

Last week I mentioned the vast amount of handout literature that crosses our desk in any given week. I came across a research report from Texas A&M that had a heading that compelled further study. Usually these reports receive little attention except to glance at the lead line and thereby ascertain if we are interested in going any further into the article.

The writer of this release must have known that most of their releases get this kind of cursory treatment because he came up with a real attention compeller. The article was headed, "Bathroom Study Yields Interesting Results." How does this grab you?

Those of us who have frequented very many comfort stations, private, public and privies, know what a wealth of art and literature adorns those utilitarian walls. Was it possible that a serious researcher was making an effort to record those esoteric sketches and fundamental verses for posterity? Was the Great Society at last invading the last sanctuary of harried America? Was the two-way mirror and hidden camera coming into man's last abode of aloneness?

With these thoughts burning in my mind, I immediately began a serious study of the dispatch. Well, the study was not along those interesting lines and I believe that a lot of taxpayers' money could have been saved by merely questioning a builder of modern day homes.

The lead line started off by saying that the ordinary functional bathroom will no longer satisfy everyone, according to a study made at Cornell University. Now who doesn't know that?

A tour through most any new home will let you see the current trend in the expansion of the bathroom from a room of utility to one of almost Byzantine lavishness. The not-so-old feature of a strategically placed magazine rack has given way to TV niches, stereo outlets, three-sided mirrors, wall-to-wall carpeting, gold fixtures, crystal lights, his and her lavatories, and in some, side-by-side commodes.

The report also stated that most families prefer two bathrooms. Again, who couldn't have told that without a research grant? Many homes not only feature two bathrooms but a shower and washroom immediately adjacent to the back door so the tired and dirty American male can make himself presentable before he is allowed to invade the rest of the house.

The article concluded with the observation that lack of space and storage were the complaints most frequently voiced toward present bathroom facilities. Again, any builder can tell you that the modern centers of comfort and cleanliness contain more floor space than the rapidly disappearing living room.

Today's trend is toward an increase in creature comforts and less on sociability facilities. Whether this trend toward physical comfort and less on man's relation with his fellow man will be beneficial for us, we only let history decide.

In the meantime, if the people planners would exercise a modicum of common sense, I am sure that answers to burning questions like bathroom studies can be obtained at less expense to the taxpayer by asking the builder, manufacturer, and retailer of items in the concerned areas.

In our capitalistic society, the good old profit motive will compel our merchants to keep abreast of the people's desires and have the answers to many questions that eggheads dream up.

Ask your capitalistic businessman your questions. The government bureaucrats would be surprised at what he knows about his business and his country.

Jurors Selected In Salcido Murder Case

Final juror in the murder trial of Bernardo Salcido, who allegedly murdered his wife and mother-in-law on March 30, 1965 at a farm home near Farwell, was selected at 11 p.m. on Tuesday evening. A total of 78 persons, called on the special venire of 120, were examined before the jury was completed.

Serving on the jury are Billy Sides, Alfred Steinbock, A. O. Gast, Mrs. R. B. McKee, Lawrence Jamerson, Roy Miller, W. C. Harlan, Clyde Fields, Melvin R. Southward, Mrs. Garvin Thorn, Bert Williams and Eric Rushing.

Bill Sheehan, Dumas, and Richard Collard, Friona, are

counsel for the defendant. The case is being prosecuted by Jack Young, District Attorney, assisted by Hershel Harding, County Attorney, District Judge Pat Boone Jr. is presiding judge.

Salcido has been held in the Parmer County jail, without bond, since being arrested shortly after the crimes were committed. He was arrested in Carlsbad late on the night of the murder, after fleeing the scene with his two year old son.

Witnesses in the case were sworn in on Wednesday morning and the case is underway. Officials could give no indication of how long it will take to complete the trial.

Texico Councilmen Call City Election For March 1

The Texico City Council met on Tuesday night with all members and the city clerk in attendance. A proclamation was drawn up and signed calling for the election of a mayor for a two-year term, two councilmen for four-year terms, and a municipal judge for a two-year term, on the first Monday in March, at a city election.

Persons desiring to file for any of the offices must file with the town clerk on or before January 31, at 5 p.m. All persons desiring to vote in the

election must be registered by the same date.

Retiring mayor is E. L. (Ed) Farmer, who because of the press of other duties declines to run for another term in office. Councilmen whose terms in office are expiring are Bob Lebow and Perry Winkles. Holdover councilmen are Gale Doolittle and Howard Billingsley, Sam Lewis, the municipal judge of the township, has not stated whether he will seek to remain in office.

In other business, two building permits were approved. The permits went to N. L. Tharp for the erection of a house on Stateline Road and to Manford Turnbough to build a workshop at his residence.

The police magistrates report, in the amount of \$290 for the period Dec. 8-Dec. 30 (collected in traffic fines), was approved.

Several matters were discussed but no action was taken and the matters were tabled until a later date. All other business was of a routine nature.

Also under discussion will be the management of fertilizer and water applications to get the highest net return from various crops.

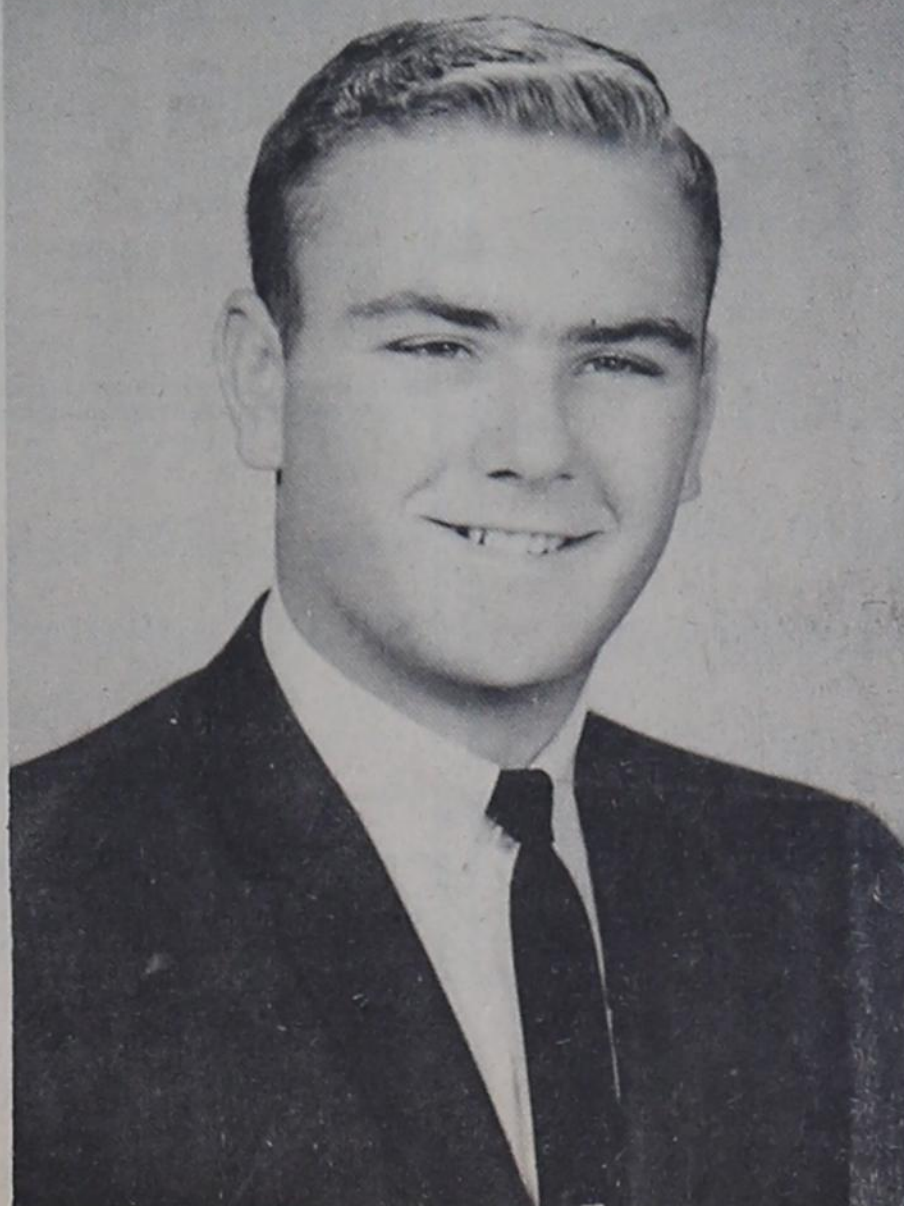
The series of programs which will continue through the winter months are under sponsorship of the Parmer County Program Planning Committee and the County Agricultural Agent.

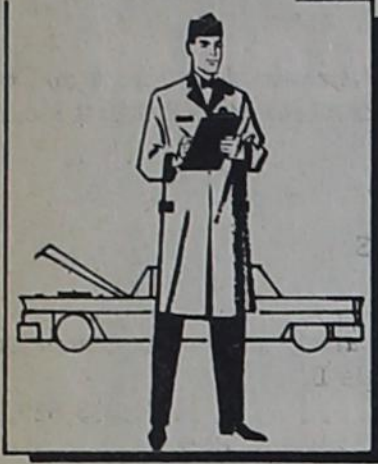

a profit and not be taxed, is that right?

A-If certain conditions are met, you may elect to exclude the gain from the sale of your home. Generally speaking, these conditions are that your adjusted sales price was \$20,000 or less, you were 65 or older on the date of the sale, and you occupied the house as your principal residence for at least 5 of the 8 years before the sale.

Q-Last year the amount I could deduct for child care expenses was raised to \$900. Is the amount the same this year?

A-Yes. Up to \$900 may be deducted when there are two or more qualifying dependents for which this expense is necessary. Working wives whose husbands are capable of self-support must file jointly and must reduce their deduction by the amount their combined adjusted gross income exceeds \$6,000. A man may deduct these ex-

penses only if he is divorced, widowed, or legally separated, or if his wife is incapacitated or institutionalized.

On The Farm In Parmet County

We are sure needing some moisture now for the wheat. Also, many farmers are finding their land extremely dry and hard as they try to begin land preparation for this year. This is especially true on cotton ground.

Watering does usually help make wheat more resistant to freeze damage. However, wheat can lose its cold resistance when we have some warm weather in the winter with adequate moisture in the ground. With warm weather the wheat plant starts to grow out of its dormant stage. Then if we get a real cold spell while it is growing some, we may get some freeze damage due to the sudden shock of adverse conditions.

VITAMIN A FOR CATTLE

Vitamin A plays a vital role in reproductive performance of mother cows and in growth of young animals. Research indicates vitamin A is more critical for heifers than older cows.

In a recent Culberson County test, 70 yearling heifers were bred to calve as two-year-olds. Thirty-five heifers were used as the control group and were given no supplemental vitamin A.

The other half were injected with two million units of vitamin A one month before the breeding season began and again two months later. Three weeks before calving they were given another two million units, for

Principles we want children to learn about money include: Spending wisely for real satisfaction. Saving for future use. Understanding credit and how to use it. Having experience in earning money.

Sharing money with others. Seeing money as a tool to reach goals, not as a goal itself. 4-H members want training in money management, but without leaders, this project work has not been emphasized. Leader and member lesson guides are available and it is hoped some special training can be given this important project before very long.

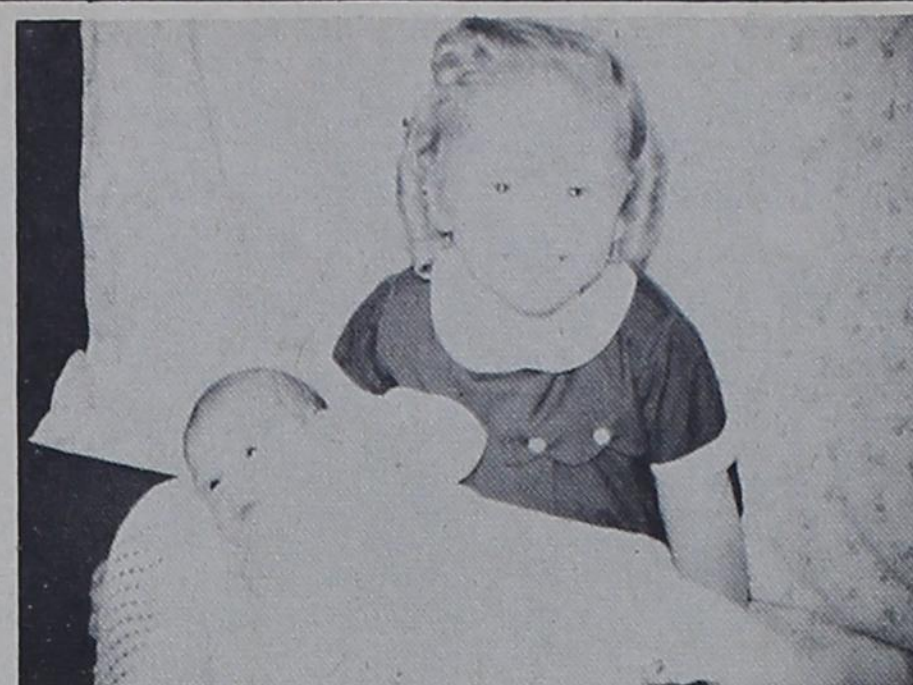
