New patrol car is Farwell topic

The Farwell City Council on Tuesday discussed the possibility of purchasing a new patrol car for Chief Roy McGaa.

McGaa said the car needs a new transmission which would cost a great deal, plus the car is several years old.

Mayor Jimmie Mace appointed a committee to look into it.

In other business, the council:

--Reviewed the dog/cat ordinance and noted that state law says that if the owner of the offending pet can provide proof of immunization then the animal is not required to be quarantined after biting someone. Council members will look into other possible policies for vicious animals and discuss this next meeting.

--Approved a building

Community Center fee schedule changed

No one attended a public hearing called by the Texico City Council Tuesday on complaints dealing with the new community center guidelines and rules.

But the council voted to change its fee structure, discarding its hourly rates for center usage.

The new fee schedule is:

-- \$100 deposit, refundable if proper cleanup is done.

-- \$50 to rent the center for half a day (six hours).

-- \$100 for all-day rental.

In other business, the council:

-- Voted to seek a janitor for the community center.

-- Heard Mayor Nathan Tharp say the animal control officer quit -- he didn't have time to do the job. Tharp will check with another person who had applied for the post to see if he wants it. If he doesn't, the post will be advertised.

-- Noted a survey problem exists in the block where Ronnie Warmuth is trying to sell his house. It seems survey lines are off close to 10 feet in a north-south direction for the whole block, it was stated. The city is not involved.

County doesn't give tax abatement to new business

The subject of tax abatements to businesses coming to Parmer County was the chief topic discussed at the Parmer County Commissioners meeting on Monday.

On May 12, the Friona City Council unanimously accepted a tax abatement proposal for Sparkle Cleaners. The abatement terms are: year 1, 100%; year 2, 100%; year 3, 75%; year 4, 50%; and year 5, 25%.

Those totals are according to the Friona procedures based on a minimum of five new jobs and/or a \$50,000 capital investment.

The county commissioners didn't grant Sparkle a tax abatement. Instead, the commissioners voted unanimously to act on individual requests as they come up and not set up tax abatement guidelines and criteria at this time.

Under Texas "home rule" guidelines, cities can offer tax abatements. The same proposals are then given to other governmental bodies, such as hospital districts, school boards and county commissioners.

Under Friona policies, any requests for tax abatements must be reviewed by a committee comprised of representatives of the city, school district, county, hospital district, Friona Economic Development Corporation and the county appraisal district. The committee makes a recommendation to the city based on several criteria, such as community, employment and fiscal impacts.

In other business, the commissioners:

-- Purchased new road graders for the Friona precinct, from Yellowhouse Machinery, and for the Bovina precinct, from West Texas Equipment.

-- Purchased a new backhoe for the Lazbuddie precinct, from Yellowhouse Machinery.

-- Approved participation by the Parmer County extension service in a state cost-sharing program to buy new computers. The split is 60-40.

--Discussed approval of the D.A.R.E. (drug education) contract for the 1997-98 school year but delayed any action until the school makes a decision about the program.

--Heard that two requests have been made by residents outside the city limits to be included in the mosquito spraying. Street Supt. Dee Hammit will see about setting up a fee for this service for those outside Farwell.

--Discussed a request for another street light by the old Dairy Queen building. The council will check on price and decide next meeting.

--Talked about the possibility of an ordinance defining the parking of RV's in the city but won't take action until the July meeting.

-- Noting the survey problem, it was said that a trailer moved into the city last year is partially in the street right of way.

-- Discussed plans to revise the city ordinance dealing with fences. This includes the distance of the fence to city right of ways, height, color, and material used. A new material may be required. corrugated tin may be outlawed. This will be further discussed at the next meeting.

-- Heard that city engineer Robert Lydick has suggested putting the new city hall on the south end of the community center.

-- Is moving ahead on plans to swap lots with Citizens Bank -- giving the bank the lots where the city barn is and getting five lots north of Rip's Western Wear in return for a new city barn area. Appraisals will be taken.

-- Heard that an all-weather road will be put in for the new fire substation. Bids were opened on caliche. Tharp has volunteered to put the caliche down.

--Heard that the building inspector will look at the buildings at Wheeler and Garwood

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Mediation ordered in Gustin case

U.S. District Court Judge Mary Lou Robinson on June 6 ordered that the Charlie Gustin law suit against the Farwell School District be turned over to a mediator for possible resolution.

In the order sent the school board, Judge Robinson said the "court finds it appropriate for mediation."

The judge wants the school board attorney to furnish her with the names of three potential mediators, and the American Civil Liberties Union, which represents Gustin, to do likewise.

All discussions in mediation will be private and confidential, the judge said.

Judge Robinson said she wants to try to have the suit settled in July.

Charlie, who graduated from Farwell High in May, refused to go along with the school district's new drug testing policy for students participating in extra-curricular activities, saying it was unconstitutional.

Charlie is enrolled at the University of Texas. His suit was filed on his behalf last winter by his parents, Donnie and Mary Gustin, of Farwell.

A court date for the lawsuit was set for October.

The original suit had named the individual school board members as defendants but Judge Robinson has them removed from the suit last month.

Two perish in ambulance accident

A Farwell woman died following an accident late Monday afternoon.

Dorothy Lovelace, 74, was being transported by a Clovis ambulance from Clovis hospital to a Lubbock hospital when the ambulance went off the highway during a heavy rain and flipped over.

She was pronounced dead at Lubbock Methodist Hospital.

Also, an ambulance attendant, Tim Martin, 39, of Portales, died Tuesday at University Medical Center in Lubbock after being critically injured in the accident.

The driver, Paul Adams, 29, of Farwell, was treated and released from Lubbock Methodist.

The accident occurred eight miles northwest of Shallowater on U.S. 84.

Early reports indicate that the ambulance was travelling within the speed limit and that the ambulance was the only vehicle involved in the accident.

Texico discusses athletic philosophy

The Texico School Board and about 14 parents had a good discussion Tuesday on the school's athletic philosophy.

Currently, athletes play on different levels. Junior high players can be on varsity teams. Some teams are composed of 7th, 8th and 9th graders.

Questions raised included: What is best for the kids? Should the goal be to win every game or build a program? Should kids play at one level (i.e., 7th graders play against 7th graders, 8th graders against 8th graders, etc.) or should teams be as competitive as possible? Is it important to let all kids play?

Some parents supported keeping athletes at one level, while others wanted teams to be as competitive as possible. The board took no action.

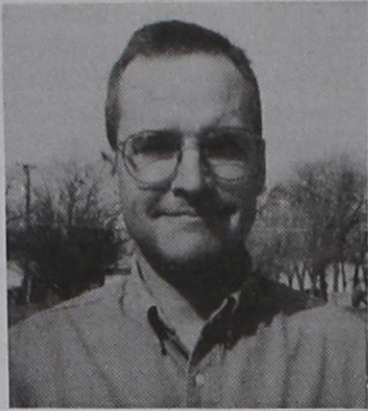

Pest Management Update

Parmer County Entomologist Mark Logan



The number of moths currently in the area has the attention of most people. Most of the moths are army cutworm with a few variegated cutworm thrown in.

Back in March and April we had some isolated heavy infestations of army cutworm in area wheat. These cutworms pupated and are now emerging as moths. There is only a single generation of army cutworm so this current invasion should be short-lived.

Moths are attracted to lights, so where you can, turn off outdoor lights and pull window shades and drapes to keep from attracting the moths as much as possible. Uses of insecticides against these moths are of little value. Do not try to kill the moths in your car while you drive down the road. The army cutworm should soon migrate from the area.

Armyworms are of some concern in wheat. Two different species could be found this time of year- armyworm and wheat head armyworm. Conditions have been ideal for wheat to make a recovery from the early April freeze. These conditions have also been favorable for armyworm.

Armyworms are vegetative feeders and are often associated with rank stands of wheat. They mostly feed at night and during the day will likely be found in the debris at the base of the plants.

Armyworms usually restrict their feeding to the lower leaves and are not much of a problem; however, if they begin feeding on flag leaf, beards, or developing grain, an insecticide application may be in order. If armyworms begin to clip heads, consider an insecticide application if infestation exceeds two worms per square foot.

Wheat head armyworm prefers feeding in the head. Infestations are often limited to field margins and are considered to be of minor importance. Seldom would an insecticide application be justified for the wheat head armyworm.

While we continue to work on a more accurate degree day model for western corn rootworm for this area, we have some indication that eggs have hatched at least in the southern corn growing areas of the Texas Panhandle.

Utilizing temperature data from the PET weather station located southwest of Hereford on a degree day model developed from another state, egg hatch in that area should have occurred late May and early June. A report from that area June 4 indicated that first instar larvae were feeding on corn roots.

The model seems to have us in the "ballpark", but more research data is needed. Some corn rootworm insecticides applied at planting in April may not provide adequate control of these corn rootworm larvae.

Police Report

Here is the weekly report from Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa:

On Tuesday, Nicolas C. Sanchez, 30, of Farwell, and Rene A. Martinez, 35, of Clovis, were arrested in Farwell on charges of felony possession of marijuana (16 lbs.) with intent to deliver.

Acting on a tip from a local businessman, McGaa had been keeping a location east of Farwell under surveillance.

He observed a drug transaction take place and radioed Texas State Trooper Craig Hunt, who stopped the vehicle on East Avenue D.

A third individual in another vehicle got away as McGaa was in an unmarked car and Hunt had the only other unit in the area.

The estimated street value of the marijuana is \$10,624.

On June 6, Department of Public Safety narcotics agents executed a search warrant at 209 7th St.

They were assisted by DPS troopers from Hereford, the K-9 unit from Friona, and Farwell police.

Narcotics paraphernalia and packaging materials were seized but no drugs were found. The suspect was not at home at the time the warrant was executed.

On June 7, a 911 call was received but it was determined that the call was unfounded.

program. While students are doing well on college tests and scoring well against students in other high schools, a large percentage of D's and F's are being given.

Parents thought that the weighting of tests and homework needed to be looked at, with more weight put on homework. The main problem seems to be when students go from junior high to the high school.

Complete scores were reviewed. Again, no action was taken but school officials will continue looking into the problem.

In other business, the board: -- Approved next year's budget, giving an average of 3 percent pay raises to teachers and 4.2 percent for non-certified staff. It was noted that 75 percent of Texico's teachers have master's degrees or above.

The budget also included an extra \$5,000 per building aimed at programs teachers have been asked to design which would help kids learn.

-- Approved the 1997-98 calendar.

-- Reviewed the ITBS scores, in which Texico did very well. These results will be published in the Tribune later.

-- Approved a 504 plan, making accommodations in the classrooms for handicapped students.

-- Heard that school nurse Chantel Ward received a state grant for a school immunization program.

-- Hired Buddy Little, a former head of the Capitan Schools' math department, to teach at the junior high. This is an additional teaching post.

-- Approved the same coaching assignments for next year except that Little replaces Roy King as varsity girls' track coach. Little also will be assistant girls' basketball coach, assisting King.

-- Hired student Tim Jobe to help with the ag farm this summer.

-- Heard a report from board member Deborah Autrey on the New Mexico School Law Conference she attended recently.

-- Discussed plans to change the kindergarten hours because of transportation financial problems.

Currently, students attend half-day kindergarten each day. Full day kindergarten may be offered two or three days a week next semester. The reason is that the state has been cutting back, about 5 percent a year, on its funding for school transportation programs. Texico will try to get some extra funds to pay the To and From Bus Co., headed by Rick Queener, but if not the noontime buses may be eliminated.

Texas teachers to get pay raises averaging 8%

The state of Texas has mandates raises for teachers averaging 8 percent, Supt. Phil Warren told the Lazbudie School Board on Tuesday.

Thus, the board must come up with the necessary funds in its budget, which was discussed at a workshop during the meeting.

In other business, the board:

-- Bought a used van from Muleshoe Motors for \$20,500.

-- Received the resignation of cafeteria manager Roxanne Hurst. Hired to replace her was Stephanie Foster.

-- Received the resignation of bus driver Donna Cozby.

-- Heard Warren report that school TAAS scores are up. This will be reported in detail in a future Tribune issue.

-- Okayed the appraisal schedule for teachers.

The Chief's Corner

From Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa:
 In my last Chief's Corner, the question was asked: Is the public at risk from officers who can't shoot?
 The answer is "yes."

Granted, some peace officers are excellent shooters. But, overall, most are not. Before talking about how to correct this problem, let's find out what is involved in accurate shooting. While I am rated "Master Pistol" in police shooting, I am not a world class shooter. For input, I talked to Municipal Judge Pat Howard, who was. He is a lifetime NRA Master in outdoor pistol shooting. In competition, he was rated 7th in the world in the Expert Pistol Class.

Judge Howard said that "shooting in world class involves constant practice. We were advised on diets by doctors, what we ate, how much and when, affected our shooting. We could not have coffee, tea or Cokes because caffeine and sugar affected our shooting. Smoking and alcohol affect your shooting. You must have proper sleeping habits, and taking a nap before shooting is out because it takes too long to recover your skill level.

"For those who shot in the bench rest rifle events, the pulse beat in the trigger finger affected shooting. There is a tremendous amount of stress in world class competition shooting, but those targets were not shooting back. That is an entirely different ballgame."

What Judge Howard is talking about is the "Body Alarm Reaction" that occurs under severe stress -- the stress that comes from knowing that the second place winner of a gunfight is the dead one. The shooting ability of an officer goes downhill fast when confronted with this phenomenon. Unlike a Hollywood hero, or the hero of an exciting book, this reaction is unavoidable and profound.

The term "Body Alarm Reaction" refers to the perceptual distortions encountered by an officer placed under severe stress. They include a negative effect to hand/eye coordination, degraded fine motor movements of the fingers, and degraded ability to make critical decisions. Adrenaline and other hormones released into the blood stream can cause the muscles to tighten up enormously, and keep in mind this is just a bare outline of what happens under severe stress.

The risk to the public in police shootings is two-fold: (1) the officer under stress loses a percentage of his shooting ability, he misses and those missed shots are a danger to the public; and (2) the gunman is allowed to spray indiscriminate gunfire because the officer fails to kill him immediately, either because of missing or because, he, fearing future punishment, fails to shoot.

Next: What police agencies can do to lessen this risk to the public, and why it is politically incorrect.

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

Some potatoes are grown locally

While potato growers in other parts of the country are suffering from overproduction and resulting low prices, potato growers in West Texas probably won't have to face that problem this season.

Potato growers in this area have a relatively small market volume compared to other production areas, said Dr. Roland Roberts, vegetable specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. West Texas potato growers produce about 300 million pounds of potatoes each year out of the 44.1 billion produced in the U.S.

The local crop is grown on approximately 12,000 acres, mainly in Bailey, Lamb, Gaines, Castro, Parmer, Hale and Dallam counties. Planting on the High Plains occurs in March and April with harvest usually beginning in the middle of June. The West Texas growing season is in competition with the ones on the east coast and California.

Planting dates have a big influence on the production of potatoes. When the temperature is above 85 degrees Fahrenheit, potatoes have a harder time enlarging tubers. Potatoes will grow better if night temperature drop below

60 degrees.

"So far this growing season has been good for potatoes but not for the cotton crop," Roberts said. "A hard freeze on April 12 killed potato plants back into the ground."

"The potato crop is looking good," said Cliff Black, Springlake Potato Co. "The rain and cold weather has been a problem getting the potato crop started. Many of the growers and farmers are quitting the potato business because they are too old and there is no one to continue the business," Black said.

"In recent years there has not been an overproduction problem in West Texas that would make the market drop," said Roberts. "Sometimes there is a small surplus of the later maturing russet baking potatoes when our growing season overlaps the growing season of Colorado and Eastern Oklahoma. This will cause the price to drop somewhat," he said.

When there is a surplus of summer potatoes, growers have to take a lower price or abandon some potato acreage because summer potatoes cannot be stored long. Summer harvesting stresses the potatoes. To protect these potatoes from starting to rot before they can get to the consumer they have to be conditioned and transported at 60-65 degree temperatures.

Roberts said there are some problems that go with growing potatoes on the High Plains. One factor is that farmers have no marketing order with the USDA. A marketing order is an industry-grower supported research and market development program. Areas that do have these programs have a strong marketing advantage, Roberts said. These agreements allow farmers to contribute money to a fund that pays for market development and field research which benefits growers in the area covered by the order.

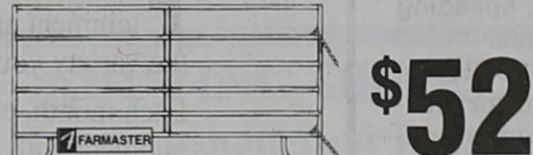

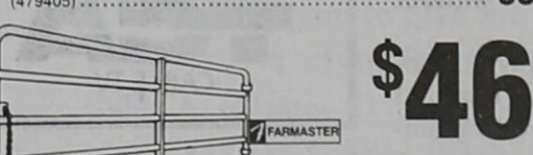
