

One more week to go!

For the football fanatic, it's THAT time again.

The always popular Area Merchants Football Contest will begin its 31st year on Aug. 31.

Last year, more than 600 persons, ages 12 and up, entered the contest. That figure alone testifies to the popularity of the contest, given the number of local residents who are over the age of 12.

This is when area prognosticators probe the sports columns, read the charts and check with their favorite arm-chair quarterbacks.

In order to have a strong chance at the grand prize, it's important to enter every week. So be sure to watch for the first week's contest, starting Aug. 31.

The top prize for the winner of the 12 week contest will again be two tickets to see the Dallas Cowboys play at Texas Stadium. They play the New Orleans Saints Dec. 2.

The grand prize winner will also get \$50 in cash, a night's lodging for two at the Marriott DFW Airport Hotel, game day breakfast, use of the hotel fitness center, stadium seat cushions, welcome cocktails, transfers to and from the game, and transfers to and from the airport.

And the reason the Tribune is able to offer the contest, the weekly cash prizes (\$10 for first and \$5 for second) is due to the following sponsors:

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30. Lovelace Oil.

31. Farwell Fertilizer.

Rules for the 1990 contest will be the same as in the past. A person must be at least 12 years of age to enter. Entrants must choose 12 teams they think will win the selected contests.

Games will be divided among high school, college and professional ranks. In case of a tie game, unless a tie is predicted by the entrant, that game will not be counted.

Each entrant must remember to pick a tie-breaker score, a very important feature of the contest since

many weekly winners (and overall winners) have also been determined by the tie-breakers.

The person naming the most games correctly each week will receive a check for \$10; the second place winner gets \$5.

Each week's scoring is tabulated and kept on record at the Tribune office. The standings are posted each Monday and may be seen during regular business hours.

All entry blanks must be

turned in to the Tribune office by 5 p.m. CDT Fridays, or if mailed, must bear a Friday postmark.

It's very important that you enter each week's contest to have a strong shot at being the overall winner. Even if you never pick 11 or 12 to take the weekly prize, you may take the overall prize with a consistent 8 or 9 weekly tally.

Entry blanks for the first contest will be in the Aug. 31 issue of the Tribune and also at the Tribune office.

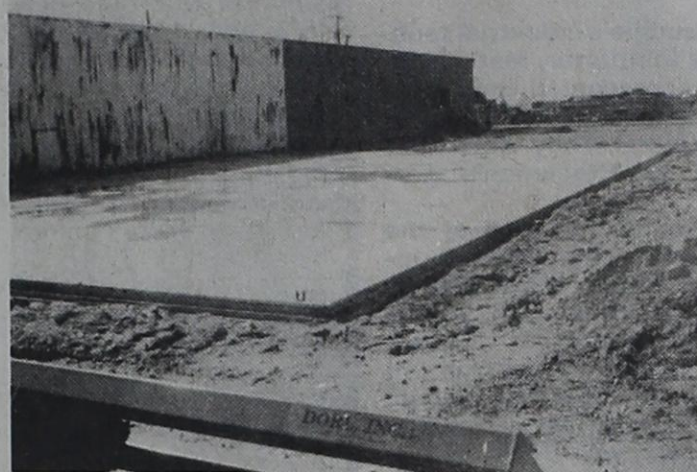

Farwell city finances okay

The Farwell City Council Tuesday approved an annual budget which should keep the city tax rate where it is.

CPA De'Aun Willoughby presented the audit and was pleased with how the city's finances shape up.

The city ended the fiscal year with \$239,000 in the bank. About \$21,500 less was spent last year from the general fund than was received in taxes, etc.

However, she said two problems with nepotism were found - two fathers had hired their sons. She said this was illegal and needed to be corrected. The council called an executive session to discuss this.

In other business, the council:

- Approved a building permit for Bessie Ingram, 505 First St. She plans to move a house onto the property next to her house.

- Approved a building permit for Farwell Farm Supply. A 40' x 60' building is being added.

- Discussed funds for hiring a police officer. Mayor Chris Gikas said funds have not been budgeted for one because the reserve funds the city has on hand could cover it if needed. Councilmen Prentice Mills and Martin Kube said a police officer is needed in Farwell.

- Discussed the problem of Farwell residents having New Mexico tags on their vehicles. Mills was unhappy about this, noting how it meant the funds from those tags weren't helping support Farwell Schools and causing higher taxes for other Farwell residents.

- Awhile back, the council had voted participation in the countywide DARE anti-drug educational program for fifth graders in area schools. It was noted that Farwell city's share would be \$1,244. Farwell Schools may not participate in DARE since it uses the Quest program in the junior highs. However, Lazbuddie, Bovina and Friona schools are involved in DARE and the Farwell City Council will pay its share.

- Decided to look into computerized billing for its utility bills.

- Declared September as "Voter Registration Awareness Month."

- Noted that MISSCO, the company that had talked with Farwell about providing trash pickups, has made a bid termed "unacceptable" by Gikas. When the MISSCO owner first appeared before the City Council he had talked about charging \$24 a month per container (200 to 300 would be needed). But his bid used a \$48 per container figure.

Vehicle 'attack' placed on hold

The Texico City Council, at a special called meeting Tuesday, put off its attack on abandoned vehicles until further discussions in September.

A dozen residents appeared to complain that their vehicles should not fall under the city ordinance governing "abandoned vehicles."

City Marshal Walt Causey had "red tagged" more than 20 vehicles after being instructed to do so by the council last week. The "red tagging" was stopped after complaints were heard and several tags pulled off vehicles by city officials.

If a vehicle is "red tagged," the owner has five days to move it. If not moved, the city is authorized to impound it.

Mayor Doyal LaRue said the "red tagging" would be "put on hold until a further discussion." LaRue suggested that an answer to the problem that instead of just one person determining which vehicles should be "red tagged," that two councilmen and the marshal would go together to check on vehicles.

The council published a legal ad in today's Tribune, noting that the issue would be discussed at the Sept. 11 meeting.

Some of the complaints voiced by residents about their vehicles being "red tagged" included:

- One man has three vehicles, only using one at a time so the others stay parked in the same place for lengthy periods.

- One woman said her vehicle is in her fenced-in backyard and persons cannot see it from the street.

The main question voiced at the meeting was how "abandoned vehicles" is defined.

The ordinances governing abandoned vehicles, weeds, junk and abandoned houses were published in the Tribune last month as a public service. Basically, "abandoned vehicles" were listed as those "partially dismantled, non-operating, wrecked, junked or discarded."

And one parent pointed out the hazard to children when junk is left outside.

Landfill now open Saturdays

Texico Mayor Doyal LaRue announced Tuesday that the Texico landfill will be open Saturdays from 1 to 4 p.m., starting now through the community-wide cleanup of Sept. 20-22.

This is being done due to suggestions from Texico residents who work weekdays.

Here's what can be taken to the landfill:

- Household trash must be placed in the transfer station.
- Metal must be placed in a stack in the designated area.

A person suggested amending the ordinance to take care

of some of the problem, such as vehicles that are fenced in.

Burnable wood items must be placed in the "burn pile."

Texico councilwoman Carolyn Burrows will be at the landfill Saturday to show residents where to put their trash and debris.

The city is seeking to hire someone for the Saturday work. If this turns out successful, the city may keep the landfill open Saturdays once or twice a month after the September cleanup.

Cleanup work chugs ahead

The ad hoc Texico Cleanup Committee met Monday night to further plan for the general community-wide cleanup, Sept. 20-22.

Letters will be passed out door to door this week, reminding residents of the cleanup and the need to get junk, debris, etc., to be placed along the street curbs Sept. 21. On Sept. 22, the trucks will be rolling, and the cleanup done. The letter, in English and Spanish, says:

This note is to remind you of the general city cleanup scheduled Sept. 20-22. Here's how it will work:

We are asking you to clean your property, if needed, and put out your debris or junk beside the city street on Friday, Sept. 21. Then, on Saturday, Sept. 22, trucks will be available to pick it up, starting early in the morning. There is no charge to you.

If you need help for moving heavy stuff off your property, please call City Hall at 482-3314 by Sept. 14.

Or if you want the cleanup crews to come onto your property to remove hazardous junk, please call City Hall (482-3314) by Sept. 14.

We also would appreciate it if you could volunteer your time and efforts that Saturday for the cleanup. Again, if you want to assist, just call City Hall to sign up.

Please. This community-wide effort cannot be a success without everyone's participation. Please help our community get stronger.

Also at the meeting, several "success stories" were reported. Many residents have undertaken cleanup projects and the results are showing. Particularly mentioned were some residents of North Lamar Street who have done

is nowhere nearly as difficult as his surname for us to pronounce.

Carsten is living with the Royce Bethel family, and will attend Farwell High School this fall.

Carsten loves to play tennis. He has competed in national tennis meets in Denmark where, on one occasion, he was eliminated on the third round of the doubles competition.

"He's already beaten all the aces from Clovis and Portales," says his American mother, Jamye Bethel. "We're going to have a tough time getting partners for him."

Until the tennis season starts, he will try his luck with other sports. Carsten enjoys soccer, wind surfing, and skiing. He will learn a little football and basketball in physical education classes this year, and he hopes to learn water skiing.

Carsten has completed his high school career in Denmark, and will probably begin his university studies when he returns home next spring. He has not decided what he will major in when he goes home. But if tennis could be part of his studies, he would love it.

Carsten speaks German, French, English, and Danish, and will study Spanish while he is here this year. He is also ahead of most American students in math and science.

While he is here, he will take American government and economics, English, advanced reading, Spanish, theater arts, athletics and American history. He also hopes to take driver's education while he is here since the course is very expensive to take in Denmark.

Unlike many of the foreign exchange students who have come to our area, Carsten is at home in a small community. The 17 year old Dane comes from Bradstrup, a town of about 3,000 people 350 kilometers from the German border.

"Most of the people there work in the cities; we don't fabricate anything there," says Carsten. Many of the townspeople are employed in various service industries.

Carsten's father, Jørgen Kregghede, for instance, is an architectural engineer, and his mother, Vivi, is an interior designer who prepares displays for department stores. They commute from their small town into neighboring cities. His family also includes his brother, Stig, 15, a student.

Carsten arrived in the United States on Aug. 12. The trip took him from Denmark to London to New York to Pittsburgh to Dallas to Lubbock before he arrived here. The first part of the trip he traveled with other foreign exchange students bound for the United States, "so it was actually fun," he says.

His first impression of the United States is "it's all so big. I didn't really expect how it would be, but I like it very much."

While he is here, Carsten hopes to improve his English, become more mature, and see the United States.

Brockman honored for door project

Leland Brockman, son of Phil and Judy Brockman of Lazbuddie, was honored in June at the Technology Student's (TSA) National Convention in Corpus Christi.

Brockman had won state for his entry in the woods competition at the state contest in Waco. His project was a home entry door made of ash, with leaded glass inserts and antiqued brass hardware. He built the door in his industrial technology shop class at Lazbuddie to be given to his parents for their home entry.

Brockman entered the project in the TSA Regional competition in Lubbock, where it took first place and was advanced to the State level contest. Again, Brockman was awarded first place and was invited to the National Convention where State winners were honored and were asked to display their projects.

Lazbuddie's industrial technology instructor, Mark Scisson, accompanied Brockman to Corpus Christi for the week-long event. They were later joined by Brockman's parents.

Lazbuddie has one of the most comprehensive and up-to-date industrial technology programs in the state. School officials stated that they are very proud of Brockman's performance last year. He will be a sophomore at Lazbuddie.

Texas deaths won't be included

Judge Stephen Nyswonger ruled last week that the trial of Diana Lumbra in Garden City, Kan., will be limited to evidence pertaining to the death of Jose Antonio Lumbra who died in Garden City on May 1.

Mrs. Lumbra has been charged with first-degree murder in this case.

The ruling means that evidence concerning the deaths of three of her children here in Parmer County will not be used as evidence in the Garden City case, and also that evidence concerning the deaths of three other children in Texas will be excluded.

It was excluded because the judge ruled that evidence in these cases could not be used because no conclusive pattern or plan was shown in Ms. Lumbra's behavior concerning the deaths in Texas.

Ms. Lumbra has been charged in this county with the deaths of Joanna Garza Lumbra, Melissa Garza Lumbra, and Melinda Ann Garza Lumbra who died between 1976 and 1982 while Mrs. Lumbra resided in Bovina. A trial in these cases will begin when her trial in Kansas has ended.

No formal charges have been filed concerning the deaths of Joselionel Garza, 2 1/2 months, who died Feb. 13, 1978 at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock; Ericka Aleman, 6 weeks, who died Oct. 8, 1980 in West Plains Medical Center in Muleshoe; and Christopher Daniel Lumbra, 5 1/2 months, who died March 28, 1984 at Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt.

It is possible that the Bailey County Grand Jury which is scheduled to meet early in September will be asked to determine whether there is sufficient evidence to try Mrs. Lumbra in Bailey County.

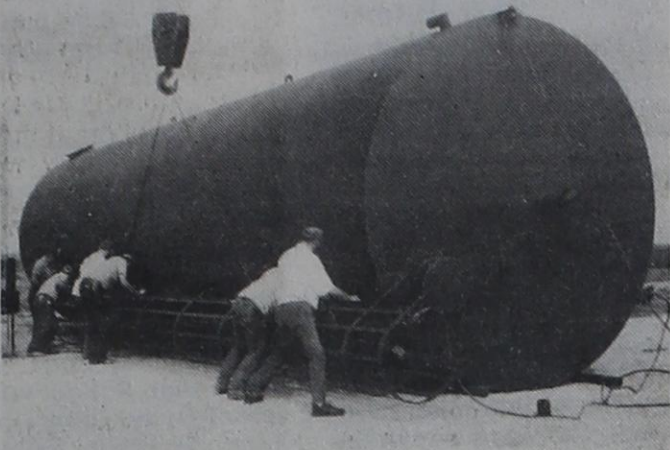

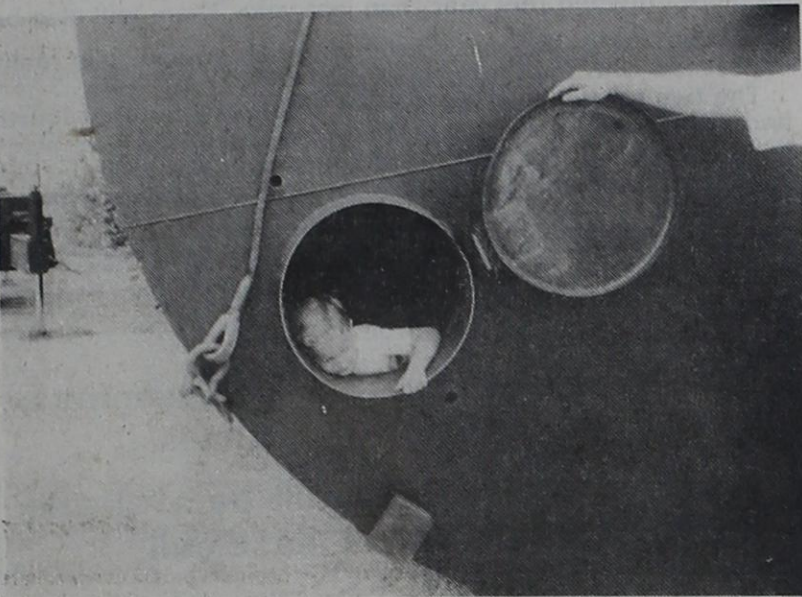
The Pleasant Hill Fire Department members assisted with the installation of the new reserve water storage tank which will assure plenty of water for their pumper truck in case of a fire.



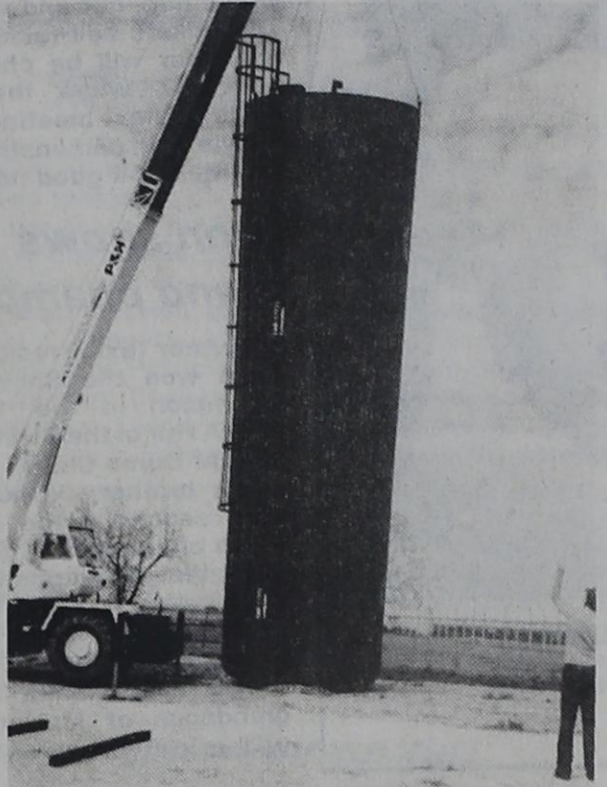

The City Council is considering possible future projects such as a new swimming pool, new community center and new city hall.

"Open Space" is defined as land within or adjacent to a community that has or can be used for public protection

(flood plains, soil erosion control, water quality, preventive or control of natural disasters), economic development (tourism and business attraction, property value enhancement), recreational uses (passive or active, natural or maintained), conversion of natural resources (ecological balance, historical or cultural preserve) or preservation (beauty or visual pleasure).

1. How important is Open Space to you at the present time?
2. In your opinion, who should have the primary responsibility for providing open space - city, state, county or federal?

5. What features attracted you to the Open Space area?

7. What Open Space Areas do you feel should be acquired first and for what purpose? (Purposes such as public protection, recreational use, preservation, economic development or conservation).

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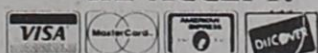

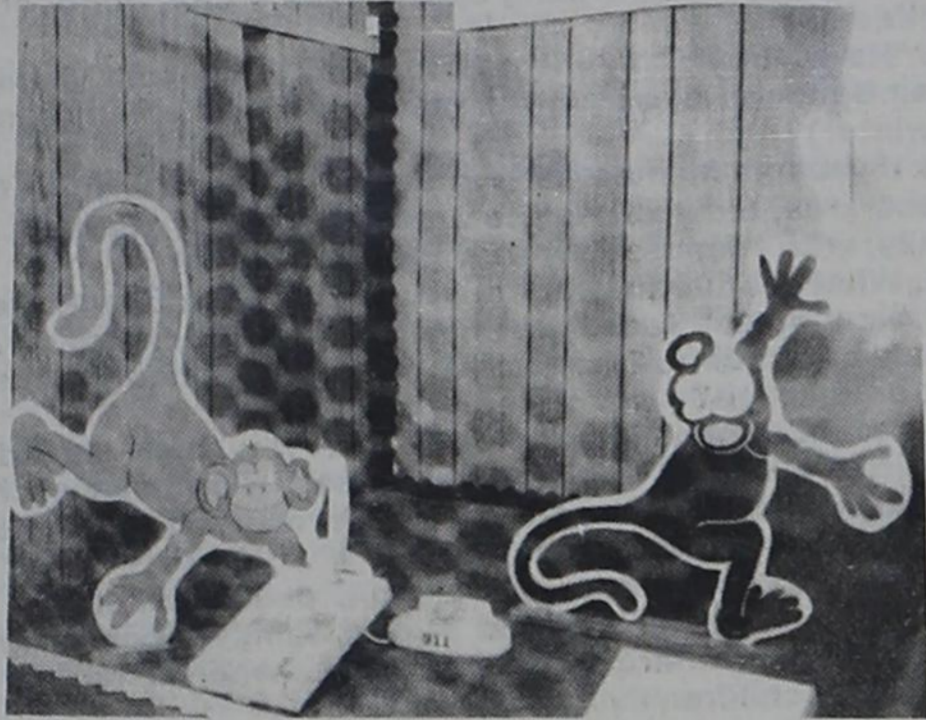
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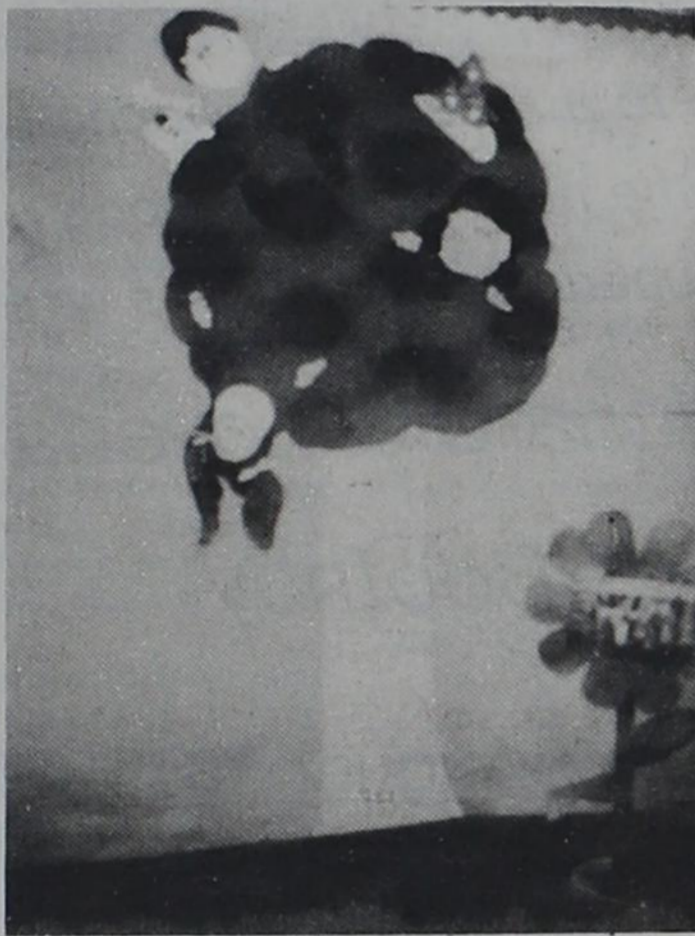
