I oppose a curfew

I don't favor a curfew, in either Texico or Farwell.

I can understand why the Texico police have suggested a curfew for youths under 18 in the community, in the wake of a rash of vandalism and burglaries involving six Texico juvenile boys.

And the police should be complimented for taking a strong stand here. Proposing a curfew gives youths something to seriously think about.

But, in a nutshell, I think a curfew will create more problems than it solves. It just offers too many chances for mistakes to happen involving youths out at night legitimately - who are working, for example, and will not stop anyone who wishes to commit a crime.

I think what is more important is to work on educating our youths about the penalties they will incur if they participate in criminal acts. The fact is, sooner or later, they will be caught and will face the music.

I'm not happy about the recent vandalism spree. My business was hit, with a BB shot through a window. And my insurance doesn't cover it.

But I do recognize that it's more important to help juvenile youths get back on the right track than "throw the book at them." Here's why I feel that way:

About 15 years ago, when I was a reporter in Michigan City, Ind., I was assigned to write a story about our juvenile court. So I sat in on juvenile court proceedings for a full day, not to publish what was occurring there (due to confidentiality statutes), but to get a feel of how court is conducted.

At the end of the day, I went into the judge's chambers with the Juvenile Court judge, named Jack Ford. As Jack took off his robes and got ready to go home, he asked me my impression of what I had seen.

I told him, frankly, I was surprised that although he sternly lectured all the youths appearing before him that day, he gave out nothing more severe than "probation."

Jack responded to me: "Mike, 90 percent of all youths who end up in Juvenile Court never return. Those 90 percent made a mistake, learned from it, and you'll never see them in trouble again. Thus, I always go lenient on youths who are in my court the first time."

I'll never forget that statistic that Jack threw at me. Because of it, I also believe in leniency for first-time offenders.

That's not so say they ought to get off scot free. Juveniles, just like adults, need to know that society won't accept criminal behavior.

And I also realize that the other side of Jack's coin - the 10 percent who are repeat offenders - remain an irritant. Unfortunately, they don't learn from their misbehavior and find themselves in the criminal justice system for quite some time.

I wish I had an answer to youths who have problems at home. I wish all parents were loving and interested in helping their children mature. I wish all families would close ranks to help one of their family members in trouble.

But this isn't a perfect world. And, too often, the help a youth needs isn't available.

Each of us ought to do what we can to help those in need. Sometimes we won't be successful, I know that. But it doesn't mean we can't try.

An open letter from Dr. Richards

Dear Texico Patrons,

The Texico community will be considering a School Bond Issue on February 4, 1992 to erect and remodel school buildings. Texico Schools feel a need to add more classrooms and cafeteria space because of the increase in student enrollment. The New Mexico State Department of Education strongly recommended that Texico Schools build a science lab at Texico Junior High. After gathering input from students, staff, parents, and community, the School Board felt the need to build extra classrooms at the Junior High. The previous tax levy, used to build classrooms at the elementary, has the last payment in July of 1993. Considering all of these factors, Texico Schools decided to ask voters to continue a building project based on the increase in student enrollment.

The student population at Texico has increased considerably in the past few years. In fact, the 1992-93 student enrollment is 134.6% larger than the enrollment in 1981-82. The figures below show our student numbers for several years.

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Rhea fire dept. organized

A new volunteer fire department has been organized in Parmer County: the Rhea - Hollene VFD.

And to recognize their success at getting organized, the Parmer County Commissioners Monday voted to give them an annual \$4,000 payment, similar to the payments the other county volunteer fire departments received.

The Rhea - Hollene (the adjoining portion in Curry County) VFD has received a charter from the state and also the donation of an old fire engine from the Friona fireboys.

Commissioner Robert White suggested that the new department ask Farwell for a donation of its old fire engine, also.

Rhea - Hollene VFD officers are: Glen Schueler, chief; Rick Taylor, assistant chief; Curtis Allen, secretary - treasurer, and Danny Allen, training officer.

Finance committee members are Floyd Schueler, Jack Patterson and Joe Allen.

Entertainment committee members are Terry Widner, Gene Schueler, Spencer Turner and Mark Harrison.

The new department meets at 7:30 p.m. on the second Monday of each month. Annual dues are \$10.

In other business, County Judge Bonnie Clayton announced that Parmer County will receive \$69,726 as a performance reward from the state, according to House Bill 93 which rewards counties in averting felons from being sent to the state penitentiary.

This is the new law that makes counties handle more convicted felons locally - non-violent offenders who meet rigid criteria and are screened by County Sheriff Rex Williams. It went into effect Sept. 1, 1991.

The Community Justice Council, organized by Judge Clayton, has presented recommendations for a work release and community service plan dealing with these inmates. The recommendations, in which District Attorney Johnny Atkinson, Sheriff Williams and the Friona police chief participated, include:

1, Counseling; 2, life skills training; 3, community service, and 4, work release programs.

The funds are for the current state fiscal year, ending next Aug. 31. Judge Clayton hopes the money arrives soon.

Also, the commissioners approved a contract with MISSCO, of Amarillo, to handle the trash disposal at the two county containers outside of Bovina and Friona.

Commissioner Ernest Anthony received a letter from Excel Corporation, Friona, seeking a tax abatement for its cooler expansion project.

Anthony made a motion that Excel be granted 50 percent tax abatement on the new addition only.

Anthony didn't receive a second for his motion because the commissioners wanted more information from Excel and are requesting that it send a representative to its next meeting.

Local milo growers earn recognition

Four local milo growers earned recognition in the National Grain Sorghum Contest.

Donald Rucker of Triple L Farms placed first in Curry County, first in New Mexico, and second in the nation in the irrigated division competition. Rucker's yield was 193.75 bushels per acre.

His yield was slightly more than double the Curry County average. Rucker farms about 1,200 acres, roughly half is irrigated and half is dryland consisting of wheat, grain sorghum, and corn.

Spencer and Steve Turner of Crest Agro harvested 110.28 bushels per acre on their dryland milo. They placed first in Curry County in the dryland division and first in New Mexico.

They also harvested 106.97 bushels per acre which earned them first place in Parmer County. Their yields also more than doubled the county averages. The Turners farm approximately 3,000 acres, both dryland and irrigated consisting of grain sorghum and wheat.

Randy Johnson, of Farwell, harvested 184.93 bushels per acre in the irrigated division. Johnson placed first in Parmer County and first in Texas. His yield was 3.9 bushels short of placing third in the nation. Randy farms 800 acres of irrigated land consisting of grain sorghum, cotton, and alfalfa.

Several other local growers that were entered in the National Grain Sorghum Contest also had outstanding yields

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Sheriff's Report

Stolen trailers recovered

An admission by a suspect that several fertilizer tank - trailers stolen from Parmer County since the latter part of 1989 were sold in the Deming, N.M., area has led to their recovery.

Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams, along with Arvne Eckhardt of Nutri-Tech and Ted Holder of T & M Fertilizer, two Farwell businesses, went to Deming Jan. 23 to identify them.

Nutri-Tech has recovered four of the five tank - trailers stolen from them and T & M has recovered its stolen tank - trailer. Checks are being made in the Las Cruces, N.M., area for the other Nutri-Tech missing trailer.

Williams said felony theft charges will be filed against the former Farwell resident who allegedly is involved in the theft. The man is in Lubbock jail currently serving a 2 1/2-year term for tractor theft, plus \$112,000 restitution.

After learning that the stolen trailers might be in the Deming area, Williams contacted the New Mexico criminal investigator for that area, Jim Long, who is stationed in Deming. Williams sent physical descriptions of the trailers to Long along with motor serial numbers and identification marks, like "pipe welded on."

Long located the five trailers, which had been sold to Deming area farmers. Then Eckhardt and Holder identified them.

Williams thanked the New Mexico State Police for "their excellent cooperation in this matter."

In other police news, Charles Howard, 27, Fort Worth, was arrested Jan. 25 on a charge of failure to identify by the Texas Highway Patrol. The case is pending in county court.

Enhanced 911 coming

All of Parmer County will have access to the enhanced 911 emergency telephone service beginning Feb. 13. This service will enable emergency personnel to quickly locate the source of a request for emergency.

Also during this period of time, the Farwell First Baptist Church was organized. He was a charter member and he served on the finance committee.

A short time later his son-in-law, Gabe (Penny) Anderson, who was married to Flora Lee, asked him to manage an elevator he was building in Farwell. He worked at the Sherley Anderson Pitman elevator in Farwell until he retired at age 90.

As you can determine from the numbers, our school system continues to grow. Due to increases in student enrollment, Texico Schools has hired two additional staff members this year, a first grade teacher to help with 50 first graders, and a junior high teacher. We feel the new building project will be an educational advantage to accommodate our children.

During the last State Department of Education Monitoring visit, Texico Schools were prompted by state officials to build a science lab at the junior high level. The science lab facility is needed to teach our growing enrollment the science competencies required by the State Board of Education. Texico Schools have always attempted to fulfill all state requirements on student learning.

The decision to continue a building project for Texico Schools was carefully considered by the Texico School Board. The school reviewed the students needs, the bonding capacity, and the tax rates very carefully. Input has been requested during needs assessments, Accountability Reports, and brochures. A building committee was organized to provide the following priorities to the School Board.

PRIORITY 1) Add 4 to 6 classrooms at the junior high since the enrollment was already at 136 students, and the larger classes from elementary would soon be in junior high. This will allow junior high students to remain in the junior high facility all day, rather than moving to the high school building for classes.

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PRIORITY 2) Due to approximately 230 elementary students eating during a 45 minute time span, the cafeteria needs to be enlarged. The enlarged cafeteria could also be used for community functions and banquets.

PRIORITY 3) The needs assessment indicated that many parents and staff were interested in obtaining evaporative air conditioning for the junior and high school classrooms.

In considering a new bond issue, the Texico School Board looked closely at the variables of the tax rate and the percent of interest on the bond money. The previous bond issue, used for elementary classrooms, expires in July of 1993. Once the 1992 hump in taxes is past, the tax rate would remain the same for the next ten years. The Board could have bonded for up to \$1,200,000, but for purposes of a stable tax rate decided to bond for \$825,000. The intent is to have an ongoing building project and attempt to keep the tax rate at a relatively stable level. The timing on this bond is also appropriate. Interest rates on bond money is at a 20 year low, so it is an opportune time to build because the interest rate on the money may not exceed 5%. Therefore, now is a good time to build for many reasons.

We would like to dispel the rumor that this tax increase is for salaries or operation of the school. The local 1/2 mill property tax only generates \$8,949 for Texico Schools. The operation of the school is based on a state wide per unit value determined by student enrollment. These state funds are used to operate the school. The question the Texico patrons will vote on Tuesday, February 4, 1992, is whether new buildings need to be added to house our increase in enrollment.


The Texico Schools realize times are tough for all areas of our economy. We realize that farm commodity prices are down and that the dollar does not go very far. We also realize that it is better for our students to have the appropriate classroom space needed for learning instead of a cramped learning environment.

We hope this letter has explained or enlightened the Texico taxpayer on the February 4, 1992 Bond Election. The Texico Community Center will be the only polling place and will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. The absentee voting deadline is 5:00 p.m. Friday, January 31, 1992.

but the rules of the contest state that only one grower is eligible to advance out of their county. Therefore these growers that had yields comparable to the winners were not eligible to advance farther in the contest.

Those growers accomplishing high yields in the irrigated division were: Billy Rucker 190 bushels, Bruce Mayfield, 175 bushels, Byron Mayfield, 170 bushels, and Max Martin, 180 bushels.

Those in the dryland division were: Triple L Farms, 102 bushels, Gene Schueler, 90 bushels, and Bruce Mayfield, 85 bushels.

Wilbur Ellis- Tide of Farwell's sales reps started early in the year taking soil samples of each individual farm, then received recommendations from Dr. Dan Kreig with Texas Tech in Lubbock. Recommendations were for amounts of fertilizer needed to produce the crop, different types of fertilizer placement, seed spacing, variety selection, timing and amount of irrigation, heat units and row spacing. All of the different recommendations played an important role in the overall production of the crop.

Probably the practice that showed the highest increase in yield was row spacing. The tests that were conducted concerning row spacing showed 20" or 30" rows had a 9 to 17 percent increase over 40" rows.

Texico bond issue Tuesday

Tuesday is a voting day for residents of the Texico School District.

Voters will vote on whether to approve an \$825,000 bond issue for building construction.

Votes can be cast at the Texico Community Center from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Qualified to vote are registered voters within Curry and Roosevelt counties living within the school district.

Texico officials say that due to increased enrollment, they have a shortage of classrooms. Proceeds from the proposed bond issue will fund needed classrooms to be constructed on the south side of the existing junior high building.

These rooms will consist of a science lab, required by the state, a computer classroom and three regular classrooms; restroom and maintenance

facilities also are included. And the present junior high offices will be redesigned to allow for a hallway to the new classrooms.

Funds from the bond issue also will be used to expand the cafeteria to the west, providing more room for student lunch time and for a larger banquet room for the community. And air conditioning would be placed in the existing junior high and high school classrooms.

School officials say that the bond issue would result in a tax hike of about \$3.43 per \$1,000 assessed valuation.

As an example, they say if a taxpayer's property has an appraised value of \$60,000, the assessed value is \$20,000 - one-third of appraised value. And the cost increase would be about \$68.59 per year or \$5.72 per month.

The tax increase would be shown in the November 1992 tax notices. There would be no change in taxes this year.

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Letter To The Editor

Where the problem may lie

To The Editor:
 Re: Vandalism in Texico and Farwell:
 Mr. Brandon Schauf's letter of 1/17/92 stated, "Most of the kids are not involved in school or church related activities." Why not? There are activities besides "hanging out" with peers. It does seem that the problem is at home - why aren't kids involved in school or church activities? The local schools offer excellent opportunities for kids to become involved: debating, FFA, FHA, track basketball, football, chorus, band and other activities. The churches also have various group activities.

A common recreation center will only add fuel to the vandalism fire. Texico and Farwell schools have always enjoyed an "extremely healthy" rivalry, and to throw these kids (already with problems) together would only aggravate the situation. If kids have no respect for property now, then opening a new recreation center will not cure the problem - soon it will be a "wrecked center"!

I suggest the problem lies with either disinterested or learning impaired children or with children whose parents have not bothered to encourage them to join or become a part of the school, church, or community activities. In my estimation, discipline, respect, as charity, begins at home. Perhaps the parents need to re-establish values.

If the teachers checked persons responsible for acts of vandalism, they would probably find them to be arrogant non-achievers with little interest in learning or complying with the rules of society or becoming an active, contributing part of the community.

It would be a good idea, I think, if Texico and Farwell High Schools would develop a steering committee for solutions (from the kids' point of view) to the problem. I would suggest three members each from junior and senior classes of both high schools to develop a plan they deem workable and present it to a joint meeting of both towns' government members.

Another solution would be to develop a YMCA which would be a membership organization for interested parents and children who choose, instead of violence and vandalism, healthy and organized recreation activities.

I am a former student of both Farwell and Texico schools and a current taxpayer in the city of Farwell and am somewhat distressed by the apparent increase in acts of vandalism in the communities.

I do believe most parents in both communities are doing a wonderful job in guiding and encouraging their children to become responsible citizens. This is quite evident in academic and sports awards presented each year and in the success the young people enjoy in their work and education beyond their local high schools.

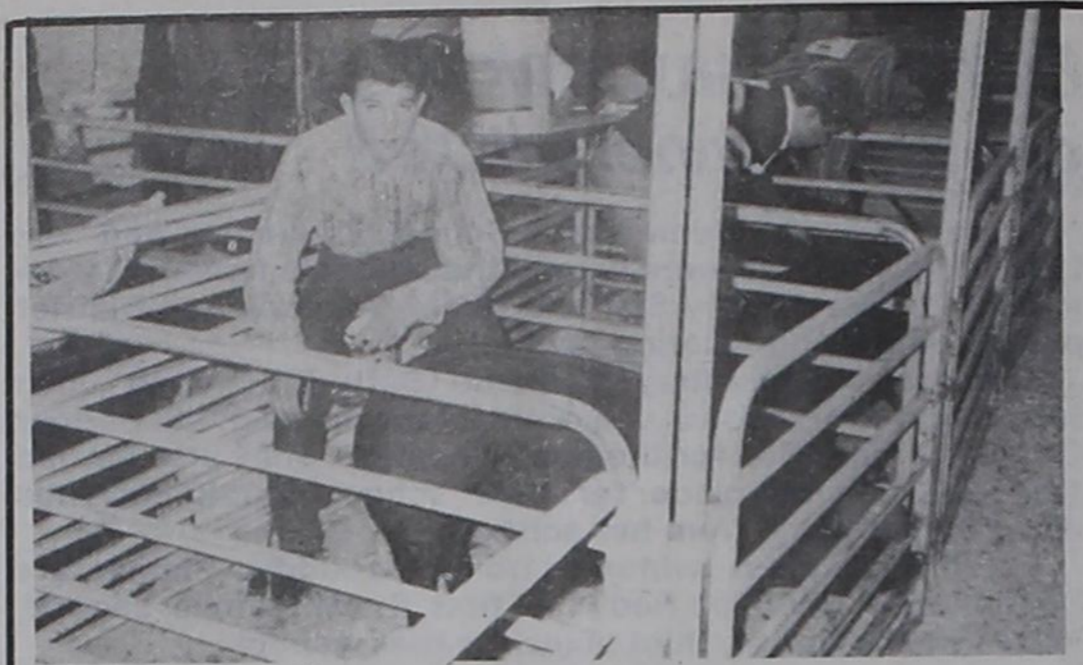

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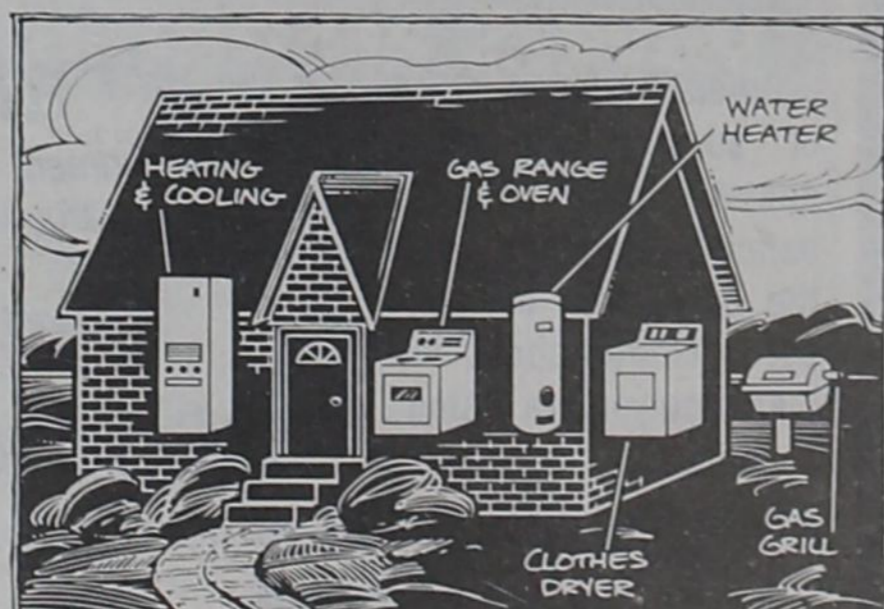

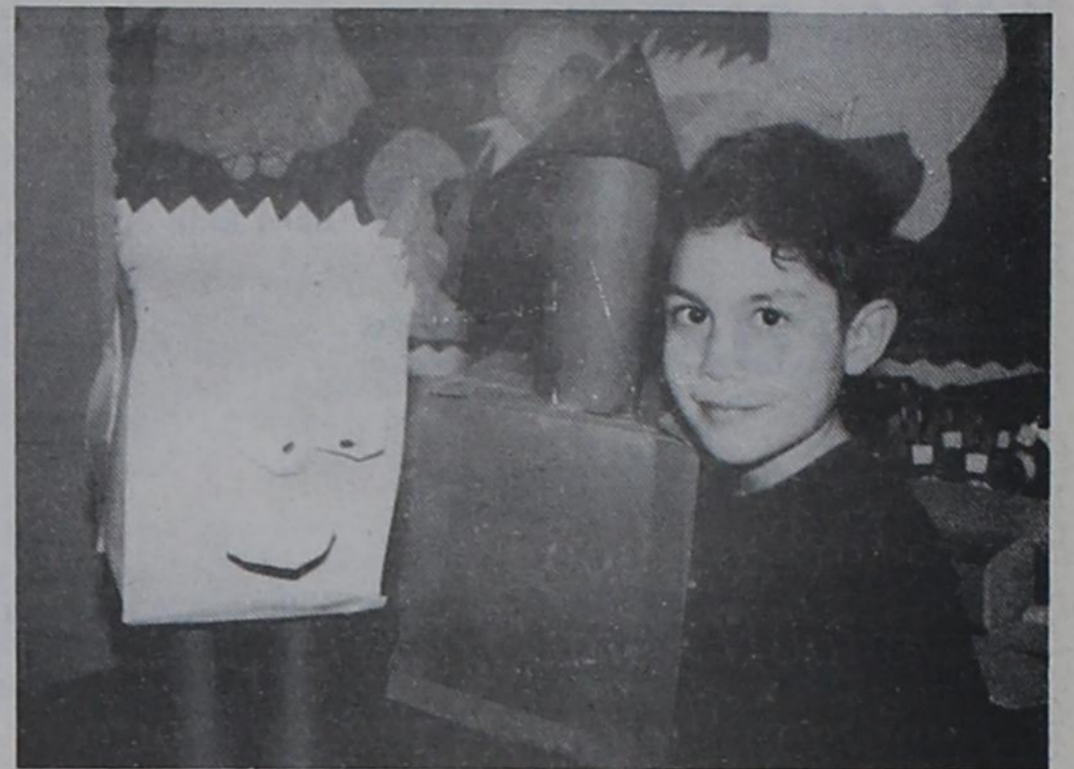

Recipe of Week

Chopped peanuts (optional)

Microwave at HIGH (100%) for 2 minutes or until melted, stirring every 30 seconds. Dip vanilla wafers in caramel, coating about half the cookie. Allow excess to drip off. If desired, dip edges of caramel coated cookies in chopped peanuts. Place on buttered waxed paper. Chill. Store in refrigerator.

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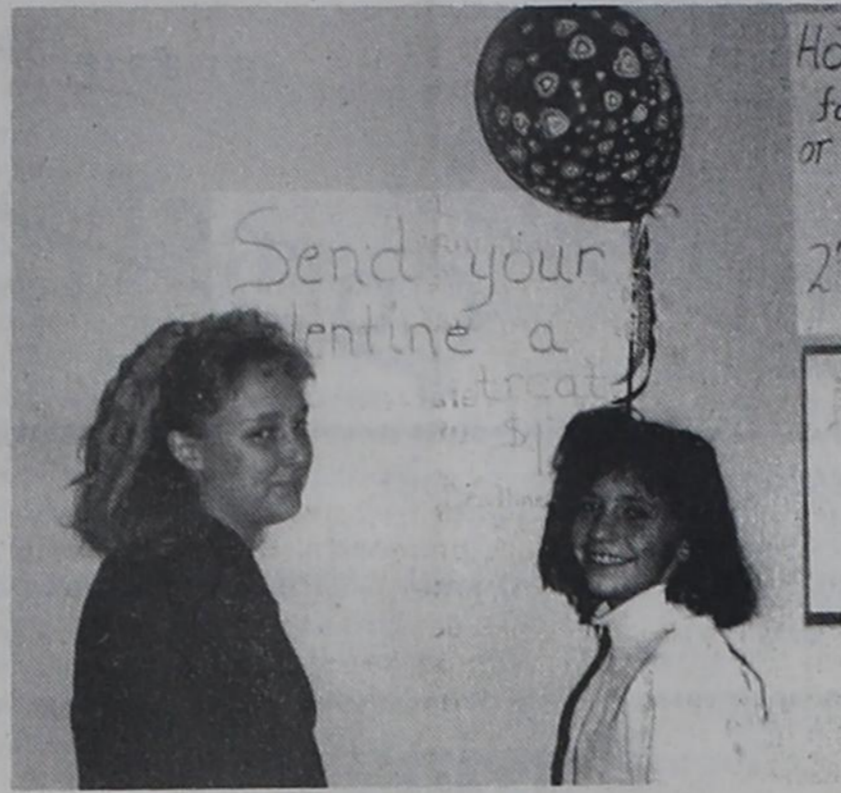

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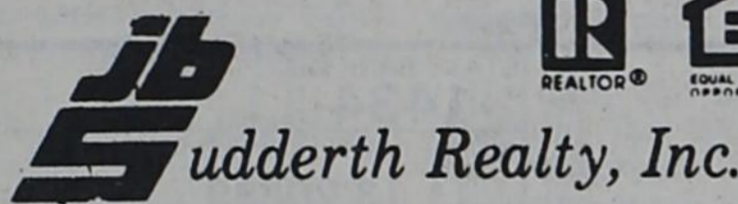

Although other studies and scientists may not agree, researchers in Europe found that the ingredient, a natural plant colloid, actually caused people to lose weight, even though specifically instructed not to alter normal eating patterns, according to one study published in the prestigious *British Journal of Nutrition*. She stated, "Not only have I lost 30 pounds but my cholesterol has dropped from 232 to 143. I have two closets full of clothes which have not fit me in two years that I can now wear." In a separate report, a telephone interview revealed that a Wilmington, North Carolina pharmacist lost 14 pounds in 3 weeks on the product and was never hungry.
