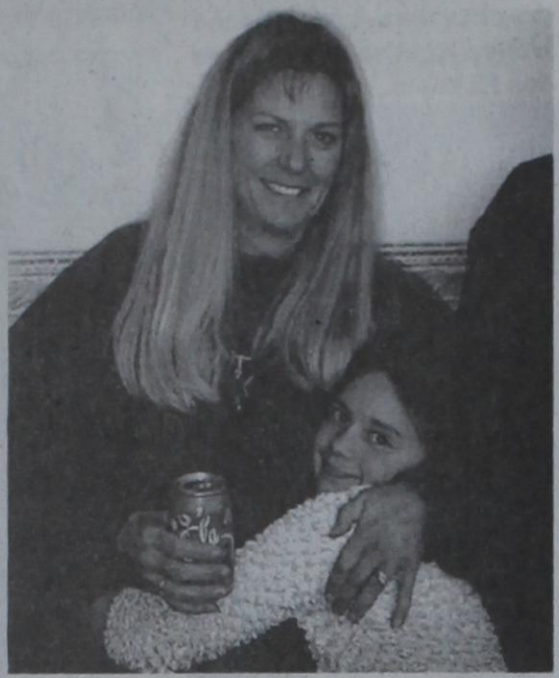

Tax abatement process starts for dairy

The Parmer County Commissioners on Monday began the process for tax abatement for DeWitt Dairy, to be built along Highway 86, about six miles east of Bovina (toward Dimmitt).

The process includes a public notice and public hearing. More information will be announced later.

The dairy request meets the county's criteria for it to be awarded a tax abatement schedule.

After the facility is on the tax role, there is 100% tax abatement for the 1st and 2nd years; 75% for the 3rd year; 50% for the 4th year; and 25% for the 5th year.

Last year, two tax abatements were given by the commissioners, for Excel and for a grain elevator.

In other business, the commissioners:

-- Decided not to amend its contract with

Friona State Bank which handles the county's monies as the county banking depository.

Jerry Hinkle, of the bank, attended the meeting.

In December, the bank asked the commissioners to consider two new options that were available to place the county's letters of credit, one through the Federal Home Loan Bank, and bonds through an insurance company in

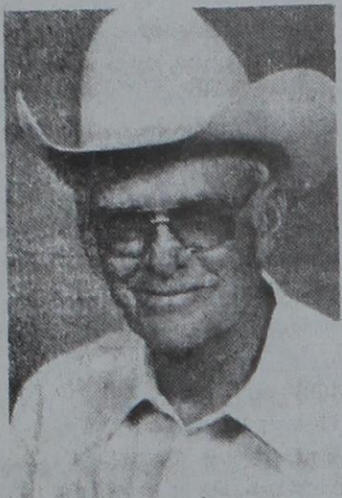
Kansas.

The bank suggested the change because it would appreciate the bank's cash position. The new options became available Sept. 1, 2001.

Thus, Parmer County will continue to have its securities pledged to the county through the Federal Home Loan Bank -- federally-insured bonds.

He was ordained as a minister in the Assembly of God Church where he served for short periods

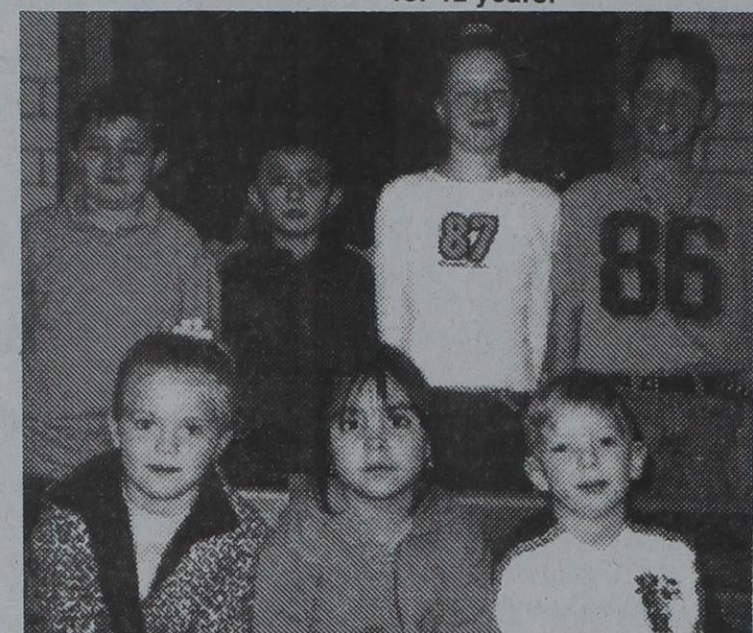
of time as pastor of three different congregations.

Lifeline offers a valuable resource for our area

A particularly interesting program was presented at last week's Texico-Farwell Rotary Club meeting by Darlene Rose, who heads the Lifeline project in this area.

Lifeline that is a very valuable service utilized by over 100 elderly and/or handicapped persons in our area, including about half a dozen folks in the Twin Cities.

Basically, this is how it works:

You wear a button on a neck chain. Whenever you need help, you press the waterproof help button that activates a small in-home unit called a communicator.

It puts you in touch with a Lifeline monitor (based in Massachusetts) who talks to you to find out what kind of help you need. Monitors (and there are many of them working at the same time) are on duty 24 hours a day.

Then the monitor can call one of your friends, neighbors or relatives to assist you; or, if more professional help is needed, that will be done, too.

And if you press your button and can't speak, the monitor knows exactly what to do, too.

The Lifeline is very affordable here, \$30 a month. And it sure can give an elderly and/or handicapped person living alone peace of mind.

It's this type of service that I really appreciate being offered to folks. Just visualize this:

An elderly person falls, breaks a hip, and lies on the floor for days without help. But if that person has the Lifeline button, all he/she needs to do is push it -- and help is immediately on the way.

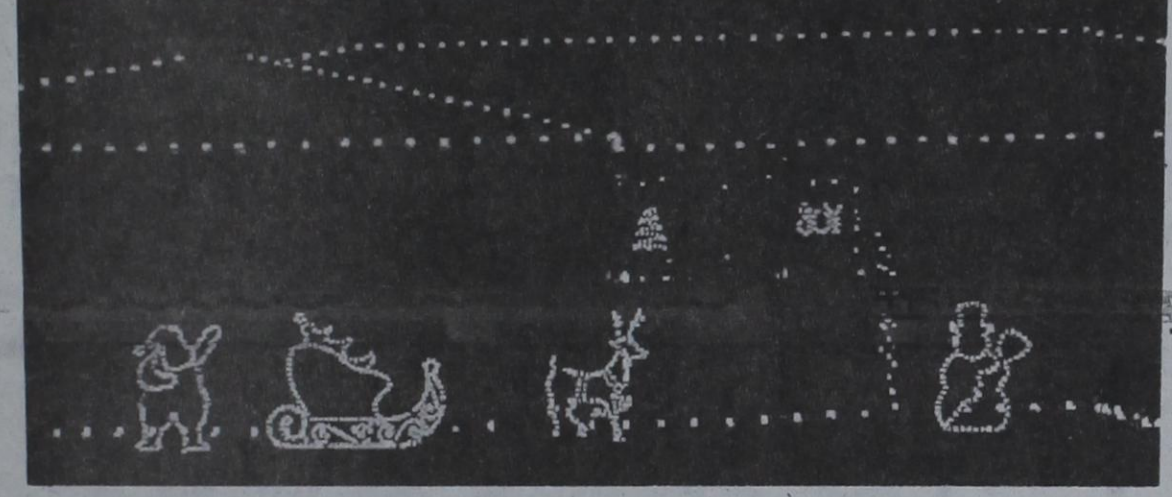
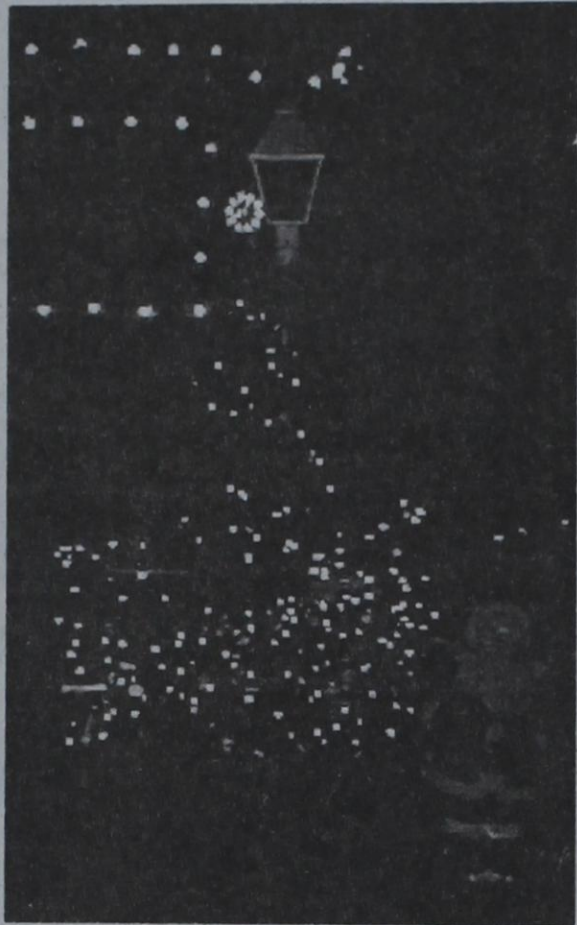
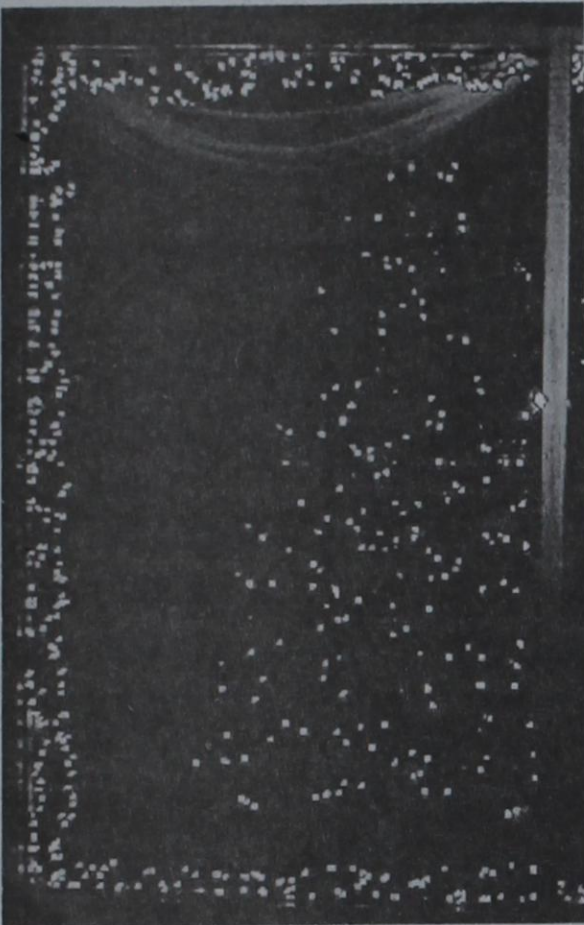

Here's how precinct finances shape up

At the beginning of each year, the Tribune publishes financial information for the four Parmer County precincts so that folks will know the shape they are in.

The funds that each precinct has can be used for any precinct business, such as employee salaries, equipment, machinery, fuel, supplies, etc. All funds are maintained by county treasurer Anne Norton.

The precincts and their commissioners are: Pct. 1, Kirk Frye, Friona area; Pct. 2, Tom Ware, Bovina area; Pct. 3, Ed Corn, Farwell area; and Pct. 4, Raymond McGehee, Lazbuddie area.

Cash on hand is maintained in the Farm to Market Fund and the Lateral Fund. The Lateral Fund consists of money that comes from the state each October, based on the number of road miles in each precinct.

Thus, when the commissioners redistricted their precincts this year, the number of road miles was important in their thinking -- it involved finances.

Here's a look at the cash on hand, as of Dec. 31, 2001, for each precinct. Also given are the totals from a year ago, on Dec. 31, 2000.

Precinct 1

In the Farm to Market Fund is \$23,747, compared to \$17,756 a year ago. In the Lateral Fund are zero dollars, compared to \$7,619 a year ago.

Pct. 1 also has a certificate of deposit worth \$100,000 and \$90,974 in investments. A year ago, the precinct had the same \$100,000 CD, and \$114,000 in investments.

Precinct 2

In the Farm to Market Fund is \$33,389, compared to \$9,754 a year ago. In the Lateral Fund is \$2,600, compared to \$7,039 a year ago.

Pct. 2 also has a certificate of deposit worth \$200,000, plus investments of \$135,263. A year ago, the precinct had a CD worth \$180,000 and investments of \$90,000.

Precinct 3

In the Farm to Market Fund is \$29,865, compared to \$15,179 a year ago. The Lateral Fund contains zero dollars, compared to \$9,610 a year ago.

Pct. 3 has no CD's, but investments worth \$83,116. A year ago, the finances were similar: no CD and investments worth \$83,000.

Precinct 4

In the Farm to Market Fund is \$37,041, compared to \$15,053 a year ago. The Lateral Fund contains \$464, compared to \$7,744 a year ago.

Pct. 4 has four certificates of deposit, totalling \$485,000. A year ago, it had four CDs worth \$438,000. The precinct has no investments.

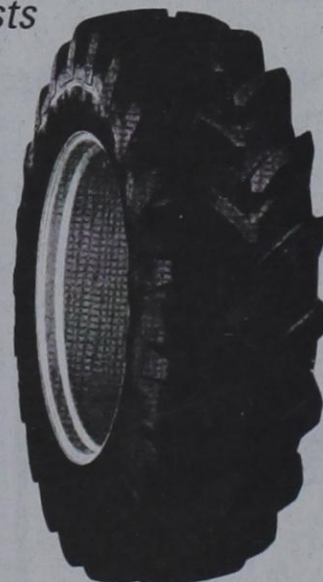

LIVE CATTLE: February Live Cattle basically stayed inside a long term sideways range between \$70-71, but short term trends closed down on Friday. Cash prices are expected to trade steady to \$1 higher between \$66-67. Long term trends are still pointing higher, but there is still room for lots of improvement on the cash side. Need to see a recovery early next week?

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeders basically gave the entire week's gains up on Friday. After working higher since Monday, March Feeders traded down the \$1.50 limit on Friday to end the day down \$1.35. Higher corn prices (basically 4 cents) was to blame for the sharply lower opening and the rest was history. Short term trends are down, but prices are still inside a sideways range.

CORN: March Corn had a positive reaction to this morning's USDA Crop Production Report. Actual numbers in all categories except the World Ending Stocks came in below the lowest estimated range. Prices were able to penetrate the \$2.13 before trading back lower. Trends are up with support at \$2.07. A close below this level would most likely translate into lower prices. Needs to hold.

SOYBEANS: March Soybeans also received positive news from the USDA Crop Production Report. Prices opened over 10 cents higher when actual USDA numbers were lower than the lowest estimates in all categories except the World Ending Stocks. Prices cleared the \$4.41 level early before selling off. Short term trends remain higher and long term trends are close to turning up as well.

WHEAT: March Wheat has stalled out just above the \$3.00 level, but prices are likely to correct in either a sideways or lower fashion before attempting to move higher from here. Long term targets remain around the \$3.50 area, but it will take more positive news to move the market. USDA Report did little to support a rally. Basically, everything released in the Report was termed neutral.

COTTON: March Cotton was able to hold support this week, closing above the 37-cent level. Long and short trends remain higher as long as prices can hold support levels around the 35 cent area. Resistance levels above \$38.50-40.00 will have to be taken out if prices are to reach long term targets between the 43-44 cent level. Trends look to be higher into the March time frame.
