BTD plans going okay

Another special project this year is a new way to help finance BTD activities. In years past, we sold shave permits. But this year we are trying a new program, spearheaded by Rick Sullivan.

We're seeking donations for commemorative pins that says "Texico-Farwell Border Town Days 1989." The pins are very colorful and also feature the Texas and New Mexico state flags. They will become available after July 1.

Home economics information is her role

Rochelle White has been the Parmer County Extension Agent for Home Economics for just about one year. Prior to that time she was an assistant agent in Swisher County.

Miss White sees her role as one of providing information for people in Parmer County. She presents home economics programs for any organized clubs that ask her to do a program. She works with the 224 4-H'ers in the county, their leaders, and with the 3 Extension Homemaker Clubs in the county. And, she is available to help people find the answers to their home economics problems.

"I'm always available to answer questions on things like canning, freezing, sewing, strain removal, or problems at home. If I don't know the answer, I'll find out," she said confidently.

"In the summer we get lots of calls about food preservation - canning and freezing; in the winter we get questions about how long things that have been frozen will stay good. The questions go in spurts."

The county agents have a vast amount of information through the Texas A & M University information system. They have pamphlets available to the public on a wide variety of topics.

"We even have computer programs these days." One program available at the county extension office helps people analyze their diets. "You can see what you are lacking in vitamins or minerals, or what your sodium intake is," she said.

Another program available is about stain removal, and a third is about budgeting. "It asks you about 15 questions about your fixed expenses. Then it calculates what you can afford to spend on a purchase. You can play with the figures to find out what you can change to enable you to get what you want," she said.

"We also get information about new products from the companies that make them. Sometimes they even send me samples of products to test." White had a stain removing product and a natural fiber product on her desk that had been recently sent to her for her opinion.

Much of White's time is spent on 4-H activities. She trains leaders and helps the 4-H'ers with their projects. She goes to the 4-H food shows, fashion shows, and demonstration contests. Sometimes she attends 4-H camps and meetings around the state. This summer, for instance, she will be taking some senior 4-H'ers to San Antonio to the state 4-H Congress where they will learn about how the government processes work.

The Extension Office prepares a 4-H newsletter every month to let everyone know about the new projects and activities that are available.

White also works with adults through the Extension Homemaker Clubs in Bovina, Rhea, and Friona. These women meet once a month for a business meeting and educational programs related to the family, nutrition and health or clothing.

This year White is working on a special project in conjunction with the Home Economics Committee. They have chosen Nutrition for Young Children as their focus for 1989. White is implementing this program in the kindergarten classes in each school system in Parmer County.

Flexibility is a key to county extension agent's job. "I enjoy the work I have with people in the different communities. I like working on different topics. I just have to go where there's a need."

The satisfying part of White's job is "knowing that the things I teach people help them, and knowing that we are building families when so many things in society are tearing families down."

White lives in Farwell, so that she will be close to her office. "I was raised in the country, so I don't mind the size of this community at all." White keeps busy with her job. She also enjoys sewing, hand work, reading, and cooking in her spare time.

Chamber slates fund-raiser

The Texico Chamber of Commerce Monday decided to have a garage sale July 14-16 to raise funds to help renovate the city's Community Center.

The labor will be donated. But funds are needed to pay for the materials.

The center repairs will be done in August at a workday to be scheduled later.

"We hope we get a good turnout for this sale," said Chamber President Richard

In addition to the work to be done by the Chamber inside the center, the City Council will pay for repairing the outside east wall of the center.

Any leftover items from the garage sale will go to a mission in Mexico that Johnny Rucker is involved with.

In other business, the Chamber agreed to buy new pennants to go over the highway for Border Town Days. Also, the Chamber sponsors the prizes for the antique car contest.

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Voters approve hospital district

Voters in Bailey County and Lazbuddie gave a big boost to West Plains Medical Center in Muleshoe Tuesday when they approved creating a hospital district by a large margin.

Election results from Bailey County showed 1,518 for the district and 139 opposed. Voters in Lazbuddie okayed the proposition by a 93-50 margin.

The district includes most of the northern two-thirds of

Bailey County and portions of the southern part of Parmer County close to Muleshoe.

The new hospital board, which has Darrell Jennings of Lazbuddie on it, will now consider setting tax rates for the district.

The hospital district could set tax rates at a maximum of 25 cents per \$100 valuation.

The 31-bed, community-owned hospital, which closed in November 1986 and re-

opened in 1987, needed this taxing power if it was to stay in existence.

The proposed tax rate, with current valuations, is expected to generate about \$500,000 per year. It currently costs about \$125,000 a month to keep the facility going.

The new board, besides setting a tax rate, also may acquire the hospital building, restructure the current debts and upgrade the facility to qualify for Medicare patients.

Stephens attends seminar

Kaci Stephens, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Darrell Stephens of Farwell, was Farwell High School's representative to the Hugh O' Brian Youth seminars at West Texas State University June 2 - 4.

While she was there, she and students from all over the Panhandle heard speakers talk about some of the

most important topics facing youth today. They also had a chance to meet the speakers face to face in small group seminars where they could ask questions that they might not have asked if they had been in large groups.

The speakers ranged from the presidents of large corporations to successful profes-

sionals. They discussed career opportunities as well as important topics facing youth today.

One of the most interesting seminars Kaci attended was about free press. After the talk Kaci was able to interview Beth Duke, the society editor for the Amarillo Globe News. Kaci was impressed with the answers Ms. Duke gave the group.

The Hugh O'Brian Youth seminars were started by the actor, Hugh O'Brian. He sent a videotape which was shown to the group. He explained that he had started the seminars after taking a trip to Africa where he had met Dr. Albert Schweitzer.

O'Brian wanted to start something that would help young people think for themselves. He also wanted everyone to know that most young people are basically good. He started the seminars in Los Angeles and the idea spread from there.

"On our first night at HOBY we also played a game called 'Management'. Each of us tried to sell lots of land to the others. It was a lot of fun," said Kaci. It also served to break the ice among the participants.

Each participant was assigned to a group for the weekend. They worked together as a team listening, discussing, and analyzing the information that they were given.

"It was all so interesting, we really learned a lot," said Kaci.

After participating in the seminar, Kaci said she wanted to encourage all of her friends to apply for HOBY next year. She would advise them to "Go with an open mind, and be prepared for the greatest experience of your life. It was really something wonderful."

U.S. 60 upgrading moving along

The upgrading of U.S. 60 to a four-lane facility in Parmer County is making headway.

The state expects to award a contract for construction of the first phase of the road in early 1990. Actual construction normally begins within 30 days later.

The first portion to be constructed will be from Friona to the Deaf Smith County line, about 17 miles.

The second stage will be from Friona to Bovina; the third stage will be from Bovina to Farwell.

Stage 2 is planned for

'Will I have to replant?'

Large storms accompanied by heavy washing rains and hail hit large portions of the South High Plains causing moderate to heavy damage to the young cotton crop in recent weeks.

The big question is always, "Will I have to replant?" In many fields, it is obvious that the crop will have to be replanted. In others the best alternative may be to stay with the existing stand even though the plant population has been reduced and the surviving seedlings have incurred some injury.

"Don't make snap decisions when it comes to hail damage, cautions Dr. James Supak, cotton specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Often, the plant damage and stand loss appears to be much worse than it actually is immediately after the storm."

Give the crop 2 or 3 days to recover before carefully evaluating the condition of the remaining plants. In the meantime, sandfighter or some other tool should be run as soon as possible to prevent sand injury to vital leaves and buds on the injured plants. Quite often, Supak cautioned, sand and wind damage after a hail can do as much or more harm to young seedlings than the hail.

In making the field inspection, consider how much of the crop was destroyed. A hail storm can reduce the plant population to only two seedlings per row foot in 40-inch rows, or about 25,000 plants per acre, and the crop can still produce a normal yield, unless, of course the crop is poorly distributed or has long skips.

If skips are involved, the potential for significant yield losses is increased. In studies where skips varying in length from 1 - 9 feet were used to reduce stands from 4.5 - 3.5 or to 2.5 plants per foot of drill, yield losses of approximately 15 - 25 percent respectively were observed.

Another point in determining whether to replant is how much damage there was to plants. The agronomist explained that plants having only traces of leaves will recover better than those with no leaves. "If the plants can be easily 'rowed' down the field, that's a good sign. But even seedlings that

were completely defoliated, the plants can still recover and make a crop if the stems are intact, free of breaks in the bark and the seedlings have sound buds. Recovery of defoliated plants will be slower than that of plants that have at least some portion of the leaves remaining."

"However, if the stem is shattered and the bark loosened or broken at points below the leaf buds, then recovery is impossible," Supak warned.

Regrowth hinges either on the sound terminal bud (the growing point) or auxiliary bud located at the point of leaf attachment.

The agronomist says that because of the young seedling's ability to recover, hail injury in June will cause less yield loss than in July or August when the plants are more mature and replanting is impossible.

A crop can recover from damage in early to mid - June to the point that the injured plants are difficult to distinguish from undamaged plants," he added. Also, young cotton that survives early hail damage is often more mature at frost than a crop that has been replanted.

"When a cotton field is destroyed," he said, "the producer has no choice but to replant. But when the crop is damaged and only partially destroyed, producers are faced with a much more difficult decision."

Now is time to fight back

The pine tip moth can be a serious pest of young pine trees planted by homeowners on the South Plains. And right now is one of the few times homeowners can effectively fight back, says Mike Blanton, Extension Agent - Entomology for Parmer and Bailey counties.

The larvae of this moth bore into the growing tips of the trees, causing them to turn brown. Severely infested trees develop a bushy appearance over time.

This tip moth passes the winter as a pupa within the injured terminals and twigs of the tree. Moths emerge in late March and early April and begin the first of several generations which will occur during the summer.

Female moths lay eggs on the needles and stems. After hatching, the young larvae bore into the tip and begin feeding. After several weeks of feeding and constructing a tunnel in the tip of the stem, the larvae pupate. The adult moths then emerge from their pupal cases, and a new cycle or generation begins.

Properly timed application of an insecticide is the best way to reduce pine tip moth populations and damage, the Extension agent said. "Since this pest spends most of its life cycle protected inside the pine tip, foliar sprays are most effective when the young larvae are just hatching from the egg," he said.

To properly time these applications, pheromone traps can be used to detect the presence of adult moths and determine when eggs are being laid and new cycles are beginning. Traps in Lubbock have recently begun catching moths of the second generation, indicating it is time to apply an insecticide.

Foliar - applied insecticides recommended for homeowners include Orthene and dimethoate. Adding a small amount of liquid soap or surfactant to the spray solution will improve control because it helps the insecticide adhere to the treated trees, the Extension agent said.

"Always read and follow label instructions when applying insecticides," he stressed.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Appointments may be made by calling (806) 238-1116. The mobile breast cancer detection units will

be in Bovina at City Hall, 205 North St., on Friday, June 30, from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and the American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

1. 35 - 40 years of age - one baseline mammogram.
2. 40 - 50 years of age - a mammogram every 1 - 2 years, depending on breast type and risk factor.
3. 50 years of age and over - an annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
4. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk

factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

5. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find every early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The unit accepts cash, check, Visa, MasterCard and American Express.

TDA okays exemption

This information is from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service:

A combination of thin wheat and late spring rains have led to a severe weed problem in much of the area wheat. TDA has issued a crisis exemption for the use of Diquat as a harvest aid in wheat. Diquat use is authorized to begin on June 19; the crisis exemption expires July 3.


The product may be applied to wheat after it reaches the soft dough stage. The labeled rate is 1-2 pts. per acre. A non-ionic surfactant should also be included at 16 oz. per 100 gallons of water.

This contact herbicide will be more effective when applied in a high volume of water to insure good coverage. Diquat should not be applied within 7 days of harvest.

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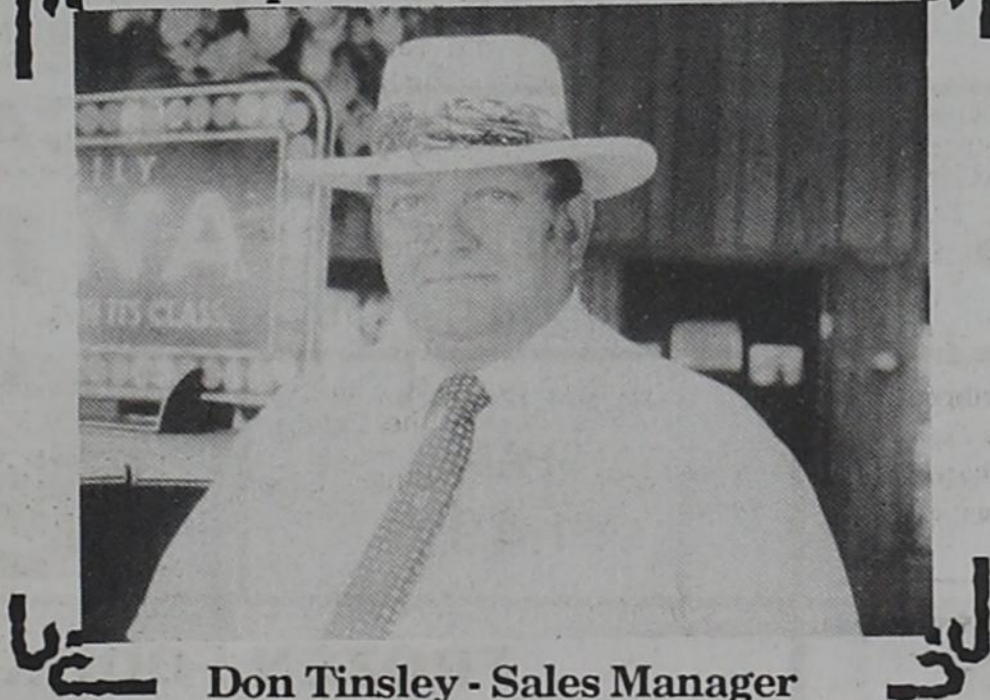
Cancer detection unit coming

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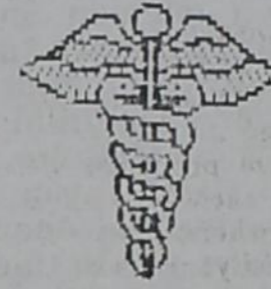


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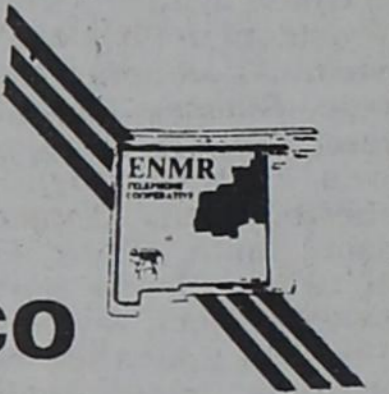
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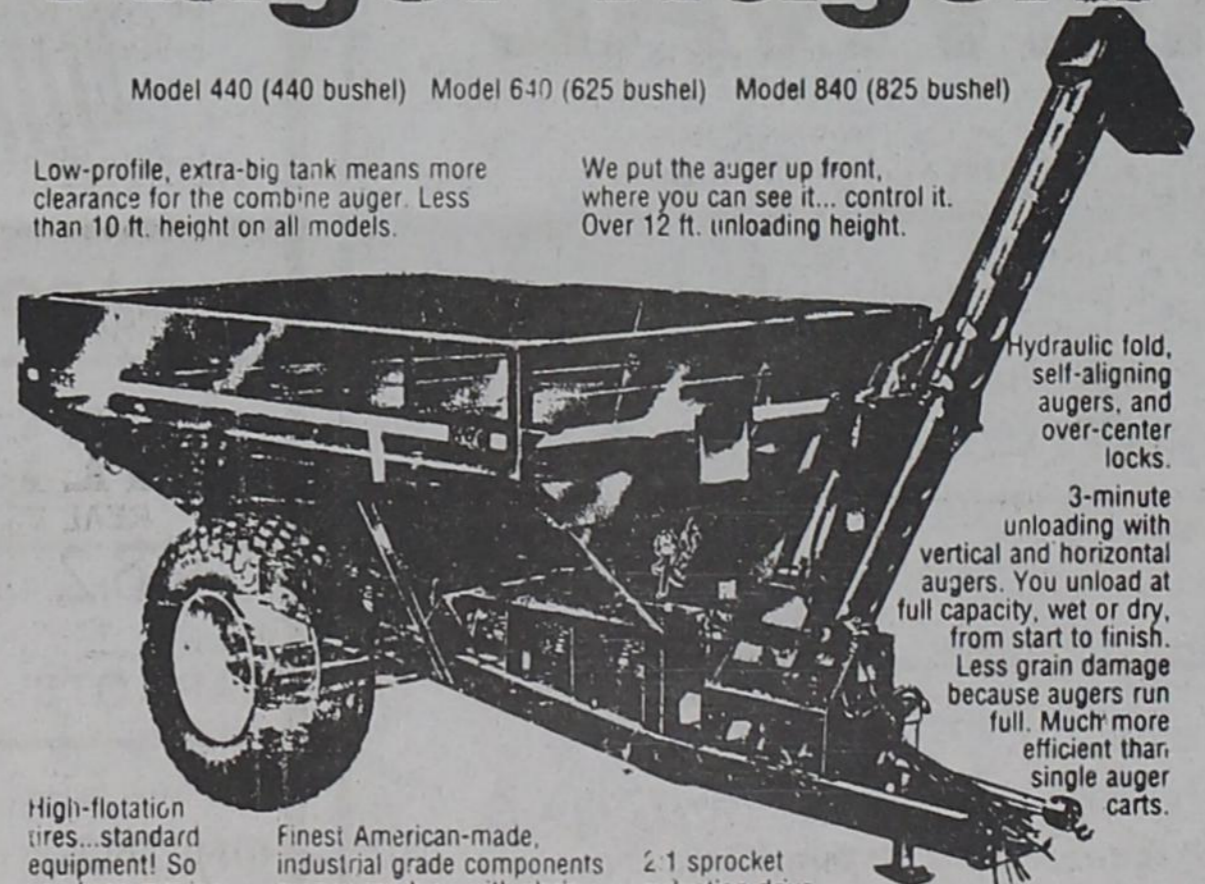
