

Vote To Be Held On **Cotton Allotment Transfers**

Parmer County cotton farmfew days to decide whether they want to be able to sell or lease their cotton allotments outside the county, according to Prentice Mills of Parmer County ASCS office.

Referendum on the question will be conducted during the period of May 15 through May 19. Ballots may be returned

by mail or delivered to the ASCS County Office during that time. The only question to be dedie schools; there's lots of cided by the balloting is whether upland cotton allotments may be transferred during the next two years to farms which are owned or controlled by someone else and located in other counties. Such transfers may be made by sale or by lease. In no case may transfers be made outside the state. An affirmative vote by at least two-thirds of the county's cotton farmers who vote permits such transfers curing the next two years, 1968 and 1969.

Two similar referendums were conducted in 1965 and 1966 throughout the cotton belt, and growers in 412 counties have already approved the allotment transfers. The vote this time will be held only in coun-

ties where such transfers have not previously been approved. It is to be pointed out that voting by mail is easy and convenient, and the vote there-

fore should be large and fully representative of the wishes of the cotton farmers in this county.


