Innovative teaching

Teaching our children has become increasingly more challenging these days.

Teachers have to compete with television, videos, computers and other electronics to capture their students' attention.

However, two teachers at Farwell Elementary have done just that - they have their students' attention and, perhaps even better, their cooperation.

Mrs. Taylor and Mrs. Faulkner both teach 3rd grade. Their classes don't just sit at their desks and write down what the teacher says. They get involved in their studies; they get their hands and minds working and they do it together.

Mrs. Taylor and her class recently completed a section in her science lessons dealing with how simple machines work. Not content to just let her class see them in a book or to hear about them, she let her class research, design and build their own machines.

"We used books from the library that dealt with the subject and the kids went from there," she said. "They had to look up a machine, understand the pattern and what made the machine work."

The class turned out such projects as pulleys, levers, wheels and axles and gears. They were all made from items around the house and classroom. Nothing fancy, just all really practice.

"The kids really got into doing this because they got to see just how things work and how much work goes into the building of machines. I'm very proud of them," said Mrs. Taylor.

Mrs. Faulkner's class took a more poetic approach to learning. She combined lessons in biology, computers, english, grammar, history, mathematics and art into segments that would culminate in one complete project.

The class is studying the animal kingdom and the different classes of species. They had to research the different categories, classes and species and then make a picture chain that explained the species they chose to represent. The class then got into teams of two and had to take a particular species and describe them through Haiku.

Haiku is a form of poetry from Japan that deals primarily with things in nature. The entire poem is usually comprised of 17 syllables. The first line contains five syllables, the second line has seven and the third line has five. It is from the Tokugawa period of Japanese history dated 1603-1867.

The teams developed and wrote their Haiku with the information they had gained through their scientific research.

Then the team had to take the written words and type them into the computers and print out a typewritten copy.

"This is harder than it sounds," said Mrs. Faulkner, "these kids don't have very big hands and learning and working from the homerow keys is quite a task. It was great to see how hard the teams worked together in developing their Haiku's. They sounded out the syllables, made sure the sentences were grammatically and structurally correct. They seemed to really enjoy the experience."

When you call, be prepared to provide the operator with the following:

The name exactly as it is listed and the city or section under which it is shown, the previous/current address and the social security number of the owner.

If you prefer to write, provide the following:

The name exactly as spelled and city shown in the publication, all previous addresses for the last five years or more, including any post office boxes, social security

D.A.'s investigation ends; no charges brought

Last November, Texico Mayor Butch Tharp reported that threats were made against him and Dan Walterscheid, then city animal control officer. He asked for an investigation by the Curry County District Attorney's office.

D.A. Randall Harris told the Tribune Tuesday that state investigator Joe Caseraz was assigned to the case.

Harris said Caseraz investigated and spoke to numerous individuals about the case. He was unable to find evidence that substantiated these alleged threats and was, therefore, unable to bring any charges.

Harris said the case is now closed.

Harris also mentioned that Tharp and Walterscheid were both made aware of the findings of the investigation and were both satisfied with the investigation.

Texico Schools eye new mandates

Recently, members of the Texico School Board were faced with dealing with two government mandates involving the adoption of policies concerning gun control and sexual harassment within the school district.

Dr. R.L. Richards, superintendent of Texico Schools explained that the Federal government is now requiring local school districts within states that receive federal funding to adopt the Gun Free Schools Act.

This act was passed by Congress in September 1994 and the attorneys for the Texico Schools suggested that the district adopt this policy as soon as possible.

The act defines weapons and firearms and the distances involved in enforcing the act for the schools.

A weapon is defined as a firearm, knife, explosive or any look-alike object that resembles an object for potentially violent use.

A firearm is defined as a weapon or anything that expels a projectile. This definition includes starter guns.

The only area of the policy, as it is set before the board, that is a barrier to completely accepting the act, is in the wording that no weapons or firearms may be within 1000 feet of the school grounds. This poses quite a problem for the

district because this distance begins to overlap into the residential areas of Texico. Also the fact that Texico serves a wide rural area where firearms are almost a necessity to control wild animals and predators and many students drive their families farm/ranch vehicles that carry firearms to school.

At the present time, the policy is being carefully studied and with the help of board members Byron and Bruce Mayfield, a more common sense approach is being outlined and developed before the policy is strictly enforced.

The act also outlines the disciplinary actions that the district will be allowed to take in enforcing the policy.

The State of New Mexico is also mandating that the district adopt a formal Sexual Harassment policy. The board is having to develop this policy according to state guidelines. The policy is being formulated along the same lines as many other standard harassment policies.

The policy gives the guidelines for recognizing and reporting harassment and for investigating the complaints. In order to carry out this policy, the board formed a sexual harassment committee. They will be responsible for investigating any complaints filed.

Arthur Salguero, counselor for Texico Schools, is currently developing 2 one-hour workshops on identifying and reporting sexual harassment.

No formal sexual harassment policy has been accepted as of yet by the school board, but work is continuing on developing the final draft.

If parents have any questions concerning these policies, Dr. Richards urges them to come by his office to review them.

Texico cleanup goes on

Bit by bit, the property cleanup in Texico is continuing.

City Clerk Marie Christian reported that one of the properties with problems has been cleaned up completely, in the 700 block of Turner Street. The old shack and torn-down fencing have been removed, along with junk on the property.

At the last City Council meeting, City Marshal Gil Holguin had reported that persons who had been cited for cleanup violations had until March 1 to comply. He said little or no progress had been made to comply.

On March 1, Holguin and Municipal Court Judge George Herington inspected the sites involved. Herington said that progress is being made and he extended his deadline for compliance to April 3. Involved are:

Boll weevil referendum topic

Information on the High Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Referendum will be provided March 17 at the Farwell Community Center, said county extension agent Gary Patterson.

The two-hour meeting will be conducted by the Texas Ag Extension Service and starts at 10 a.m. It provides two continuing education units toward re-certification requirements for private pesticide applicators, also.

Parmer County's Brant Baugh will present information on the present boll weevil situation and the proposed referendum so that cotton producers can make an informed decision when they vote in April. A representative of Plains Cotton Growers will give a presentation to further stress the critical nature of the situation and provide more details of the referendum and program operation.

The boll weevil has taken advantage of four consecutive mild winters, resulting in unprecedented numbers of weevils surviving to infest cotton in the early summer. That, combined with the CRP, has led to expansion of the weevil throughout the South Plains.

Farwell and Texico Schools will be out for Spring Break March 13 - 18.

Burn time now

Producers interested in burning Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) land need to do so soon, says Plains Cotton Growers.

PCG officials warn that time is short because of the narrow window available for producers. Winter months provide the best time for burning CRP grassland since the plants are dormant and do not suffer any adverse effects from the practice.

Burning also provides producers with several added benefits in addition to promoting healthier stands. The benefits include control of weeds and control of certain insect pests that can use the accumulated thatch as winter cover.

An example of this is the boll weevil which has been able to effectively use CRP grass for overwintering in some areas of the High Plains.

Recipe of Week

Southern Sweet Potato Bread

- 1 1/2 cups sifted Martha White self-rising flour
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 cup sugar
- 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 2 tablespoons milk
- 1 cup mashed cooked sweet potatoes
- 1 cup chopped pecans
- 1/2 cup golden raisins

Preheat oven to 325 degrees F. Grease bottom only of an 8 1/2 x 4 1/2 x 2 1/2 inch loaf pan. Stir together flour and spices in mixing bowl. With a spoon, stir in sugar, eggs, oil and milk; blend well. Stir in sweet potatoes, pecans and raisins. Pour batter into prepared pan. Bake 1 hour and 10 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pan 15 minutes. Remove from pan and cool on wire rack. For easier slicing, wrap loaf and store overnight in a cool place. Bread mellow over time and will keep for several days. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

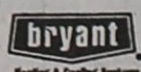

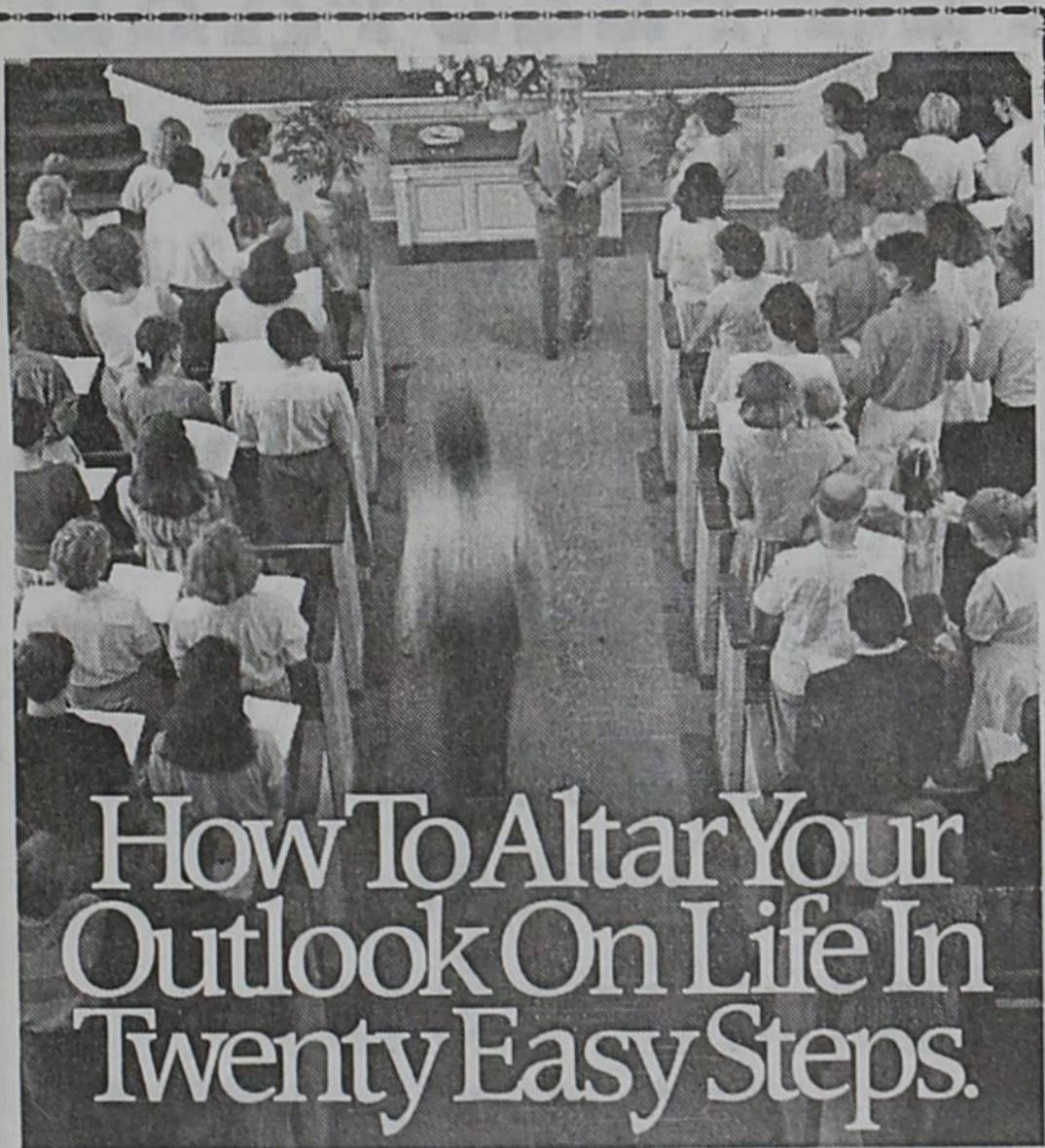

Combust battles Endangered Species Act

Cong. Larry Combust, who represents Parmer County, succeeded Feb 23 in winning unanimous House approval of a bi-partisan provision that will prevent additions to the Endangered Species Act, a law that expired in 1992, but continues unchecked.

The examples given to support this amendment were the facts that, in Texas, a two-inch minnow threatens use of a region's water supply if U.S. Fish and Wildlife efforts continue under the Endangered Species Act. Combust cited enormous federal fines for what regulators could classify as excess pumping of groundwater, as well as punishing individuals with one year jail sentences and \$100,000 on up fines.

The measure extends the regulatory moratorium for new listings or restriction of land use under the Endangered Species Act until the expired Act is re-written or until Dec. 31, 1996.

Grau targets ENMR

Last Friday, the New Mexico House of Representatives voted 59-2 to alter the way Eastern New Mexico Rural Telephone Cooperative holds its elections.

State Rep. Wesley Gray, D-Grady, has pushed a bill to prohibit co-op employees from voting in board elections. Grau said most of the estimated 200 employees don't live within the area served by ENMR but are allowed to vote.

The bill will now be considered by Senate committees. The matter has become controversial with Grau saying the salary paid ENMR's director, Robert Harris, is way out of line with managers of other co-ops. Also Grau questioned whether ENMR needs aircraft and a helicopter.

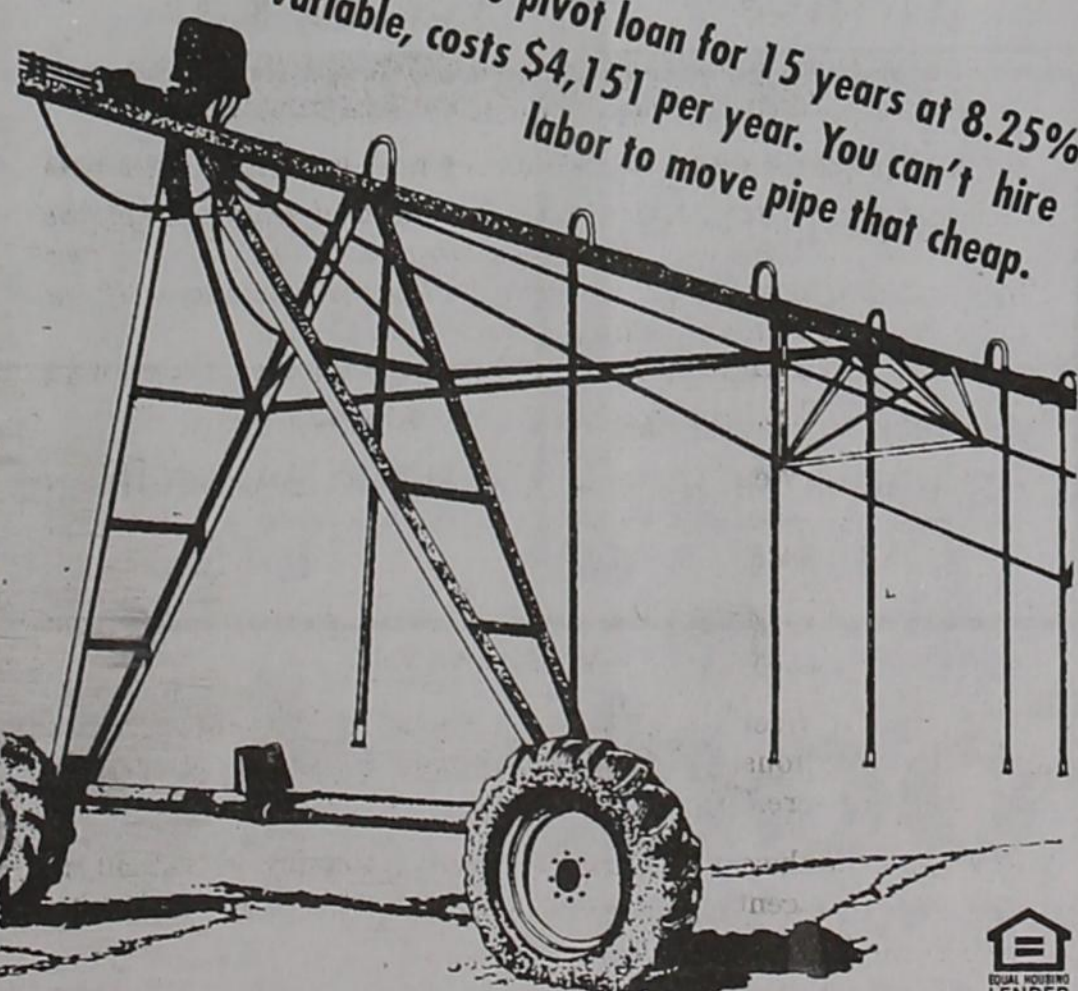
