

Another committee has been heard from; and to achieve its laudable aims, the public will have to ante up considerably more tax money. Recently Governor John Connally's blue-ribbon committee report, the study of Texas education, had been made public. This committee has recommended a monumental 10-year plan for improving Texas public schools that will triple costs and require a \$300,000,000.00 to \$400,000,-000.00 tax bill next year.

said this plan would life our schools out of "mediocrity" and "inefficiency".

Altogether, the proposals of this Committee on Public School Education would increase local. the fund raising project for the state and federal school costs group. in Texas from \$840,000,000.00 to \$2,100,000,000.00 at the end of ten years. Under the plan, about 4% of the state's income would have to go to schools. Some \$503,000,000.00 more would be required, bulk from state sources, for 1970-71. Some key recommendations

include: Increasing basic allotments from \$23 to \$50 per pupil, plus additions for transportation, materials and vocational teachers.
