Another bit of mis-information is that it is impossible to balance the budget without causing mass starvation or wreaking economic hardship on the poor and disadvantaged. The projected budget deficits over the next three years can be approximately 85 percent eliminated in one swoop.

This is by simply not granting cost of living increases to social security recipients or to all federal retirees or current employees. This word from a very knowledgeable Washington watcher who is privy to reliable Congressional studies on

The problem is that there is not any politicians with the nerve to brave the political firestorm that would erupt about their heads from the pressure group representing these voters.

Our informant also said that the other 15 percent of the deficit could be eliminated through a reduction in the timehonored Congressional pork barrel projects so dear to a Congressman's heart and to the folks in his home district.

Fiscal stability can be achieved if our leaders have the nerve to lead, and if our people have the wisdom to follow that leadership.

It is past time for the City to sweep the white chat rock off of the streets which were topped this summer. We have closely observed on two of our very hottest days, and found no evidence of further bleeding of tar. The tar coat has taken up all the rock it will this year. Now the choking white chat dust is ruining homes, buildings, cars, and foilage up and down these streets.

After listening to the gloom and doom spread by one of the overpaid TV double domes, we were reminded of some words of wisdom we had read. With a little shuffling of the papers in our office, we uncovered it. We think some of our newscasters could do well to read and ponder on its message. Believe we have run it before, but here it is again.

I watched them tearing a building down. A gang of men in a busy town; with a ho-heave-ho and lusty yell, they swung a beam and the side wall fell.

I asked the foreman: "Are these men skilled, and the men you'd hire if you had to build?" He gave a laugh and said: "No indeed! Just common labor is all I need. I can easily wreck in a day or two what builders have taken a year to do."

I thought to myself as I went my way; am I a builder who works with care, which of these roles have I tried to play? Measuring life by the rule and square? Am I shaping ny deeds to a well made plan? Patiently doing the best I can? Or am I a wrecker, who walks the town, content with the labor of tearing down?





Hance Announces Higher Disaster Payments For Corn, Grain Farmers

Lubbock that West Texas corn and grain sorghum growers will receive higher disaster payments than originally announced by the USDA.

"After the USDA announced its disaster relief program on July 15, I asked Secretary John Block to reconsider the payment levels set for corn and grain sorghum," said Hance. "Before leaving Washington, I received a letter from OMB Director David Stockman stating that his department had approved the increases and announcement by the USDA is expected shortly."

Originally, the USDA had set corn payments at 15 cents a bushel and grain sorghum at 18 cents a bushel. The new levels will be \$1.17 per bushel for corn and \$1.13 per bushel for grain sorghum and barley. These payment levels are 90 percent of what they were under the prior disaster program that expired in 1981. This

"The Administration's decision to raise the disaster payments will of course help our farmers," said Hance. "Many more of our farmers will be able to hang on for another year and hopefully we can get a farm bill passed that recognizes the problems on the farm are being caused by low commodity prices and killer interest rates."

The Texas Congressman also announced he had sent a letter to Governor Bill Clements requesting disaster aid for farm workers under provisions of the disaster Relief Act of 1974.

"Many of our agricultural workers, both migrant and local residents, are faced with the prospect of having no jobs due to the lack of any substantial crops this fall." wrote Hance. "Most agricultural employers in West Texas are not covered by unemployment in-

School Lunch Policy Set For Area Schools

Area schools serve nutritious meals every school day.

At Farwell School, students may buy lunch for \$1.00 for grades 9-12, 95 cents for grades 6-8, and 90 cents for grades K-5; and breakfast for 60 cents for all students. Reduced price meals are 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for break-

At Texico, students (all grades) may buy lunch for 90 cents, and adult lunches are \$1.40. Extra milk is 20 cents for students or adults. Reduced price lunch is 40 cents. Texico School does not serve break-

Lazbuddie students may buy breakfast for 25 cents for grades K-6 and 30 cents for 7-12. Adult breakfast will be 75 cents and the reduced price is 20 cents.

Lunches will be 70 cents for K-4; 85 cents for 5-8; \$1. for 9-12; Adults, \$1.35 and visitors will pay \$1.60

Reduced price meals are 40 cents for lunch and 20 cents for Children from families

whose income is at or below

the level shown on the scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced-price meals. To apply for free or reducedpriced meals, families must complete an application for same and return it to the school. An application which does not contain complete information on household members and income cannot be used by the school. If information is missing, the child will be denied the meal

For an application to be complete, the family must provide the total household

household members, social security numbers of all household members 21 years or older, or a statement that a household member does not have one. An adult household member must sign the application. The information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school

If a child is approved for meal benefits, the family must tell the school when the household income increases by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when the household size decreases. The family may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If the family is not now eligible, but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, they can fill out an application at that

In certain cases, foster children are eligible for these benefits. If the family has foster children living with them and wish to apply for free or reduced-price benefits for them, they should tell the school.

Children who get meal benefits are treated the same way as children who pay for meals. In the operation of the child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap.

If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have a right to a fair


Two New Coaches To Help **Direct Steer Grid Attack**
