

Combest emphasizes countercyclical income

The State Line Tribune participated in a conference call last Friday with Cong. Larry Combest regarding the new ag bill coponsored by Combest and Rep. Charles Stenholm.

Combest, a Republican, heads the House Ag Committee, and Stenholm is the ranking Democrat having special giveaways as fund-raisers. A story on those is given elsewhere in today's Tribune.

Last year, Crime Stoppers paid out two rewards. The top award they give out is \$1,000.

Currently, there is \$5,390 in its Reward Fund, and \$2,297 in its General Fund (for normal expenses). They also have (Continued on Page 5)

The Parmer County Jail had its annual jail inspection last Friday -- and it passed muster.


State inspector Dennis Cisneros gave the jail approval, saying there were no deficiencies noted.

The bill adds \$73.5 billion over the current farm bill -- a total of \$168 billion, over 10 years.

Combest stressed that the committee has a limit on how much it can spend. So if any committee members have specific areas where they want to add money, then they also have to show where like financial cuts can be addressed.

As for initial reaction, he said the wheat growers have shown strong support. The bill was announced last Friday.

Hearings were to start this week, and Combest wanted them completed by Friday. Thus, work on the bill could be finished Combest said the 1996 Freedom to Farm Act "was a mistake. It didn't work." And he blamed the lack of countercyclical income language in that act for its downfall.

He said he went back to the 1985 bill, which included countercyclical income.

Other parts of the Combest farm bill includes maintaining planting flexibility; keeping current loan rates, fixed rates and target prices for cotton; increases the loan rate for sorghum to \$1.89 per bushel; continues dairy price supports; expands CRP land to 40 million acres, etc.

CORN: Prices are being supported heavily by demand coming from China. The fact that high pressure is creating hot and dry weather across the Mid West has been a bonus for prices. This market will likely feed off adverse weather until there is a change in the forecast. Remember the market trades on weather predictions 5 days ahead.

WHEAT: Looks like prices finally kicked into gear last week. The market doesn't have the adverse weather to support prices like corn and beans. Export demand and or Karnel Bunt may be the wild cards pushing prices higher? Fundamentally, wheat should be the strongest grain, but it seems to be the weakest for the moment. Look for higher prices later.

SOYBEANS: The leader of the pack when it comes to grain. Strong demand and adverse weather have been the perfect combination supporting prices. Prices should remain strong into early August or until weather changes. Either way, demand for soy products will remain strong until the new crop is harvested.

LIVE CATTLE: Prices may have bottomed last week at \$72.50 basis the August contract and \$69 in the cash? Prices are expected to remain soft this week and then explode upwards into August. Still looking for prices to reach \$76-\$78 into first week of August. Cash may remain \$1-2 below the August contract until we get into the month of August.

FEEDER CATTLE: Targets were met at \$89.50 last week basis the August contract. Corn may add some pressure, but prices should still be able to rally up into early August. Targets remain between \$94-96, but it will take higher fed cattle prices and strong demand to push back to new contract highs over the coming weeks.
