Do your good deed and help relieve the postal deficit by writing a letter.

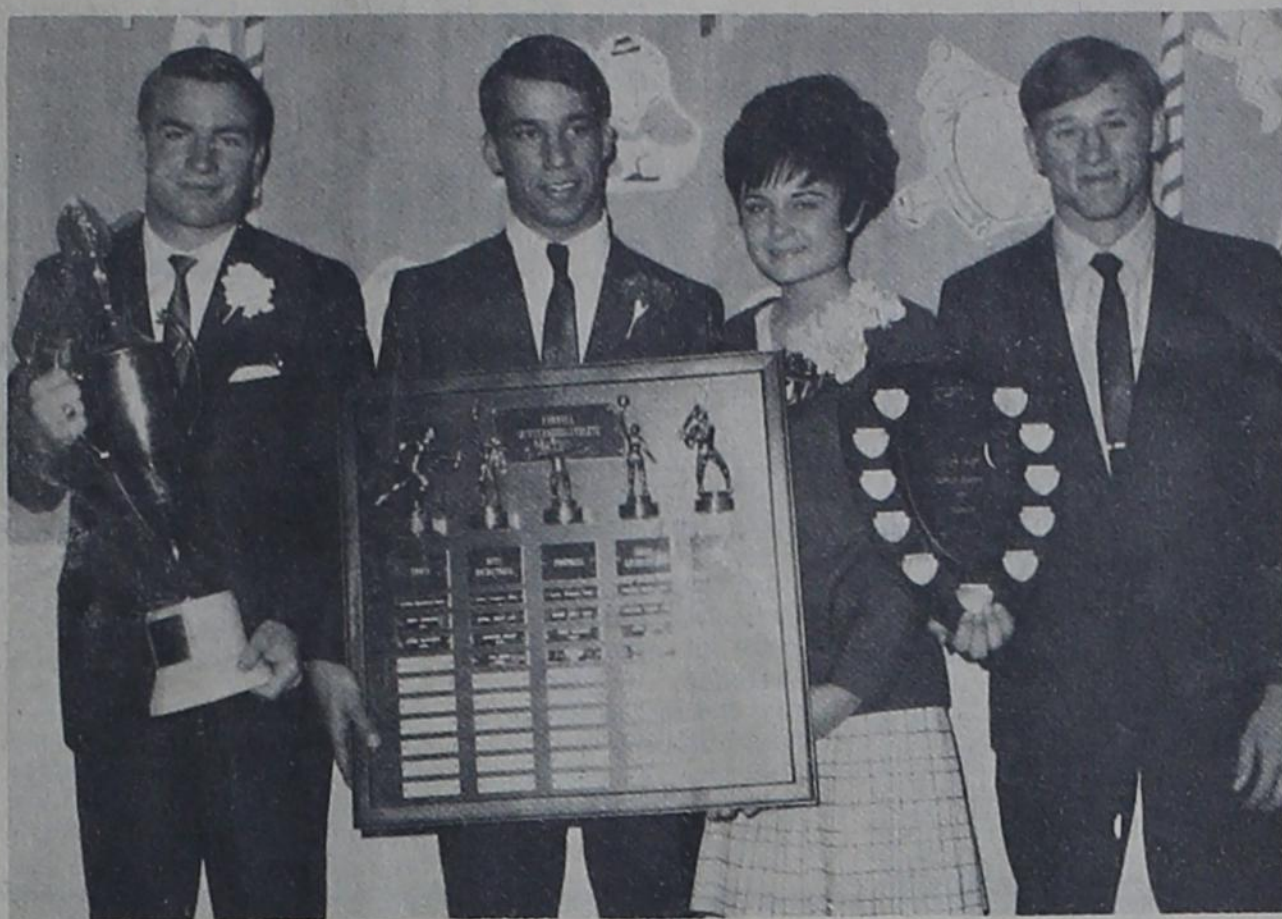
County NFO Meeting Set

A county-wide meeting of National Farmers Organization has been called for 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, March 25, in Bovina Schools cafeteria.

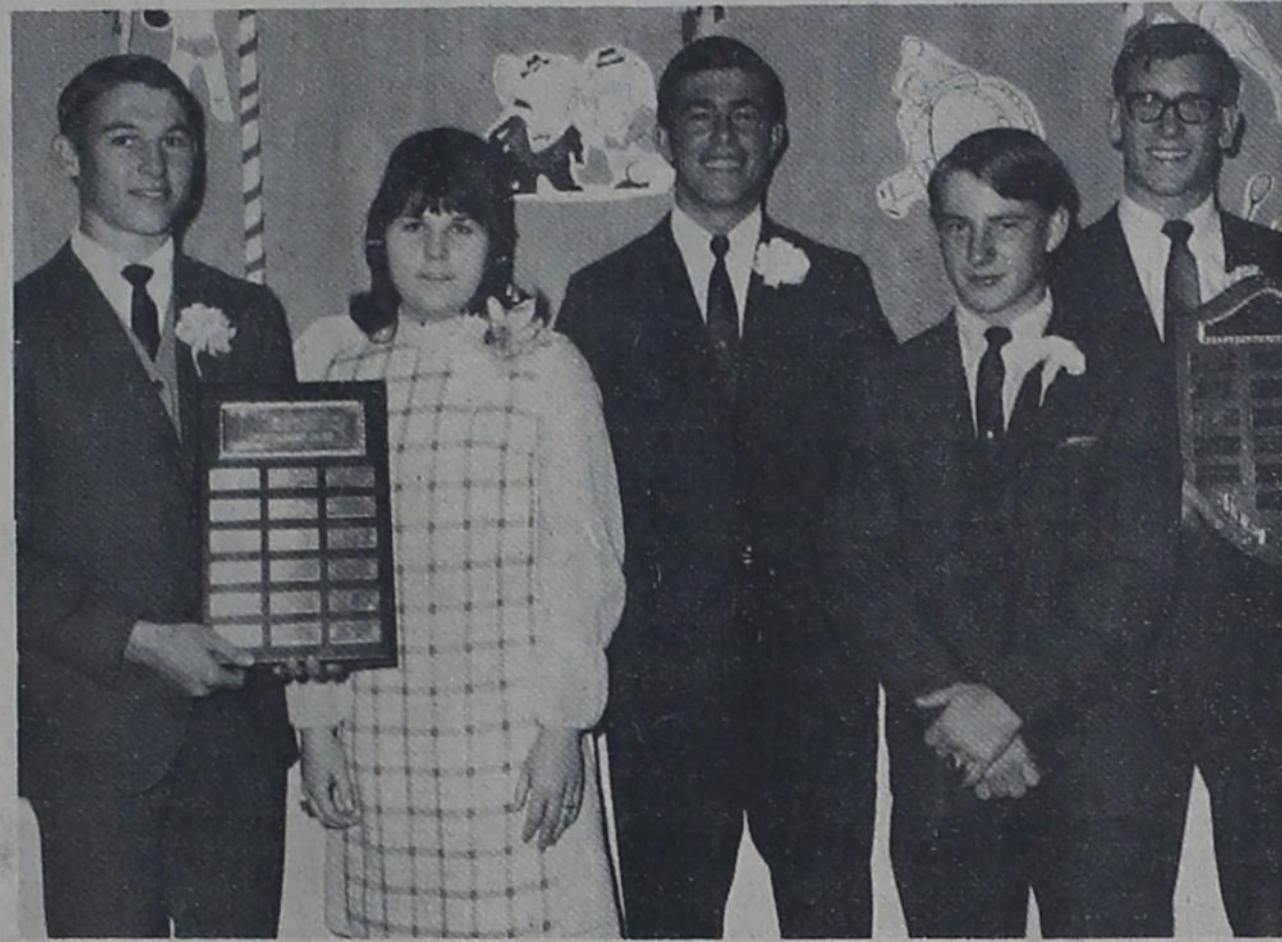
The meeting will launch a county membership drive in Parmer County.

Set Labor Housing Unit Meet

J. T. Ford invites all area persons to a meeting at Farwell School Cafeteria at 8 p.m. Tuesday, April 1. Purpose of the meeting is to explain the possibility of building a Labor Housing Unit in Farwell. Ford, who is chairman of the local Labor Housing Unit Committee; Joe Jones, vice-chairman; and Bill Boling, local Federal Home Loan Administrator; will be present to answer questions on the proposed building plan. In addition, tentative plans call for persons from Dimmitt and Muleshoe, where Labor Housing Units have been constructed and are in operation, to be on hand to answer questions asked by persons attending the meeting.

Fifty per cent of the necessary funds for erecting the Housing Unit are available through FHA and rent from the Units would pay the indebtedness on the remainder of the building cost. The committee will solicit memberships at the meeting and try to find out if there is enough interest in the project locally to make it feasible.

All local businessmen who have been contacted on the project have expressed themselves as in favor of the Labor Housing Unit, stating that if adequate housing is provided, local farmers can bring a higher class of laborers to the area.

Saturday At Sunrise --

Weather Forecast Set At Crim Farm

Annual weather forecast for this area and a prediction of crop prospects for the coming year will be made by J. W. "Indian John" Crim at his annual March 22 sunrise forecast, this Saturday at the family home 18 miles east and two miles north of Farwell. He has been making the forecast for the past 44 years, as he reads the signs from a ceremonial fire which is lighted as the sun rises.

"Indian John" was taught the art of reading the signs from the fire by his father who

had learned the art from the Indians themselves. Legend has it that a tepee shaped fire burning at sunrise on March 22 will give signals of a good or bad crop year in wind direction and the way the smoke carries. If the wind is from the north or northeast and carries the smoke south or southwest, the crop will be average; but wind from the west, southwest or south means a "very poor" crop. A bumper crop is indicated when the smoke is carried south or southwest.

Donald Christian, President; Harry Sheets, Karl J. Gast, Harold Travis, Gilbert Kaltwasser, J. W. Herington, Melborn Jones and the following absent: None, constituting a quorum and among other proceedings had by said Board of Trustees was the following:

WHEREAS, the term of office of Harry Sheets and Karl J. Gast members of the Board of Trustees of this School District will expire on the first Saturday in April, 1969, said first Saturday being April 5, 1969, and on said date a trustee election will be held in said School District.

WHEREAS, it is necessary for this Board to pass an order establishing the procedure for filing for and conducting said trustee election;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF FARWELL INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

1. That an election be held in said School District on April 5, 1969, for the purpose of electing to the Board of Trustees of said School District Two Trustees.

2. That all requests by candidates to have their names placed upon the ballot for the above mentioned election shall be in writing and signed by the candidate and filed with the secretary of the Board of Trustees at the superintendent's office not later than 30 days prior to the date of said election.

3. That said election shall be held at the following place and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election:

At County Courtroom Building in Farwell, Texas, in said School District, with Albert Smith as Presiding Judge, and Mrs. Albert Smith and Mrs. Robert Shuman Clerks.

4. Bonnie Warren is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and Jane Stovall is hereby appointed Deputy Clerk for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at County Clerks office in County Courthouse within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. on each day for said absentee voting.

5. The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as near as may be, by the Election Code of this State, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

6. Immediately after said election has been held, the officials holding the same shall return to the president of the Board of Trustees in a sealed envelope a copy of the returns, poll list and tally sheet for said election, and this set of election returns shall be used by the Board of Trustees in canvassing said election.

Another copy of the return, poll list, and tally sheet of said election shall be delivered to the president of the Board of Trustees in an un-sealed envelope and this envelope shall be available in the office of the superintendent.

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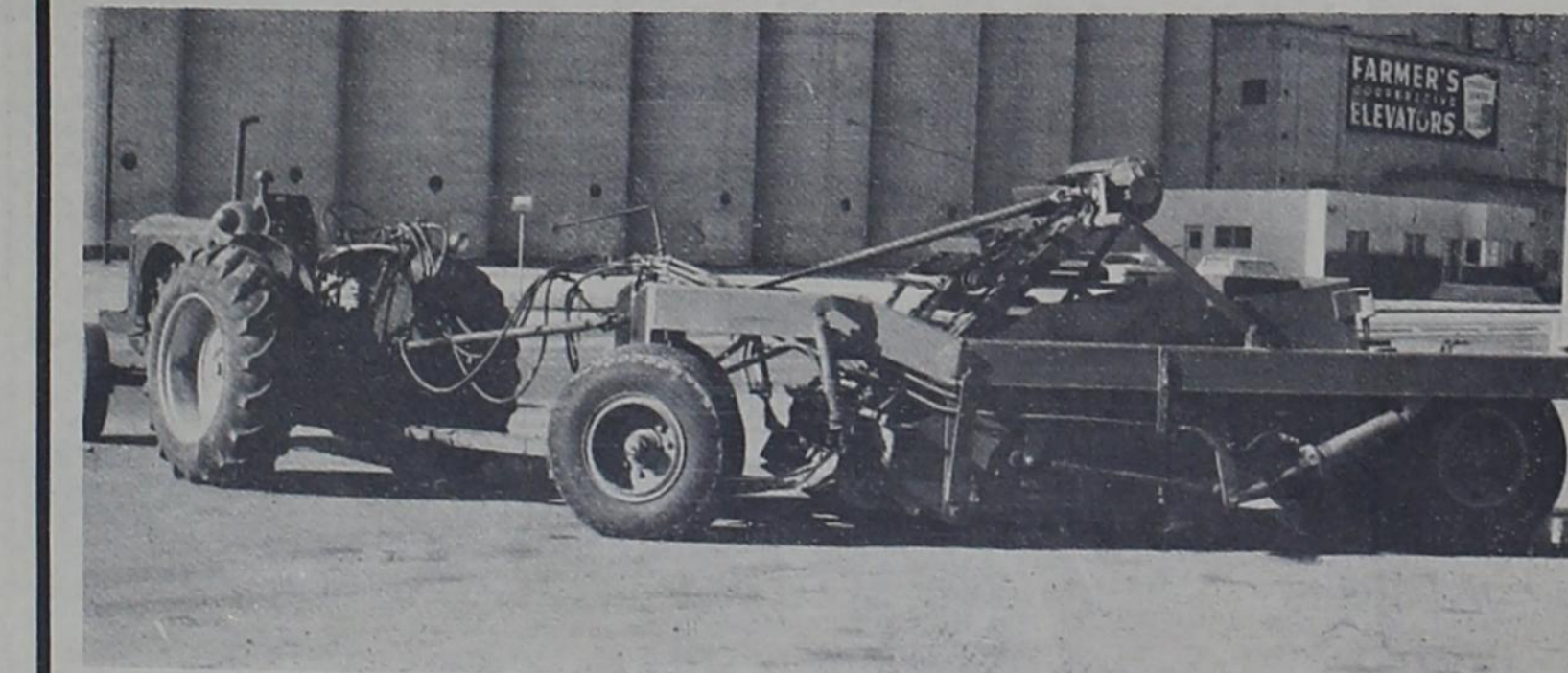

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Bring Foreign Students To Farwell School --

AFS Slates Spring Carnival

Farwell Chapter of the American Field Service has slated a spring carnival at Farwell school in the old gymnasium on April 12 beginning at 6 p.m. The carnival will involve the entire community including students, civic and service groups and also all church groups. Funds raised at the carnival will be used to help in bringing a Foreign exchange student to Farwell school. Plans have been made for the student to be here by the beginning of school. Final selection of a home for the student will be announced in the near future.

The American Field Service was founded in 1914 as a volunteer ambulance corps, and served with Allied Armies during World War I and II. Between the two wars, it conducted a graduate fellowship program for French universities, and in 1947 undertook the current international scholarship program at the secondary school level. Since that time, more than 42,000 students from 78 countries have participated in the American Field Service Program.

The Field Service is a non-profit membership organization under the laws of the State of New York, and is a private educational program with no religious or political affiliation.

The Winter Program is the original and largest of the group and consists of the International Scholarship programs. It brings students from overseas for a year to study in their senior year at a United States secondary school and to live with U.S. families as a part of the family. Of the approximately 3,100 students currently involved in this program annually, 95 per cent are in public high schools and the

balance in independent day and boarding schools. The AFS Winter Program students are boys and girls who have been chosen for personal and academic qualities. They are between 16 and 18 years of age. All of the students must have studied English and must have demonstrated a potential for quickly becoming competent to carry a high school course in English.

The students are individually interviewed and screened by AFS committee and offices overseas, with the final selection and placements with families made by the International Headquarters. These students come to the United States from approximately 60 different countries for a one-year period and are required to return home at the end of the year. They arrive in the U.S. sometime between the last week in July and the first week in September and return to their homes the following July. At the end of their U.S.

stay, they are taken on a three-to-four-week bus trip to expose them to different U.S. environs and to promote multi-national friendships among the students.

NURSERY NEWS

"Did the freeze kill the fruit?" That will be the oft-asked question from now until it does kill it--or until frost danger is past. We all know that trees in full bloom will not stand 10 to 12 degree weather and still set fruit. The next question is "How much cold will a bloom stand before it is full open?"

There have been instances where peach buds froze before the bud swelled to half size.

There are a number of factors that enter into the picture and a complete record of them all is something we haven't kept. But we do know that when the air temperature gets below freezing and there is little or no moisture in the air, the peach bud that has started to swell will stop and go no further. The extent of damage is relative to the amount of moisture, degree of cold, length of time of the cold, and maybe a few factors that we know nothing about. On the other hand, there have also been instances where a coating of ice over the blooms protected the fruit--some five or six degrees--which made the difference between a crop and a failure.

A prime factor in retarding bloom on fruit trees is to keep roots well watered during the early spring; in fact, all winter. We have seen a few trees around town already that are in full bloom (or at least, they were before our winter weather set in.) We also noticed that the ground was extremely dry. Why? By studying nature, we learn that a plant in trouble will make one final effort to reproduce its kind. When a tree is extremely dry, the laws of nature tell it that if it intends to do its job, do it now. The tree that blooms in the fall or exceptionally early is about to die.

Again, we maintain plants given the proper amount of the right kind and balance of plant food and plenty of moisture will repay us many times over for the effort spent.

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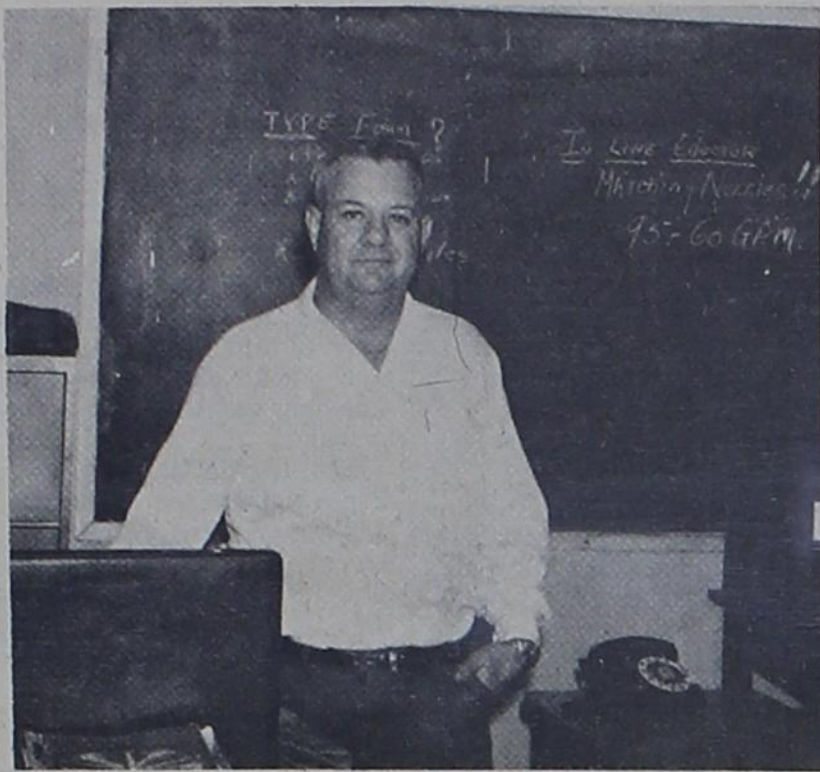
