Maybe we're old fashioned but we don't charge a penny for announcements - with photos! Of course, the Post is a bit bigger...

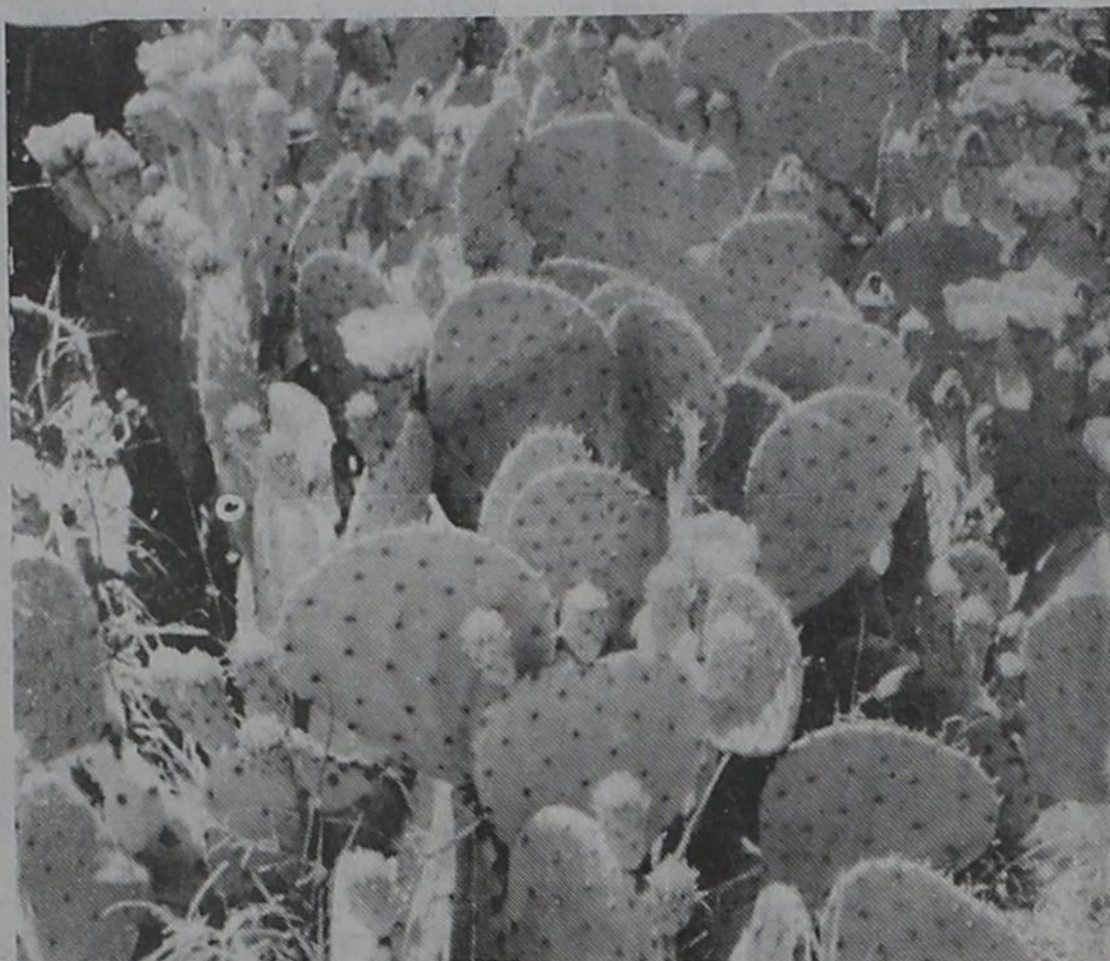
Rumor of the Week: A new Allsup's convenience store where the Amarillo and Lubbock highways merge in Texico might be coming soon.

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Farwell residents to be surveyed

Farwell residents will be asked to respond to a survey which may enable city leaders to apply for a Community Development Improvement Grant.

Farwell City Council members were recently asked to help residents on First Street who complained about low water pressure. At first the city council members discussed replacing a water line, then they wondered about digging a new well. Both are costly projects.

City Council members were advised by a representative of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission that there is money allocated for community development projects such as water lines and new wells. The City of Farwell

will have to apply for the funds if it hopes to go forward with the project.

Farwell leaders will need certain information so that they may apply for a community development grant.

According to City Clerk Cynthia Thigpen, residents will be asked to answer a few simple questions. City leaders will probably need information such as: street address, phone number, number of people in the household, income level, type of plumbing, number of bathrooms in each house, etc. so that they can effectively apply for a grant.

If the survey is actually taken, the information will be tabulated and sent to the Panhandle Regional Planning

Commission which will advise state legislature of the projects in the Panhandle which need funding the most.

"They (PRPC) told us that more than one million dollars has been allocated for the Panhandle, and it will be given to somebody. You would think that water would be a real need," said Mrs. Thigpen.

Normally, community development grants are allocated to the projects that are most vitally needed by communities. Priority is given to those projects that would do the most good to the people who need it the most.

Grants are also most frequently given to those communities which show that they are unable to fund them by themselves.

Shumate appointed

CRP signups to begin

The 11th Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) signup is set for July 8-19.

The CRP pays a fee to land users who agree to put land into permanent vegetative cover for 10 years.

During the first 10 signups, most Texas cropland farmers could count on bids of \$40 or less per acre being accepted.

However, Secretary of Agriculture William Richards says farmers should not rely on that formula when making their bids this time.

"Under the new CRP provisions, bids on eligible land will be accepted based on environmental benefits obtained per dollar of cost," Richards said. "Producers who wish to enroll in the CRP should be aware that there is increased competition."

Texas' State Conservationist Wes Oneth says that land eligible for previous CRP signups included land that was highly erodible, land useful as filter strips next to perma-

nent bodies of water, croppd wetlands, or areas subject to stream scour.

Oneth says land eligibility requirements will be expanded for this signup to include cropland acres that could affect water quality and well heads, which are sources of water for municipalities. According to Thomas Reed, District Conservationist in Friona, there are some well head protected areas near the city of Friona which could receive a priority in this signup.

Richards says that to increase water quality benefits under CRP, producers offering areas such as filter strips, grass waterways, windbreaks, shelter belts and contour grass strips will receive additional consideration during the bid evaluation process.

Richards says producers can simultaneously enter the same acreage into the annual commodity programs and CRP. They can withdraw from the commodity programs without penalty if the CRP bid is accepted. Acceptance of a bid is not binding to either the producer or USDA until the contract is signed.

"In the first 10 CRP signups, Texans had 3.9 million acres of land accepted into the program," Oneth says. "On average, erosion was reduced by 36 tons on each of those acres as a result of the program. That's over 40 million tons of soil that did not erode as a direct result of the Conservation Reserve Program."

Oneth says the program keeps soil -and agricultural chemicals added to the soil - from reaching water supplies. He explains that without vegetative cover to keep soil on

erosive sites, it washes away, eventually reaching streams, lakes, ponds, and underground water supplies. Once there, it reduces the quantity and quality of water for fish, wildlife and humans.

The new Parmer County Education District Board held its organizational meeting June 27 at Friona.

Board members, and the school districts they repre-

sent, are Mike Beauchamp, Bovina; Charles Christian, Farwell; Kathryn Goddard, Friona, and Robert Gallman, Lazbudzie.

Ms. Goddard was elected chairman; Christian, vice chairman, and Gallman, recording secretary.

The board voted to have an election for the new district, mandated by the state legislature, for Aug. 10 on the following issues:

- The exemption of 20 percent of the market value of the residence homestead from ad valorem taxes in the district.

- The exemption of \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of an individual who is disabled and of \$10,000 of the homestead of an individual who is 65 or older from ad valorem taxes in the district.

- The taxation of all personal property other than manufactured homes in the district that is not held or used for the production of income.

In other business, the board named Hat Ratcliff to post bids for a depository contract.

The next meeting will be Aug. 15 at Friona.

Survivors include his parents, grandparents and great-grandparents.

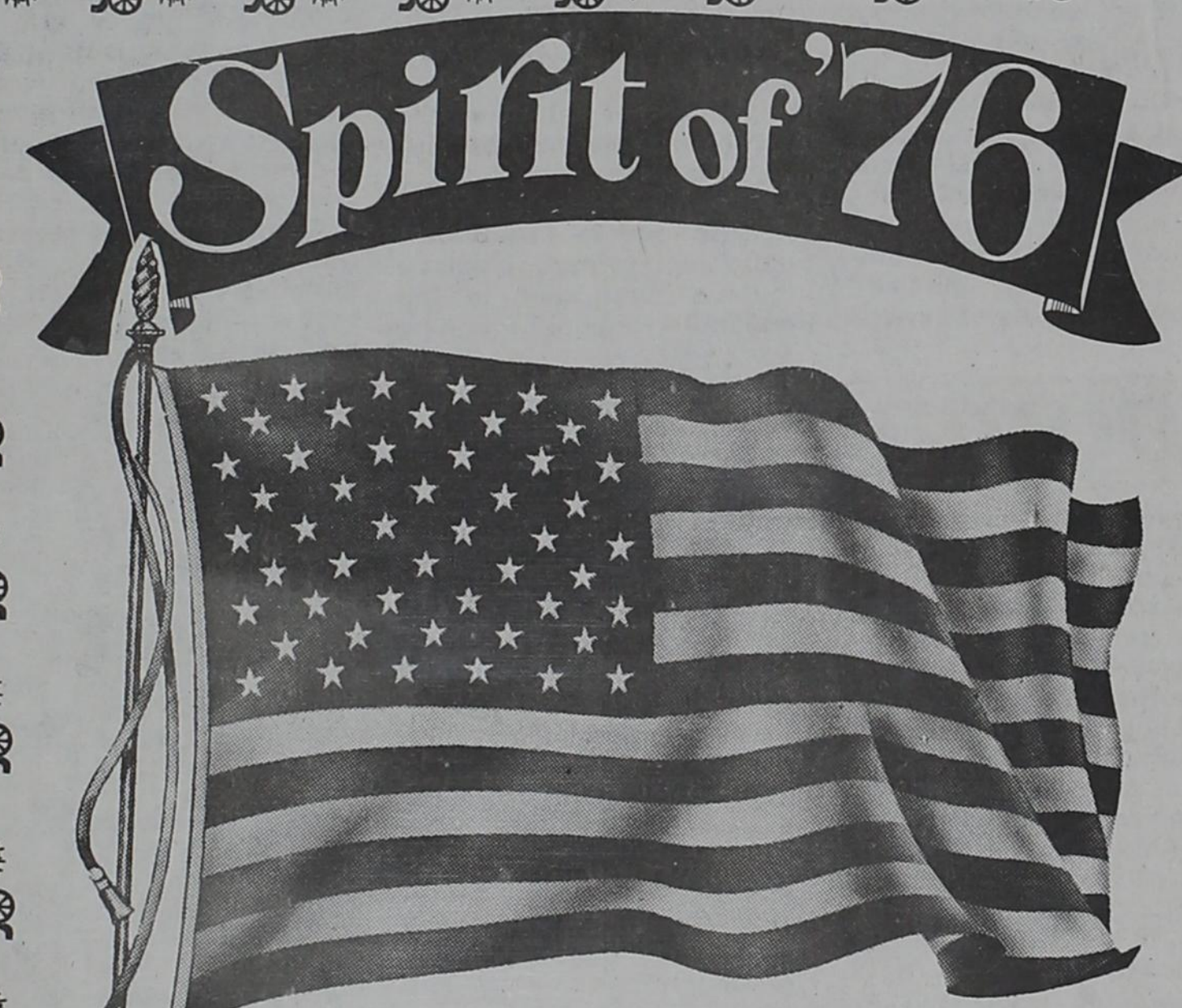

Lawn sprinkler service opens here

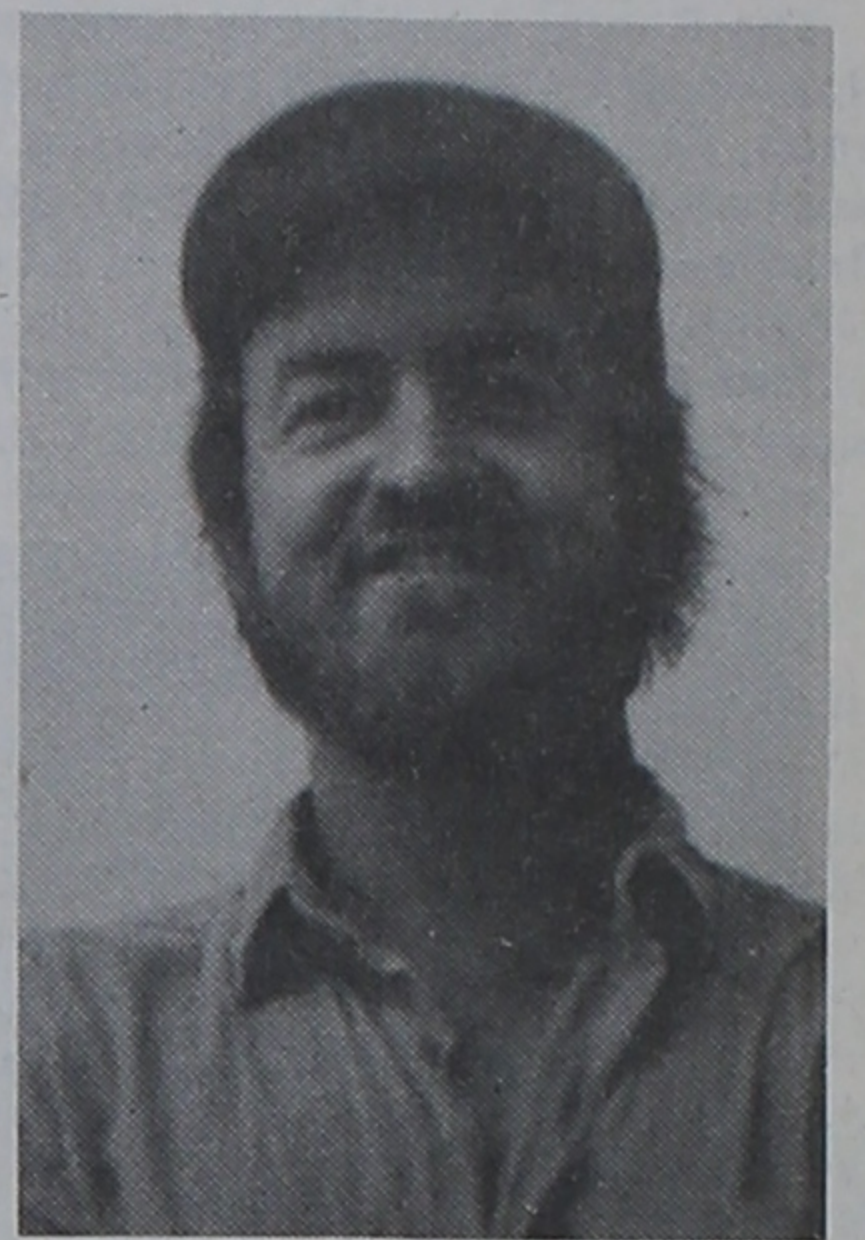
Johnny Franse of Texico has started a new business - Franse Lawn Sprinkler, to serve the Twin Cities.

"Water is a limited resource, and an automatic sprinkler system has an automatic controller so that the plants get just enough water," said Franse.

Hot weather during the day causes an increase in evaporation. "You can lose up to 30% due to evaporation," says Franse. An automatic system can be set to control the water so that the sprinkling is done over night when the loss due to evaporation is the least.

The automatic systems are very flexible. They can be set a number of different ways so that the plants get just the right amount of water. They

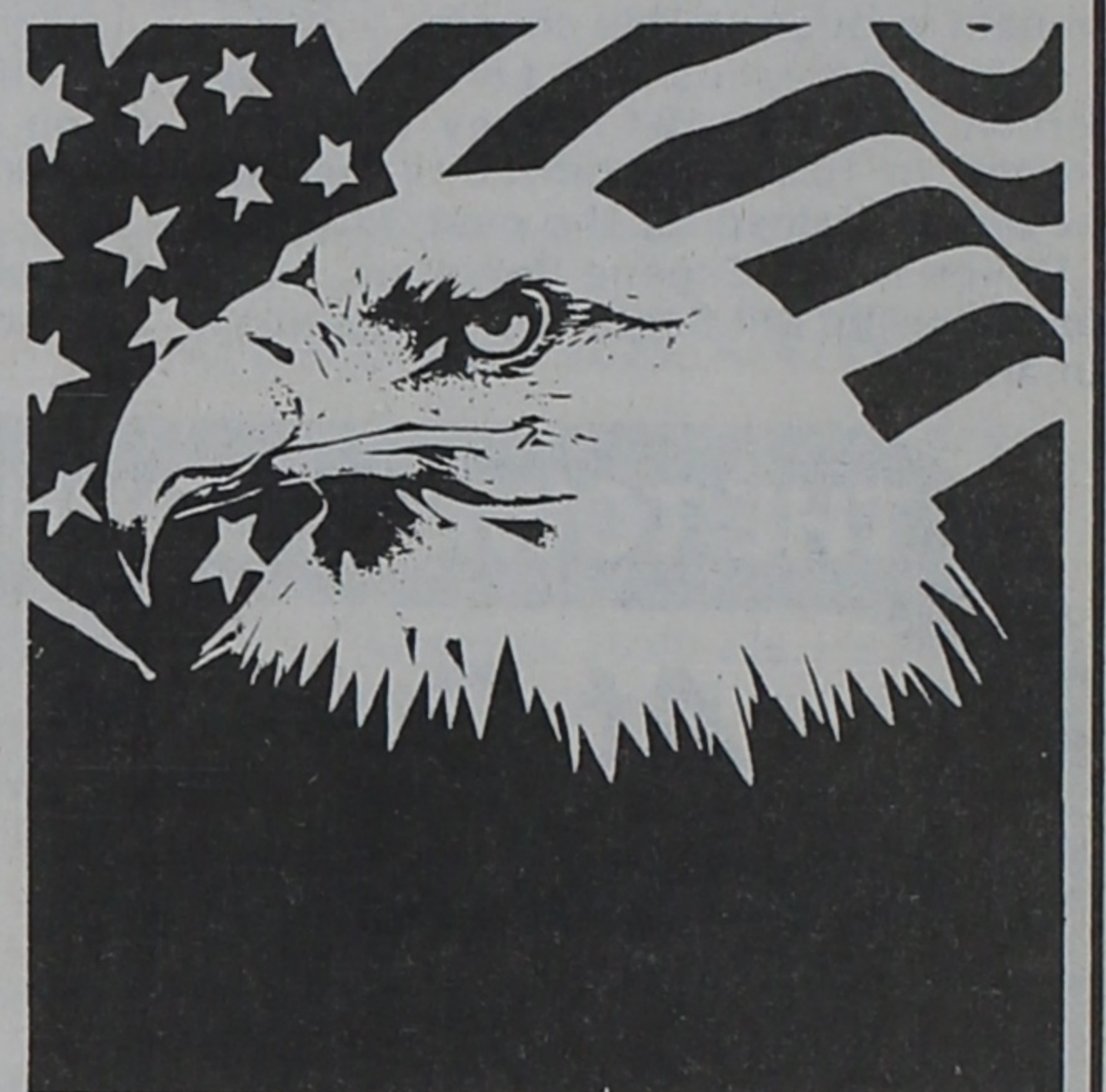

Prices expected to rise

The Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association reports that feeder cattle prices are expected to be stronger this summer and fall if the weather cooperates.

They report that part of the reason feeder cattle prices are expected to be supported through the fall because of some changes in the way the cattle industry now operates. They cite the following:

1. More feeder cattle are contracted during the time from March - May for fall delivery to the feedyards than was the case a few years ago.
2. This year there is a smaller percentage of this year's feeder cattle than normal left uncontracted in the open market.
3. More cattle are going into the feedyards at lighter weights than before, reducing the glut of feeder cattle being pushed into the feedyards in the fall.

The TSCRA reports that if the weather does not limit the size of the 1991 corn crop, then fall feeder cattle prices could be above last year's.

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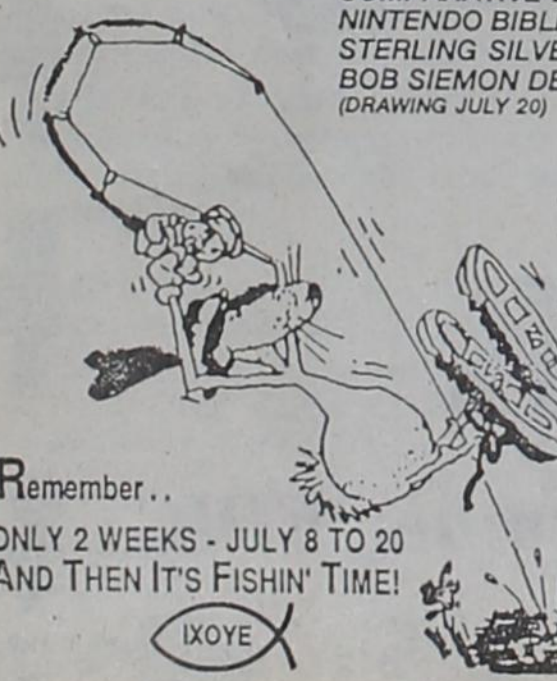
