The Farwell Steers have racked up an enviable record in winning district basketball championships. This year's win makes eight out of the last 11 years that the Blue and White have walked off with the big gold trophy. District 3-A has always provided well-rounded competition in all sports and the roundball game has been no exception. Therefore, it stands to reason that Farwell must have had some excellent material for the hardwood game during this 11-year span. Yet, strangely enough, not one of our boys has gone to college on a basketball scholarship.

We think this stems from two reasons. First, in spite of the record, football is the major sport in this area and the boys seem to prefer to go the football route. Next, we think the majority of basketball coaches are all too prone to look exclusively for the tall boy.

This we feel is a serious error in putting a team together. The odds on a school coming up with five or six tall boys that are extra good players are very slim. We have observed many top rated teams with at least one or more players six foot or under that has stomped taller but less agile teams.

As proof of this, look at the last winning team that Texas Tech fielded... with Dub Maltese. He was the field general and sparkplug of that team. The Missouri Valley Conference is a top rated basketball conference and Bradley University is a major basketball power. This year, the Bradley Braves have a whirlwind at five feet, six inches. These illustrations are endless, but prove the value of a not so tall good, but agile player.

With Farwell's record in the court game, we think some coaches in this area are making a serious mistake not giving closer scrutiny to the local talent.

We have found the most dedicated, patient and pleasant group of people who deal with the public. They are the employees of the airlines who man the ticket counters at the larger airports.

Last week was a trying time for the publisher's family in getting to Salem, Oregon, by air. As you know the weather here and in Amarillo has been most unusual. Fog, that is. We were in Amarillo 24 hours trying to get a flight out and all flights were being cancelled due to the weather.

The public is generally rude and demanding and when their plans go awry, it makes them more so. Yet with all the trials and tribulations, we were impressed with the unflinching courtesy and patience of the dedicated ticket purveyors. Our editorial hats are off to a fine group of employees.

The only sour note during our trip to Amarillo was being bagged at 10 o'clock at night in a practically deserted air terminal for a \$2.00 overtime parking ticket. There is always someone who doesn't get the word.

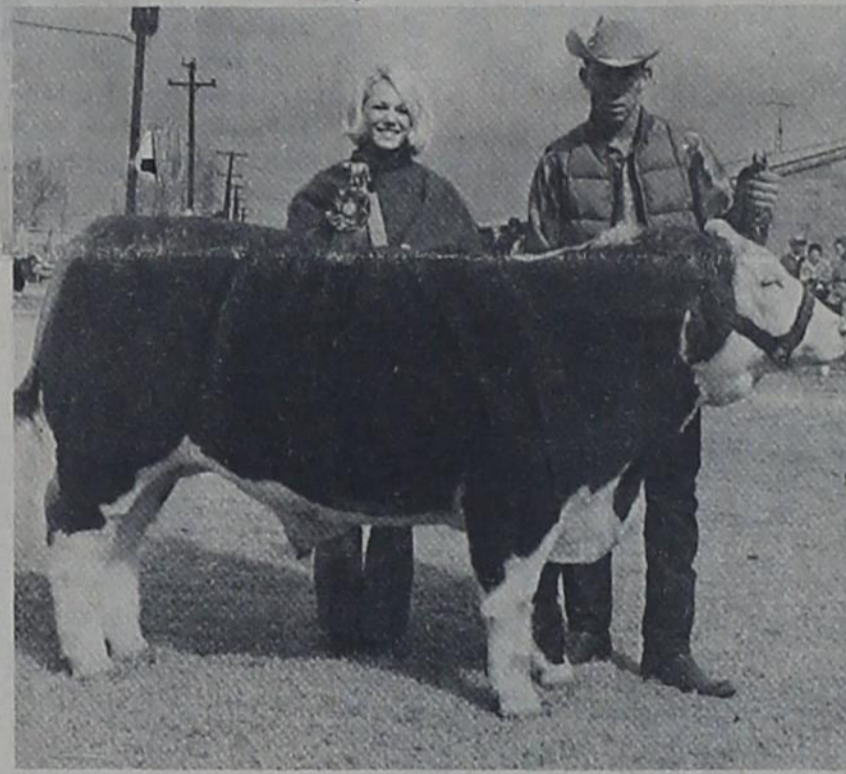
Cleanup Week Feb. 24-March 1

Steers Have Perfect District Record

Farwell Steers closed out their regular season Friday by taking a 70-60 decision over the Vega Longhorns. The win brought their season record to 23-7 with a 10-0 district mark and a 13-game winning streak.

The Steers trailed throughout the first half of play, but the outcome was never in doubt. They had a ten-point lead at the close of the third period and coasted easily through the remainder of the game. Danny Prince led the Steers in scoring with 19 points and in rebounds with 12. Alred had 18 points for the Longhorns.

The Steers scored 1825 points in the 29-game regular season for a 63-point per game average as opposed to 1378 points for their opponents, a 43-point per game average.

Following the game, Amos Tatum, principal of Farwell High School, presented the district trophy to the Steers.

Nicaraguan County Agent Visits Curry County

A visitor at the Loren Wilson farm Route 1, Texico, on Monday was Senor Concepcion Burgalin Silva, Area Supervisor of the Extension Service in Estell, Nicaragua, who was in the area looking over the swine producing operations.

Accompanying the Nicaraguan Extension Agent was Tony Romo, County Extension agent of Las Lunas and Phil Crystal, Curry County Agricultural agent. Romo was interpreter for the tour group. Billy Wilson, 4-H and FFA Club member escorted the agent and his group on a tour of the swine production operation on the Wilson farm, showing them something of how swine can be raised economically using much available material.

Silva gave as reason for his visit to the county was to study swine producing practices. He said Nicaragua now has an over production of grain because it is used only for human consumption and for exporting. The country is making plans to convert extra grain into meat by starting hog production followed by cattle.

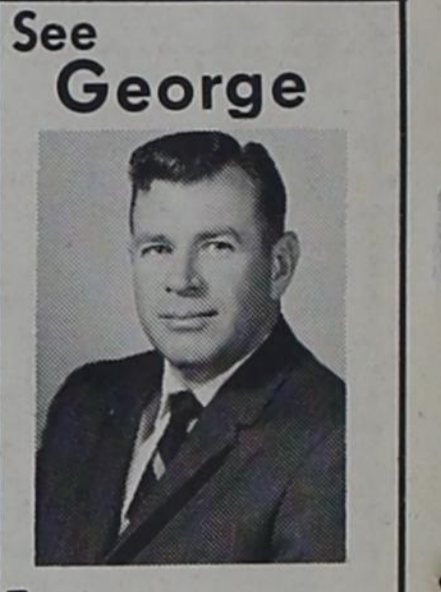
The Nicaraguan agent is supervisor of the county agents in 11 counties in his country. He was educated at the National School of Agriculture in Managua, Nicaragua. He said, "I am quite impressed with the local area since it is much like the area where I live." Annual rain fall in his country is 30 inches per year.

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NURSERY NEWS By Alvin Woodburn Garden Center Nursery Clovis, N.M.

We will dwell a while longer on the subject of pruning or trimming this week. Sometimes, when a person begins talking about trimming, maybe the first thing he should trim is his tongue. As Mark Twain said about the weather, "everybody talks about it."

I have often wondered why we have such vicious winds here in the spring. To understand the act of selection which nature must go through in order to give us plants that will take this pressure, we must understand that winds like we have had so far this spring will jolly well trim out the weak.

In order for roses to do well, we should trim about one-third of the canes each year. This enables us to get a new rose bush every three years. We find a good bud above the crown and as close as we can to the ground and make a diagonal cut just above this bud. Next year, find another one and trim it out. The third year, get the remaining canes or branches. The one that was trimmed the first year has made good growth and blooms and is ready to be trimmed the next, or fourth, year. Since roses bloom on new growth, we like to encourage growth from the bottom up. Trimming some of the canes at the bottom encourages new growth and blooms. The object of leaving some of the older canes to somewhat longer lengths is to have enough height of the old wood to give the plant enough leaves to support the blooms that will be put on.

Some trim roses back near the ground every year. This will get new growth but the skeleton that the bush has strived to produce is gone and the rose must, by nature, replenish the factory before it can produce fruit or bloom. To cut the bush too severely is taking a lot of the strength away. Some have figured that it takes an average of 25 leaves to produce one bloom.

To let the entire bush grow and then cut it at the height you want is not too satisfactory as it leaves all the blooms right on top and the part up of them will be full of dead and diseased or exceptionally large canes.

New Executive Named By Grain Association

Bill Nelson, executive vice president of Grain Sorghum Producers Association, has submitted his resignation from that post, according to A. W. Anthony, Jr., of Friona, president of the organization. Anthony said that the association's executive committee has named Elbert Harp of Abernathy, past president and long time association leader, to be chief executive officer after Nelson's departure March 31 in order to assure continuity in the organization's work.

Nelson joined GSPA in September 1957 and during the past 11 years he initiated and has administered the association's widely recognized successful program of research,

market development and service which has taken him into 24 foreign countries and most states seeking better production practices and increased markets for grain sorghum. In reviewing Nelson's service to the GSPA, Anthony said, "We farmers brought Bill out from Oklahoma State University where he was a grain marketing specialist, to assist us with our production and marketing problems as we switched from dry-land sorghum varieties to irrigated hybrids. Since that time, our production of grain sorghum has leaped from 204 million to 755 million bushels, exports from 22 million bushels to a high of 266 million, and domestic cattle and other livestock feed use from 178 million bushels to 620 million. But more specifically," Anthony said, "He has led us

from a 'group of individuals with ideas' into an 'organization' with national and international influence."

As to his future plans, Nelson said that they are "firm but premature to announce since others are involved, but I will be engaged in a new venture related to agricultural business development within the area and internationally. As chairman of the board of Agricultural Computing Company, I will also be having increasing responsibilities as that company continued to expand its service into on-line, real-time, time-sharing computer service to cattle feed yards, rural electric cooperatives and public accountants with farm clients."

Nelson has made numerous trips to Bovina in connection with GSPA work during the past several years.

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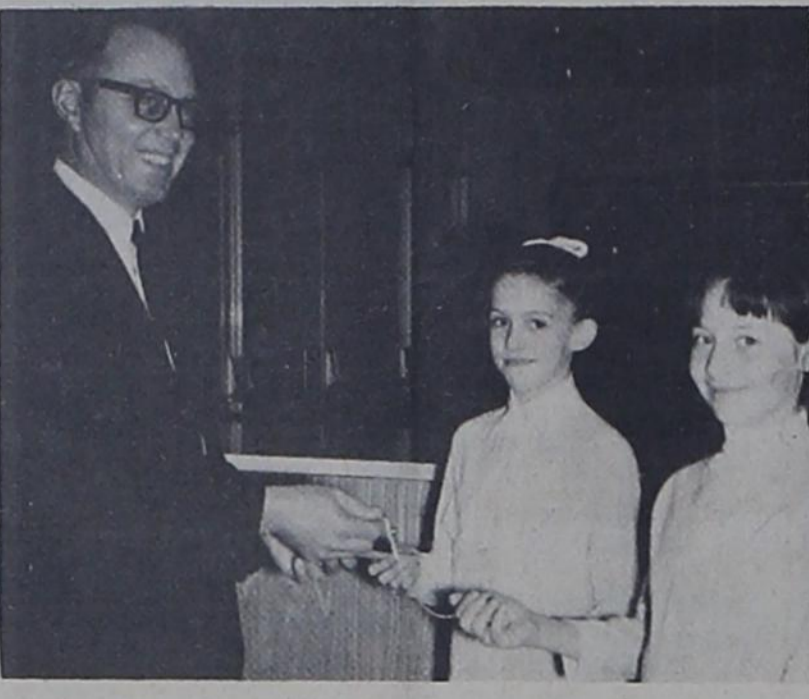
