Name Richard Hapke To Administrative Post

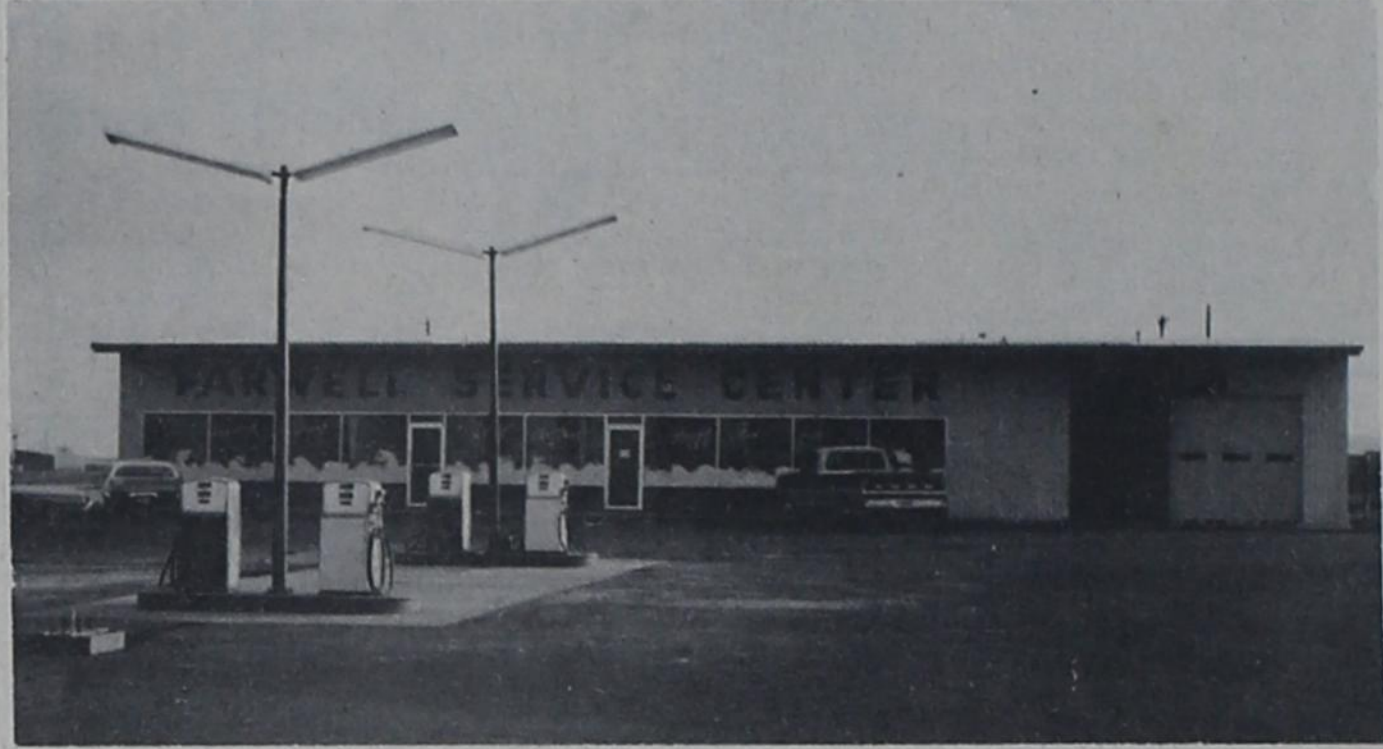
Richard Hapke, former local resident, has been named administrative assistant to New Mexico Congressman - Elect Harold Runnels, it was announced by Runnels last week.

Hapke, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Hapke of Texico, was Runnels' campaign manager for the U.S. congressional race and was picked by Runnels for the top administrative assistant position over a number of others. Hapke's wife, Carolyn, will also serve on Runnels' staff as a secretary.

Hapke's rise to this position in Washington is a typical "local boy makes good" type story. Richard worked as a printer's devil in the backshop of the State Line Tribune when he was only 11 years of age and continued in all phases of the newspapering business for many years, even working his way through

Eastern New Mexico University while editing the Tribune. He served in the armed forces for a couple of years and was editor of Stars and Stripes, edited The Friona Star and The Lovington Daily Leader, and also was editor of the New Mexico Farm and Ranch publication for awhile before becoming interested in getting into politics on an active basis.

In commenting on Hapke's "rise to fame," W. H. "Hop" Graham Jr. (for whom Richard worked so many years) says in his column in the Lovington Leader: "Harold Runnels loves to tell about how he as a little Texas blacklands farm boy (born in a chicken shack, remember) has now gone all the way to U. S. Congress. Well, that's right, but that skinny little printer's devil ain't doin' so bad either."

Boys Win Springlake Meet; Girls Take Third Place

Farwell's Steers won three straight games to take top honors in the tournament played at Springlake over the past weekend, while the girls team from Farwell was copping third place.

Coach Vernon Scott, Steer coach, remarked that the boys really played fine ball all during the tournament and he was well pleased with their showing.

In the first match of the tourney, Farwell defeated Grady, N.M., 79-70. Gene Sheets lead Steer scoring with 27 points, followed closely by Brett Hargrove with 26. Kevin Hargrove had 10 points and Sheets lead the rebounding department with eight.

Farwell topped Seagraves 51-47 in the second encounter and Sheets again lead the scoring with 23 points. Brett Hargrove scored 18 and also lead in rebounding.

Three Way was Farwell's next opponent and Three Way was defeated 67-42 with Brett Hargrove leading the Steer point making with 20. Sheets had 18 points and he and Brett tied in rebounds with six each.

In their first district game of the season, played Tuesday night, Farwell barely managed to edge by Hart 49-47. Sheets had 17 points, Brett Hargrove had 16 and also was high in rebounds with 14. Coach Scott commented that the Steers did not play well at all in the Tuesday night game.

In taking the tournament third place honors in the girls bracket, Farwell won their first

PURELY PERSONAL

Last week we commented on the scare stories spread about by our ever active "do-gooders" concerning the use of DES in feedlot beef production. Another and much more prominent "case" is being forced down the gullet of the American public. This time the full fury of the liberal press is being turned to the defeat of funds for the production of an American Supersonic Transport. Already a craven U. S. Senate has eliminated these appropriations and only a favorable House vote keeps the whole project alive.

At first blush we too were taken in by the smooth sounding arguments against the SST. An article in one of our very favorite magazines, The American Legion Magazine, however, has given us a new insight into the whole matter.

Several emotional objections have been raised about the SST. These include the great cost of development, the lack of apparent need for a transport plane that flies faster than sound, the danger of radiation at the altitudes the SST would fly, pollution of the upper air by jet exhausts, and what is probably the liberal's real "gut" issue -- the need to divert federal funds instead to poverty programs and other social uses.

To begin with, the Government contract with the Boeing Aircraft Co. and General Electric provides that the Federal Government will get its development money back with the sale of the first 300 of such planes. The market projections for these planes call for more than 500 SST's to be in service. This gets Uncle Sam's money back, plus a profit.

The fact that a SST will get a person to Europe in two and one half hours versus the present 747's time of seven hours is unimportant from the individual's time standpoint. What is important is that the SST will be about two and one-half times more efficient in moving people across the oceans than the 747, hence in the long run will be cheaper to operate as well as less costly to the traveling public. This is what they are after -- to make flying cheaper so more people can and will use the planes.

As far as radiation problems go, this is more errant liberal nonsense. We have had a host of military pilots flying at SST altitudes for two decades with no ill effects. In fact, radiation illness is a combination of exposure time plus amount of radiation. The Inca Indians of Peru in a lifetime of high altitude living soak up infinitely more radiation than people in airplanes, even an SST. Also, because of the dosage plus time factor, the SST would ACTUALLY reduce exposure because the plane would keep you in the air so much less. Two and one-half hours against the present 747's seven hours time.

Then there is the problem of upper air pollution that has great emotional appeal for the ecologists. Unfortunately, most ecologists think with their viscera instead of their brains. The unglamorous but scientific fact is that with our present state of the art, a SST fully loaded and going at top speed would be the polluting equivalent of three present day cars going 60 MPH. That could hardly be considered a world destroyer.

Lastly, as far as additional poverty programs are concerned, we, for example, are tired of subsidizing someone else's careless love.

Even if all the arguments against the SST had more than a grain of fact in them, there is this inescapable fact: There ARE SSTs here and now. The first model of the French-English Concorde flew in March of 1969, and on October 10 of this year it flew 1,320 MPH in level flight. The Russian TU-144 flew December 31, 1968, and hit 1,336 MPH last May. These SSTs ARE here and ARE being sold to the world's airlines for early delivery. So the blunt fact is we will not be banning the SST by not producing one ourselves, but only disastrously harming our own national economy and drastically increasing the unemployment that the "people planners" prate about. This almost seems like a liberal plot to ruin our country as they enrich the rest of the world.

Schools Set Holiday Dates

Schools in the Twin Cities have released the dates of the Christmas holidays which will be observed and when classes will resume.

At Texico, classes will be dismissed at 1:30 p.m. (CST) on Friday (today) Dec. 18, and will begin again on Monday, Jan. 4, at the regular starting time.

Farwell Schools will not dismiss for the Christmas vacation until about 2:30 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 22. Classes there will also be resumed on January 4 starting at 8:30 a.m.

Texico students will have a holiday atmosphere at the school all day Friday when they have their various Christmas parties. Grades one through six each have individual class parties in their rooms while the junior and senior high students have a combined party in the gym with faculty members furnishing refreshments.

Highlight of the big party is the gift exchange. Each class draws names and all the gifts are exchanged at the party. The 7th grade Spanish class will present a skit as will members of the Pep Club. The Cheerleaders will perform two pom-pom routines, and a band composed of high school students will entertain with musical selections.

Farwell's elementary rooms will have their Christmas parties in their individual rooms starting at 1:30 p.m. on December 22. Many of the junior high and high school classes have already had their parties; however a Christmas get-together is planned at Farwell Country Club for junior and senior high school students on Saturday night, Dec. 19.

At Home In Parmer County

Unwrapping Christmas packages is lots of fun, but cleaning up afterwards is nobody's favorite job. Here are three tips for a quick and easy clean-up. First, save three Christmas shopping bags. One will be for the paper, ribbon and cards you may want to keep after the unwrapping takes place, the other for the discards. In the third shopping bag, tuck away a whisk broom and dustpan. You can give these everyday helpers a holiday look by tying a pine cone or sprig of holly on each if you like. Store your shopping bag helpers in the closet where you're hiding the Christmas presents and you'll be ready for anything including happy holidays.

The December plentiful foods list features turkey and fresh oranges. Others include pork, fresh apples, canned applesauce, apple juice, fresh cranberries, cranberry sauce, frozen concentrated orange juice, fresh grapefruit, fresh tangerines, dry onions, fresh potatoes, eggs, rice and walnuts. Plan to include these foods in your holiday meals.

A favorite recipe of mine includes fresh cranberries. This Chutney is especially good with poultry and other meats.

Cranberry Chutney
1 large can fruit cocktail, drained
Measure 1 1/4 cups of the cocktail syrup and combine

In a heavy three quart saucepan with --
1/2 cup orange juice
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 cup light brown sugar
1/4 cup cider vinegar
1/2 teas. ground cloves
1/4 teas. red pepper
1/2 teas. salt
Bring to a full boil, stirring often. Add two cups cranberries, 1 cup chopped unpeeled apples, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1/2 teaspoon ginger, garlic salt to taste, and 3/4 cup seedless raisins.

Cook until berries pop - 5 to 10 minutes, then stir in fruit cocktail. Simmer, stirring often until mixture thickens slightly - 15 to 20 minutes. Store in refrigerator or pour into hot, sterilized jars and seal immediately. Chutney will thicken as it cools.
Yield: about 2 1/2 pints.

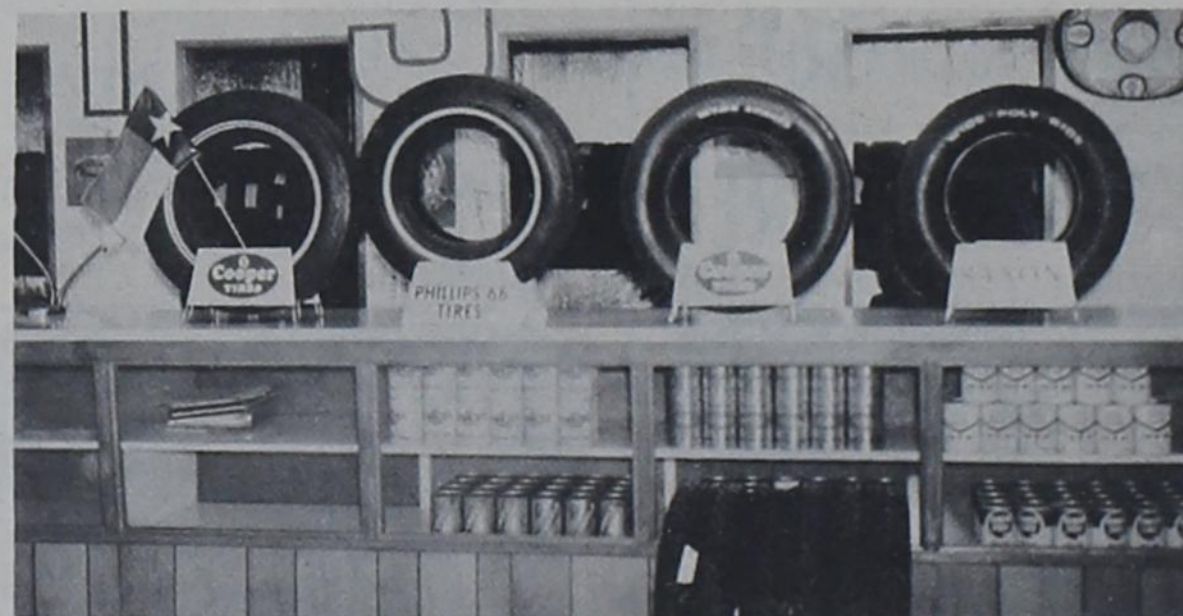

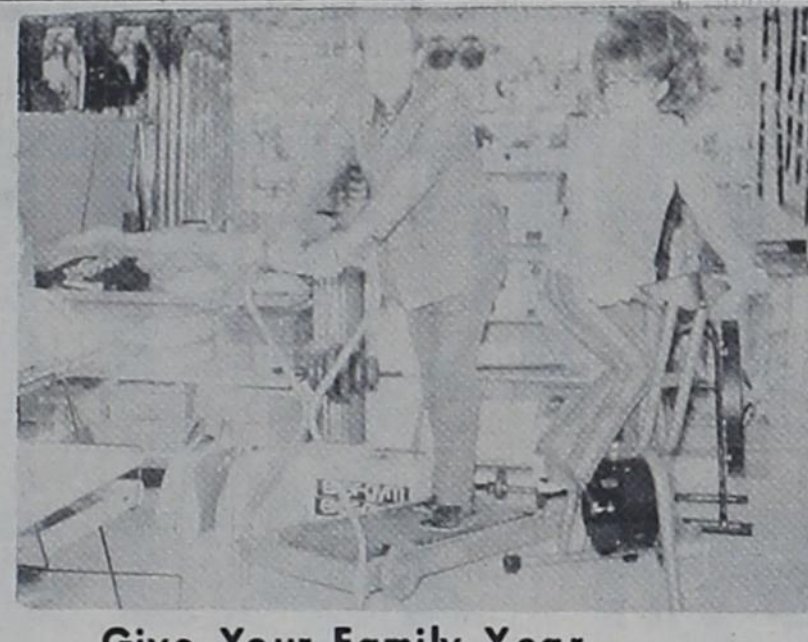

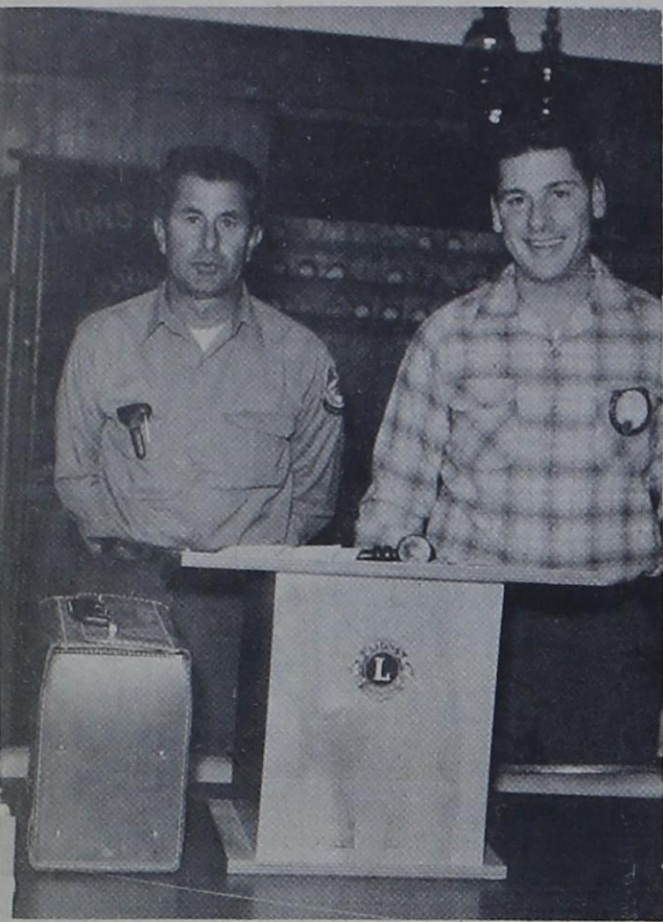
Christmas Observance Planned

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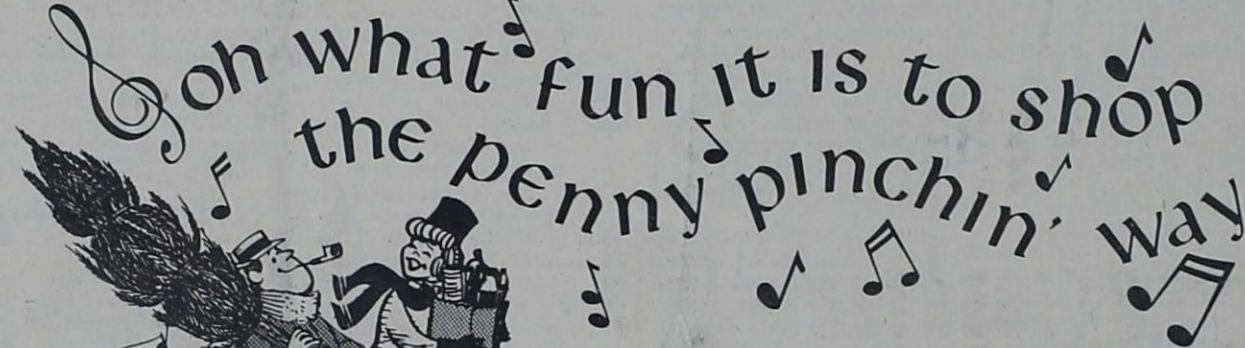
