Governors Race Takes Spotlight

Second democratic primary election in Texas will be held Saturday. Voters will name a candidate for governor, and an associate justice of Court of Civil Appeals, Seventh Supreme Judicial District.

Polling place in Farwell will be in the country courtroom at Farmer County courthouse. Polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Election judge in the Farwell precinct is Albert Smith. Clerks will be Mrs. Carolla Smith and Mrs. Nell Walling.

A total of 59 absentee ballots were cast prior to the deadline on Tuesday, May 28.

The Democratic choice for governor will be made between Don Yarborough, Houston attorney, and Preston Smith of Lubbock, lieutenant governor of Texas. They emerged for the run-off election from a field of 10 candidates.

Winner will meet Republican nominee Paul Eggers in the November general election.

A run-off was also required between Jack Hazelwood and James A. Joy for associate justice, Court of Civil Appeals. Three candidates were in that race in the Seventh Supreme Judicial District in the May primary.

Voting is expected to be lighter over Texas in the run-off election than was recorded in the May primary. Supporters of both gubernatorial candidates view the possibility of a light turnout at the polls as a threat to actually voicing the will of registered voting Texans.

However, the May primary registered fewer votes than had been expected in Farmer County. A total of 1726 votes were cast at that time.

Set Clean-Up Campaign Dates

In a noon meeting on Tuesday the Farwell Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture made plans for a clean-up week. Dates of the clean-up campaign were set for the week June 10-15. Complete details of the campaign will appear in next week's issue of the Tribune.

Pros will be from the surrounding areas of Texas and New Mexico since most country clubs are closed on Monday, and all amateurs in the area are invited to participate. Entry fee for amateurs is \$5.00 each.

Prizes will be gift certificates which may be redeemed at the country club pro-shop.

In modern times, don't you think it is almost essential that a person be wealthy in order to be elected President of the U.S.?

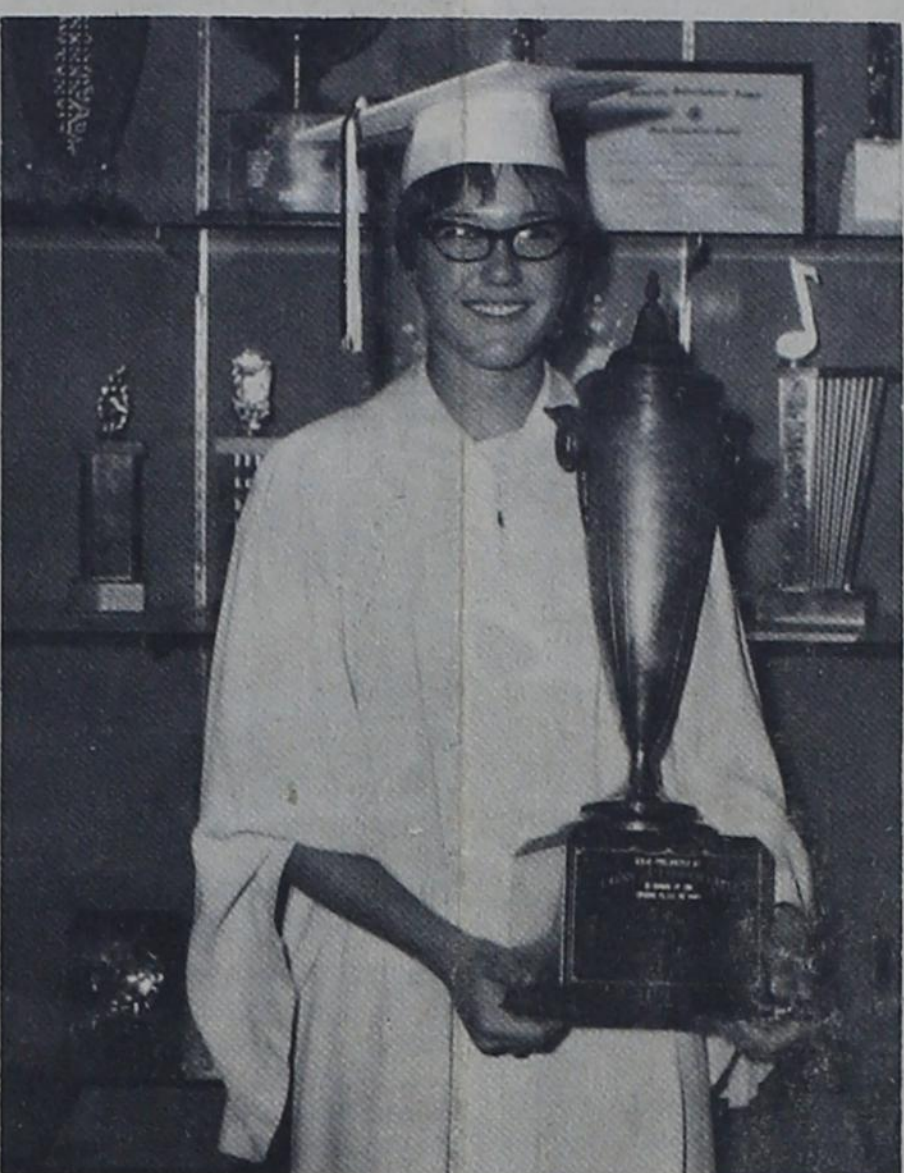

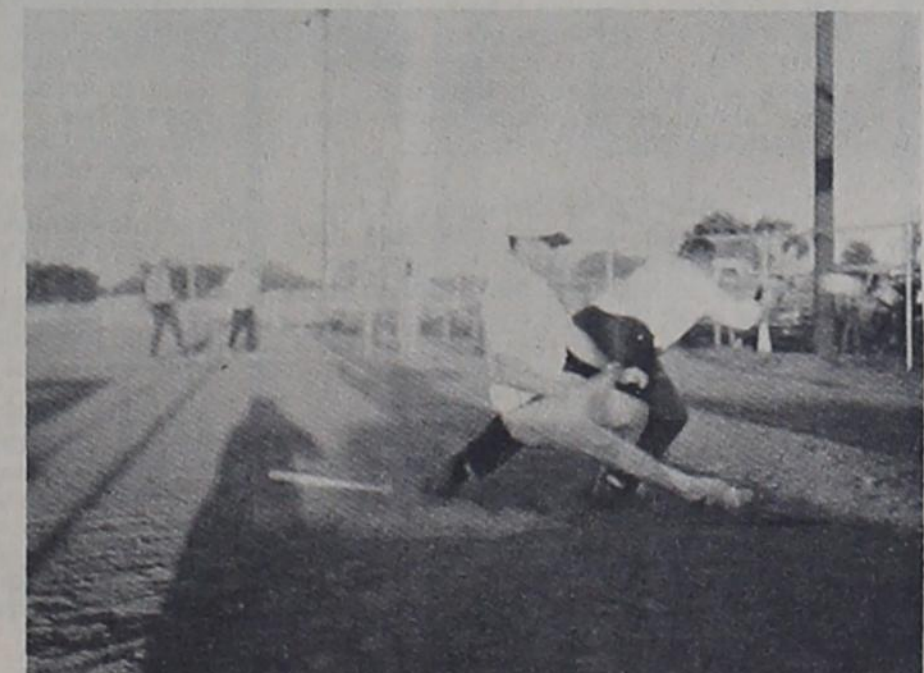

Today, one would need a great deal of nerve to want to visit our nation's capitol, Washington, D.C. We note where one syndicated columnist refers to it as "Hell City". This may be over descriptive but probably has a basis of fact. There are stories of violent crimes emanating from Washington almost on a daily basis. The wave of recent riots has added nothing to the luster of the Capitol of the mightiest country in the world. And, to most of us poor wretches, money is always a problem.

We are given to understand by sly words and innuendoes that the daily tab for rooms, meals and other forms of entertainment can be quite high. Now this threat of economic collapse following a visit to "old foggy bottom" is a thing of the past. We have found out how to have an extended tour of Washington and spend very little for room or board. The answer is simple, camp out.

This is what the Poor Peoples Campaign is doing with its some 3,000 people. Just ask the National Park Service for a nice campsite on the Lincoln Memorial greensward or possibly a place to throw your sleeping bag along Pennsylvania Avenue. The National Park Service has done it for the "Poor People"; they ought to be able to do it for the poorest group of all, the taxpayers.

I have wondered how these economic squatters got the right to defile a section of our National Capitol with their pup tents, privies, and pandemonium. I am sure it will cost several thousands of taxpayers' dollars to restore this once green and well-tended park area to its former state. In fact, we wonder if it can ever look the same after this demonstration of governmental and private irresponsibility.

We have before us a quote by Secretary of the Interior Udall of April 18, 1968, that says, "But I think we are not . . . it would not be proper to turn parklands over to any group of people for permanent or temporary use for any kind of human shelter of any kind." We wonder what changed his mind so quickly.

We hope that a House Bill introduced by Congressman Joe Pool of the Texas Third District soon becomes law. Congressman Pool's bill H.R. 17127 would amend the Subversives Activities Control Act of 1950 and prohibit erecting or occupying any tent, lean-to, or other type of shelter for temporary living quarters within a two-mile radius of the Capitol building, The White House, or the Pentagon. Also, his bill would repeal any other provision of law authorizing government officials to issue a permit for or otherwise authorize the use of any property for construction of such a camp in connection with and for the purpose of participating in, aiding, or promoting any demonstration, picketing, or agitational or propaganda campaign.

We say "Hooray" for Congressman Pool, but we would surmise that his bill doesn't even get out of Committee, much less up for a vote. After all, a vote would put our leaders on record and this is something they do not want. We will probably forget by fall as we usually do.

The summer season at the Lions Club ball field starts on June 3. The Lions have now fenced the park and also are making plans to add another diamond just west of the present field. This will give the Twin Cities a ball facility second to none in the area.

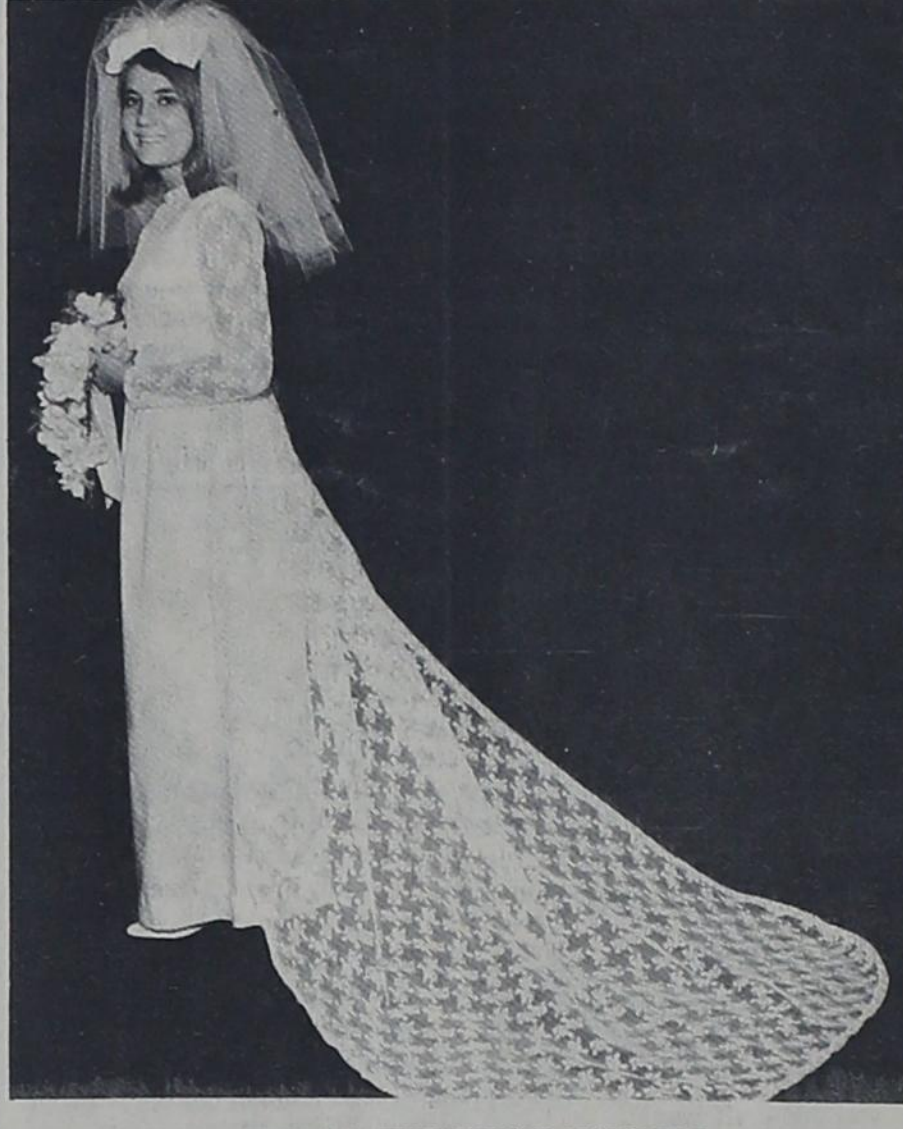

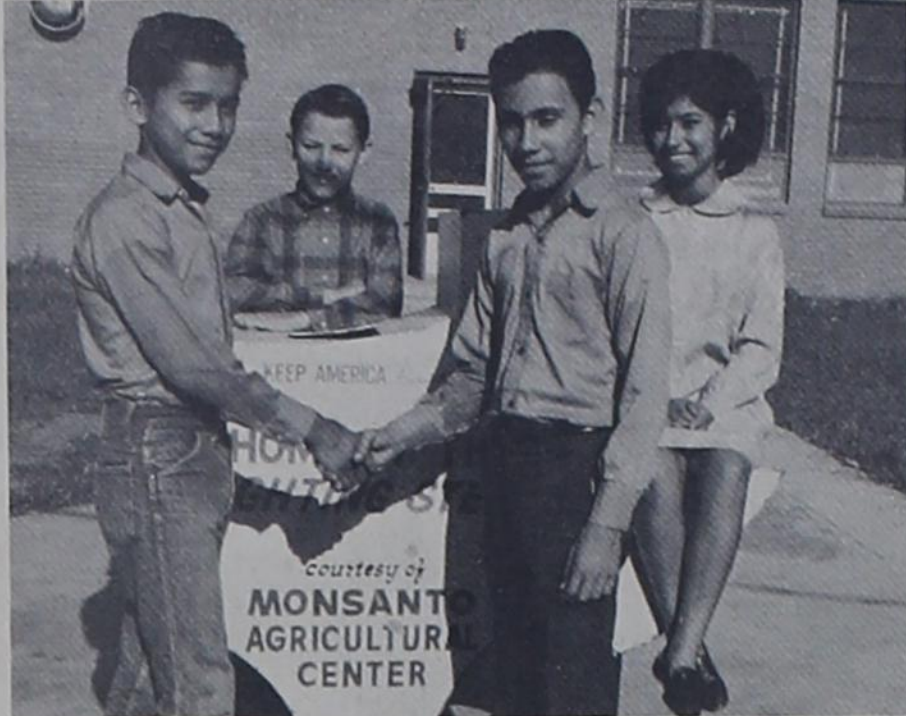

This means that allotments may not be transferred out of Parmer County since the vote had to carry by a two-thirds majority.

Allotments may be transferred by sale or lease to other farms within the county,

however. You may buy or lease allotments from counties that voted in favor of allotments to be transferred from their counties. A list of counties voting to permit allotments to be transferred out will be available soon, according to Prentice Mills.

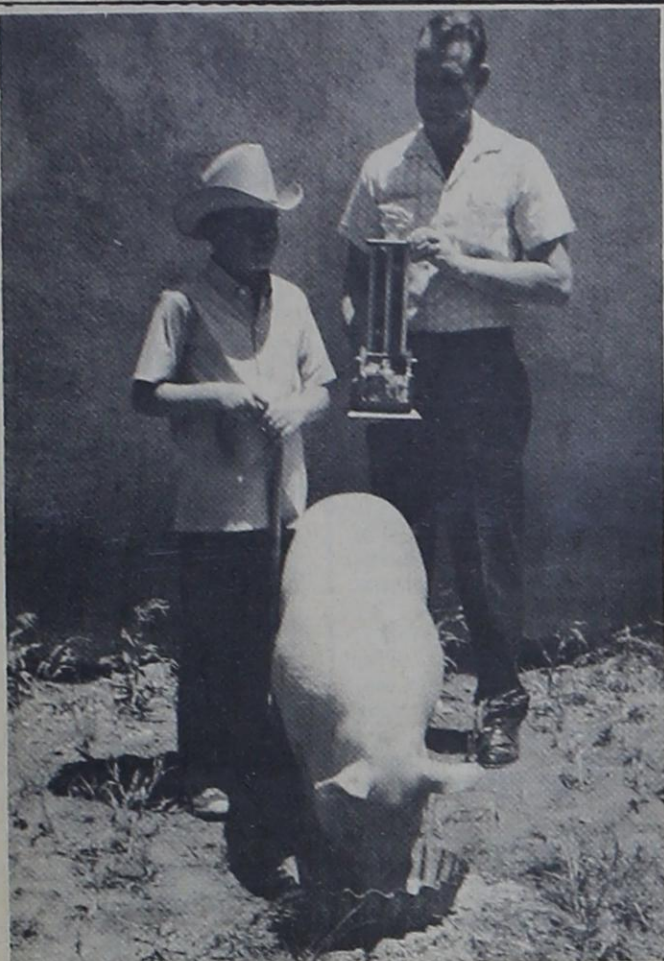
Swine Show A Success

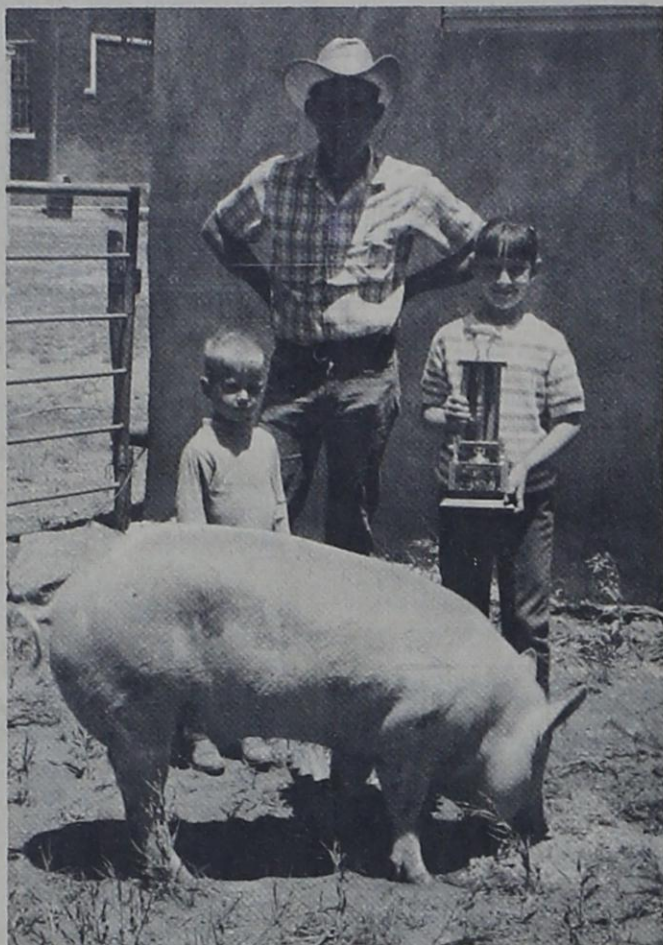

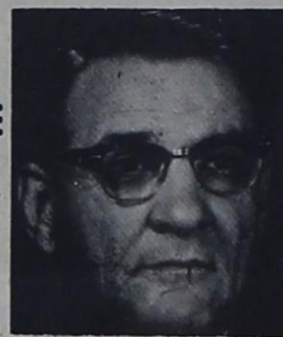
