## Pest Management Update

Parmer County Entomologist Cherinell Riley



Parmer County Extension Service entomologist Cherinell Riley will be resigning June 30. Her husband, Ricky, has taken a job in Tahlequah, Okla. Cherinell plans to possibly pursue greenhouse work or teacher at a community college.

Here is her last column for the Tribune:

I don't know how many times I have corrected people when they ask me where I live. It's "Farwell, TX" with no "e."

Here's a few tips if you have pest problems. In regard to insects, collect more than one specimen if you can. Take it to the extension office. Include on a label with the jarred specimen, your name, address and phone number, and where you collected the insect (i.e., 10 miles north of Muleshoe on shrubs at home).

If you have a diseased plant, bring in branches that are showing mild or severe symptoms, but note that once a plant is dead, brown and crisp, it is difficult, if not impossible, to tell what it died of -- nutrition deficiency or disease.

AN excellent source to get Internet information is lubbock.tamu.edu. All of the area pest problems are reported to extension offices and compiled on this website. There are placed to look up insect identification, news articles and the excellent newsletter from the Lubbock extension specialists that includes what is going on or about to go on with all crops in all areas.

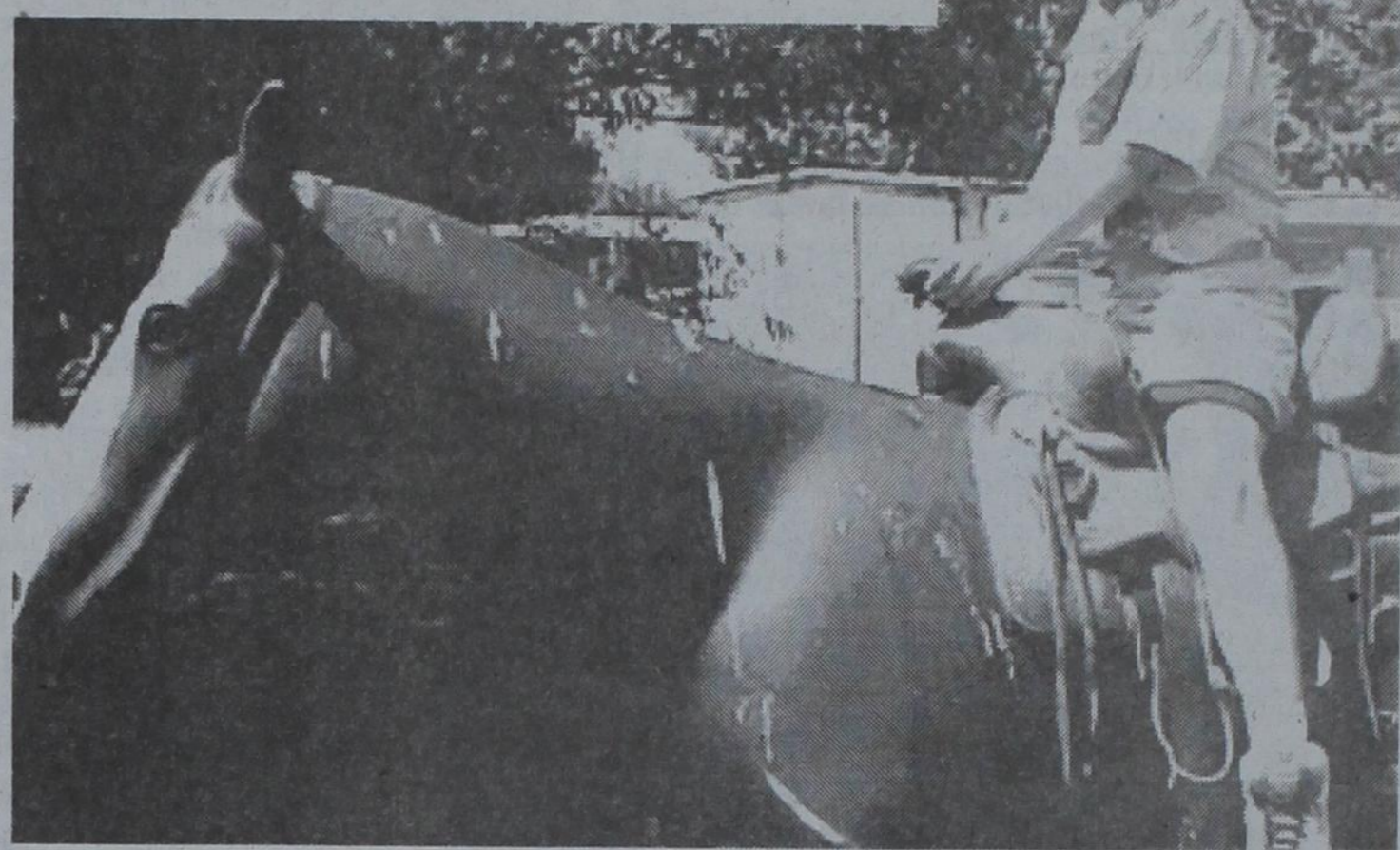

**COTTON:** No news to move market in either direction. Still has to overcome enormous amount of pessimism in the market. Support is \$39.90 basis July, but a break below this could push prices down toward 38 cents? Should see 5 cent or better rally in July?

**CORN:** Lots of positive news this week and prices continue to hold or move lower? China has a drought in some areas, but looks like there is an agreement to allow them into the WTO. This should translate into 4.5 mm exported. Still very cold temperatures in the Corn Belt.

**WHEAT:** Good news in wheat, but still poor performance. Harvest pressure may be too much for prices until later on? Long term, this market has lots of potential to move significantly higher, but traders will have to remain patient? Still look for 50 cents to \$1.00 higher by year end.

**SOYBEANS:** Very strong demand coming from soy meal and soy oil demand. World demand continues strong in spite of a high U.S. Dollar. Look for prices to cool off for a few days and then resume their up trend. Targets are as high as \$4.80--5.00 basis nearby July.

**LIVE CATTLE:** Seasonal pressure along with ample supplies continue to push prices lower. Market has dropped from June 4 into June 24 for 11 out of the last 11 years. Cash may continue weaker over next few weeks, but August LC should begin to hold around \$71.50--72.50.

**FEEDER CATTLE:** Feeders may pull back toward the \$89.50--90.00 level, but should hold. A bottom should also be completed over the next 2-6 weeks. A close above old highs of \$92.00 should project prices back up toward the \$95.00-96.50 area basis the August and October.

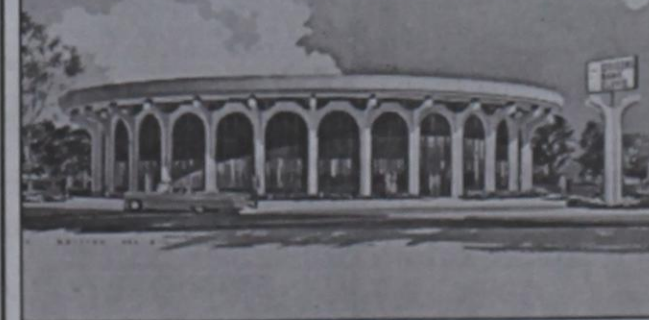

### Texico city pool almost ready

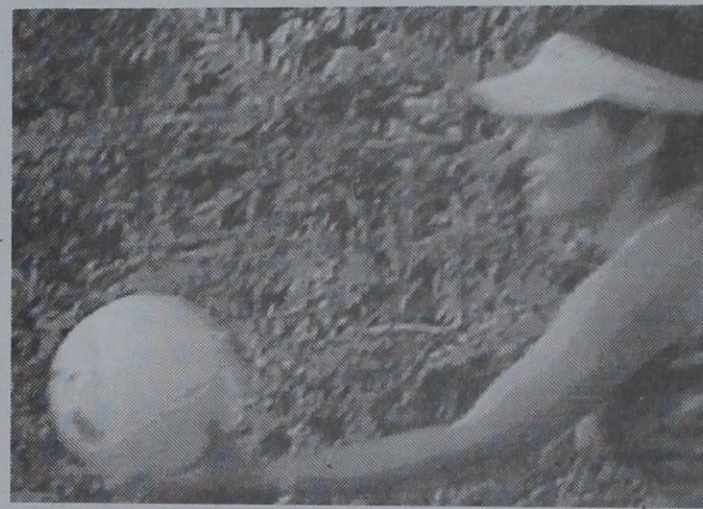
The Texico public swimming pool is close to be opened, reports project manager Kelley Brophy.

### The Texico National Bank.
