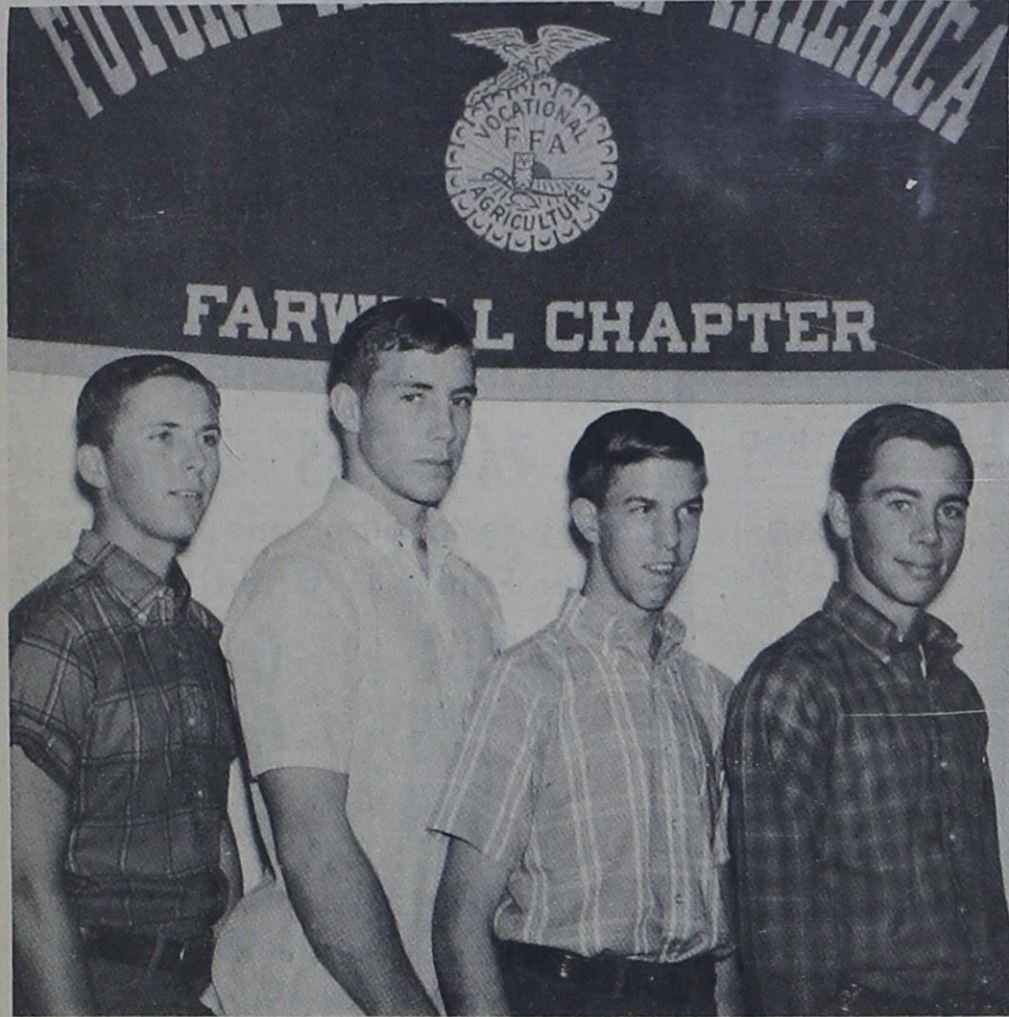
of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Herington, has had lambs, barrows, gilts, and a maize crop.

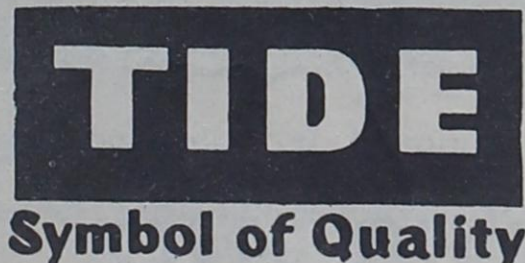
