Outstanding turn-around

Richard Murphy, the administrator of the Muleshoe Area Medical Center, spoke at last week's meeting of the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club.

After his talk, I made a couple of comments about the center to the club. And I'd like the general public to know what I said.

In the past 10 years, the Muleshoe Area Medical Center ranks as a significant triumph for our area. The folks supporting and managing the center have done a superlative job.

I remember trying to deal with the California company that was managing the center when I first arrived in this area. They went into bankruptcy. And the center was closed.

But in a fine display of community initiative, Muleshoe area business people, such as the late Bob Stovall, got together and virtually rebuilt the center from the ground up.

I recall Bob telling me of how they literally got down on their hands and knees to scrub the facility, to get state approval for re-opening it. And then the key to achieving their goal was found - a tax base.

I editorialized strongly in favor of the formation of that hospital district in order to establish the tax base that small community hospitals must have.

Voters within the Muleshoe hospital district supported the tax, enabling the center to re-open. I was very proud of these folks. Having a local hospital is vital for small communities. Not only does it provide a good payroll for the community, it simply is needed. Period.

And during a decade which saw so many small hospitals close, here we saw the reverse - the revitalization of a small city's clinic.

And, my, has it been revitalized! Key steps included:

* A working agreement with Lubbock's Methodist Hospital, which, among other things, provided an excellent administrator in Murphy.

* Expanding the medical staff, to include many services that hadn't been offered here before. For example, read the two ads that the center is running this month in the Tribune. Excellent work.

* Placing a physician at the Farwell Medical Clinic. I remember the day when Dr. Frank Kretsinger wandered into my office, saying he was interested in establishing a practice here. He had been recruited by the Muleshoe folks to come to our area.

And when Dr. Kretsinger left, another Muleshoe center physician, Dr. Nancy Chasteen, opened a practice in Farwell.

The Twin Cities are most fortunate to have the Farwell Medical Clinic. Dr. Ivins, our dentist, and Dr. Chasteen, our physician, are vital to our community's welfare.

Time, after time, we have been blessed to have a physician handy when an emergency occurs. I'll give you two personal examples:

1) I was doing some roof work with my son, Rob. After climbing the ladder, Rob jumped onto the roof - and landed on a nail. Within five minutes, we were at the Farwell Medical Clinic, where he got a tetanus shot.

2) When my mother - in-law lived with us, she suffered from emphysema and was mostly house-bound. It sure was nice when the nurse from the Farwell Med-

When tragedy strikes, folks pull together

When tragedy struck, the folks in the Pleasant Hill Community really knew how to pull together.

Saturday, when folks heard that the Burford family had gone to Lubbock to be at the hospital with Adam, the Pleasant Hill Community responded rapidly.

Ted Richardson and Jerry Martin called out to the community to respond to the Burford's needs. Richardson had known the kindness of his neighbors several years ago when he was in a tragic accident which killed one member of his family and had left him severely burned. Neighbors had pitched in and helped him in his hour of need. He wanted to help a neighbor.

About 15 to 20 men from the Pleasant Hill Community responded to their calls, and brought trucks, combines, and grain carts. They harvested the Burford's wheat crop. Ladies prepared meals for the harvest crew.

"It was really a complete community effort," said Nancy Barnes. "Almost everybody did something. They got combines and trucks and went over there and started to harvest the wheat."

"There wasn't much we could do for them at the hospital," said Richard Kelley. So the community decided to help the Burfords with their harvest.

Kelley and his family brought meals to the workers. He didn't own a combine, so they decided to make sure that everybody got fed. Wanda Kelley, Kay Singleterry and DeAnn Richardson were among those who brought sandwiches and hot meals to the fields.

Before the harvest was over, about 6 combines, 8-10 trucks and a couple of grain carts were called into action.

Many of those who helped were members of the Pleasant Hill Volunteer Fire Department. They had worked side by side with both James and Adam Burford, both of whom were members of the Fire Department.

"It's neat to see a group pull together. If somebody needs something, they all pull together," said Kelley, a member of the Pleasant Hill Fire Department. "I really appreciate those guys who go out and do that."

Even the Fire Department's tables and chairs were hauled out to the roadside so the harvest crew could have a meal. "We take care of each other out here," Mrs. Singleterry said.

Adam's grandmother, Geraldine Burford expressed her appreciation: "There's nothing like good neighbors. People have been so, so good. I guess it's just this part of the country. There is nothing like good neighbors."

The help was especially appreciated because the tragedy of losing a grandson reminded her of 29 years ago when she lost her son Johnny to leukemia at just about the same time of the year. "It was a double whammie, I remembered just like it was yesterday," she said.

Here's how golf shootout will work

One million dollars.

"This shootout is a culmination of the Texico Chamber's desire to have a unique event that would draw attention to Texico and to increase their scholarship fund," said event chairman Ronnie Warmuth. "Last year there was a unique nine hole tourney held within the city limits of Texico where a lot of fun was had and the scholarship funds were increased."

Warmuth said it was decided to include a major prize in this year's tourney in an attempt to draw even more participants. Chris Fontanilla, Farwell Country Club pro, suggested that the Chamber try the Hole-In-One Shootout format. "Chamber members agreed, and here we are on the verge of the largest activity this Chamber has ever undertaken," he added.

The possible \$1 million top prize is underwritten by the National Hole-In-One Association, a subsidiary of Aetna Insurance Co. Sponsorships of Platinum - \$100, Gold - \$50; Silver - \$25, and Bronze - \$10 are being sold to help defray the expenses of the Shootout. There will be a large Sponsor Board at the tee box and ads in the local paper listing these people and businesses who help to make this activity a success, said Warmuth.

There will be golf carts to shuttle golfers back and forth to the second hole. Tee times can be reserved by calling 481-9210 or golfers will be taken on a first come, first serve basis. Further information can be obtained by calling Warmuth at 482-9465.

There will be a concession stand sponsored by the Chamber and the Texico Community Activities Organization at the tee box.

License plates to be checked

The Farwell City Council meeting Tuesday:

- Agreed to send a memo to all city residents at the end of the month telling them that if they live in the city and have illegal New Mexico license plates on their vehicles, they will be fined.

Councilman Jimmie Mace said he rode his bicycle throughout Farwell Monday and counted 187 New Mexico license plates on vehicles inside the loop - not counting vehicles in the streets that appear to be visitors.

City Police Chief Roy McGaa will be in charge of enforcement.

- At the request of Mayor Chris Gikas, approved rejuvenating the Neighborhood Watch program. Gikas will ask Frances Kube and councilwoman Ysleta Kittrell to head this project up. Mrs. Kube had headed this program several years ago. "It failed the last time because we didn't have a good method for reporting. But now we have a city police officer," said Gikas.

- Agreed to Gikas' request to alleviate a problem of youths driving their bicycles unsafely in the city. Mace will head up this project, that may include a bicycle rodeo and licensing.

- Heard Mrs. Kittrell ask for an ordinance banning the parking of 18-wheelers and cattle trucks on city streets overnight. She said several folks have complained to her about this. Noxious odors from cattle trucks was discussed, too. The council will hold a public hearing at the start of its July 19 meeting to get public input on the proposal.

- Approved a small hike in Southern Union Gas rates (see legal ad elsewhere in today's Tribune).

- Approved 5 building applications: Leroy Jupe, 200 2nd St., a garage; Donald Jones, 202 7th St., a carport; Bill Boling, 408 Ave. B, a storage building; Furrow's Construction, 301 6th St., a house; and Jerry Stover, 610 3rd St., housing addition.

- Scheduled a hearing at its July 19 meeting on a mobile home variance request from Alma Rutiga at 306 7th St.

- Tabled discussion on Communicare, a method where home-bound folks are checked on by telephone.

- Told residents on Manana Street it was okay for them to plant trees in the center area of the street, but the city won't maintain the trees.

- Approved having Lee's Electric put in new lighting at City Hall.

- Approved the bid of O.D. Cole to paint the inside of City Hall. Cole bid \$2,385. Other bidders were: Melvin Venable, \$2,200; Joe Castillo, \$1,540, and Preferred Painters, Clovis, \$1,777.

- Heard McGaa report he was updating the policy manual. He also presented information on a curfew for minors, if needed. It was modeled after the Dallas ordinance, which passed U.S. Supreme Court scrutiny. The curfew would be from midnight to 5 a.m. Sundays through Thursdays, and from 1 a.m. to 5 a.m. Fridays and Saturdays. It allowed for exemptions for adequate reasons. No action was taken.

- Approved seeking bids for the annual street patching program.

- Approved paying the city's animal catcher \$10 per skunk. If the call comes from just outside the city limits, it's the employee's decision on whether to go on the call; if he does, the persons requesting the service must pay the \$10.

- Heard Water Supt. Dee Hammit say that folks are stacking limbs and junk next to the dumpsters - and the city won't pick it up. It's up to the residents to get rid of it. For Border Town Days, the city will have the landfill open free of charge on July 16 for large items.

Lazbuddie 'trades where the money comes from'

The Lazbuddie School Board on June 14 entered into contracts with the Bledsoe and Follette school systems to transfer some of Lazbuddie's Weighted Average Daily Attendance (WADA) in exchange for increased funding. Bledsoe will get 35 WADA for \$51,000; Follette will get 62 WADA for \$81,000. According to Supt. Phil Warren, the 97 WADA represents about half of what Lazbuddie has to sell.

He said Texas lets wealthy school districts to purchase WADA from poorer school districts instead of the state having to fund the poorer school districts.

"We trade where money comes from; it comes from wealthy districts, instead of the state," said Warren. These funds must be used for certain things, and not for other things.

Staffing decisions were made for the 1994-95 school year. They included:

Phil Warren, superintendent and elementary principal; Hardy Carlyle, fulltime secondary school principal; Roxann Hurst, cafeteria manager; Carey Suduth, coach; Jonessa Brockman, computer teacher, half days; Sandra Garza, fulltime Spanish teacher; Gwen Warren, fulltime counselor; Lynn Eldon Randolph, bus mechanic.

The board also:

- Accepted John Black's resignation as coach.

- Said the current salary structure will remain in place until August, at which time raises will be given.

- Agred to re-roof the vocational ag building.

- Approved participation in the Parmer County JETT (Job Education Training and

Pleasant Hill teen-ager accidentally killed

"It was just a tragic accident. Everyone I talked to had nothing but praise for him; he was a good kid," said Curry County Sheriff Jim Jackson of Adam Burford.

Burford, 17, a Texico High School student, accidentally shot himself in the head last Friday evening. The incident occurred while playing with his younger brother and some friends.

"It was very traumatic for his little brother to witness," said Jackson. "Something like this is always a tragedy, but it is especially so when they are so young."

According to Jackson, the Curry County Sheriff's department was called to the scene at 7:30 p.m. mdt on Friday. The death was ruled accidental by Justice of the Peace Jim Hanson of Lubbock.

Burford was the son of James and Robin Burford of Pleasant Hill. He was vice-president of FFA, and played football at Texico High School.

Harvest under way

"We're really beginning to get in the swing of it," said Fred Chandler of the wheat harvest which began last week. Chandler is the manager of the Sherley Anderson Pitman Grain Elevator in Farwell.

Chandler characterizes the harvest as "probably average." It's been running 40-60 bushels per acre with a list weight of 59-60, and moisture content of 11-13.

"The price has been holding fair," Chandler added on Monday. He reported that Larry Timms brought in the first load on June 14.

Billy Mayfield brought the first load of wheat to the Sherley Anderson Elevator in Lariat.

Lonnie McFarland, manager of the Lariat Elevator reports that the harvest really had not gotten started in that area. "We're getting mostly dryland corners," he said. Rain has slowed the harvest down a bit, but the irrigated wheat which has come in looked fair.

E.T. Jennings brought the first load of wheat to the Sherley Grain elevator in Lazbuddie, and Jerry Engeling brought the first load into

Texico art teacher Billie Cooper has been nominated for the New Mexico Governor's Award for excellence and achievement in the Arts. The awards will be presented at a special ceremony in October.

Mrs. Cooper hasn't always been an artist. She never had an art lesson until she was 43 years old. She was a housewife and mother who worked beside her husband on their farm and ranch near Portales for many years.

When her husband died, Mrs. Cooper continued to run the ranch. She also began to dabble with arts and crafts, and then she decided to go back to school for her formal art education at Eastern New Mexico University.

She has shown her creations at arts and crafts shows around the state of New Mexico. She is known for ceramics, hand painted clothing, oil paintings, and jewelry. Most of her work has a definite Western flavor.

But, Mrs. Cooper is recognized more for the work her students have done than for her own work. "That's what I am - I'm a teacher," she says.

Mrs. Cooper has been teaching art at Texico High School for the past 10 years. During that time she has seen her students show their work at the Curry County Fair, the New Mexico State Fair, and Clovis Community College. Recently, Texico Elementary School students swept the Clovis Community College's drug poster contest.

Artwork by one of Mrs. Cooper's students, Chesna Campbell, is featured in a display of high school art from the state of New Mexico. In the past, two of her students did artwork which was featured on the New Mexico All School Art Poster.

The past two years, Texico High School art students have painted murals on the walls of the school. The high school library's murals show the type of information which is found in each section of a library arranged by the Dewey Decimal System. The elementary school library features pictures from favorite children's stories.

Mrs. Cooper's philosophy of teaching art is simple: students learn by doing. She accepts each student as he is when he comes into her class, and she helps the students to develop their talents. Students work at a variety of projects which are designed to develop their skills.

"They will all know how to draw better when they leave my class than they did when they came in," she says.

Terra International is building a new fertilizer plant to replace its current one on Hwy. 84 between Farwell and Muleshoe.

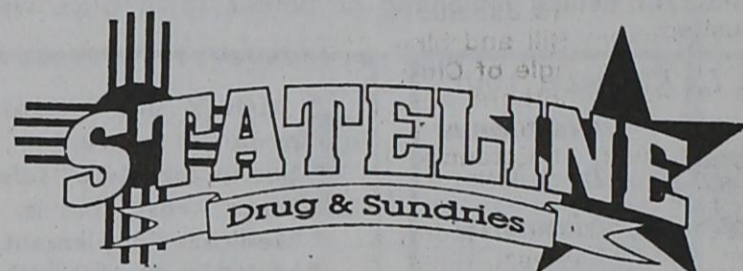
The current overhead tower was built more than 30 years ago. It will still be used for loading trucks and train cars, but the new facility will give the company more room for mixing and storing Riverside fertilizer.

"It's been here so long, it's past its time and it's not nearly efficient enough," said Eruce Bruns of the old Terra International tower.

"We can mix and blend and get it out quicker," said Bruns of the new building.

The south side of the new building will be used for storage, and the north side will be used for the blender. There will be an alleyway between the two parts. The whole building will be covered with a roof offset over the south side.

The project may be finished in July. "It's taking longer than they thought," said Bruns.

You can dial '806' soon, but mandate effective Jan. 3

This information came from West Texas Rural Telephone: Area customers of telephone service providers, such as WTRT, should know that, effective July 3, it will be permitted to include the 806 area code when making a long distance call within the 806 area code.

And, effective Jan. 3, 1995, including the area code on all long distance telephone calls will no longer be optional. Customers will have to dial 1-806 and the number for all long distance calls within the 806 area code, according to Keith Hacker, central office foreman for WTRT.

Hacker says that even calls placed from one local exchange to another, such as the Frio exchange to the Oklahoma Lane exchange, or local long distance class, such as Hereford to Canyon or Friona to Hereford, will require 11-digit dialing. Seven digit local calls such as from Hereford to local exchanges of West Texas Rural Telephone will remain unaffected.

The permissive 11-digit dialing beginning in July will allow customers to become accustomed to the procedure. Customers will continue to dial 11 digits for long-distance calls into other area codes, just as is done at present.

Prompted by the addition of new area codes, the changeover to 11 digit dialing will affect individual and business telecommunications. Presently, all area codes in North America have been assigned. Growing use of cellular telephones, FAX machines, pagers and additional lines, all of which require more phone numbers, have accounted for using up the area code numbers.

Bellcore, administrator of the North American Numbering Plan that determines how area codes and telephone numbers are assigned to businesses and individuals, has created new area codes to address the situation.

New codes will be phased in beginning January of 1995, and will have a middle digit of 2 through 9, where previously, all area codes had a 0 or 1 as the middle digit.

Southwestern Bell reports that when the new area code plan is introduced, many office phone systems, including PBX's and Key Systems, will be unable to process some types of calls unless appropriate changes are made. Any necessary changes to PBX or Key System equipment to accommodate the new 11-digit dialing pattern and new area codes must be complete by Jan. 3, 1995. Failure to make these necessary changes could cause businesses to be unable to make and receive certain long - distance calls. Administrators of WTRT and its WT Services, Inc. subsidiary want member/ customers to be aware of this change in plenty of time to plan and prepare for it.

Local phone system customers are encouraged to contact Paul Hamilton of Interconnect division of WT Services, Inc. South Highway 385, Hereford, as soon as possible to determine if their phone systems may require modification in order to function under the 11-digit dialing pattern.

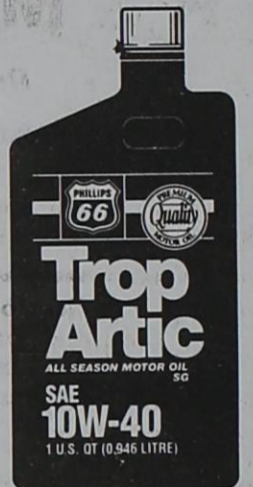


