Texico hires new principal

The Texico School Board Tuesday hired Carolyn Abell, of Artesia, as the new high school principal.

She replaces Ken Shaw. Mrs. Abell has been assistant high school principal for the six years.

In other business, the board accepted the resignation of Wanda Turnbough, 4th grade teacher, and hired Bob Harmon to teach high school math.

Hardage receives special honor at college

Dustin Hardage, 21, of Farwell, was already a successful musician when he enrolled in South Plains College's program in sound technology to learn more about the technical side of the music industry.

His Christian rock band, Vizion, had performed for small churches throughout the state and at a Christian music conference in Greenville, Ill. He's lead singer for the group and has also run the sound and served as keyboardist.

Hardage has been involved with music since he was 3, following in the footsteps of his parents, Kevin and Geneva Hardage, who had performed in country/western bands. His dad, who farms, also runs a recording studio in Farwell called From the Heart Studios. His brother, Blaze, 15, a singer and keyboardist, rounds out Dustin's immediate family.

His grandparents, Ed and Juanita Hardage of Texico, are frequently called upon to play at local musical events such as Border Town Days. Ed's career in country/western music goes back many, many years. He played with many of the performers who helped to put country/western music on the charts nationwide.

"I want a career where I can perform and sing for a living, but the chances of that are like lightning striking," Hardage explained. As a result, the practical minded young man decided to enroll at South Plains College, where he could get experience as a musician and in music production. "SPC is close and inexpensive and the sound tech program has excellent gear and equipment," said Hardage.

He and the other Vizion band members transplanted to SPC: Roger Martinez on guitar, Greg Bearss on drums, and Chuck Hammit on bass. They were joined on keyboards by Damon Faulk, from Rockwall, Texas.

Roger, who graduated with Dustin, is the son of the late George Martinez and Mrs. Martinez of Farwell.

Greg is the son of the Rev. and Mrs. Mac Bearss of Brownsville, Texas. The Bearss family lived in Lariat while Greg went to school in Farwell. His dad was pastor of St. John Lutheran Church.

Chuck also attended school here. He is the son of Irene Montgomery of Portales and Billy Hammit of Texico.

The group recorded an album at SPC and produced a 5-minute Christian music video, "I Think I Will," which won best video in end-of-the-year awards ceremonies in SPC's creative arts department.

"The script was aimed toward young teenagers with the message that you can be a Christian, love God and have fun," explained Hardage, who was named best producer in

the project. Hardage said the video will also get airplay on Night Vision, a video show which airs on 22 stations in Texas, New Mexico, Illinois and Missouri.

A connection with Domino's Pizza gave the band another musical opportunity. Domino's was putting together a promotional CD for distribution to college campuses and radio stations worldwide and had asked their musical-minded employees to write songs for the project. Hardage explained that Faulk had worked for the pizza chain and got the band into the project.

"Domino's liked the song that we submitted so well that they asked for another one and plan to use that one, too," said Hardage. As a result, two of the eight songs on the CD will feature original material by Vizion band members.

They are working now on an album to be recorded in the fall at his dad's studio.

On the technical side, Hardage has had the chance to mix sound for the college's rock and bluegrass fests and numerous student recording projects. He recently won the Bent Reel Award for maintaining the highest grade point average in the competitive program.

Different types of music require different approaches, he says. "If you going to mix a country band, you have to know how the country drums or guitar sounds," he explained. "SPC's sound technology program helps expand your listening habits so you will know. It opens your eyes to what the business is gonna be like when you get out of school," he added.

Hardage, who recently graduated with honors from the program, plans to return to SPC in the fall to take some basics like English and history.

After that, he may transfer to Southwest Texas State University to work toward a bachelor's degree in recording arts. And after that, he may go where many young hopefuls go - Nashville.

"The field is tough to get into, but there are a lot of options," he believes. "You can be a recording engineer, work on the video side, work at radio stations, anything to do with audio or duplicating."

SPC has shown him one thing that is industry standard "You had better be good at what you do."

Hardage has already proven that.

Low voter turnout marked the New Mexico State primary election Tuesday. Only 4,974 voters out of 13,378 total registered Curry County voters showed up at the polls.

Below are the unofficial totals released by the Curry County Clerk's office. The official canvas sheets from the state of New Mexico are expected to arrive in Coni Jo Lyman's office on June 5.

In the race for the GOP nomination for state representative, District 66, which includes Texico, Earlene Roberts, of Lovington, beat Mike Miller, of Portales, 732-633. On the Democratic ballot, Dewey Langston, of Portales, was unopposed.

Mrs. Roberts had 30 votes in Curry County to Miller's 12. Langston had 93.

State Rep. Blake B. Curtis was unopposed in his bid for the renomination from his district. Curtis received 939 votes in Curry County.

In the State Senatorial race for District 7, Paul E. Davidson got the nomination for the Democrats over John L. Morrow. Davidson had 460 votes in Curry County and Morrow had 246.

Billy J. McKibben had 478 votes from Curry County in the State Senatorial District 42 race.

In the State Senatorial District 7 race, Patrick H. Lyons had 401 votes from Curry County and Sacramento H. Baca had 32.

In the Magistrate Judge Division 1 race for the Democrat Party nomination, Caleb J. Chandler earned the nomination by beating out five other contenders. He had 2,122 votes from Curry County as compared to: Ben Salazar, 378; Henry W. Bayless, 454; Jakelyn A. Zimmerman, 312; Danny Tipton, 114, and Jerry Sparks, 388.

Gordon W. Hayes had 1,167 for the Republican party nomination for Magistrate Judge Division 1.

David Snider earned the Democratic nomination for Curry County Commissioner, District 2 with 701 votes. He was unopposed.

Paul D. Barnes earned the Democratic nomination for Curry County Commissioner, District 5 with 856 votes. He was unopposed.

Bobby Light earned the Curry County Commission District 4 nomination with 169 votes.

In the County Treasurer's race, Joyce Devours earned a place on the November ballot with 3,181 votes. In the County Clerk's race, Coni Jo Lyman got the nomination with 3,207 votes. Both are Democrats.

Randall M. Harris received the Democrat party's nomination for District Attorney in the 9th Judicial District with 2,956 votes.

Farwell has five lottery retail outlets and all were jam packed from the word go - Hughes True Value, Helton Oil,

Farwell United Drugs, Capitol Food and Allsup's.

Allsup's did the most business, especially since they were able to ship tickets here.

Allsup's reportedly had sold 25,000 \$1 tickets by Sunday noon. Some participants were \$100 winners or had "entry" tickets, which allowed them to participate, along with thousands of other folks, in the million dollar drawing.

Joe Hughes believes his store was probably the first in Texas to sell out of its tickets. All 2,000 tickets sent Hughes True Value were gone by 11:50 a.m. Friday. Some folks won \$50 plus "entry" tickets.

Hughes estimated about 85 percent of the folks buying lottery tickets were from out of this area, mostly Clovis.

Farwell United Drugs sold out its 2,000 tickets Friday afternoon. There were \$500 and "entry" winners here.

The drug store had opened at 6 a.m. Friday so it could boast the "first Texas lottery winner in Parmer County."

The first winner at the store was Mary Kay Hays, said pharmacist Donna Ratke.

Benny Haney at Capitol

Food said they sold out their 4,000 tickets the first day. They included \$100 and "entry" winners.

Margaret Mackey said she was the first winner at Capitol Food.

Gia Hardage, at Helton Oil, said most of their 2,000 tickets sold the first two days but they still had a few left Monday. They had \$50 and "entry" winners there.

All the lottery outlets were expected to get more tickets in early this week.

The Hardages believe their cattle got lead poisoning from old car batteries that were lying on their property. They said batteries are often used to start irrigation motors, then discarded.

Dr. Whitten said cattle like to lick batteries and their terminals and if enough lead gets into their system, they can die. There is preventive medicine available but it is highly expensive.

The Hardages have cleaned up the property, just north of Farwell, but want to alert other cattle owners that such debris can kill their livestock.

Since cattle can die up to 7 days after getting lead poisoning, the Hardages will be watching the rest of their small herd to see if more die.

Recipe of Week

Raspberry Almond Torte

3 eggs separated
 2/4 c. margarine
 1 1/2 c. sugar
 2 tsp. almond extract
 1 1/2 c. all - purpose flour
 2 tsp. baking powder
 1/4 tsp. salt
 3/4 c. milk
 1 jar (18 oz.) red raspberry preserves
 3 c. heavy cream
 1 c. sliced almonds, toasted.

Place egg whites in medium bowl. Whip on high speed for 2 minutes until stiff but not dry. Set aside.

Place margarine, sugar, and almond extract in a large bowl and cream on medium speed for 1 minute. Add egg yolks, one at a time, and beat after each addition. Stop and scrape bowl. Mix on medium speed for about 3 minutes. Fold egg whites into this mixture.

Pour batter into two greased and floured 9" cake pans. Bake at 325 degrees for 35-40 minutes or until a wooden pick inserted in the center comes out clean. Cool 10 minutes, then remove and cool completely on wire racks.

Place heavy cream in large bowl and whip on high speed until stiff peaks form.

Cut each cake layer horizontally in half. Place the first layer on the serving plate. Spread with 1/2 c. preserves and 3/4 c. whipped cream; repeat with second and third layers. Finally, top the remaining with 1/2 c. preserves only. With half the remaining whipped cream, frost side of torte. Evenly coat sides with almonds. Place remaining whipped cream in pastry bag fitted with 1/2 - inch star tip. Decoratively pipe around the top of the torte. Garnish with fresh raspberries and mint leaves. Refrigerate until ready to serve.

Corn to get a boost

by Bruce Hinrichs Curry County Extension Agent

Recent moisture could not have come at a better time. Sorghum producers plant and should have an excellent start on this year's crop. Corn will be given a boost from the rain and rangeland will improve rapidly.

A few pests need to be considered as the crop year progresses. Southwest Corn Borer could be a significant problem this year due to the mild winter. It would be advisable to use field scouts this year so that control measures can be applied at the correct time. Milo producers will be facing a new and tougher greenbug this year. Collections last year indicate that a resistant greenbug exists in the High Plains.

We have two sources of resistant greenbugs; those with resistance to organophosphate insecticides and those that have overcome the resistant properties of the milo itself.

Organophosphate resistant greenbugs are resistant to Lorsban, Cygon, Disyston and Ethyl Parathion. The resistant aphids usually show up in hot spots after pesticide application. If resistant hybrids were planted, evaluation of damage should be conducted throughout the growing season and controls should be applied if damage is found above the two bottom leaves.

If controls become necessary, the following guidelines are suggested: 1) Use the highest rate recommended for the particular pesticide; 2) Use tank mixes when possible; 3) Limit use of organophosphate insecticides; 4) Delay spraying as long as possible; 5) Limit use of insecticides to control corn leaf aphids and 6) Plant milo in wheat stubble because research has shown greenbugs are attracted to clean till soil.

Pakistan: a feudal land

Editor's note: Will Anderson, a Farwell resident, is in the U.S. Navy and is stationed at the U.S. Embassy in Islamabad, Pakistan. He has written some articles from life there for the Tribune.

Pakistan is a country beset by many problems. It has a population of up to 120 million, but it is difficult to be exact because there is no real infrastructure to care for the population, much less count it. What is certain is that the population will double in less than 20 years at the current birth rate, increasing the suffering here unbelievably.

This problem is compounded by a literacy rate of 8 percent or less, which is not getting any better, and the high incidence of incest for generations here. Over 70 percent of the recorded marriages here are between cousins. The Koran places women on a pedestal, to be treasured and shielded from the outside world by a protective family and veils. But in Pakistan this equates to little more than a form of slavery.

Like so many Third World countries I have seen, Pakistan has two basic classes, the incredibly rich and the miserably poor. It is said that 22 families control all of Pakistan's industry, and they are one leg of the "Unholy Trinity" that runs this country. The rural areas remain in a feudal system dating back centuries in which the land-owners have complete power over everything they see, including the life or death of their peasant labor. That is the second leg of the "Unholy Trinity."

And the third is, of course, the Moslem hierarchy. Any efforts to educate the poor, give rights to women, control population growth, or any other help is crushed as being "un-Islamic." These three control government and bureaucracy and effectively stop any efforts to improve the poor's education or condition. People who cannot read and must work constantly to just stay alive do not have the time or organization to effectively oppose the current situation.

The Pakistan military is the most broad-based institution in the country, with soldiers from every tribe and every class, giving many soldiers the first medical care and education they have ever received. The Pakistan armed forces are built along British lines, from the days of the British Raj, and operate with an order and discipline which is not seen elsewhere in this part of the world. It is also the only organization that can dare to oppose the more stringent demands of the Moslem hierarchy.

Pakistan and its huge neighbor, India, have always lived in dread of each other, with continual "sabre rattling," frequent violent clashes, and three wars since 1947. This

is based on the tension between Hindu and Moslem faiths, and bloodshed on both sides of the border in the provinces of Kashmir and the Punjab.

India's military supporter used to be the USSR, but now it is turning its eyes more and more to the USA for obvious reasons. Pakistan has a long-standing military relationship with the USA, up through the Soviet withdrawal from Afghanistan. But the decision of its civilian government to pursue the production of nuclear weapons has led to the cutoff of all military and non-military aid from the USA. That fact has made the job of trying to maintain ties to Pakistan's military very delicate.

The Moslem hierarchy holds that the mujahadeen (holy warriors) of Afghanistan defeated the Soviets. The weapons supplied to the mujahadeen by the West had nothing to do with the Soviet withdrawal, they say. They also dismiss any possibility that several decades of an arms race with the West or the inefficiencies of the Communist system had anything to do with it. Finally, they predict that the USA will soon split into several independent states, like the USSR, and that Islam will spread throughout the world.

The USA is identified as "The Great Satan" here frequently, as it is in our neighbor, Iran. When the Ayatollah Khomeini overthrew the Shah of Iran in 1979, Pakistani mobs burned this U.S. embassy to the ground. When Salmon Rushdie published his book, "The Satanic Verses" in 1988, Pakistani mobs attacked the American Center and killed 8 host nation employees.

Life in "The City of Islam" is usually pretty interesting, and it's not all that bad. The diplomatic community, friendly segments of Pakistan's society, and the Pakistani military are sources of friendship. The country is rich in history, the beauty of the Himalayas, the intrigue of South Asia.

Parmer County Commissioners discuss underpass change

The Parmer County Commissioners held a special session Tuesday to discuss a situation involving the FM 145 underpass leading to the Lazbuddie and Oklahoma Lane areas.

The Santa Fe Railroad plans to redo the bridge, adding a span. They also have proposed to widen the current one lane under the bridge to two lanes, with a beam dividing them.

The one-lane underpass originally was simply for drainage. In 1920, the railroad gave it to Parmer County so it could be used as a county road. In 1949, the county and state made a pact so that the entire road came under state supervision and maintenance.

The problem is that the way the Santa Fe is proposing to have the underpass widened won't meet state specifications for a two-lane road.

So the commissioners met

with Ray Bradley, district highway engineer, and talked to a Santa Fe official in Kansas City by telephone. The state and railroad will try to work out a feasible plan.
