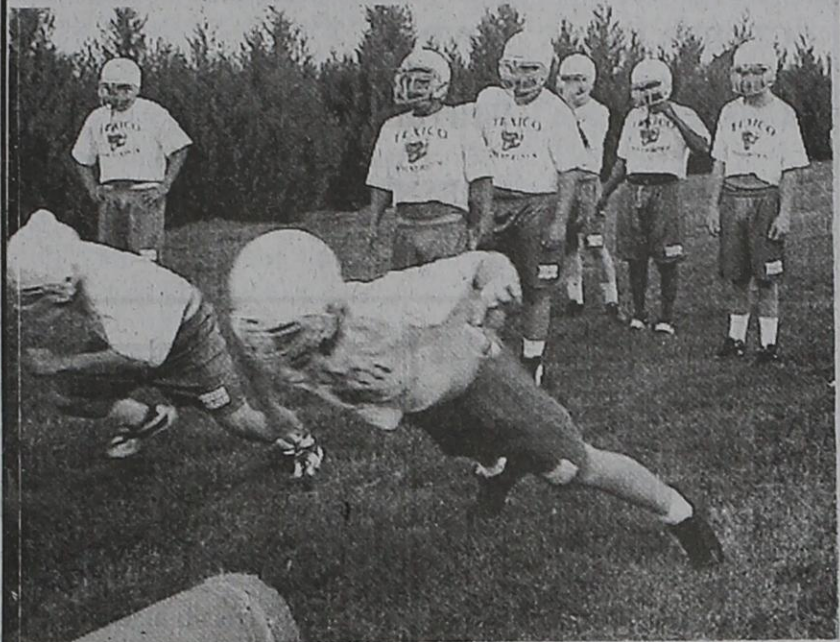
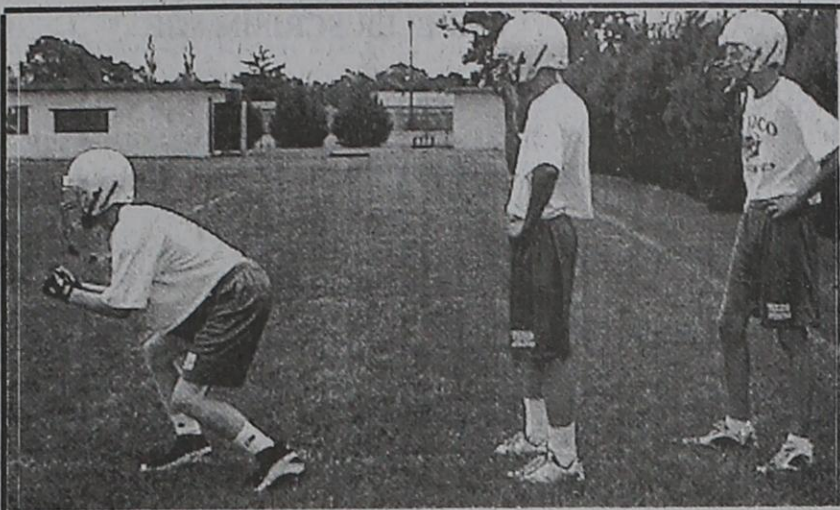
Well my life as a stage manager is officially over (for two weeks now) and I'm in bliss.

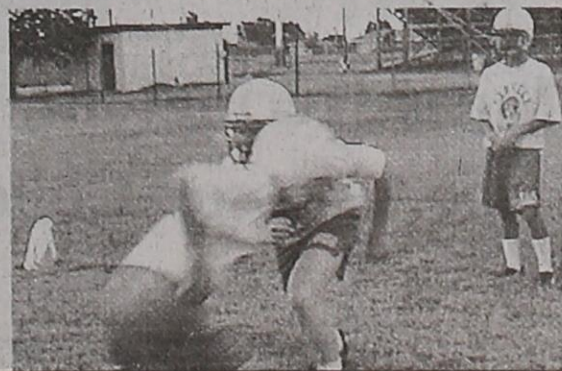
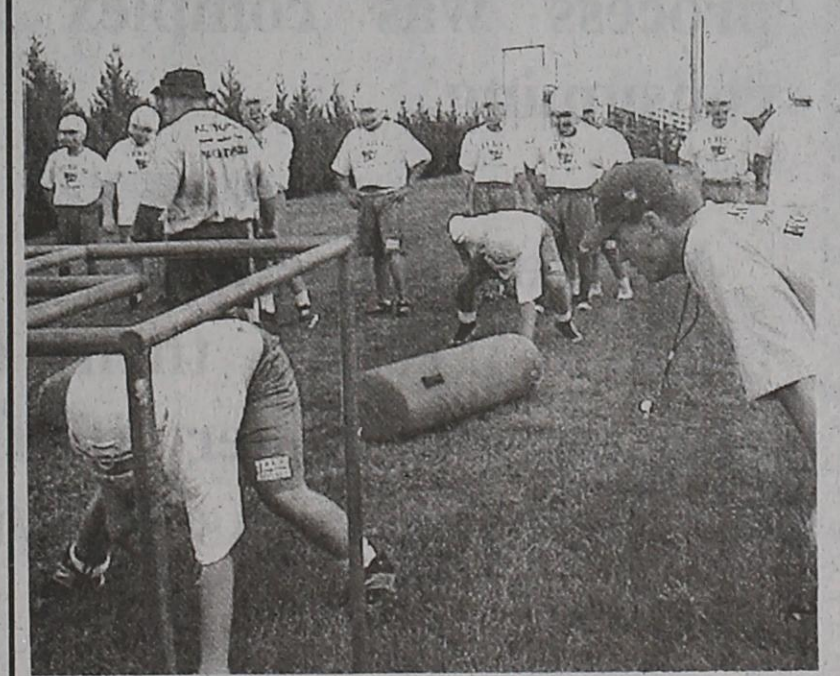
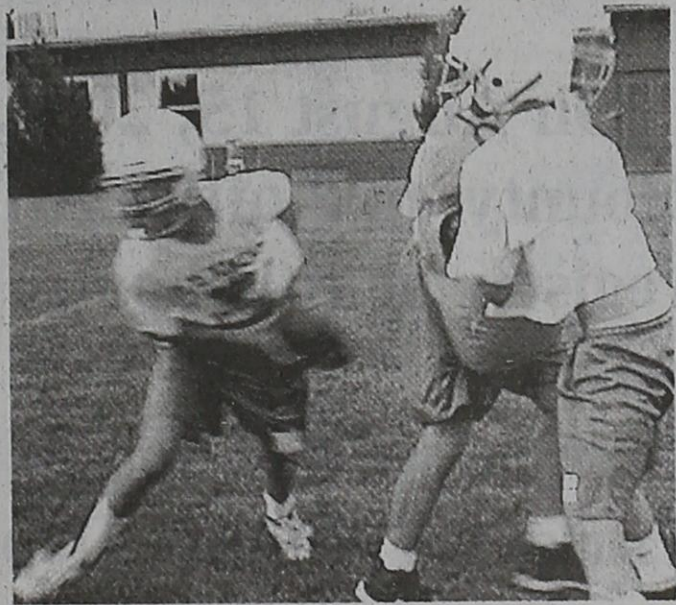
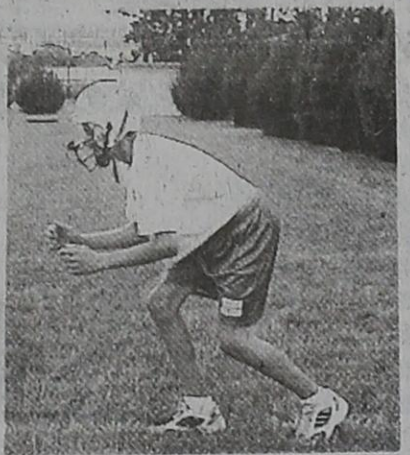


Wolverines, Steers start workouts

Texico School Board moves ahead on gym, learning center plans

The Texico School Board on Tuesday moved ahead with plans for the new gym and learning lab.

Last year, school district voters okayed a \$1.5 million bond issue, and the state legislature added \$1.3 million more last month (although about \$500,000 of that amount won't be given to Texico until 2002).

Both projects will be started toward the end of this year. Expected to be completed first is the learning lab. Plans call for one of the classrooms in the high school to be remodeled. Enough electrical outlets and computer space will be put in to allow for future technological changes.

As to what the future holds for technology, that's a very good question, since computerization is still exploding throughout the world scene.

The gym will be built where the current football practice field is. It will seat about 1,200 -- compared to the 650 who are crammed into the current gym. The new gym also will feature mostly folding, plastic seats which should make it more comfortable for spectators.

At the July school board meeting, the board had asked for input from residents. Since then, Supt. R.L. Richards reported that more than 10 folks have stopped by the administration building to view the blueprints and offer suggestions.

Suggestions have dealt with the elevation of the bleachers, how the locker rooms are organized (even including pointing out the need for electrical outlets and shelves for girls' curling irons), makeup of the gym lobby floor, the scorer's table, and outside designs.

Also, Richards noted that the state has given Texico Schools a grant of \$51,000 for more parking lot space. This will be on the northeast side of the high school.

In other business, the board:
-- Heard a report from the Texico cheerleaders on the training camp they attended and some of this year's plans.
-- Heard that more than 40 boys turned out for football.
-- Hired Shelly Tate, as an elementary school aide, and Trinity Watt, as a junior high school special education aide.
-- Approved the activity bus drivers' list.
-- Discussed the grading schedule. Currently, students are ranked with a top grade point average of 4.0. This grading method leads to complications at the top (valedictorians and salutatorians) since there are ties. The gpa schedule will stay the same this year, but next year school officials may go to a numerical listing -- 0 to 100 points.

Bobby: It's tough having to wait

Time for an update on how Texico's Bobby Winegeart is doing. Around \$7,000 has been raised for his surgery, which is set in November. Funds to allow the wheelchair-bound young man to have the surgery that, hopefully, will allow him to walk again are being collected at the Texico branch of Citizens Bank.

Bobby is very anxious to have the surgery done. "It's hard waiting, I wish I could have it done tomorrow ... it's tough having to wait," he says.

The exact date for his surgery has not yet been set. He is waiting for Dr. Kao, the surgeon who will perform the operation, to call him back so that they can set it.

"It's 3 months away and I'm pretty much counting the days," he says.

So it's still a time of waiting for Bobby.

Bobby did have the pleasure to meet Will Anderson at Border Town Days. Will is a Naval Attache stationed in Quito, Ecuador, who has offered to let Bobby's parents stay with his family in Ecuador until Bobby has recuperated enough to return home to the U.S. after his surgery.

Will is the son of Bob and Carrie Anderson, of Farwell.

"I liked him," says Bobby.

So it's pretty much the same old routine of watching his favorite TV shows and taking the occasional trip to Sonic for a soda.

But Bobby says that he has written about 500 "thank you" cards.

"The community has really pulled together and I thank them so much for the support they have shown me. Everything they've done I just hope I don't let anybody down if it doesn't go right," he says.

So do you think that everything will be ready by November?

"I hope so ... I really hope so."

Livestock approved for Ave. F folks

The Texico City Council on Tuesday heard resident input on proposed Avenue F annexation.

The annexation process has been going on for a year.

Glen and Freda Neie attended, in hopes of trying to arrange a clause or a stipulation so that they might keep their livestock.

"We don't want to lose what we have," says Mrs. Neie, "and we don't want problems 10 years down the road either."

The council agreed to have City Attorney Ty Rudder put in a stipulation in the proposal to allow residents on Avenue F to

FCC offers free training for CNA's

What is a certified nurse's aide (CNA)?

It's someone who requires special training in basic nursing. This includes bathing, dressing, feeding, grooming, and changing soiled clothes and linens.

In other words, a CNA assists the nursing home resident with the activities of daily living, and maintaining his dignity while doing so.

The Farwell Convalescent Center is taking applications for a free CNA class that will be starting soon. The classes will be held in Levelland, and include 80 hours of training, then testing.

The FCC plans to have car pools for the trainees; mileage will be paid to the drivers.

The CNA training will be paid by the FCC, and employment at the nursing home will be offered to those who successfully complete the training and receive their certification.

Besides the duties mentioned, CNA's help keep residents hydrated with fluids, and help keep the units neat and clean. Once the nurse's aide is trained and certified, they can also take vital signs.

The CNA is the backbone of the nursing staff, said FCC administrator Jerry Adams.

Many times it is the nurse's aide who finds the first sign of a change in a resident's condition. And nurses rely on the CNA's to report any changes promptly so that adequate care can be given.

Will Anderson, Farwell's Naval Attache in Ecuador, was home for Border Town Days and stopped by the Tribune to chat.

He had a chance to talk with Bobby Winegeart at BT. As you know, surgery is scheduled this fall to hopefully help Bobby to walk again.

Will told Bobby that he checked out the hospital where the surgery is scheduled. The hospital is about 20 minutes away from Will's home in Quito, the capital of Ecuador.

Will went to the hospital with two nurses to see it. "It was great," said Will. The nurses gave it a strong "thumbs up."

Bobby's surgery will be performed by Dr. Kao, of Washington, D.C.

Last month, Dr. Kao performed similar surgery on a 21-year-old young man who was paralyzed from the neck down after a truck accident.

Will talked to the young man during his hospital visit. Three days after the operation, the young man had regained feelings in his hands and down to his waist.

The young man was in the same room that Bobby Will be in -- with a great view of the Andes Mountains.

Will has offered to have Bobby's parents stay with him, but the hospital also has rooms available for them. They have their choice of where to stay for the 2 to 3 weeks they will be there.

Will said he was told that Dr. Kao has dozens of these operations, with an excellent success rate. The reason the operations are done in Ecuador is due to the cost.

The estimated cost there is about \$30,000. In the U.S., it would be \$150,000.

Will told Bobby he is looking forward to seeing him and his parents later this year when they come for the surgery.

It just so happened that he was Eleisa's friend and she had told him that morning to keep his eyes open for any secretarial jobs opening.

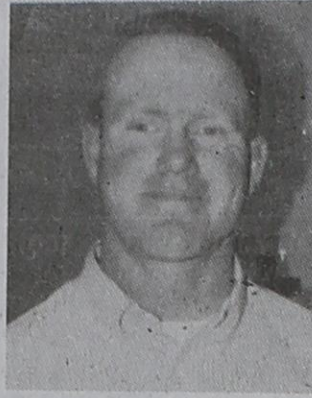
Isn't it great the way things work out?

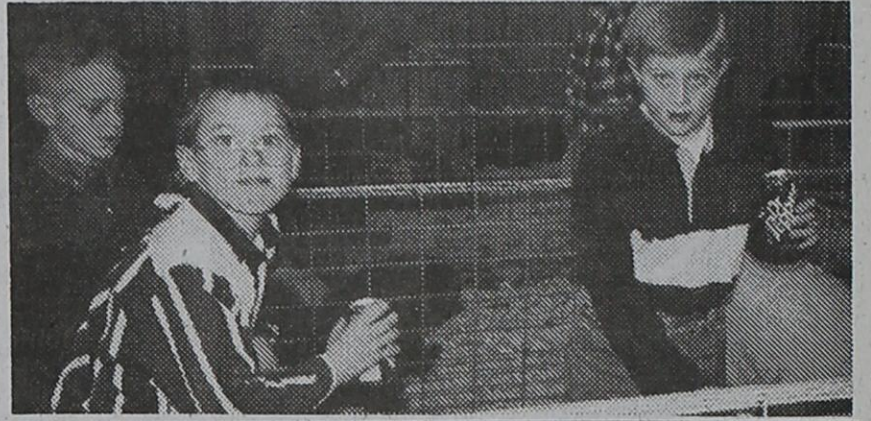
The 2000 Parmer County Stock Show dinner is just around the corner -- Aug. 19 at 7 p.m. in the Friona Community Center.

The trigger level for treating cotton in the Muleshoe area has been changed, said Terry Futch, Northwest Plains Eradication Zone manager.

A new trap trigger of 3 weevils per 40-acre field was set, after discussions with program director Charles Allen.

The change will reduce the number of acres being treated

in those areas, helping preserve beneficial insects that prey on the beet armyworm, said Allen.

The Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation will continue to monitor the level of beet armyworm infestation, along with crop stage and weevil-trap data, and will adjust treatment triggers as necessary, said Futch.

Believe it or not, school is fast approaching. Here are the starting dates for our area schools:

K'Dawn Scroggins, formerly of Texico, is the new Bovina High School principal. Last year, she was middle school principal.

Now she will oversee grades 6-12.

Her husband, Bruce, former Texico School football coach, is athletic director and head coach.

According to an Associated Press story on Sunday, federal officials are unhappy with what they consider lax DWI laws in New Mexico.

New Mexico allows 2nd and 3rd time offenders with revoked licenses to receive a limited license under certain conditions after 30 days. That violates federal rules of a mandatory minimum one-year driver's license suspension for repeat offenders.

And New Mexico does not meet federal mandatory minimum jail sentences for repeat offenders.

And New Mexico doesn't require mandatory impoundment or immobilization or installation of ignition interlock systems on all vehicles registered to repeat offenders.

So the federal Highway Traffic Safety Administration is shifting \$6 million normally sent for New Mexico highway construction into other state programs aimed at traffic safety.

The boll weevil count in Parmer County is low due to close monitoring and quick action.

According to Terry Futch, manager for the Northwest Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone, they "have not been catching a lot of weevils."

They have been finding a lot of beneficial bugs such as ladybugs (these are bugs that

kill the bad ones) so everything is looking pretty good.

Here are the stats for the week of July 24-30:

Eighty-nine boll weevils were caught in 5,845 traps in Parmer County, averaging out to .02 percent.

And out of 32,363 acres being monitored in the area, only .08 percent of acres are being sprayed.

Futch says not a lot of spraying for weevils has been going on. Apparently, they did a very good job spraying last year knocking out 93 percent of the boll weevil population.



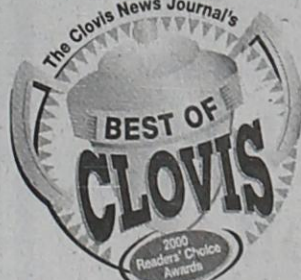
