Coach Defines A Sissy

Approximately 45 persons were in attendance at the Texico High School athletic banquet Tuesday evening. Arrangements for the affair were made by the varsity cheerleaders.

Speaker for the occasion was Coach Johnny Green, who used as topic for discussion "The Real Winner." Coach Green stated that of the number of boys who participate in sports only about ten per cent are "real winners," ten per cent are "real losers," and the other 80 per cent are "shoulder shruggers."

He stated that the real winners are those boys who try their hardest and go forth with a burning desire to win, but take defeat in a graceful manner as well as taking victory in their stride. He said the winner may be beat on the scoreboard, but he is never beat in his heart.

The real loser can always give a reason for defeat, (never at fault himself) and when he wins he is puffed up about it and

believes himself to be the "greatest." The vast majority of the group are the shoulder shruggers who smile sweetly and say "win a few, lose a few, that's life" - and that is life to at least 80 per cent of the people in the world. Coach Green ended his talk with the parable of a "Sissy" and asked the athletes present to decide in which group they belong.

Hypocrisy Evident In Intellectual Community

The near riot that occurred as former Gov. George Wallace of Alabama tried to address a group of college students and faculty members at Dartmouth College last week stands out as a bold example of the hypocrisy inherent in the so-called movement toward "academic freedom."

Those students who took part in the cat calls and constant jeering directed at Wallace succeeded only in demonstrating their complete ignorance and lack of understanding of the principles underlying the concept of freedom of speech. Their behavior not only was unbecoming of a group of educated people, it would have been equally unbecoming of a group of heathen savages, which was what the crowd appeared to be at times. Their actions were a disgrace to the academic community and the country as a whole, leaving little doubt as to the mental bankruptcy of at least a portion of the student body and faculty of Dartmouth College.

When one considers that Dartmouth College is located in a portion of the country which is supposed to be the very citadel of liberal thought, grave doubts are cast on the validity of much of the liberal line of reasoning. Those who were the most active in attempting to keep Wallace from having his say are undoubtedly the same bunch who screams loudest for "academic freedom" and "freedom of speech." They are the ones who grow the old English style beards, sit around waving a very distinguished looking pipe, (in which there is usually no tobacco), and expound on the oppression of the intellectual community by the uniformed and uneducated laity. In reality, they succeed only in demonstrating the extreme minuteness of their mental capacity.

Had these self-styled intellectuals been truly interested in promoting freedom of expression as they so often claim, they would have at least allowed Wallace to make his speech, uninterrupted by boing, heckling, and a cute little demonstration in which several students dressed up in Klu Klux Klan outfits and pretended to beat a Negro student with poles, etc.

Had these people been the mental giants they had claimed to be, they would have issued a challenge to debate under the proper rules, rather than resorting to mob tactics. Could it be that they are afraid of a legitimate debate with George Wallace?

What these pinheads fail to realize is that by attempting to shut Wallace up with gag tactics, they expose their own hypocrisy. One can only draw the following conclusions:

These people are not mental giants, but mental weaklings. They are interested in freedom of speech only in as much as it benefits them, all other opinions be hanged. They have demonstrated that they neither know nor care to know the principles upon which a democracy is founded. They have shown that they partake of the very thing that they propose to be against -- discrimination against those with divergent viewpoints.

I suggest, then, that before these individuals expect to be listened to in the future, they demonstrate their ability to disagree with a person without resorting to tactics such as they used against Wallace. It does not speak highly for the academic community of Dartmouth College, or anywhere else for that matter, to merely attempt to shout those with whom you do not agree.

Water, Inc. Meets In Lubbock May 24

Final steps will be taken May 24 for formation of Water, Inc. as individuals and organizations on the High Plains of Texas meet at the Koko Palace in Lubbock beginning at 2 p.m.

At a meeting last week, the name, Water, Inc., was chosen and plans made for organizing the association whose main objective will be to supply water from new sources to the area. "This is actually the groundwork for some project, such as channeling water from the Mississippi River, etc., for the Plains area," Aubrey Brock Bovina representative of High Plains Underground Water District.

However, Water, Inc. is not an affiliate of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, but will act in the capacity of looking to the future in finding some new source

of irrigation water for this section of Texas.

Everyone in the area is invited to attend.

The water association formation has been recommended by the Texas Water Development Board and other agencies seeking to provide new water resources for this area as the first step in a water importation program. Water importation will need the study of the organization required for developing and distributing water in the area.

Such a project would cost in the billions of dollars and would take at least 10 to 20 years to complete.

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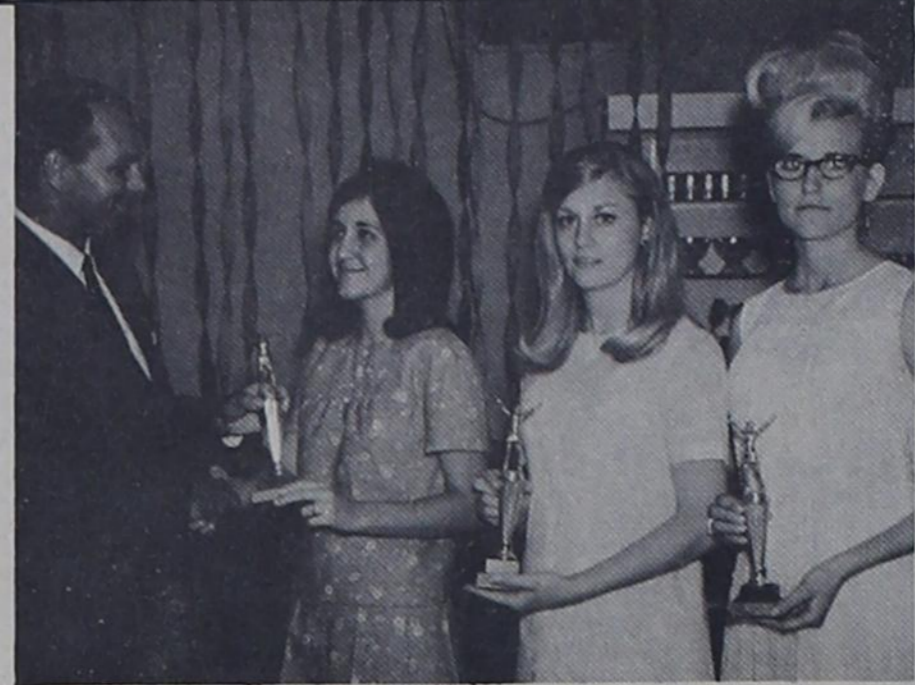

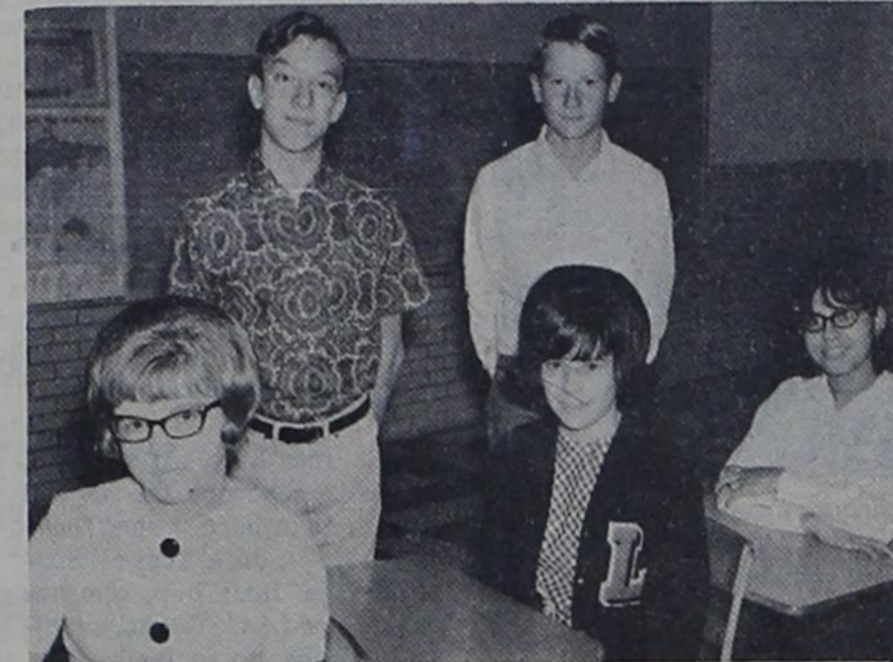
Emily has attended both East Texas State College and Texas Tech. She is a member of the Pink Ladies and a Sunday School teacher at Lazbuddie Methodist Church.

Attention All Farmers And Land Owners

Business and agriculture leaders of the High Plains met recently in Lubbock to form an organization which they hope will eventually lead to the importation of at least 15 million acre feet of surface water. This newly formed organization adopted the name Water, Inc.

Its prime objective is to import enough water to supplement that now being pumped from the

Ogallala formation and insure the economic stability of the area.

Dr. Herbert Grubb of Lubbock and R. C. (Dick) Godwin of Hereford will meet with farmers of the Lazbuddie community Friday night at 9 p.m. in the Lazbuddie high school auditorium. All farmers and landowners are especially urged to attend.

Vote To Be Held On Cotton Allotment Transfers

Parmer County cotton farmers will vote within the next few days to decide whether they want to be able to sell or lease their cotton allotments outside the county, according to Prentice Mills of Parmer County ASCS office.

Referendum on the question will be conducted during the period of May 15 through May 19. Ballots may be returned by mail or delivered to the ASCS County Office during that time.

The only question to be decided by the balloting is whether upland cotton allotments may be transferred during the next two years to farms which are owned or controlled by someone else and located in other counties. Such transfers may be made by sale or by lease. In no case may transfers be made outside the state. An affirmative vote by at least two-thirds of the county's cotton farmers who vote permits such transfers during the next two years, 1968 and 1969.

Two similar referendums were conducted in 1965 and 1966 throughout the cotton belt, and growers in 412 counties have already approved the allotment transfers. The vote this time will be held only in counties where such transfers have not previously been approved.

It is to be pointed out that voting by mail is easy and convenient, and the vote therefore should be large and fully representative of the wishes of the cotton farmers in this county.

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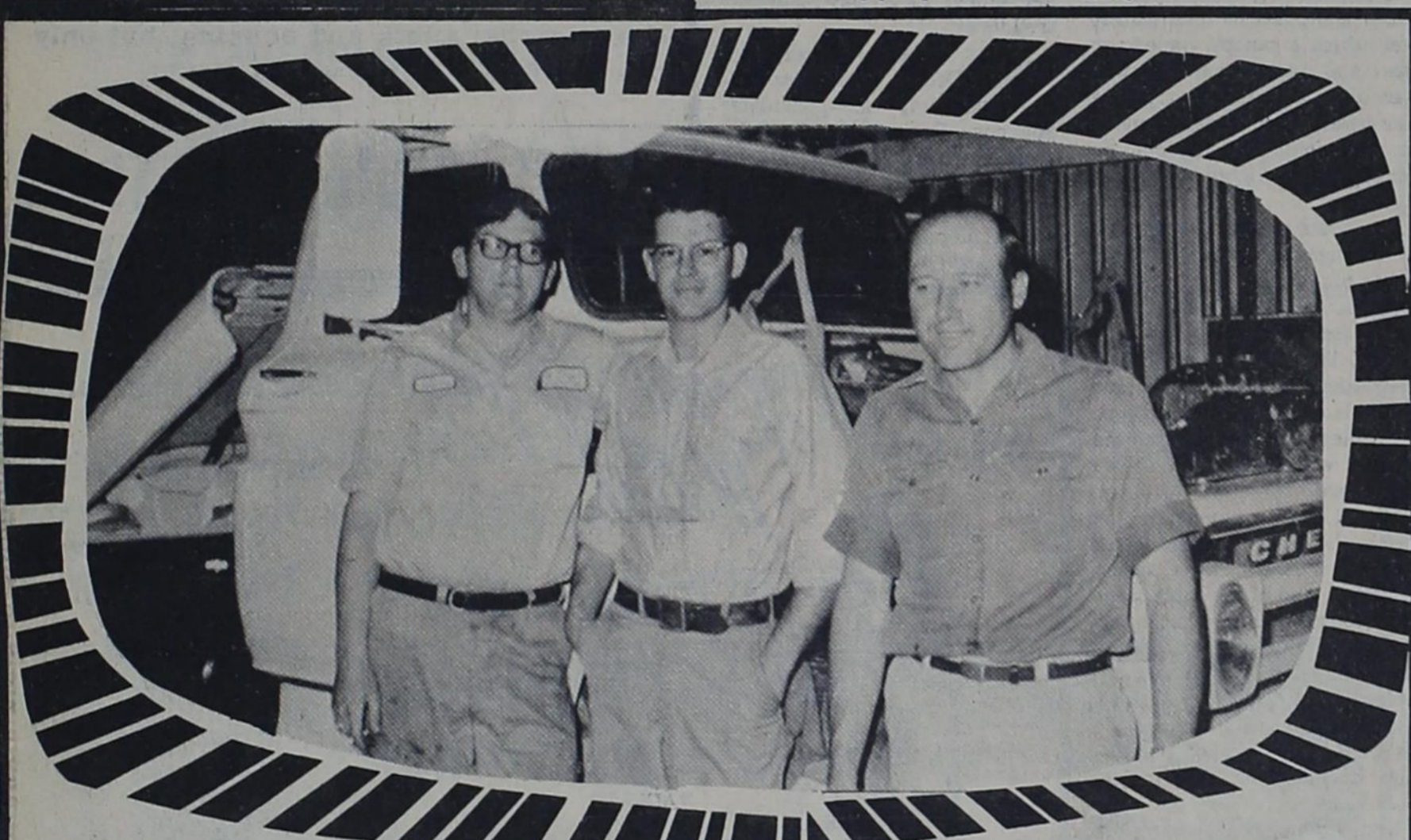
