## A city manager for Texico?

### Texico firemen honored

At the Texico City Council meeting on Nov. 26, a "Volunteer Cardiac Save Award" was presented to the Texico Volunteer Fire Department from EMS Region III.

On hand for the ceremony were Region III executive director Brian Hecht and Region III board member Ron Edwards, a captain with the Clovis Fire Department.

Receiving the award on behalf of Texico was Texico Fire Chief Lewis Cooper. Texico fireman Doug Scioli also was in attendance.

Edwards said the award was established in July by Region III to honor those dedicated volunteer professionals whose efforts often times go unnoticed.

On the morning of July 27, Texico firemen were dispatched to a possible heart attack victim.

Upon arriving, emergency medical technicians (EMTs) Oran Jay Autrey, Paul Adams, Missy Garrison and Rhonda Foreman found the man, Ray Autrey of Texico, in full cardiac arrest and CPR was being performed by Amanda Ingram, who had been driving by. Meanwhile, Ed Autrey called the fire department.

After assessing Ray Autrey's condition, firemen used their new defibrillator unit. Defibrillation is the process of stopping very rapid contractions of the heart by delivering an electrical shock to synchronize the patient's heart with a device called a defibrillator.

Enroute to Clovis hospital, EMTs delivered 200-joules of electrical shock to Autrey. His pulse and respirations returned. EMTs also administered oxygen and an IV.

The Texico City Council on Nov. 26 decided to check with other communities which have city managers and seek their written job descriptions.

The topic came up at the previous council meeting after Mayor Nathan Tharp and councilman Ronnie Warmuth attended a meeting on state grants in Albuquerque. What they found was that, basically, communities which have persons who can write grants do a much more effective job at getting funds for their communities. And communities further away than 150 miles from Albuquerque are at a handicap in getting state grants, it was stated.

For small communities like Texico, state grants are necessary for various community projects -- that's the way New Mexico has its finances set up.

So after Tharp brought up various community projects that need state grants, such as a new municipal swimming pool, water lines, street work, etc., he said that a part-time or full-time city manager would be of great help.

Tharp said there aren't funds available to set up a city manager's position in the current budget but that the city will look at it in the next fiscal budget.

City clerk Marie Christian was assigned the task of getting job descriptions for a city manager from other communities.

In other business, the council:

-- Had Leland Tillman, Eastern Plains Council of Governments director, scheduled on the agenda, to discuss the future of Texico's water. Texico had been part of the "Ute Lake Project" in the 1980s and early 1990s which would see water being brought to this area from that lake. After several years, though, Tharp said the project's proposed pipeline was killed. Tharp said Texico needs a new water source. Tillman will be contacted again.

-- Heard Texico Fire Chief Lewis Cooper report that one bid was submitted to build the new fire substation -- from Roper Construction, of Clovis, for \$62,835. On his recommendation, the council accepted the bid. The 2-bay substation will be built on land donated by Leon Meeks at the north end of his farm. The work will take 75 days.

-- Received an offer from Floyd Robinson to maintain the cemetery for \$800 a month. It was tabled until next meeting when the council will meet with the cemetery board.

-- Proclaimed Nov. 25 as Law Enforcement Appreciation Day.

-- Discussed the renovation of Highway 108 (the Pleasant Hill highway) from Wheeler Avenue to the school. The work includes 4-laning, sidewalks and drainage improvements. The state is funding the bulk of the project. The council voted to have the work include a culvert under Hereford (toward the pond) to help drainage, instead of drainage work from the highway to Hereford. Tharp said state funds for such projects are drying up and he doesn't know when it will be done.

-- Cancelled their second meeting in December due to the Christmas holidays.

-- Heard city attorney Marion Ty Rutter report that state law doesn't allow the city to donate funds to the city DARE (drug education) program, but does allow the city to seek state grants for it.

-- Heard Rutter report on condemned buildings. He's still working on it and no action will be taken until at least the next meeting in January.



A one-vehicle accident occurred the night of Nov. 27 at Curry County Roads 8 and C, near the Texico Cemetery. State police said a 1992 Ford pickup, driven by Leroy Jupe III, 20, of Farwell, failed to negotiate a turn, slid off the road and hit a utility pole. Jupe was charged with aggravated DWI and reckless driving. He was taken by Texico ambulance to Clovis hospital with injuries. Police said two passengers, Tabitha Boney, 21, of Clovis, and Ronald Wilson, 24, of Farwell, were not taken to the hospital but had visible injuries. Texico Marshal Gil Holguin alerts all area folks that with the holiday season upon us, the Texico police will be participating in DWI blitzes in Curry County on a frequent basis. "We wish everyone a safe and happy holiday, but we want everyone to know that our police officers will be doing extensive patrolling throughout the holidays."

### Local gins report good quality cotton

The area cotton gins have been up and running since the first week of October and, from all indications, the crops are yielding a lot of good quality cotton.

JeDon Gallman, manager of the Farwell Gin reports that the crops that have been brought into the gin are among the best that they have seen in several years.

"The older cotton is holding up very well and is making good yields," he said. "The replant cotton isn't as strong as the farmers had hoped, but it's making a little."

Several farms had cotton acreage wiped out or severely damaged by the hail storms during the summer.

Todd Lingnau was the farmer with the first cotton bale in to the Farwell Gin on Oct. 14. His bale weighed 520 pounds. The gin has baled 7762 bales as of this writing and will be ginning for at least another month.

The Muleshoe Co-Op Gin saw its first bale brought in by Steven Phillips on Oct. 2. The bale weighed 532 pounds.

The Co-Op has baled 21,000 bales as of this writing and will be running through the end of December, first of January.

The crops that they are seeing are also good quality and are making good yields also. However, it is not the best year that they have seen for cotton farmers.

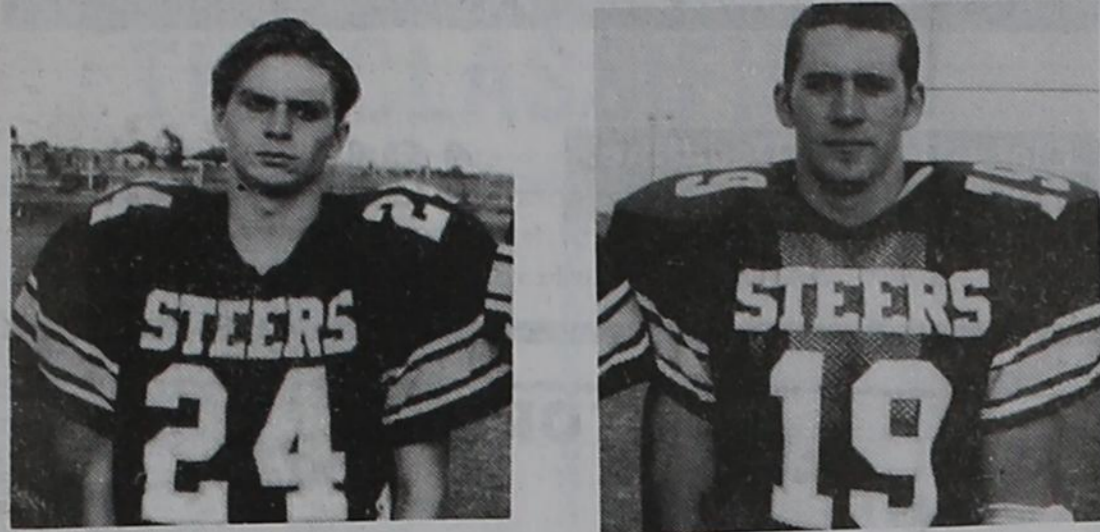

## Texico Schools issue annual accountability report

Texico Schools have released their annual accountability report for the 1995-96 school year. Some of the highlights are:

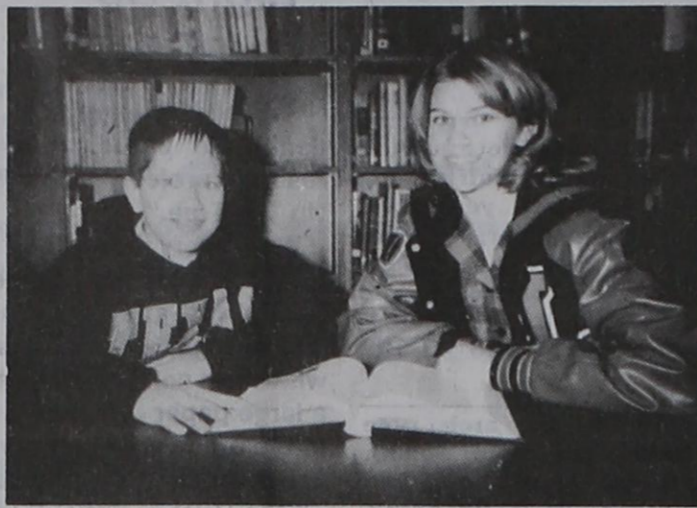
**Teacher salaries:** In the past three years, Texico's average has gone from \$32,746 to \$32,983 to \$34,370. Meanwhile, it stays ahead of New Mexico's average, which is now \$29,092. But it's below the national average of \$37,846.

**Revenue sources:** Of Texico Schools' \$3,212,486, 86 percent comes from the state, 5 percent comes from the local district and 9 percent consists of federal funds.

**Student follow-up:** Of the Texico graduates in 1996, 14 percent have found fulltime employment, 44 percent are involved in vo-tech programs, 28 percent are in college and 14 percent in "other." The percent of Texico seniors graduating this year was 83.3 percent, compared to 77.78 percent last year, 79 percent in 1994 and 90.9 percent in 1993.

**Test scores:** As for college entrance exams, Texico ranked 17th in the state and No. 1 in the cluster ranking with other districts comparable to Texico.

**Drop-out rates:** Texico's drop-out rate was 6 percent in 1995, compared to the state's average of 9 percent.
