

**The Fillpot Report**

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**COTTON:** Prices are beginning to look like something may be going on? Technically, prices have broken above long term resistance levels at \$43.25 basis the December contract. Prices now have projections up towards the \$45-47 level. The U.S. Dollar has also begun to show signs of weakness.

**CORN:** Weather has been the primary focus over the last couple of weeks. This has been an usual market in the fact that prices are historically still extremely cheap. As long as problems persist in the Corn Belt and China, look for uncertainty to translate into continued volatile markets.

**WHEAT:** The weakest link as far as grains go? This market has really tried to hold strong, but poor exports have done little to support prices. Long term trends are still pointing higher into October and support from higher corn and soybeans has helped to support.

**SOYBEANS:** Soybean prices still lead the grain pack as the strongest market. If there is any uncertainty in direction, the rest of the market seems to follow their lead. Still fairly strong demand and uncertainties with weather have held prices fairly well up until now.

**LIVE CATTLE:** The last USDA Cattle on Feed now has many analysts somewhat skeptical about higher prices into the Fall. Prices were expected to re-test lows in the \$72.50 area and then rebound quickly into August. Prices are now at these levels and the cash market must prove itself.

**FEEDER CATTLE:** Feeder prices held twice around the \$89.50 support levels before breaking below. Prices now have fairly strong support at \$88.50 and aside from sharply lower cash sales, prices should be in position to maintain these levels and work higher into the early August time frame.

**Ag waste cleanup offered**

Parmer County Extension Agent Cody Hall said an agricultural waste pesticide collection, Texas country cleanup and household hazardous waste pickup will be held on Aug. 16 at the Bailey County Coliseum in Muleshoe.

The same collection will be held Aug. 18 at the Ollie Liner Center in Plainview.

They can accept unwanted pesticides, properly rinsed plastic pesticide containers, used motor oil, oil filters, lead acid batteries, and household hazardous waste.

Also, lab wastes from local school districts will be taken.

Here is the weekly report from Texico Police Chief Kelley Brophy:

A reminder that the Super Blitz will continue through August and September.

Emphasis is extremely heavy on motorists obeying the seat belt law.

"After-hours trading" may soon be so prevalent that the term "after hours" may become meaningless.

But that's not the case yet. And if you are interested in it, you should be aware that there are some real differences between after-hours trades and those made during "normal" business hours.

One difference has to do with the pricing of any given stock. During regular trading, you can place a "market" order to buy or sell a stock at the stock's current price. You won't have to wonder if the price will change before your trade is executed; what you see is what you'll get. But there is no standard price quote on stocks trading after 4 p.m. Eastern time, so all after-hours trades are "limit" orders.

That means when you place an order, you must set a price "ceiling" when you want to buy, or a "floor" when you want to sell. In other words, you must decide what price range you will not exceed when you make a trade. That's a different kind of concept for most people used to simply buying and selling stocks at the available price. And it means you'll have to make a judgment call on what you're willing to pay or be paid for a stock.

That's not to say that "limit" orders are, by themselves, a problem. In one sense, limit orders may be beneficial, because they can protect you against wild price swings. On the other, after-hours trading volume is still relatively low, so you may not find any takers for your limit orders.

You also may find other risks in after-hours trading. For one thing, price movements during extended hours may be more volatile than those during trading sessions. And the impact of news announcements immediately preceding, or during, after-hours sessions may cause an exaggerated effect on the market, because the volume of trades is so much lower than it is during the regular trading day.

It's a good idea to read the day's news on the stock you're trading, especially any announcements that come after regular trading hours. If your stock is moving rapidly up or down, and you can't find any real reason for it, then you might want to hold your order until you determine what's behind it.

Is after-hours trading worth it to you? You'll have to decide that for yourself. Generally speaking, though, there shouldn't be a lot of times when you absolutely must make a trade. The truth is that you have time enough to build and execute a solid investment plan during normal trading hours.

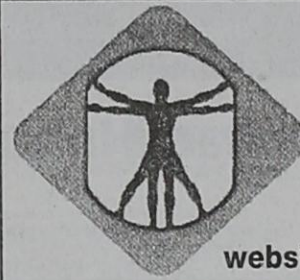

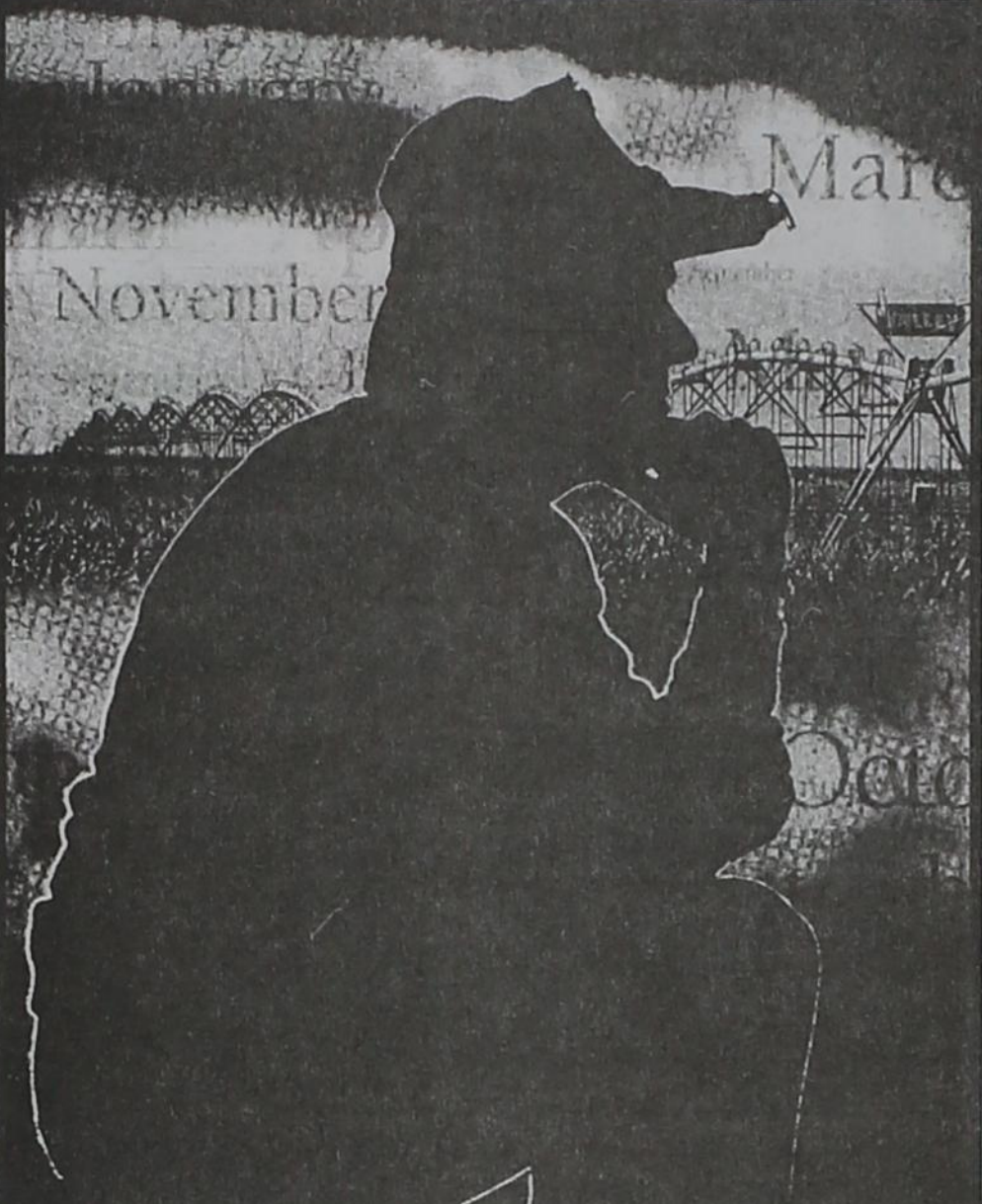

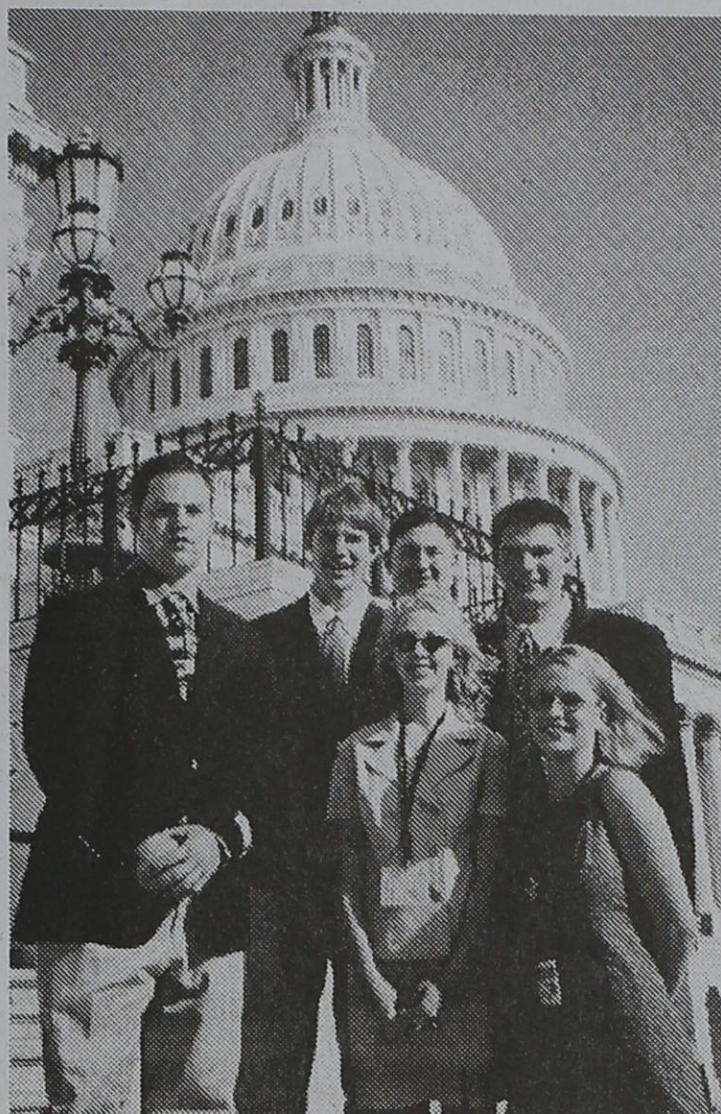

## Deaf Smith sponsors local students' tour in Washington, D.C.

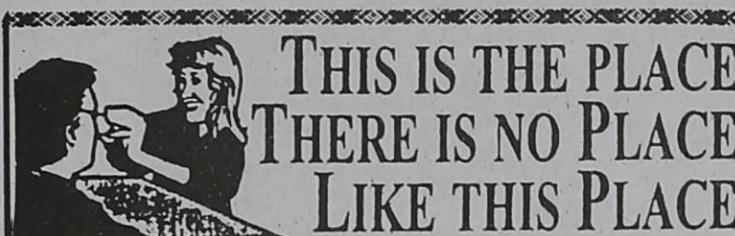
Each year, many of the nation's electric coopera-

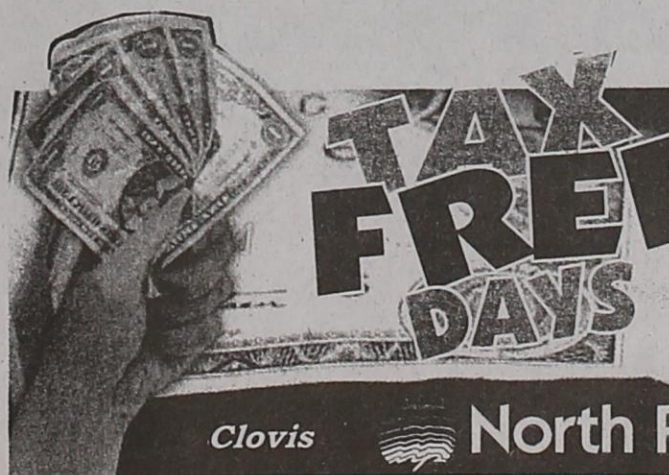

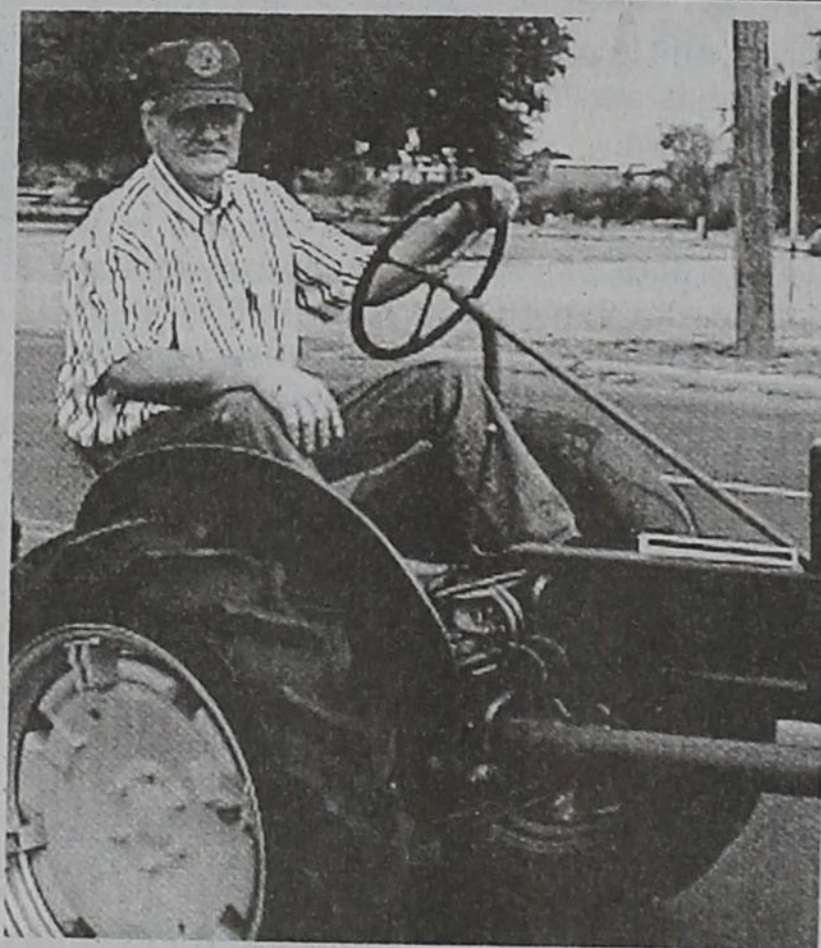
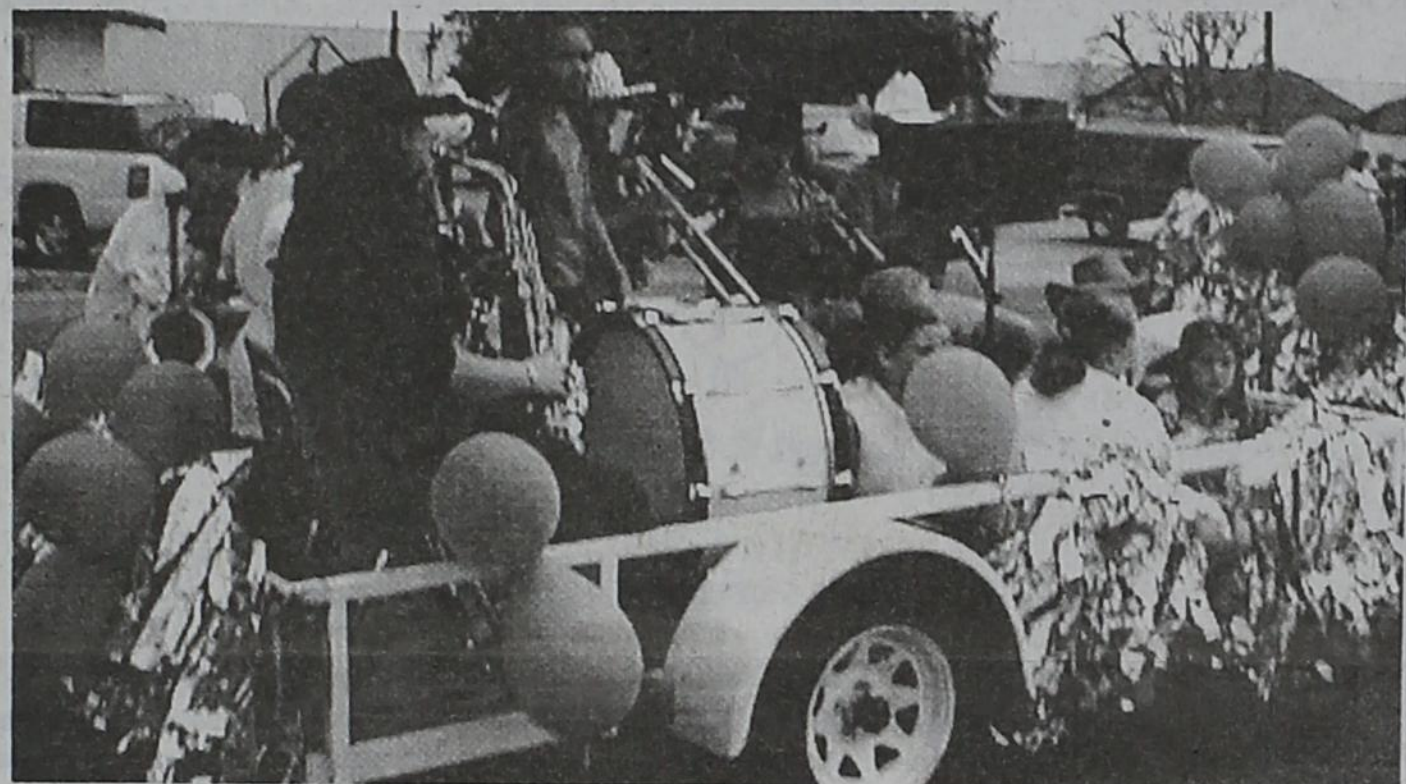
