## Lee & Gloria Hutchins Walking across the ocean

Lee and Gloria Hutchins, of Farwell, know what it's like to walk across the ocean.

Have they taken to oceanography and exploration? No, the Hutchins' are simply allowing God to work through their lives and He's taken them on a walk of faith that led across the ocean to Sweden.

Sept. 3<sup>rd</sup> - 17<sup>th</sup>, Lee and Gloria traveled to Framnäs, Sweden, to help lead the second "Walk to Emmaus" ever held in the Scandinavian country.

The couple had traveled to Sweden last year for the first "Walk to Emmaus." It was a women's Walk and Gloria was one of the members of the "Bakbordet," or back table coordinators. In the United States, this table is called "St. Elsewhere." Lee was there for support and to help get things rolling for a men's Walk. The men's walk was planned over 3 1/2 years.

"The Walk to Emmaus" is sponsored in whole by the Methodist Church Upper Room ministries in the U.S. It has begun to spread internationally, slowly but steadily. Norway has begun to hold Walks and Finland and Denmark have been contacted about the possibility of establishing the Walk to Emmaus.

Lee and Gloria are a part of the New Horizon's Emmaus community and were part of a group from Texas that helped to conduct the Walks in Framnäs.

The "Cleopas Project," as the Swedish Walks are called, took place at a retreat facility owned by the Methodist Church of Sweden outside of Framnäs. The niece of Alfred Nobel once owned this property. She willed the property to the Methodist Church and it makes for a beautiful, serene setting for the Walks.

There were 20 women "pilgrims" and 14 men "pilgrims." Their Walks were conducted in the exact same way as the American versions.

"The 'flavorings' of the walks were just a little different," said Lee. "Otherwise, they used the exact guides as America."

"It was interesting to go back to Sweden to see how the men would react to their Walk to Emmaus experience," Gloria said. "Their culture is still very much where the man takes the lead in all things and the women were excited to see if the men would react as positively to their experience as they all had."

Veterans Day, a very special day of remembrance.

First of all, I hope you all will come to the ceremony at the Parmer County Veterans Memorial in Farwell City Park on Monday.

A story is elsewhere on this page giving the agenda.

It's important to recognize our veterans and appreciate their service to our nation. Please attend.

Yep, I'm a veteran, too. RA 16854373. You never forget. "RA" stands for "Regular Army." I served a three-year tour, starting in 1966.

At the time I went in during the Vietnam War you were either "RA" -- if you enlisted, or "US" -- if you were drafted.

No, I didn't serve in Vietnam. I was sent to Germany for two years, with the 3<sup>rd</sup> Infantry Division. Then the last year was spent in New York State with an Army Air Defense Command unit.

The 3<sup>rd</sup> Inf Div -- the Marne Division. It's the only division in the U.S. Army that has an official nickname -- the Marne Division, due to its heroism at the Battle of the Marne in World War I.

My daughter, Patty, was born while I was serving with them. In one of our scrapbooks is a certificate signed by the commanding general declaring Patty to be an "official Marne baby."

How did I end up in Germany instead of Vietnam? An interesting tale.

When I enlisted, I took the oath of allegiance at the recruitment station in Chicago. While there, I met a fella named Mike Yoakum, who also had enlisted and planned to take journalism courses

Their next visit to the Farwell Elementary School nurse's office will be on Nov. 13 from 10 a.m. to noon and from 1:30 to 3:30 p.m.

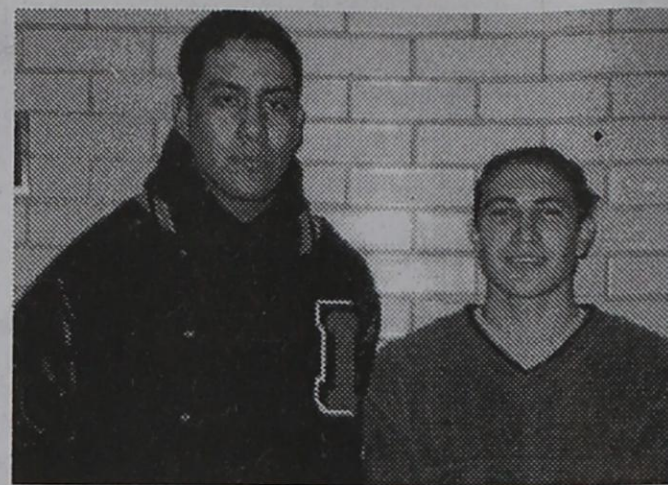
Persons should bring their immunizations records, if they have them.

In the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter, after Farwell stopped Sundown on a 4<sup>th</sup> down play, they were unable to score, but Jason Sudderth boomed a 46-yard punt to the Sundown 3. The bad field position and an aggressive Steers defense resulted in a safety for Farwell, with Justin Ware and Luis Olmos on the tackle. Farwell led 2-0.  
In the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter, Hugo Vasquez returned a punt 70 yards for a TD. Ware kicked the point after.  
After an acrobatic interception by Colby Norton, Logan McFarland plunged in from the 1 to make it 16-0 deep in the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter.  
With 3:34 left in the 3<sup>rd</sup> period, Farwell lined up for a 19-yard field goal try. But after a bad snap, Logan McFarland threw to Olmos for a TD and a 22-0 lead.  
At the end of the quarter, McFarland had a nifty punt return. So when Sundown got the ball, they were tackled in their end zone again for a safety, by Ware and Giovanni Moreno.  
With 1:42 left, Matthew Edwards scored the final TD.

# Springlake-Earth beats back Steers

## Water Conservation District accepting data for claims

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 is accepting orders for data to support landowners' claims for a cost-in-water income tax depletion deduction to 2002 federal income taxes.

The data itself cannot be released until Jan. 1, 2003, the beginning of the new tax year.

Landowners who have previously claimed the deduction and have established their cost-in-water at the time of land purchase, as well as saturated thickness at that time, will only need the amount of the 2002 decline to substantiate their claim.

Landowners who have not previously claimed the deduction need to establish the number of feet of saturated material they had beneath their land at the time of acquisition, the cost of the water which has been determined by comparing actual land sales with and without ground water at the date of land acquisition, and the decline in the water level during the tax year. These data may be provided by the district for the district's service area.

their ballots.

The state had informed counties that state poll inspectors would check elections in most counties. Such was the case here. A state poll inspector came to Friona and Farwell.

There were no county contested races.

Elected without opposition were incumbents Gordon Green, Democrat, 287<sup>th</sup> District Court Judge, 1,139; Bonnie Clayton-Heald, Democrat, County Judge, 1,324; Sandra Warren, Republican, District Court Clerk, 1,641; and Colleen Stover, Republican, County Clerk, 1,623.

Elected was Altha Herington, Republican, county treasurer, 1,621. She replaced Anne Norton, who is retiring.

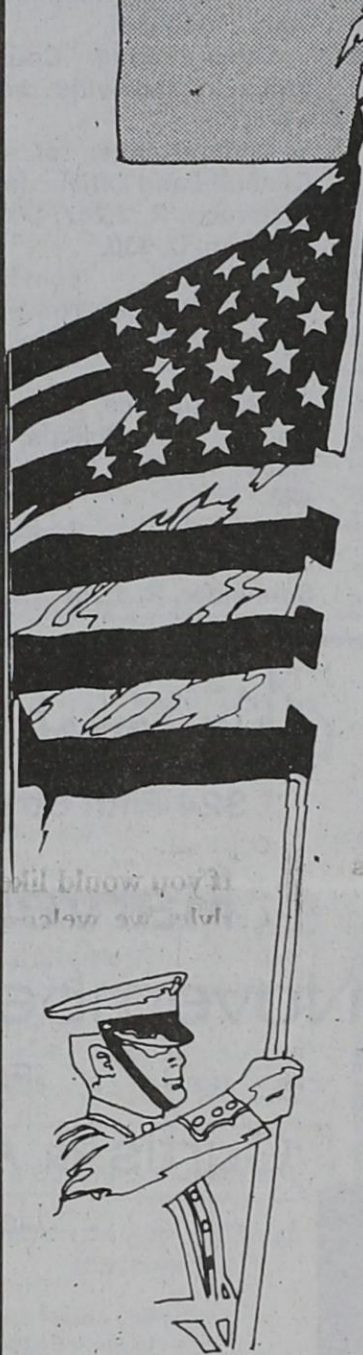
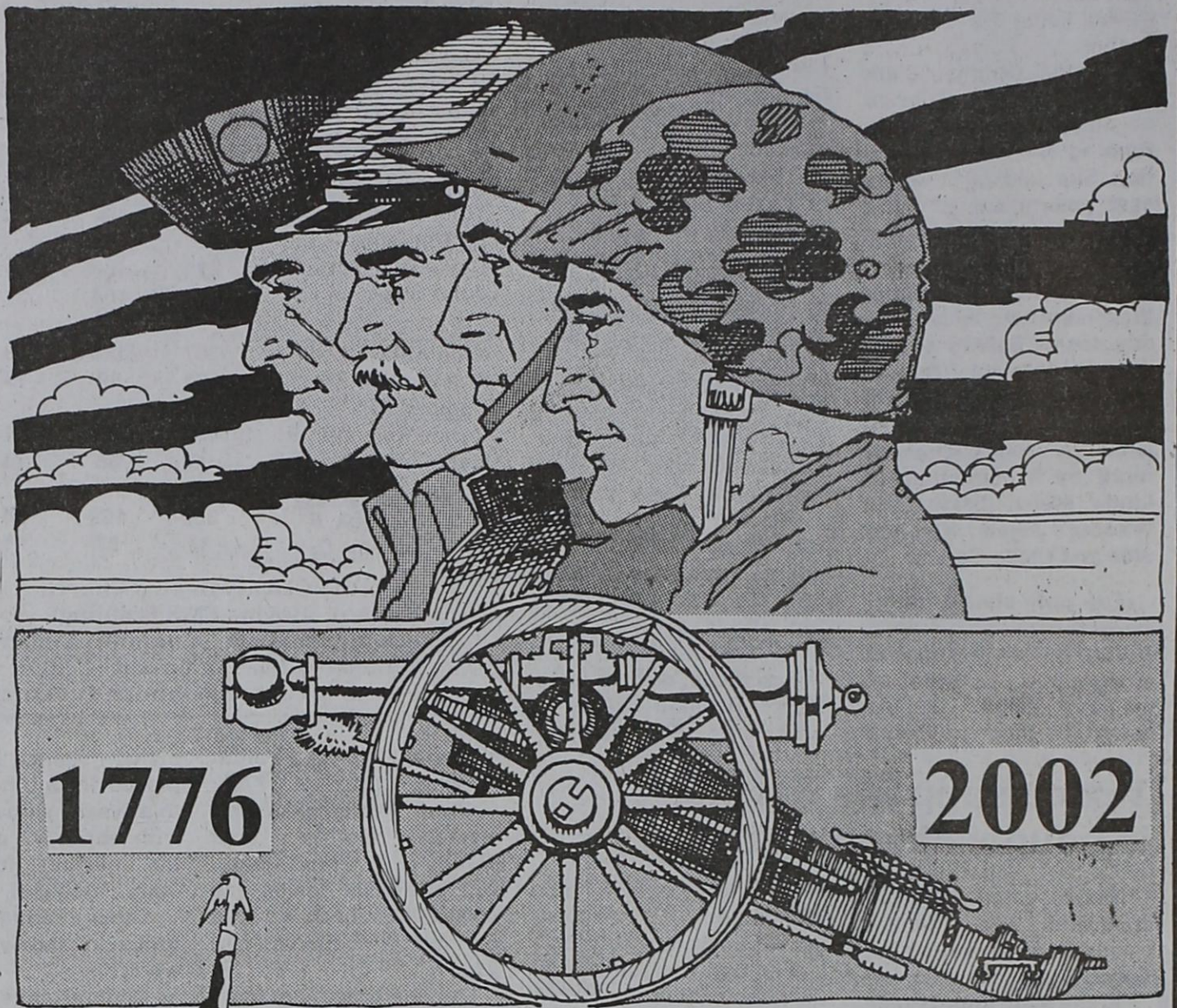

I was despondent. By being put off those two weeks, it meant I would not be able to get to my journalism course at Fort Benjamin Harrison in Indianapolis on time. Who knows what would happen then?

Anyway, it turned out okay. I got to Ft. Ben and was allowed to kill some more time until the next course came along about three weeks later.

Meanwhile, Mike Yoakum had started the course I originally had signed up for since he had finished his basic training on time and had gotten to Ft. Ben on time.

The upshot? Mike Yoakum's class was sent to Vietnam.

My class was assigned to Germany.

All because I was No. 44 that wintry January day in 1966, and not No. 45.

# 9-0 Wolverines start state playoffs

The 2<sup>nd</sup> ranked Texico Wolverines are 9-0 and district champions after beating 4<sup>th</sup> ranked Jal Panthers, 52-13, last Friday there. The Jal offense proved to be no match for the Texico defense, which has allowed only 31 points in their nine games, including six shut-outs.

The Wolverines open state playoff action by hosting Navajo Prep at 2 p.m. mt on Saturday in a quarter-final game.

Jal went 3 and out in their first possession, and punted. Texico quickly scored on their second offensive play, on a 69-yard TD scamper by Adrian Loera with 10:14 left in the 1<sup>st</sup> quarter.

The Panthers again were stopped by superb defensive plays, including tackles for a 7-yard loss by Alex Mendoza and Matt Soliz, a 1-yard sack by Mendoza and a 1-yard sack by Toby Thornton. Jal punted to Tony Clements, who returned it to the Jal 35.

This time, it took the Wolverines three plays to score -- on a 14-yard TD run by Loera. Braden Vaughan ran in the extra points and it was 14-0 with 6:58 left.

Jal was stopped dead again by the Texico defense, as Joe Zaikowski recorded a 2-yard sack. Then Landon Johnson blocked the punt, and recovered it himself at the Jal 22. Two plays later, at 4:17, Texico was in the end zone -- on a 13-yard run by Vaughan. The run for extra points failed.

A penalty gave Jal its 1<sup>st</sup> first down of the game. Then the Panthers connected on a 35-yard TD pass to close the gap to 20-7 at 3:05. Texico was held on offense and punted. Bryce Bailey then forced a fumble, recovered by Mark Peaboy who returned it 57 yards for a TD with 18 seconds left in the first quarter. A run by Johnny Serrano added two extra points and it was 28-7.

After trading possessions, the Wolverine defense came up big again, with tackles for losses by Johnson (4 yards), Mendoza and Bailey (11 yards), and Mendoza (1 yard). Texico then scored on a five-play, 59-yard drive with runs of 20 yards by Loera, 30 yards by Vaughan and a 3-yard TD run by Vaughan. The pass for extra points misfired. It was 34-7 with 3:53 left in the quarter.

Clements intercepted a pass and returned it 27 yards to the Jal 38. Vaughan then ran 38 yards for a TD with 1:23 left. The run for extra points was short and it was 40-7 as the first half ended.

Clements took the 2<sup>nd</sup> half kickoff and returned it 54 yards to the Jal 36. But Texico lost a fumble. Jal was stopped cold yet again on solid defensive plays by

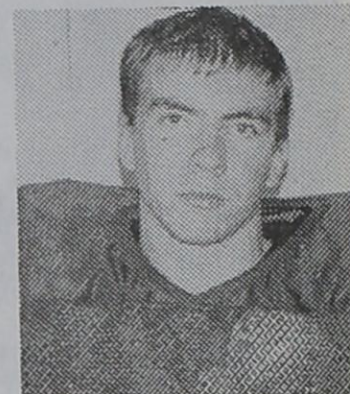
Five plays later, Texico scored on a 17-yard run by Loera at 3:26 of the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter.

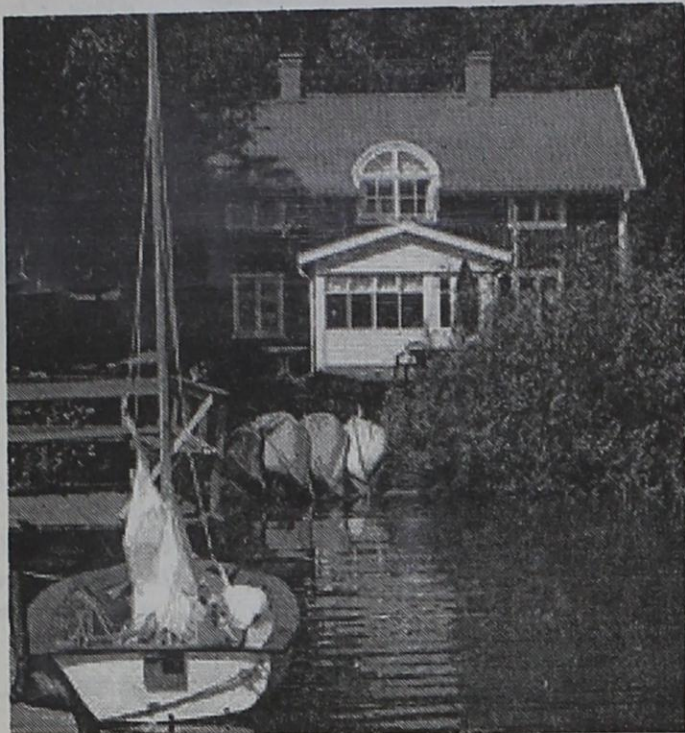

The result was overwhelming to see and experience for Lee and Gloria. The Walk to Emmaus - Cleopas Project was all they expected and more.

"Sweden and Norway have a large number of women pastors in the Methodist Church," Lee said. "It's inter-

esting to learn about the Swedish perspectives of religion, church and the future."

One moving moment for the Hutchins' was when one of the Swedish pastors stated that Sweden has been extremely concerned for all U.S. churches. The reason for the concern is that they have seen, read and heard about the moral decay of the nation and they see our churches headed the same way theirs had in the past.

"It really brought the reason for the Walk to Emmaus to the forefront for all of us participating," Gloria said.

Lee and Gloria were not planning on going back to Sweden for these Walks. They had figured that it just wasn't feasible to go back for a second year in a row.

"We had dismissed the idea of going back and were just focusing our efforts on our local New Horizons Emmaus community," Lee said.

"God had different plans for us!" Gloria exclaimed. "Lee literally walked through the door one day and said 'We've got to go...we're called to do this. It's too important.'"

"So we booked the trip and contacted everyone involved from here in the High Plains and our contacts in Sweden," Lee stated. "And we went!"

The two trips to Sweden haven't been about sightseeing and tourism for the Hutchins'. But in the two days between the two Walks, the couple was able to see a few very beautiful and interesting places near the retreat center in Framnäs.

The couple stayed on a small island called "Pa Styrso" in a hotel called the "Styrso Skaret." They found out that they were two of the very first foreigners that had ever stayed on the island. It was at one time a battlement and the government had just recently opened it up to the public. The locals knew about the hotel and island, but very few foreigners had come to visit.

They also toured a very interesting cheese factory in Falköping. "Cheese of every shape, size and flavor was in that shop," Lee explained.

But after the two-day break, Lee and Gloria went back to fulfilling their mission.

"This is truly the way that we feel God has called us to examine and live our faith," Gloria explained. "It's hard to describe or explain all the reasons, but we just know how the Walk to Emmaus has changed our lives. We want to share everything with others."

The Walk to Emmaus is not a cult-like program as many have thought it to be. It's not a goody-two-shoes kind of Christianity either. It's a way for a group of Christians to come together and reaffirm their belief in, reliance on and fulfillment from their faith in Jesus Christ.

"It totally changed my life," Gloria said. "Lee was a bit skeptical at first, but then he went on his Walk."

"It was amazing! This is something I feel called to share with my brothers and sisters in Christ across the nation and the world," Lee explained.

Texico smashed Estancia on Saturday to win the district tournament title, 11-15, 15-9, 15-9, 15-10.

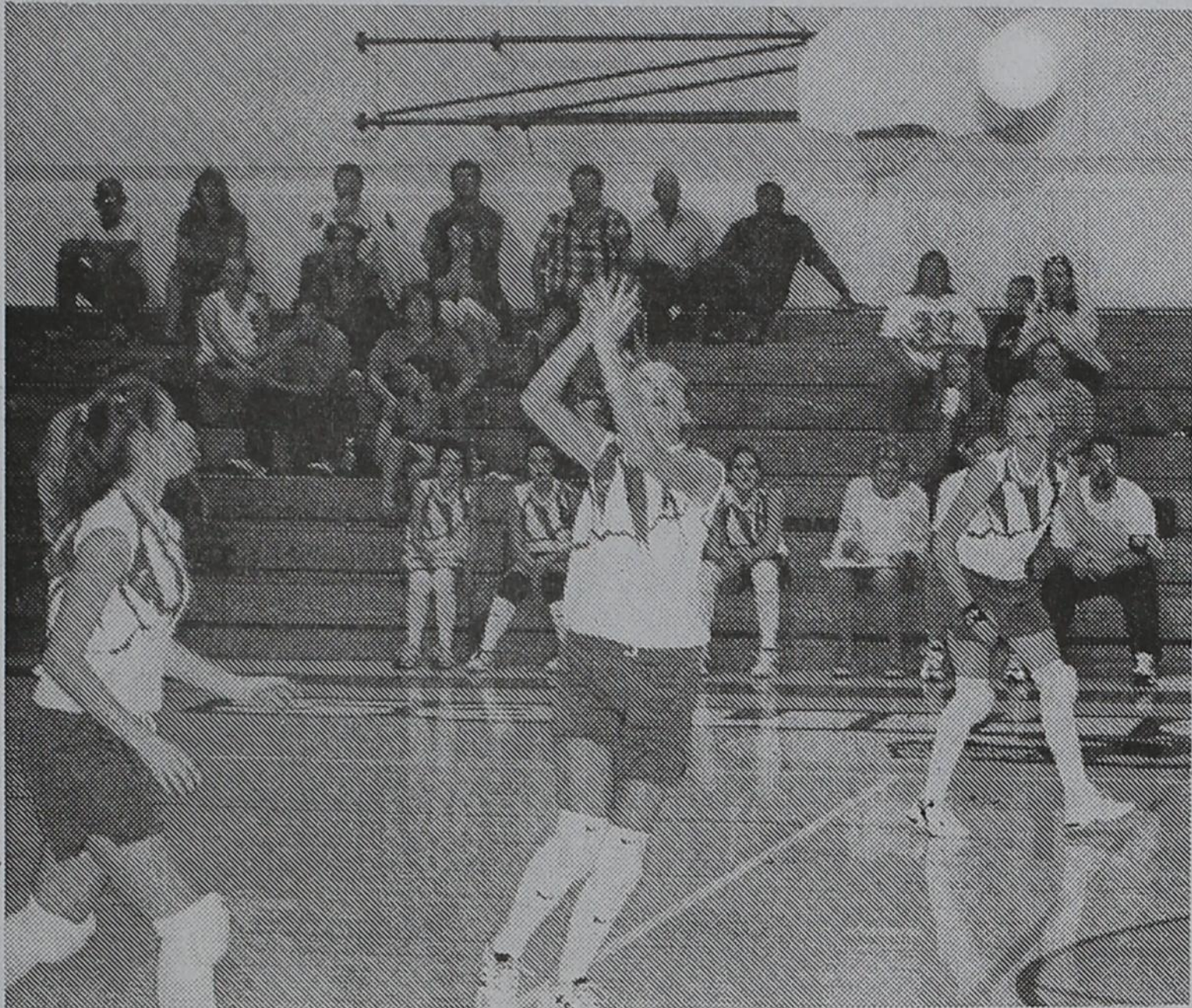

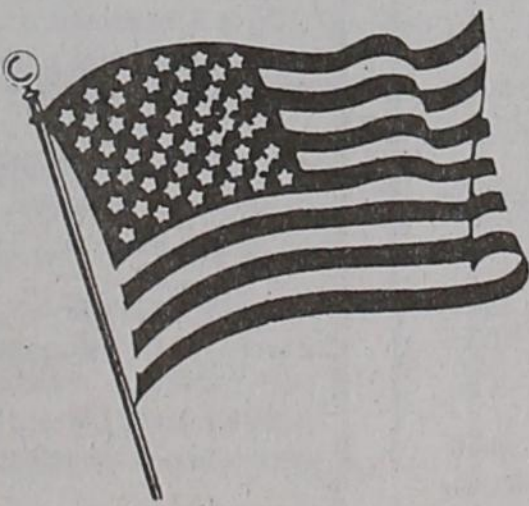



Leading tacklers for Lazbuddie were Rob Martin and Brady Mimms.

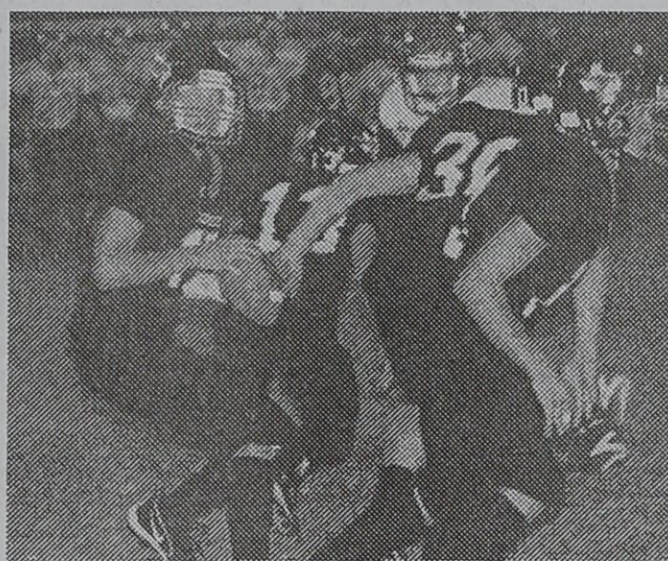
The loss put Lazbuddie at 4-6 overall and 2-1 in

district, tied with Amherst for 2<sup>nd</sup> in district.

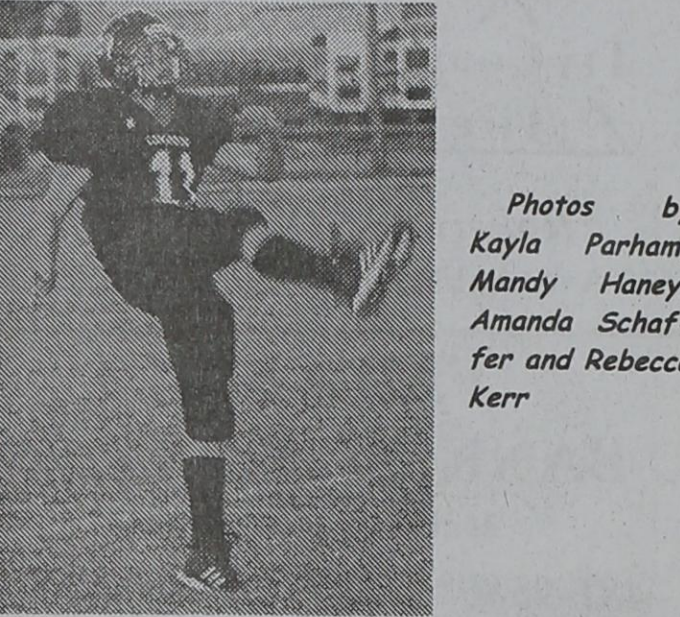
The Longhorns play at Amherst on Friday and if Lazbuddie wins, they earn a state playoff spot.
