Moisture total running ahead

Dark, threatening clouds covered the sky on the morning of Aug. 31.

"It looked kind of odd to be that dark so early of a morning," said Walter Curd of Texico. He reported that it looked almost like nightfall when he went out to get his morning paper.

Ruth Ann Bennett of Oklahoma Lane also commented on the ominous dark clouds, "I'm used to seeing clouds gathering all week before it ever rains."

Curd measured 1" at his home from Monday morning's rain. Additional rain fell Monday evening and Tuesday morning.

Fred Chandler reported .9" were measured at the Sherley Anderson Pitman Elevator in Farwell on Monday.

Lonnie McFarland of Lariat measured 1.11" at the Sherley Anderson Elevator there. He said that the rain brought the rainfall total to 3.01" for the month, and 13.94" so far this year.

Lariat had 4.18" of moisture in August 1991. McFar-

land notes that August 1992 was cooler and drier than August 1991.

The 1992 yearly total for moisture is still running above last year. McFarland said that in 1991 we had 22.56" of total moisture compared to the yearly average of 16-17".

Shirley Steinbok of Lazbuddie reports 1.2" were measured at the Sherley Gain Elevator on Aug. 31, and more than 1" had been reported to her from folks east of the elevator in Monday morning's rain.

Early morning storms on Aug. 27 brought high winds, hail, and lots of storm damage to the Friona area and out near Rhea.

There were reports of up to 3" of locally heavy rain in the northern part of the county.

There were reports of hail damage to crops, and overturned sprinkler systems in the county. Windows were blown out at Ingram's Department Store and at the TIC Service Center on Main Street in Friona.

This will be the first meeting of the season for the club and all parents and interested parties are urged to attend.

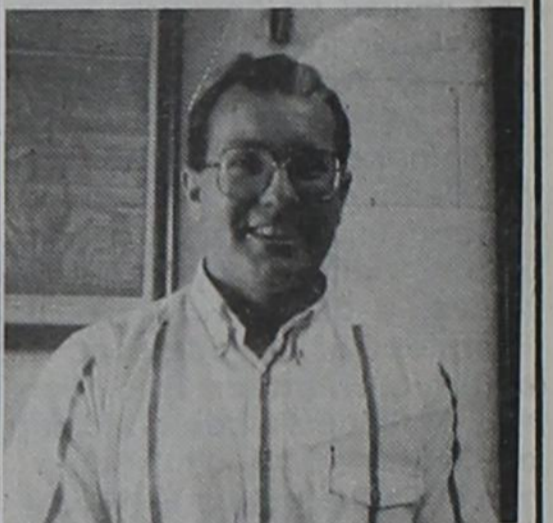
A film of the Farwell - Plains grid game will be shown.

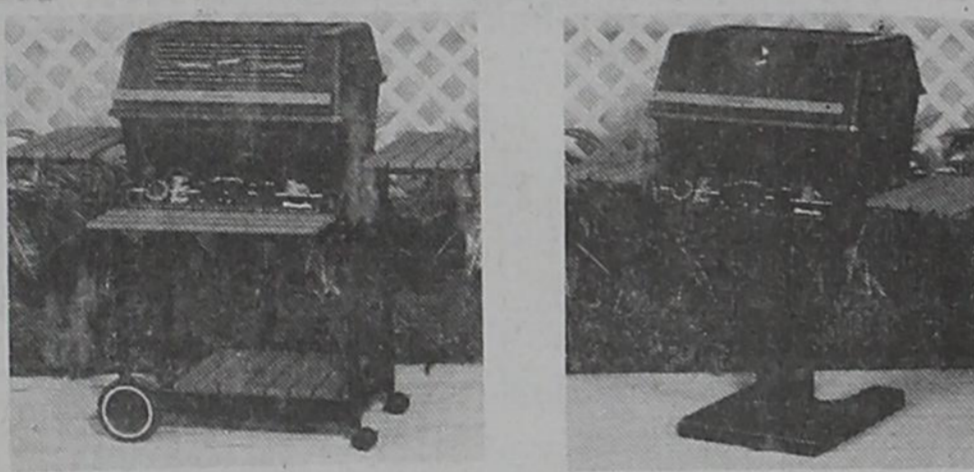
Sides to head area 4-H club

Wolverines host Jal tonight

Kelvin Gooden sparks Texico past Dexter

Kelvin Gooden rushed for 319 yards - perhaps a school record - in last Friday's victory by the Texico Wolverines over the Dexter Demons, 48-12.

Gooden's outstanding yardage was aided by a strong offensive line of Billy Rogers, Matthew Williams, Anthony Garcia, Steven Horner, Corey Horner and Steve Cloud.

Texico, 1-0 on the season, hosts Jal tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m.

The game started with Texico holding the Demons to no gain with tackles by Daniel Madrid, Pat Chumley and Corey Horner. Dexter punted to the Wolverine 25. On Texico's first play from scrimmage, Gooden broke several tackles and raced 75 yards for a TD at 9:01 of the first quarter. The kick was not good due to a bad snap.

Dexter started on their own 20, but Anthony Garcia recovered a fumble on their first play. On offense, Texico's Johnny Salinas ran 15 yards for a first down. Quarterback Louie Delgado ran the ball over from the 4 for Texico's 2nd TD, barely a minute after its first score. Gooden ran in the 2-point conversion and Texico led 14-0 with 8 minutes left in the first quarter.

Luis Estrada kicked off and Chumley made the tackle of the Dexter receiver. The Demons again were stopped cold with tackles by Madrid, Garcia and Tyrone Gooden. Dexter's punt was returned by Salinas 15 yards to the 45.

On 2nd down, Hadley Gilbert carried the ball just short of a first down. Gooden then made the first down on a 15-yard run. And on the next play, Gooden scored from the 17 for Texico's 3rd TD. The extra point kick was blocked and Texico led 20-0 with 4:15 left in the first quarter.

Again, Dexter was stopped with tackles by Mike Eaton, Richard Stephens, Billy Rogers, Tyrone Gooden and Williams. After a punt, Dexter got the ball back by recovering a fumble. The Demons moved the ball down field, with cousins Steve and Corey Horner making tackles before the first quarter ended.

After Dexter made its second 1st down of the game, Williams recovered a fumble.

Texico continued giving the ball to Kelvin Gooden, who made a first down when one tackler only came up with his shoe. But a fumble gave Dexter the ball again. On defense, Madrid caused a fumble, recovered by Cloud.

On a third down play, Kelvin Gooden raced 42 yards for another TD. Estrada's extra point kick was again blocked and Texico led 26-0 with 3 minutes left in the half.

On defense, tackles were made by Corey Horner, Tyrone Gooden, Delgado and Cloud. On 4th and 1, Dexter was stopped when Delgado broke up a pass attempt. And with just 4 seconds left in the half, Kelvin Gooden ran 43 yards for his 4th TD of the half. His run was helped by excellent line blocks, especially by Garcia. The pass for extra points failed and Texico was up 32-0 at the half.

In the 3rd quarter, Bobby Winegeart returned Dexter's kick to the 33. Gilbert ran for 15 yards. Salinas passed to Charles Williams for 33 yards at the Dexter 19. Kelvin Gooden ran to the 9. Then Delgado rushed for his 2nd TD. Gilbert ran for the 2 point conversion.

Chumley tackled the Dexter kick returner at the 30. Gilbert had a tackle, as did Steve Horner, Rogers and Madrid. Texico took over at its 44. Kelvin Gooden continued his excellent running, gaining 2 first downs. But Dexter recovered a fumble as the 3rd quarter ended.

Dexter was on its own 6 yards, but fumbled in its end zone. Mike Eaton recovered for a Texico TD. Delgado passed to Salinas for the extra points and Texico led 48-0.

Raymond Attaway tackled the kick returner. The Demons then moved the ball on offense despite tackles by Chumley, Steve Horner, Gilbert, Manuel Estrada and Joel Barba. Dexter scored on a 9 yard run with 4:53 left. The pass for extra points failed.

On offense, sophomore Chumley was at quarterback. Texico was stopped and Dexter moved again. After Barba deflected a pass, the Demons connected on a 40 yard pass play, with Barba making the stop. Dexter scored on another 9 yard run with 11 seconds left. The pass for extra points failed.

Coach Bruce Scroggins commented, "Our team looked pretty good. Most mistakes we made are correctible. And we're still shifting people around."

Individual statistics were: rushing - Kelvin Gooden, 22 attempts for 319 yards; Salinas, 5 for 29; Delgado, 4 for 8, and Gilbert, 6 for 39. Receiving - Charles Williams, 1 catch for 33 yards; Salinas, 1 for 3. Passing - Delgado, 1 for 3 and 3 yards; Salinas, 1 for 1 and 33.

Team statistics were: first downs - Texico 10, Dexter 10; rushing yards - Texico 32 for 395, Dexter 45 for 112; passing - Texico 36 yards, Dexter 57; total yards - Texico 431, Dexter 169; punting average (Texico didn't punt), Dexter 3 for 25.3 yards; fumbles - Texico 3 lost, Dexter 4 lost; penalties - Texico 5 for 65 yards, Dexter 2 for 7.

12% of crop washed away

With the Aug. 15 ASCS deadline for producers to certify their crops now past a better picture of the cotton losses on the High Plains is now available.

According to Lubbock - based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) the new ASCS figures indicate approximately 1.4 million acres of cotton are left in the 25- county area. ASCS officials point out that final reports from each of the counties probably will not be available for a few more weeks.

Failed acreage figures indicate slightly over 1.7 million acres of cotton have been certified as failed. These acres come out of the expected 3.17 million acres intended for cotton. A 1.7 million acre loss would translate into an abandonment rate of 54 - percent.

"The preliminary numbers show an unprecedented number of cotton acres were destroyed during the heavy rains we experienced in early June," says PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson. "Without a doubt this is the most extensive damage we have ever seen on the High Plains."

Johnson points out that since the 25 - county area normally accounts for 20-25 percent of the total U.S. production the damage suffered so far in 1992 means 12 percent of the 1992 U.S. crop has been washed away. He adds that producers who still have cotton in the field at this time are looking at a crop planted three to four weeks late. At best, these producers have a reduced yield potential

even with perfect weather in the weeks leading to harvest.

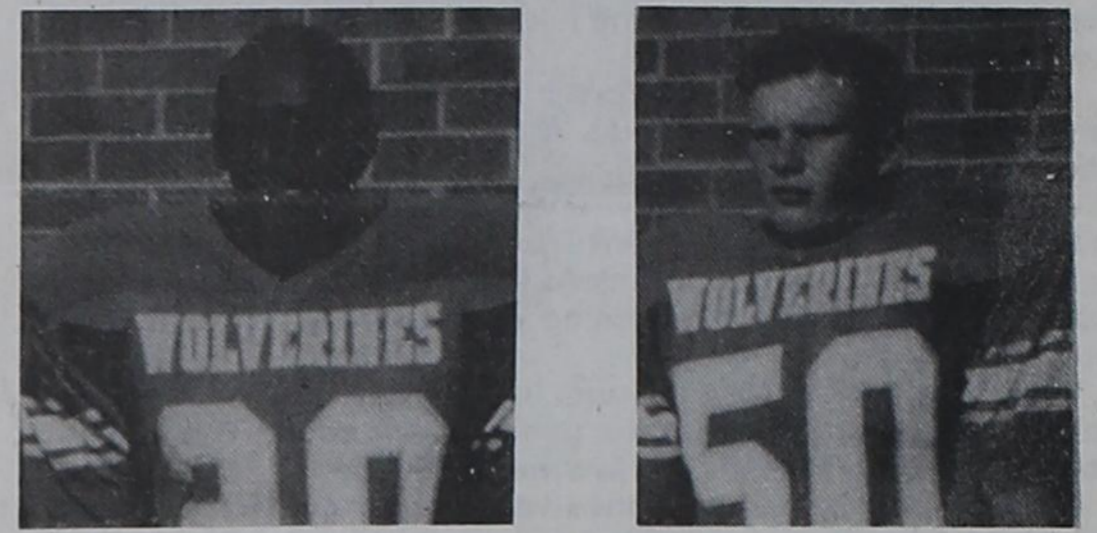

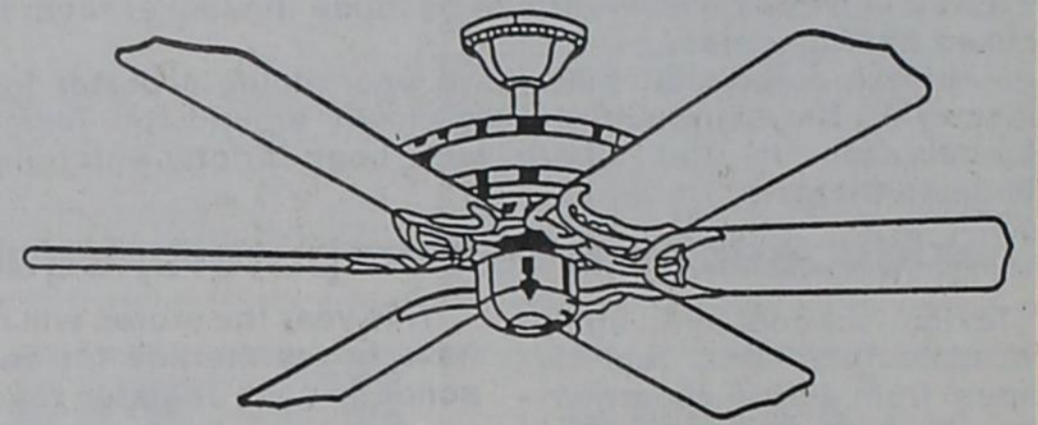

Marshal's Report

Here is the weekly report from the Texico marshal's office:
 - Texico Marshal Fry Urioste reports that New Mexico lawmen will be out in force to enforce seat belt, speeding, and drunk driving laws over the Labor Day weekend.

- Urioste noted that folks have been doing a better job of obeying the signs and driving slowly around the Texico Schools since he and Roberts have been strictly enforcing the laws there.
