Change forced

I haven't written a political column in awhile - with good reason. If you have nothing good to say, it's usually better to keep quiet.

It's too easy to tell Clinton jokes or do Clinton bashing. And Congress has stayed in its gridlock - except when it came to raising taxes (and they bragged about how it meant the end to gridlock).

An important issue facing us is national health insurance. I wrote a column several years ago supporting that concept. I haven't changed my mind.

I don't know enough of the Clinton plan to know whether that's the best way to go. There have been a bunch of plans suggested and I hope all get a good study. This is too important to rush through.

I'm sorry to see some medical groups and insurance groups opposed to national health insurance. As with most groups, they take a tunnel view of how a change would affect them.

The big picture is simple: with the move to a two-tiered economic system, the U.S. has no choice but to provide national health insurance. I've written several columns about this momentous change in U.S. society and I don't want to repeat myself. Suffice it to say that tens of millions of Americans have either lost or are losing their health insurance as we speak.

It's a bit difficult for folks living in our rural area to understand what's happening where the vast majority of Americans live - in the big cities. Folks are losing middle class jobs, with full health insurance benefits, and being forced to take minimum wage jobs, without such benefits.

Thus, the outcry for help. And politicians listen when a large number of voters are unhappy.

As for calling it "socialized medicine," that's fine with me. I don't hear any elderly folks complaining about the checks they receive from "social security" - except to say they're not enough.

Personally, I would prefer the government stay out of the health insurance picture. I would prefer a person pick their own doctor, just like today. But health care costs and insurance premiums have skyrocketed, necessitating the change.

Too bad.

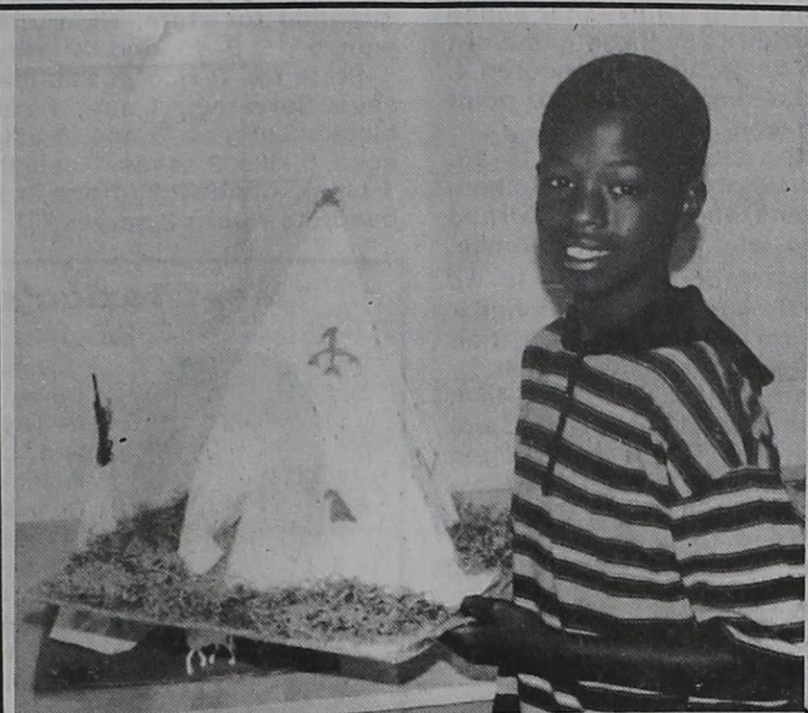
And on another issue:

I hope I don't sound like an isolationist (the term that got a bad reputation in the 1930s), but I hope the U.S. has learned some lessons from the recent troubles in Somalia and Yugoslavia.

When it comes to guerilla warfare, the U.S. is limited in how "helpful" it can be.

I'm glad we didn't send in troops to Yugoslavia. I think they would have been very ineffective in that quagmire. It's a horrifying civil war there

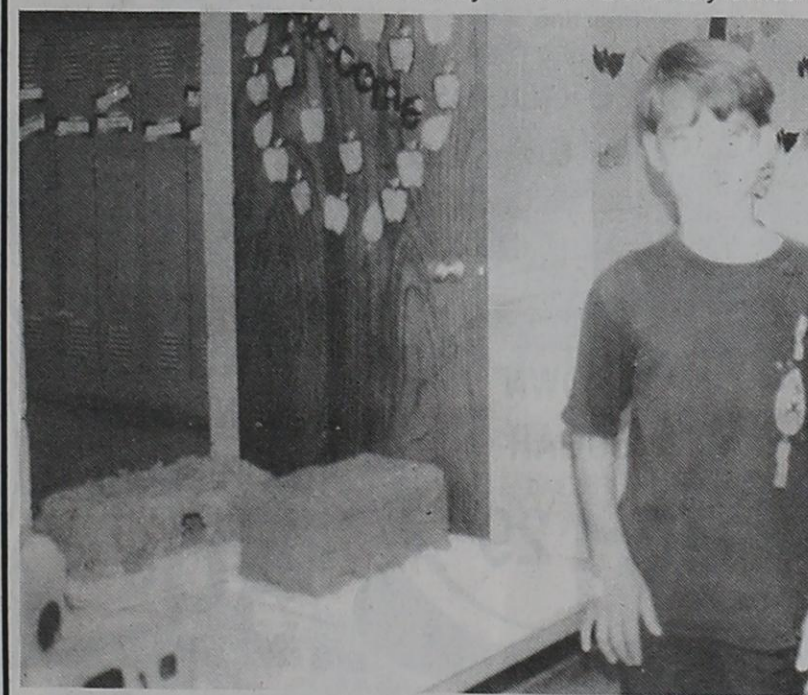
Christopher Hall holds a teepee he made for social studies.

The Clovis City Council accepted a proposal on Nov. 4 by the Texico City Council to house stray animals.

Officials meet on street work

Mayor Butch Tharp reported to the Texico City Council Tuesday on the recent city street chip seal program by Appian Construction, Hereford.

Last month, state inspectors checked the work and told Texico that the correct chip size wasn't used. So the city council turned over the matter to city engineer Bob Lydick.

Tharp said he met Tuesday with Lydick, state officials and representatives of Appian to go over the work. He said Appian agreed to do the work the state wanted done. After it's completed, the state will issue payment.

Tharp said 5 percent of the payment will be withheld until more work is done next spring by Appian.

In other business, the council:

- Approved the election resolution. Three posts are on the ballot next year: the mayor's post, currently held by Tharp; and two council posts, currently held by Max Winkles and Oran Jay Autrey.

- Accepted the low bid of a Hereford company to construct the new water well.

- Heard councilman Ronnie Warmuth commend city employee Matt Meeks for a lot of extra work he did on his own time to help the Texico Chamber plant trees at KKR Park.

- Plans to discuss at its next meeting amending the city code so more offenses can be tried in city court rather than taken to Clovis to magistrate's court.

- Held an executive session to discuss a lawsuit.

- Took no action yet on seeking an animal control officer because Texico hasn't been officially notified yet by Clovis of Clovis' allowing Texico to use the Clovis animal facility. After written notification is received, then Texico will move forward.

Texico's 1994-95 year's budget will include \$1,800 so it can pay half the price of an euthanizer, up to a maximum of \$3,000.

After Aug. 1, 1994, Texico will pay Clovis a flat fee of \$25 per animal.

The Texico Lady Spikers beat Logan in the semi-final match of the Regional Volleyball tournament at Dora Saturday to qualify for the state playoffs.

The Lady Spikers were scheduled to play Roy at Roswell Goddard High School at 9 a.m. mst on Nov. 11.

If they win that game they were scheduled to play the winner of the Ft. Sumner - Quemado game. The runnerup spot will be determined at 1:30 p.m. Saturday at Roswell High School. The final match will be played at Roswell High at 6 p.m. on Saturday.

"Somebody is going to be surprised Thursday morning," said coach Michael Littlejohn earlier this week. "Either Roy (will be surprised) that they got beat, or us that we got beat. I think the girls will be ready."

"We will be the underdog. This is a re-match of the state finals last year. They didn't lose any of their players, and we lost four starters," he said.

Logan took the first game, 15-9. The Lady Spikers got off to a slow start; they let Logan rack up 6 points before Jodi Chadwick, Texico's 4th player to serve, put 3 points on the scoreboard. Logan came back with 3 points before Dara Jenkins scored another for Texico.

The match was marked by several long volleys that ended without any points. Kelly Cooper tried to pull the game out by scoring three points, but Logan came back and scored 4. After several long volleys, Alison LaFrenz put another point on the board for Texico, but Logan won.

Texico squeaked by Logan in the second game, 15-13. Logan put 3 points on the board before the Lady Spikers managed to score. Serves by LaFrenz, and Chadwick turned the game around; Texico took the lead 10-6. On defense,

Jenkins had a fantastic spike that stopped Logan in its tracks. Servatius added a point for Texico. Then Logan had a 4 point run. Jenkins added 2 points for the Lady Spikers, then Logan scored one before Texico scored the game winner.

In game 3, Texico gained its confidence, and rolled to a quick 15-7 lead. Logan opened with a net serve, then Carol Servatius scored Texico's first 2 points. The serve changed hands four times before Misty Barnes made a terrific save to regain the serve for the Lady Spikers. Chesna Campbell added a point for Texico. Logan tried to score again, but

failed due to good defense by the Lady Spikers. Chadwick and Jenkins each added unanswered points for Texico.

Logan finally fought back to make the score 3-5. Servatius came to the line for three points. Logan fought back to a 6-8 score. LaFrenz had a fantastic six point run that gave the Lady Spikers a decisive margin. Logan took possession again. At this point Barnes made a great save just before she fell on her hand and injured it severely. Chadwick came to the line for the game points.

Logan was demoralized at the final game, 15-3. The Lady Spikers kept aching the ball, and Logan's defense crumbled. Jenkins scored the first 2 points, and Servatius scored one. Cooper served 4 points in a row, then Logan took possession for a volley. Campbell then scored 5 points in a row to take the game and the match.

Texico's Glen Neie will host a leathercraft workshop Nov. 20 at 1 p.m. at the Curry County Extension building at the fairgrounds.

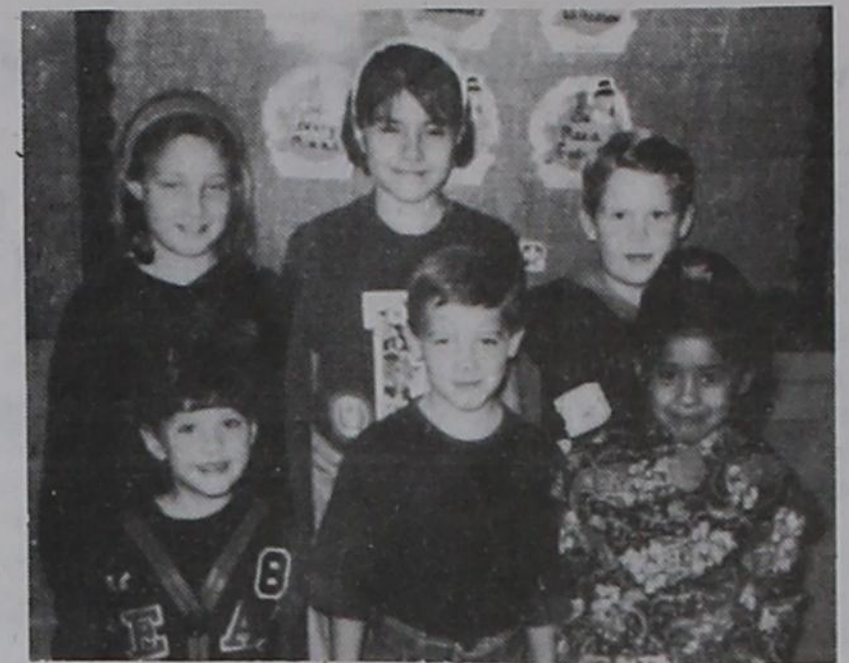
Area 4-H's are encouraged to bring their projects, and Neie will be available to give them pointers. He hopes to host one of these per month.

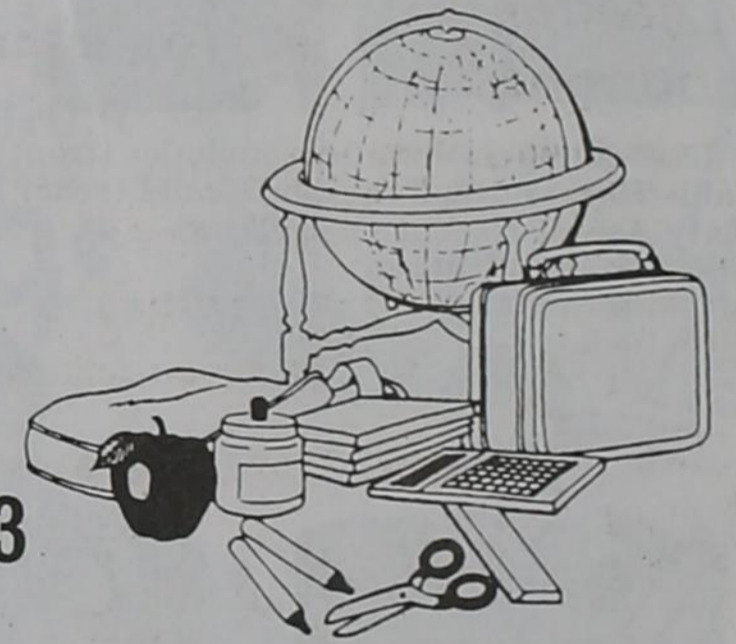

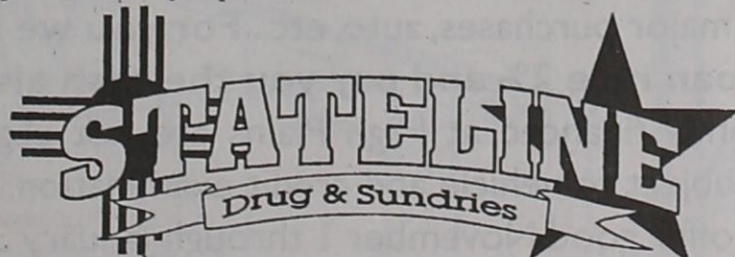

- Discussed the possibility of creating a foundation so that corporation grants could be fed into the school district.
- Changed the December meeting time to 7 p.m. Dec. 8.

Farwell School Supt. Richard Boothby had some good academic news for the School Board Tuesday.

The Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) results were announced. Among 77 regional schools, Farwell ranked 9th with 64.21 percent of its students passing all tests. The number of Farwell students tested was 95, with 61 passing all grades.

In other business, the board: - Heard Boothby give the October enrollment stats - 566 students, including 294 in the elementary school, 141 in the junior high and 131 in the high school. The average daily attendance was 546 - 96.46 percent.

- Approved a self-funded health insurance plan for employees with S & R Benefits. Funds will be kept in Farwell. - Cast its votes for Mark Schwertner to be a member of the Parmer County Appraisal District Board.

- Heard Boothby say that the construction is going well and is on schedule.

- Discussed a problem with vehicles being driven where buses are loaded. Police Chief Roy McGaa is helping with the problem.

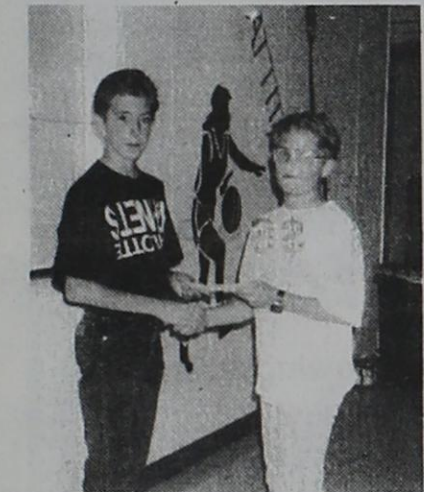

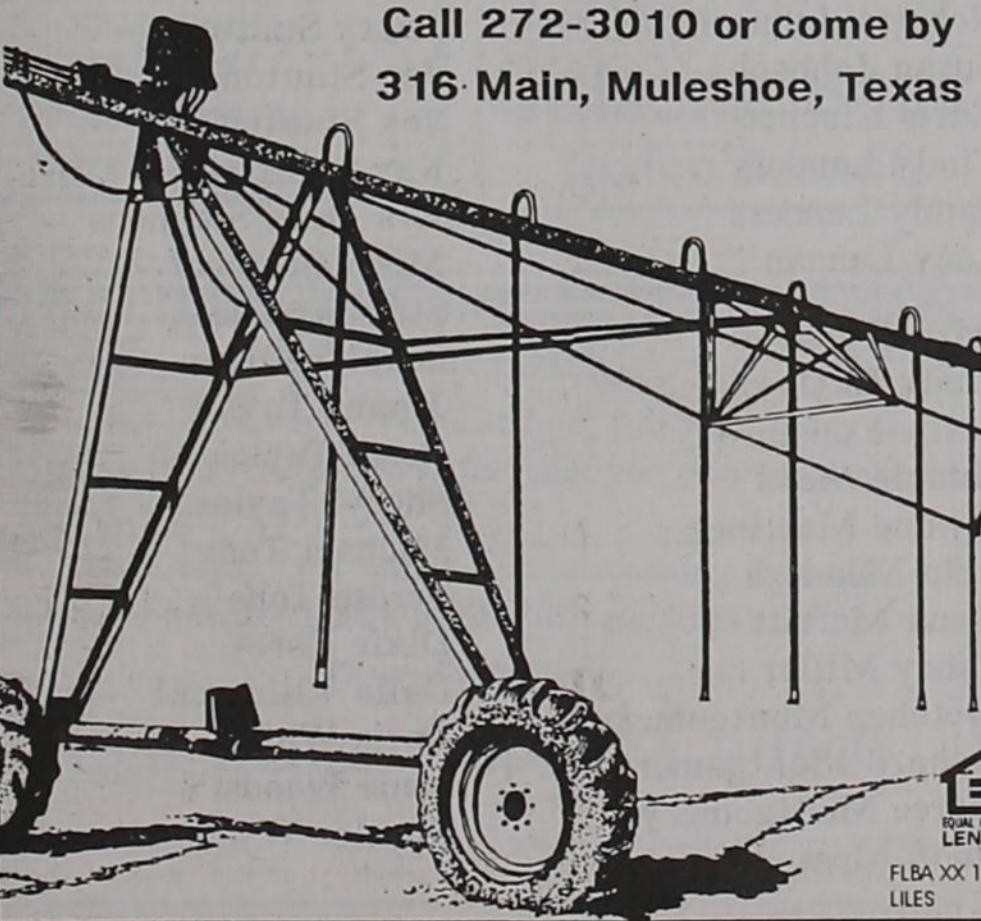

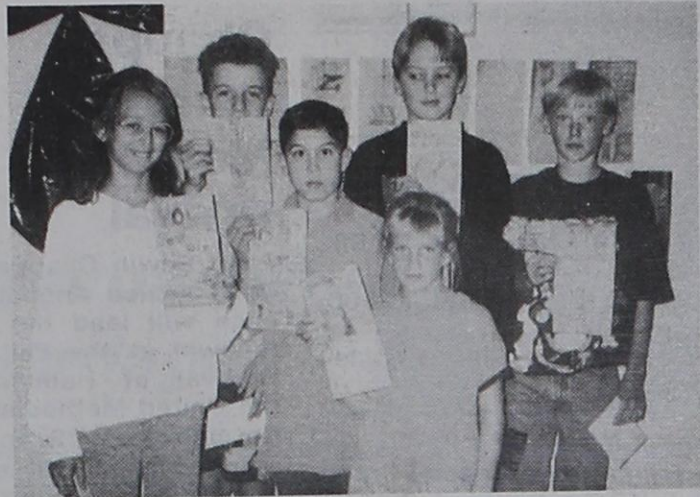

Longhorns win, make playoffs

The Lazbuddie Longhorns whipped Cotton Center last Friday to earn a state playoff berth. Lazbuddie's win over Cotton Center was 52-6 in a game stopped at halftime due to the 45-point rule. And Lazbuddie's scoring ended with a 50-yard kickoff return by McBroom after Cotton Center's lone TD (a 32-yard run). Elliott kicked the points after to have the 45-point rule take effect.

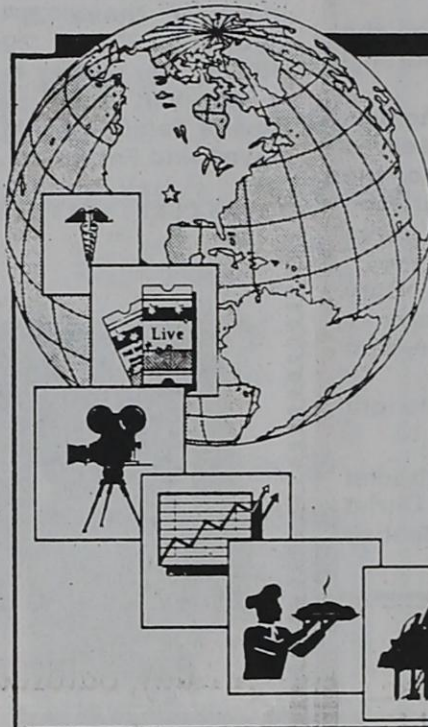
After a scoreless third quarter, both teams scored twice in the final period. First Loving tallied. The pass for extra points worked and it was 22-0.

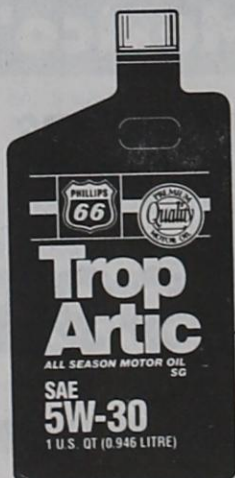

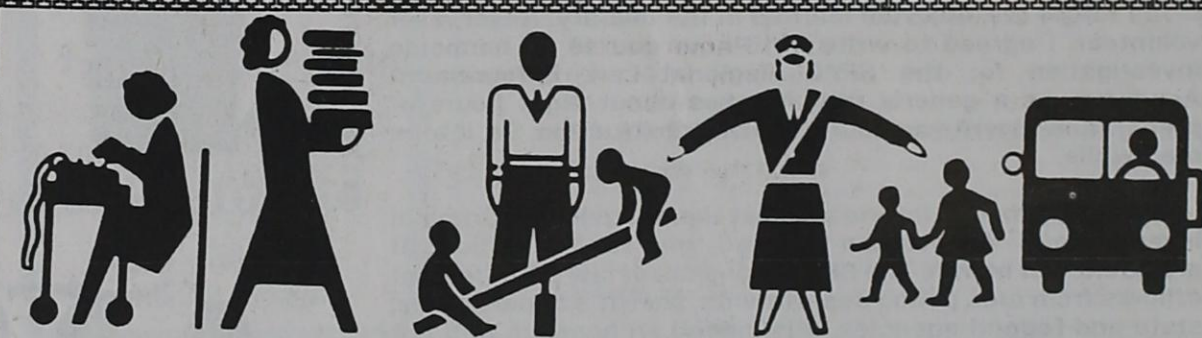

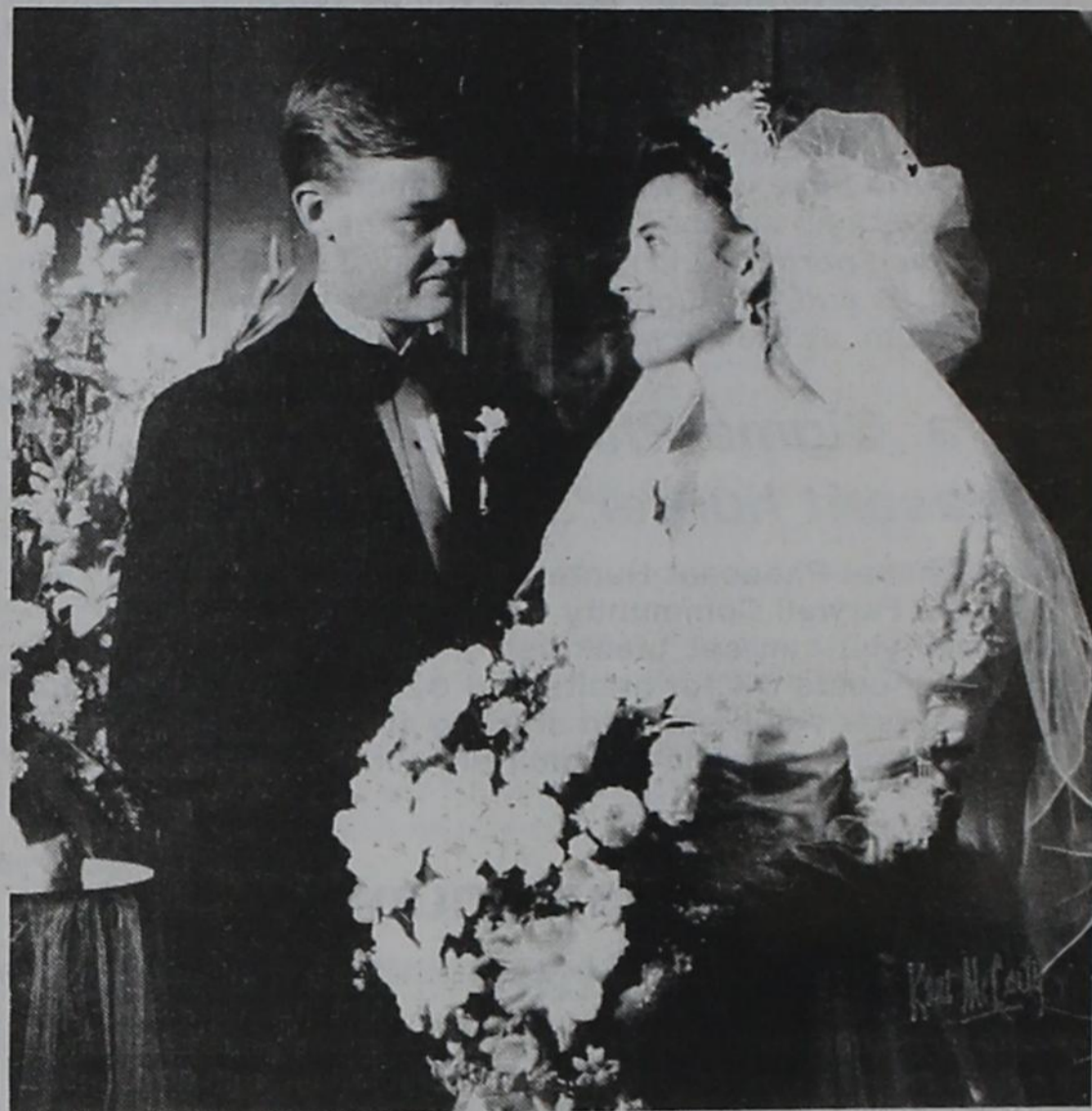
Rick Stewart, father of the groom, toasted the event and the bride and groom shared their first dance as a married

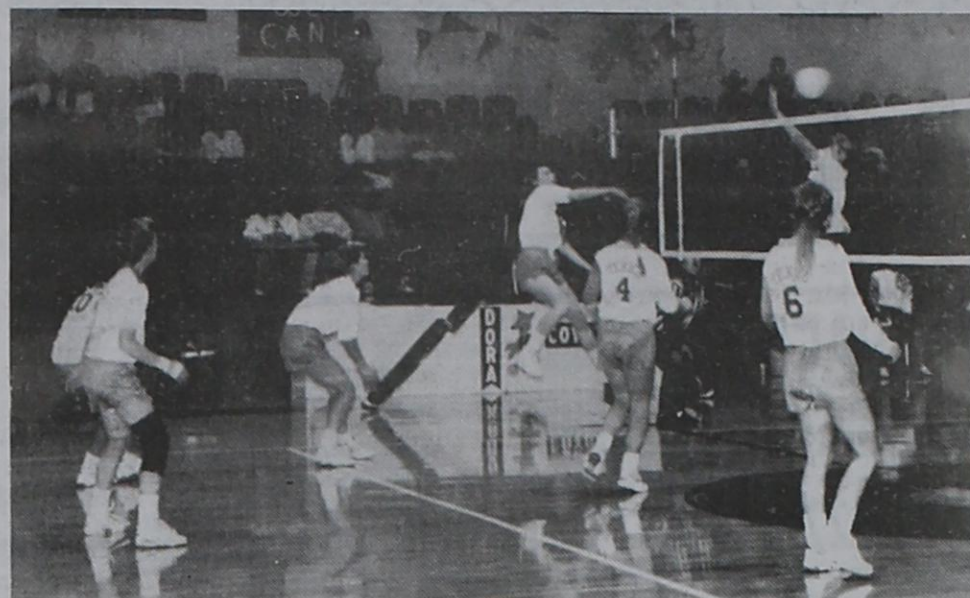

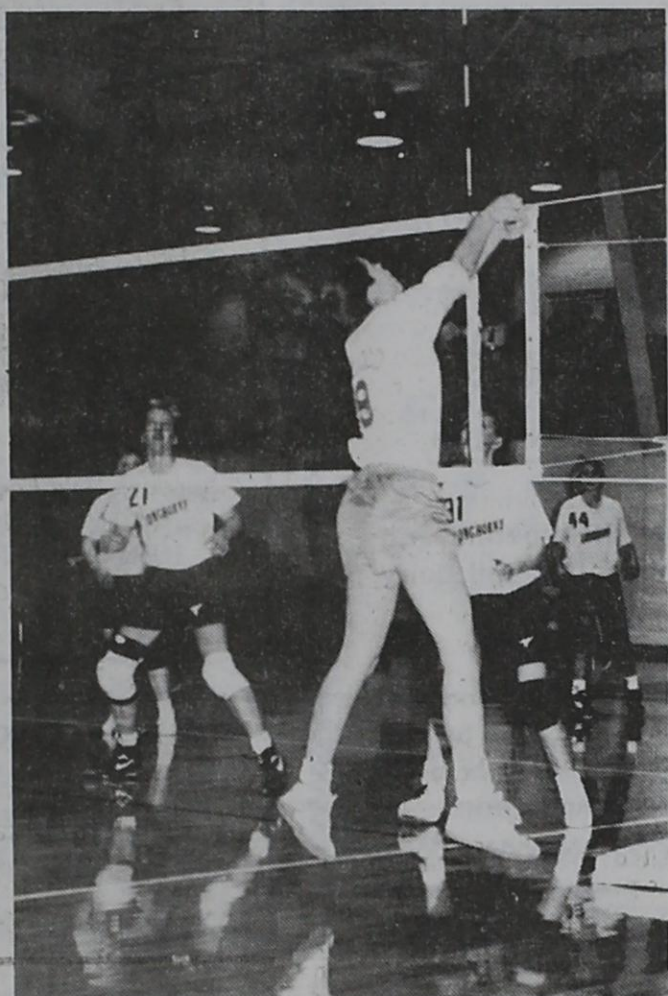

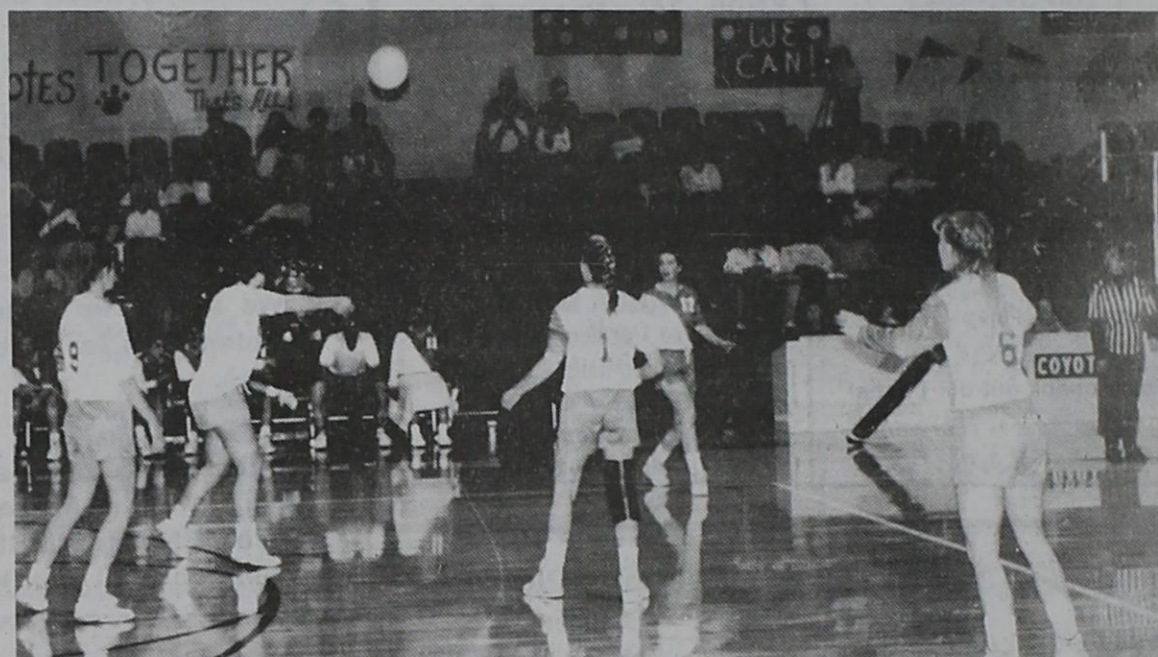
