



New Mexico Boys State '71

 On arrival in Roswell at New Mexico Military Institute, every boy registered and was assigned to quarters, a city, a county and a political party.

After lunch the boys were gathered at an assembly in Pearson Auditorium where they became acquainted with Al Ortiz, director of Boys State, General Sam Agee, superintendent of NMMI, and also Reed Mulkey, president of New Mexico Boys State.

The rest of the day was spent getting to know the other people attending Boys State and also the counselors. Sunday morning, city government was explained and a special memorial service was held for deceased counselors and Boys Staters. Regular church services followed. Throughout the afternoon, law and law enforcement lectures were conducted.

On Sunday evening, Dr. C. L. Kay, from Lubbock Christian College, gave the first part of a lecture illustrated with slides on "The American Dream." He completed the lecture on Monday evening.

Most of the day Monday was spent in campaigning and elections. Members of the FBI, New Mexico Police Force and other law enforcement agencies taught classes in law enforcement and law school to the Boys Staters.

Tuesday, the county primary campaign took place with

the elections following. The city government also began its functions on Tuesday, following the releasing of the results of the county elections. Later the boys were instructed in state government and were assigned to parties. A party chairman was elected for each party. Later in the evening state primary elections took place.

Wednesday morning, state primary results were released and the state candidates began their campaigns. The election of state officers took place in the afternoon. Inauguration ceremonies for the state officials took place on Wednesday evening. Special guests for the inauguration were Governor Bruce King and several other New Mexico officials. Boys who were inaugurated were sworn in by the New Mexico Secretary of State.

Thursday morning, city, county and state officials were in operation. Following the noon meal, representatives from the Naval, Air Force and Army academies spoke to Boys Staters about the different schools. A talent show was conducted in the evening with many of the boys from over the state participating. All of the Boys State attendants praised the show highly.

Friday morning the director of the sessions, Al Ortiz, gave his remarks and evaluation of the 1971 session of Boys State at a general assembly. The sessions came to a formal close at 5 p.m. that day. However, all of the boys who left on that day to return home left with an experience that will be with them always.



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
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Fined In County Court

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
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INDEPENDENCE DAY

JULY 4, 1776

WE, THEREFORE, THE REPRESENTATIVES OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, IN GENERAL CONGRESS ASSEMBLED, APPEALING TO THE SUPREME JUDGE OF THE WORLD FOR THE RECTITUDE OF OUR INTENTIONS, DO, IN THE NAME AND BY THE AUTHORITY OF THE GOOD PEOPLE OF THESE COLONIES, SOLEMNLY PUBLISH AND DECLARE THAT THESE UNITED COLONIES ARE, AND OF RIGHT OUGHT TO BE, FREE AND INDEPENDENT STATES; THAT THEY ARE ABSOLVED FROM ALL ALLEGIANCE TO THE BRITISH CROWN, AND THAT ALL POLITICAL CONNECTION BETWEEN THEM AND THE STATE OF GREAT BRITAIN IS, AND OUGHT TO BE, TOTALLY DISSOLVED; AND THAT AS FREE AND INDEPENDENT STATES THEY HAVE FULL POWER TO LEVY WAR, CONCLUDE PEACE, CONTRACT ALLIANCES, ESTABLISH COMMERCE, AND DO ALL OTHER ACTS AND THINGS WHICH INDEPENDENT STATES MAY OF RIGHT DO, AND FOR THE SUPPORT OF THIS DECLARATION, WITH A FIRM RELIANCE ON THE PROTECTION OF DIVINE PROVIDENCE, WE MUTUALLY PLEDGE TO EACH OTHER OUR LIVES, OUR FORTUNES, AND OUR SACRED HONOR.

1971 Bluebonnet Girls' State

Girls State is a government laboratory where government is taught, then experienced. This year it was held at Texas Lutheran College at Seguin from June 15-25, and, as always, was

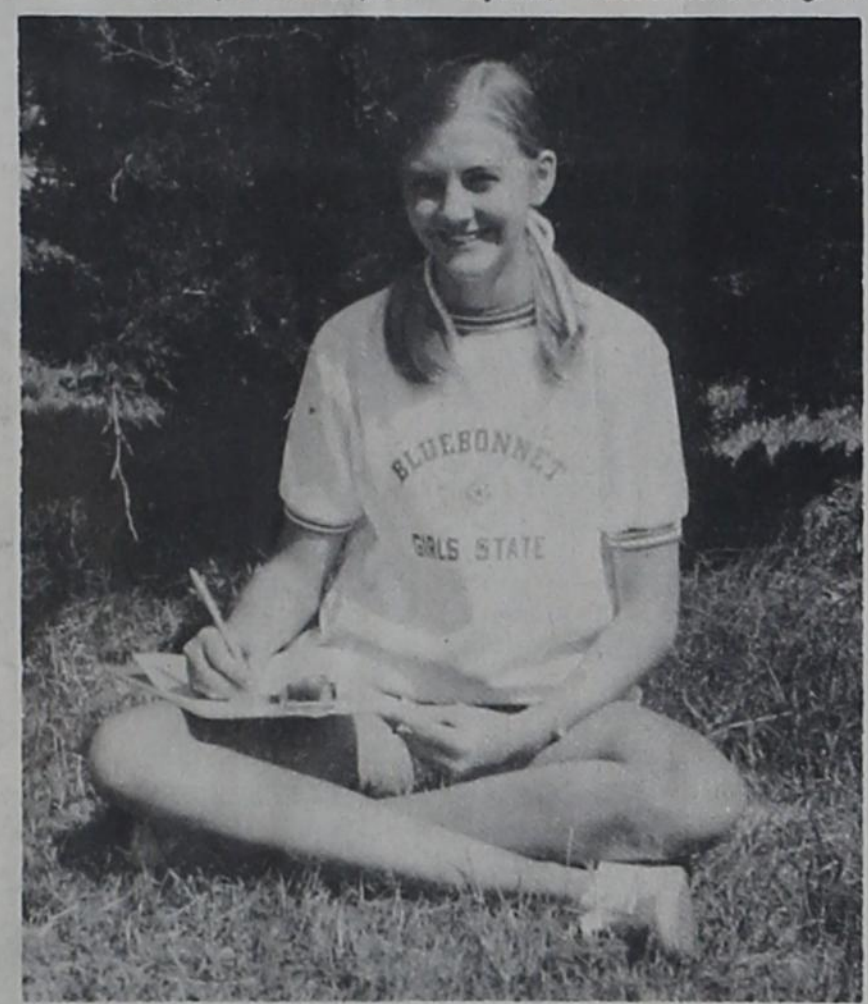
sponsored by the American Legion Auxillary. But more than just learning the workings of our state government, I gained a whole new respect and dedication for my country, flag and myself. There were 486 girls

and 64 staff, and in such a large group, I was the only person I knew; therefore, I had to really depend upon myself. But the knowledge and experience I learned from other girls is unforgettable.

From the time we arrived, we were constantly kept busy, first in our parties. I was a Federalist and the spirit each party built up against the other was fantastic. Each party had their own songs, leaders and platforms. Then the focus was on the city, then county -- which was two cities, then the state -- the entire group -- made up of five counties. The girl winning the position of governor was the first colored girl ever elected to that position in the history of Texas Girls State. She was outstanding, as were all the girls elected to state offices.

All during the ten days, singing played an important part in the program. Also House and Senate met each day, passing and debating legislation in the same way the State Legislature performs. A total of 50 bills and resolutions were submitted in the House. The bills and resolutions were written by the citizens of Girls State. We were also honored with speakers such as Senator John Tower and the President and commander of the American Legion. Governor Preston Smith spoke while we were at the state capitol and we also visited with most of the high state officials with the exception of Ben Barnes.

The honor of being a Girls State citizen is something I'll always treasure. It is my sincere wish that I can pass some of my respect and knowledge of our government to others and always be the kind of citizen I was sent home from Girls State to be.

In other business, the trustees approved a \$50 donation requested by the Texico Women's Club to put a new fence around the Texico Swimming Pool.

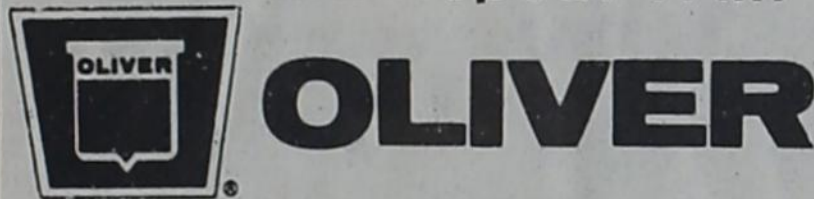

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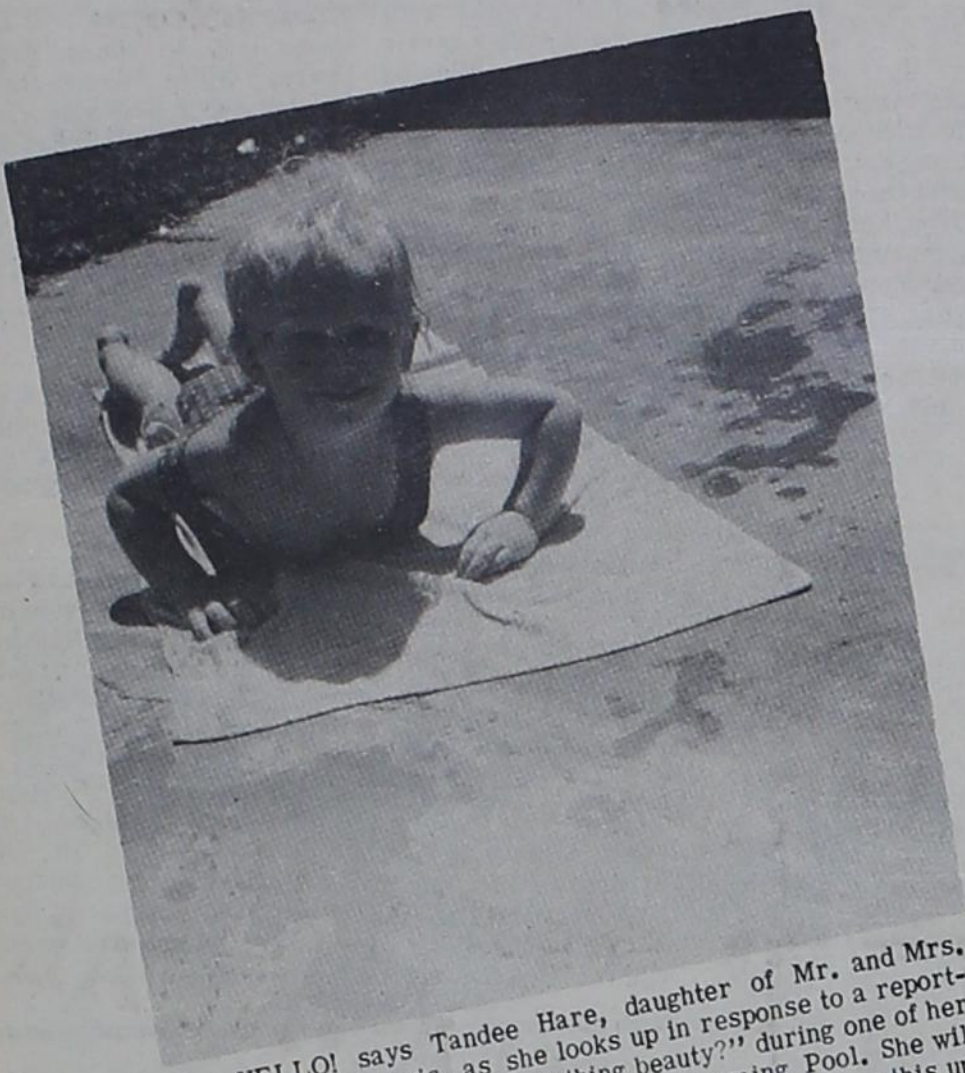
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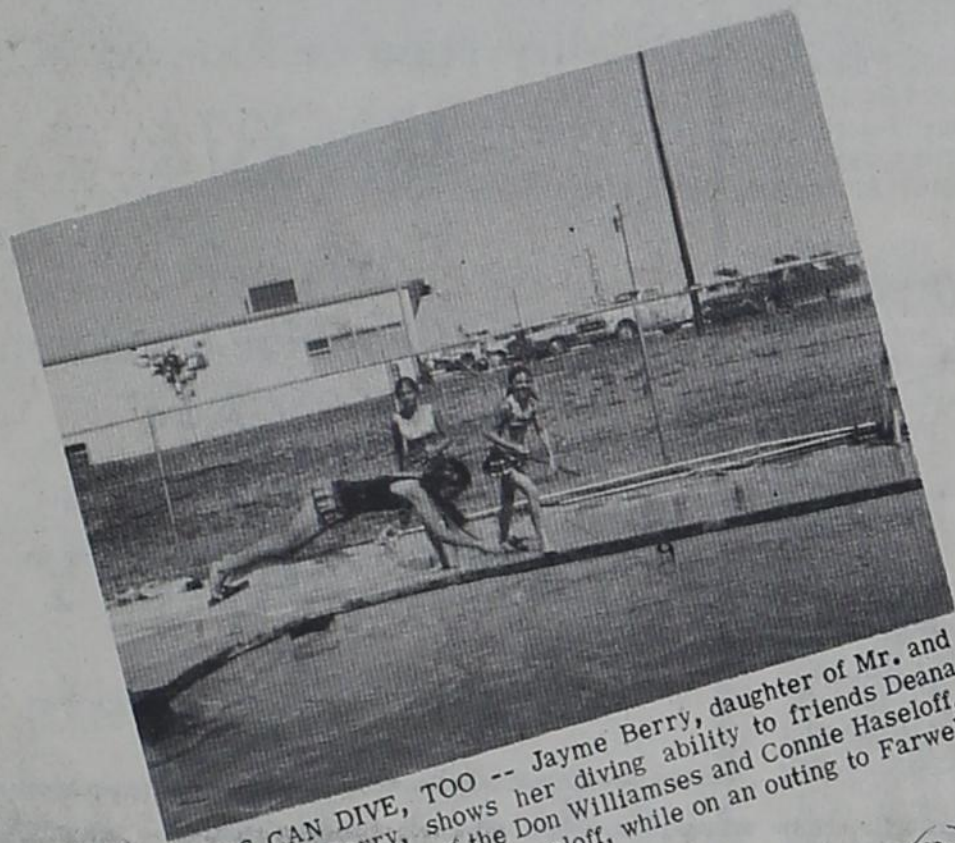

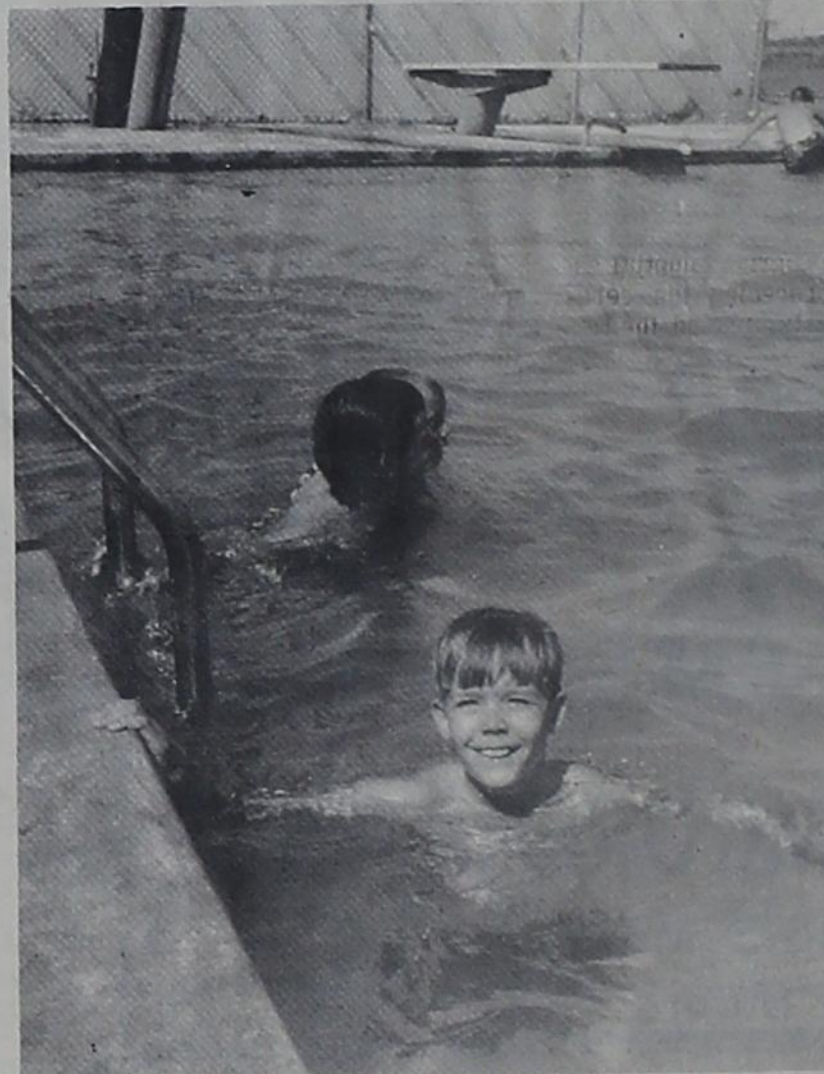

INCREDIBLE EDIBLE OR TURKEY IN A SACK
 1 t. pepper
 2 t. salt
 3 T. paprika
 4 T. hot water
 1 c. peanut oil
 1-14 to 16 lb. turkey
 Combine pepper, salt, paprika and hot water. Add and mix well p cup of peanut oil. Let stand at least 10 minutes. Wash and dry turkey. Rub pea-

nut oil mixture inside and out. Truss as desired.

Pour remaining oil into a large paper sack. Rub oil into inside of sack until surface is thoroughly oiled. Place turkey in sack, breast up and place in baking pan. Close sack securely. Tie or staple so steam can't escape. Bake approximately 15-20 minutes per pound at 325 degrees.

Wanda gives a helpful hint by adding, "Some water below the rack in an open roasting pan (several cups) will avoid any burning at all. Also, if you place the turkey in the bag with the seam side up, the juice won't leak out."

BARBECUE SAUCE
 1 large onion, chopped

1/4 c. Wesson oil
 1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce
 1/2 c. water
 2 t. salt
 2 T. vinegar
 1/4 c. brown sugar
 3 T. Worcestershire sauce
 2 T. prepared mustard
 1/4 t. pepper
 Cook onion in Wesson oil until tender. Add remaining ingredients. Simmer 15 minutes. Makes about 3 cups.

COMSTOCK FRUIT DESSERT
 1 1/4 c. vanilla wafers
 1 egg
 1 cube oleo
 1 c. powdered sugar
 1 can Comstock fruit mix (cherry, apricot, etc.)
 1 package Dream Whip
 Crumble vanilla wafers. Melt

a small amount of butter and mix with wafers. Spread in bottom of pan. Beat oleo, powdered sugar and egg. Spread this on top of vanilla wafers. Use one can of Comstock fruit mix and spread next. Whip 1 package of Dream Whip and spread on top of fruit. Garnish with small amount of crushed vanilla wafer crumbs and store in refrigerator. (This makes enough for an 8 or 9-inch square keeper.)

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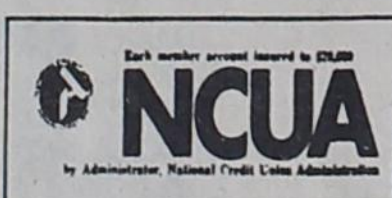
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
