Contest Starts Sept. 3 - -

Guessers Gearing Up For Gridiron Games

Although the baseball titles have not even been decided, and the weather makes swimming the most popular sport to come to mind, for the football fanatic, it's THAT time again.

Time to fead the charts or crystal balls, study the sports guides, read the columns, then casually chuck it all into File 13 as you make up your own mind about who's going to be in the win column of the football picks in the upcoming merchant-sponsored football contest.

For the 24th consecutive year, area and local merchants and businesses are sponsoring the Tribune Football Contest, and this year it gets underway on Friday, Sept. 3, with the first entry blank and 12 choices coming out in that issue of the Tribune.

Top prize for the winner of the 12-week contest will be the same as last: Two tickets to see the Dallas Cowboys play at Texas Stadium, free overnight lodging at the Regent Hotel in Dallas, and free transportation to and from Texas Stadium, plus \$50 to assist with expenses.

The tickets this year will be to the Cowboys and New Orleans Saints game on December 19.

As in past years, two weekly cash prizes will be awarded to the persons having the most correct choices. First place winner will receive \$7.50 and the second place winner will receive \$5.

Rules remain the same as in the past. Entrants must be 12 years of age or over, and contest entry blanks will be available at the Tribune office and will be in each issue of the Tribune.

To enter the contest, a person must pick the winner of the 12 high school, college, and

pro games listed. In addition, he must pick the score of a tiebreaker game, this to be used in case there is a tie in the number of correct winners chosen. (The tiebreaker pick is most important since many times the overall contest winner has been decided by the tiebreaker scores.)

The Tribune keeps weekly tabulations on the winners and they are always available for public inspection, with each week's outcome ready for display Monday mornings.

Merchant sponsors and their families are eligible to enter; however, Tribune employees and their families are ineligible for the contest.

Entry blanks should be turned in to the Tribune office by 5 p.m. CDT on Fridays, or if mailed, must bear a Friday postmark.

Stabbing In Bovina Investigated

Farmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan reports that Manuel Sanez of Tipton, Okla., was transported to the hospital where he remains following a stabbing by an unknown assailant on August 22 in Bovina. The sheriff's department is investigating the incident.

Sheriff Morgan said that his officers also investigated two thefts this week.

Claude McGowan of Hereford reported the burglary of a saddle, electric welder, and assorted tools from a barn west of Summerfield sometime

between August 12 and 15. The items are valued at \$700.

J.R. Euler of Summerfield reported that a battery, starter, and an alternator were taken from an irrigation motor sometime this week.

There were also two arrests made this week by sheriff's officers.

Alfredo Alonzo, 20, of Bovina was arrested in Bovina for public intoxication, resisting arrest, and violation of probation. He was fined \$35 for the public intoxication charge, and was fined \$500 plus court costs

and given 30 days in jail for resisting arrest. The violation of probation charge is pending hearing in District Court.

Aureleo Villarreal, 35, of Hereford was arrested at the Excel station parking lot near Friona by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission on August 21, for sale of alcoholic beverages in a dry county, and possession of alcoholic beverages with the intent of sale. He was fined \$200 plus court cost on each charge, and was given 30 days in jail, probated for 180 days.

Area Pastors Meet To Prepare For Bible Study

Three pastors from area United Methodist Churches met in Farwell last Thursday afternoon to prepare for their Fall Bible Study. They were Dr. Cyril Stone, pastor of Kingswood United Methodist Church in Clovis; Rev. Ray Bell, pastor of Trinity United Methodist Church in Clovis; and Rev. Don Holladay, pastor of Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church, Texico-Farwell.

All three pastors are preparing to teach the "Trinity Bible Studies" in their local churches. Hamlin Memorial church began that study last spring with the Old Testament and will begin the New Testament survey on August

29, at 7:15 p.m. in the fellowship hall.

Rev. Bell at Trinity church in Clovis will begin the Old Testament survey on September 7, and Dr. Stone at Kingswood church will start the study on September 30.

Trinity Bible Studies is designed by Frank Warden of Dallas. It is an intensive series of ten-week surveys of the

content of the Bible. This course is designed for the student willing to make a disciplined commitment to daily Bible study and reading. The course is designed for adult Christians to "attain a Biblical point of view" which can help them grow in their Christian life, explains Rev. Holladay.

The long-range goal of Trinity Bible Studies is the use

The world is full of mis-information. Last Sunday morning we were gassing up our car in Abilene, Texas. It was about 11:30 a.m. and already 90 degrees with around 60 percent humidity. As we watched the wheels spin on the gas pump, another customer looked us over and asked where we were from.

Farwell, Texas. Uh - where's that? About 10 miles east of Clovis, New Mexico. Oh - sure must be hot up there. We didn't even bother to answer.

Another bit of mis-information is that it is impossible to balance the budget without causing mass starvation or wreaking economic hardship on the poor and disadvantaged. The projected budget deficits over the next three years can be approximately 85 percent eliminated in one swoop.

This is by simply not granting cost of living increases to social security recipients or to all federal retirees or current employees. This word from a very knowledgeable Washington watcher who is privy to reliable Congressional studies on the subject.

The problem is that there is not any politicians with the nerve to brave the political firestorm that would erupt about their heads from the pressure group representing these voters.

Our informant also said that the other 15 percent of the deficit could be eliminated through a reduction in the time-honored Congressional pork barrel projects so dear to a Congressman's heart and to the folks in his home district.

Fiscal stability can be achieved if our leaders have the nerve to lead, and if our people have the wisdom to follow that leadership.

I watched them tearing a building down. A gang of men in a busy town; with a ho-heave-ho and lusty yell, they swung a beam and the side wall fell.

I asked the foreman: "Are these men skilled, and the men you'd hire if you had to build?" He gave a laugh and said: "No indeed! Just common labor is all I need. I can easily wreck in a day or two what builders have taken a year to do."

I thought to myself as I went my way; am I a builder who works with care, which of these roles have I tried to play? Measuring life by the rule and square? Am I shaping my deeds to a well made plan? Patiently doing the best I can? Or am I a wrecker, who walks the town, content with the labor of tearing down?

education. Farwell Schools began the year on Monday with a total of 465 students enrolled.

Farwell Enrollment Down

Farwell Schools started the 1982-83 year, which officially began Monday, with fewer students than were present at this time last year. Total enrollment was 465 students as compared to 481 last year.

High school enrollment this year is 129 students while last year's enrollment was 132.

Junior high figures are closer with a total enrollment of 110 students, compared to 109 last year. Sixth grade has 42 students, seventh grade has 28, and eighth grade has 40.

Elementary enrollment also shows a decrease this year as 226 students are enrolled as compared to 240 last year.

Kindergarten has 35 students, first grade 33, second grade 38, third grade 46, fourth grade 29, and fifth grade, 45 students.

So far this year, the overall decrease in the school enrollment is 16 students, in contrast to last year's decrease of 33 students from the year before.

Texico Shows Slight Increase

Texico Schools shows an increase of three students in their total enrollment for the 1982-83 school year, as 360 students are enrolled, compared to last year's total enrollment of 357.

The high school shows a total enrollment of 135 students, with 30 seniors, 34 juniors, 33

sophomores, and 38 freshmen. This compares to an enrollment of 123 students last year.

Elementary enrollment shows a definite increase as 152 students reported for school last Wednesday, as compared to 144 last year. There were 27 students in the first grade, 37 in second, 20 in third, 27 in fourth, 38 in fifth, and three

students in the Special Education C Program this year.

Although both high school and elementary show an increase of students this year, the junior high school reported a decrease with a total of 73 students, as compared to last year's 90 students. The eighth grade has 22 enrolled, seventh grade 27, and sixth grade 24.

Farwell Boosters Plan Bus Charter To Plains

Farwell Booster Club held its first regular meeting of the year Tuesday night at Luce's restaurant, and laid plans for chartering a bus to take fans to the first Steer football game at Plains on September 3.

Cost for the 190-mile round trip will be \$13 per person. Those interested in riding the bus to Plains may contact Lee Nell Eubank or Joe Jones at Security State Bank.

Coach Bruce Dollar reported to the club about the scrimmage with Lorenzo last week. He expressed satisfaction with the performance of the varsity team at this point in the season. Coach Dollar also reported that the football program is gaining boys over last year. He said that there are now 46 boys out for varsity football, and that a total of 79 boys are in the football program at the school.

According to Dollar, Dim-

mitt will run the same defense as the Steers will face at Plains. The Steers go to Dimmitt tonight (Friday) and engage the Bobcats in a scrimmage session beginning with the 8th grade at 5 p.m. Dimmitt and Kress scrimmaged last week and tied at one TD each. Last week Plains scrimmaged with Littlefield and came away with a one apiece tie.

During the business session, secretary/treasurer Lee Nell Eubank reported on the club expenses for last year. Membership for the year was kept at \$15, and sponsorship of the football-basketball calendar was set at \$25 for one side or \$45 for both sides. A membership is included in the calendar fee.

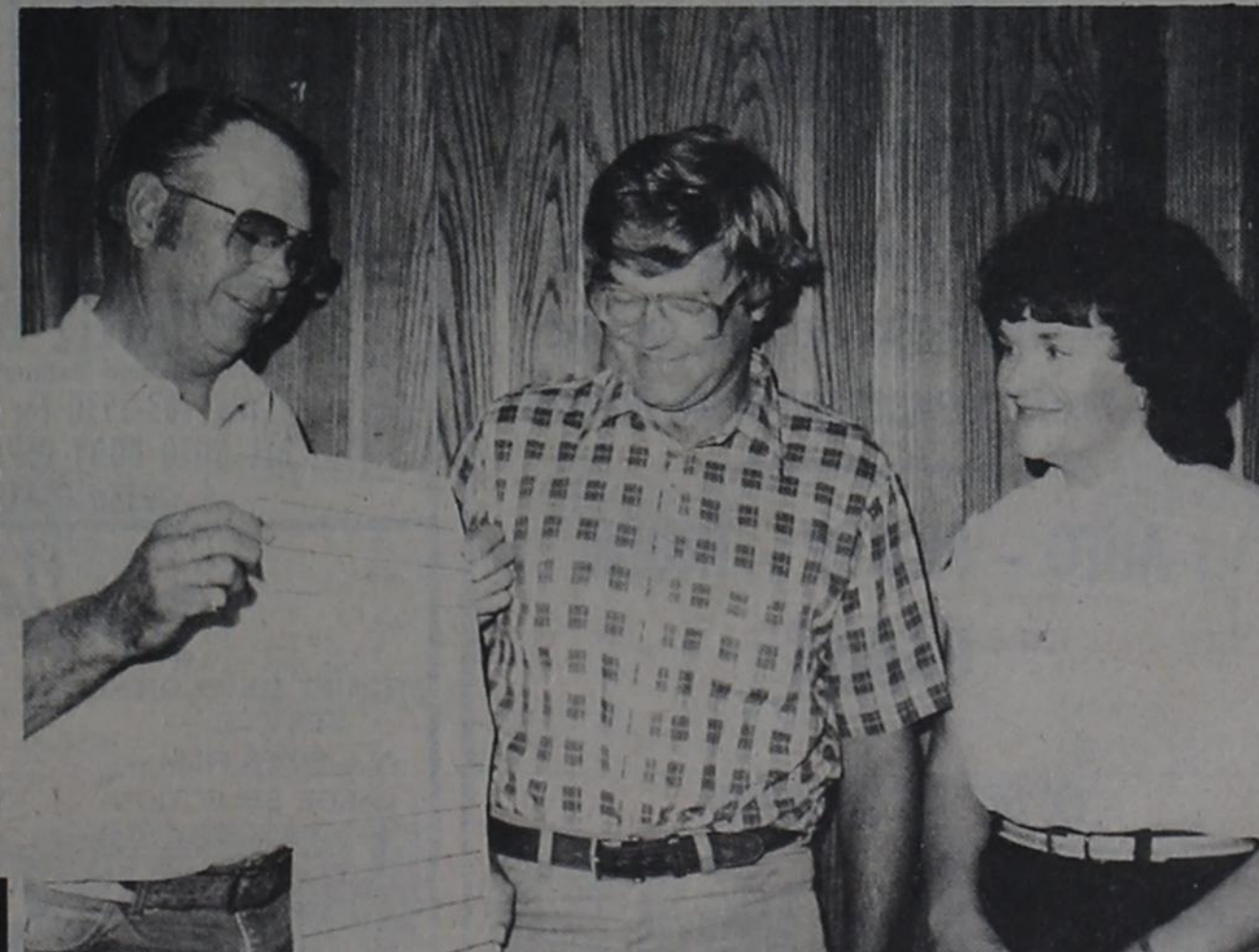
A representative of the Farwell cheerleaders also reported that the cheerleaders will sponsor the game pro-

The BTD Committee is comprised of representatives of all of the social and civic organizations in the Twin Cities.

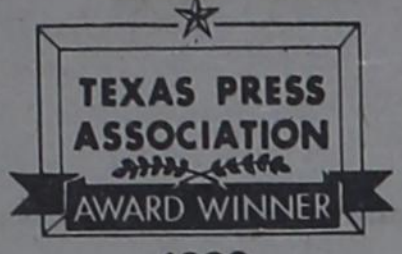


Farwell Administrators

this year, but the four administrators expect more students to enroll before the week is over.



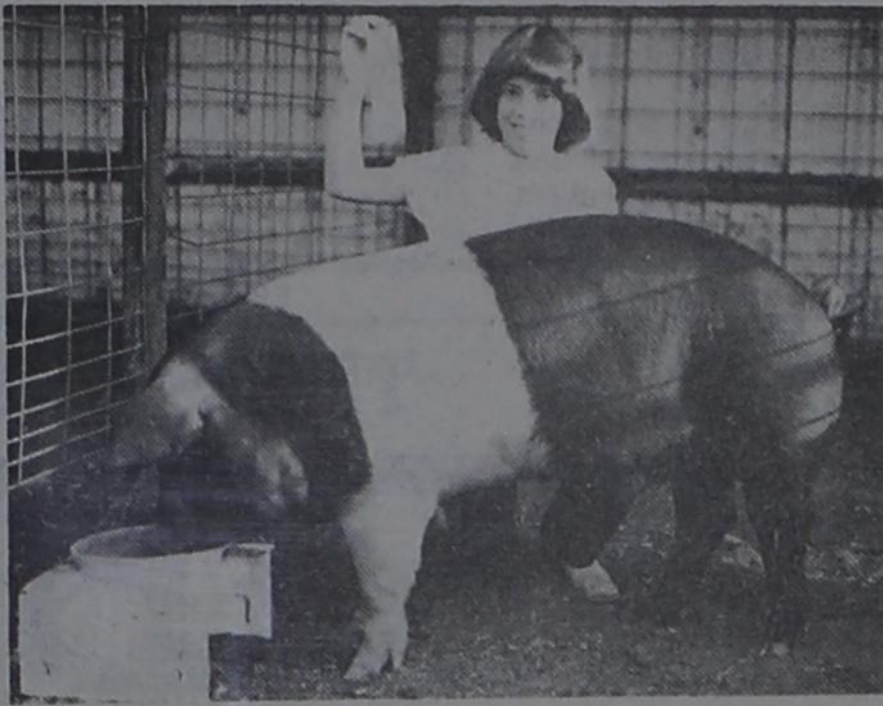

Hance Announces Higher Disaster Payments For Corn, Grain Farmers

U.S. Rep. Kent Hance, D-Texas, announced Friday in Lubbock that West Texas corn and grain sorghum growers will receive higher disaster payments than originally announced by the USDA.

"After the USDA announced its disaster relief program on July 15, I asked Secretary John Block to reconsider the payment levels set for corn and grain sorghum," said Hance. "Before leaving Washington, I received a letter from OMB Director David Stockman stating that his department had approved the increases and announcement by the USDA is expected shortly."

Originally, the USDA had set corn payments at 15 cents a bushel and grain sorghum at 18 cents a bushel. The new levels will be \$1.17 per bushel for corn and \$1.13 per bushel for grain sorghum and barley. These payment levels are 90 percent of what they were under the prior disaster program that expired in 1981. This

makes the payments for corn and grain sorghum more in line with those received for cotton and wheat.

"The Administration's decision to raise the disaster payments will of course help our farmers," said Hance. "Many more of our farmers will be able to hang on for another year and hopefully we can get a farm bill passed that recognizes the problems on the farm are being caused by low commodity prices and killer interest rates."

The Texas Congressman also announced he had sent a letter to Governor Bill Clements requesting disaster aid for farm workers under provisions of the disaster Relief Act of 1974. "Many of our agricultural workers, both migrant and local residents, are faced with the prospect of having no jobs due to the lack of any substantial crops this fall," wrote Hance. "Most agricultural employers in West Texas are not covered by unemployment in-

surance and, as a result, these farm workers have nowhere to turn for support."

Under provisions of the Disaster Relief Act, the governor of a state must request such aid from the President.

"We have also been assured by the Small Business Administration (SBA) that as soon as the USDA designates counties eligible for Farmers' Home Administration emergency

loans, the SBA will designate those same counties eligible for SBA assistance to businesses," added Hance.

"I feel confident now that all segments of the West Texas agriculture industry will receive due consideration from the federal government. I think Washington now realizes that the storm damage not only affected farmers, but also our businesses and farm laborers."

Electric Cooperative Writes Open Letter

To: Members of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative.

The ten-year wholesale power contract under which we are operating expires in October, 1982. Normal inflationary operating expenses also continue to increase. These two items are causing our retail costs of electricity to increase an average of 42% between now

and November 1, 1982. The Board of Directors and Management of your cooperative have exerted every effort possible to keep electricity costs in line. Cost increases, however, are inevitable. Inflation, increased government regulations, fuel costs, interest, and taxes: all these items and many more contribute to rising electrical costs. Many of

these are beyond our control. Wholesale power cost, depreciation, interest, and taxes alone, for example, account for 89% of our total cost of electric service.

We realize that an average 42% increase is considerably more than Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative members have ever been asked to accept, but are forced to if the Coopera-

tive's financial integrity, quality of electric service, and payment of capital credit accounts remain at their present level. We know you share our concern of rising electrical costs and trust you understand we will do our utmost to keep them as low as possible.

Experiment Station Plans Field Day At Halfway

Research aimed at helping High Plains farmers make better management decisions about their crops will be demonstrated September 14 at the 73rd annual field day of the Texas Agricultural Experi-

ment Station (TAES) at Lubbock and Halfway.

The Texas A&M University High Plains Research Facility at Halfway, 14 miles west of Plainview on U.S. Hwy. 70, is the host this year, said Dr. Bill

Ott, resident director of research for the Lubbock-Halfway centers. The annual program alternates between the two facilities, in cooperation with the High Plains Research Foundation.

Five major displays are planned on the tours of the research sites at Halfway, said James Bordovsky, research agricultural engineer and field day chairman. These steps will illustrate research being conducted in weed research, cotton breeding and variety testing, and cotton bollworm control; explain work on new management strategies, including on-farm computer application; and display a new multi-function irrigation system which will apply both water and chemicals through a dual nozzle system.

Also featured on the tour will

be research on sorghum improvement, mite control, soil fertility, grain sorghum performance, and soybean evaluation. Farm machinery, irrigation equipment, and other farm implements will be on display by area manufacturers and suppliers.

Tours will begin at 1 p.m. and end at 5 p.m.

The field day is a cooperative presentation of TAES, the High Plains Research Foundation, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Agricultural Research Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Professional staffs of these agencies will be on hand to answer questions and discuss problems with agricultural producers, home owners and gardeners, Bordovsky said.

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Farwell Steer Coach Pleased With Scrimmage

The Boyds say they really like the community's warmth and friendliness. They attend the Texico First Baptist Church. They also raise German short hair pointers and standard poodles for show.

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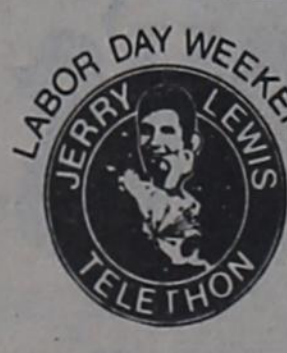

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Lazbuddie Faces Hart In Scrimmage Session

Lazbuddie Longhorns saw their first turf action last Thursday night in a scrimmage session against Anton, and will face Hart in another scrimmage tonight (Friday) at Hart at 6:30 p.m.

Coach Terry Campbell said he was very pleased with the Anton scrimmage, although both the varsity and JV lost, 1-0. It gave his teams experience and a chance to work on their plays.

The coach expects a lot from

the varsity squad who hopes to better their 1-9 record of last year.

With eight lettermen returning to this year's squad, Campbell says that he hopes to upset a few folks' plans for the district championship, but added that for the most part his team has their work cut out for them because the player turnout was small.

"It's hard to build a team when the choice of players is so limited, but we're looking a

lot better than we did last year," the coach said.

What the Longhorns lack in numbers, they make up for in motivation. "The guys are really up for the season," Campbell said, "and they're particularly psyched up for our scrimmages."

Starting at quarterback will be senior Casey McBroom. Campbell says that he hopes to use McBroom as the main thrust of the Longhorn offensive attack to try to be more effective on passing situations. McBroom was voted most improved in spring drills.

Expected to start on the running attack will be fullback Bart Elliott, a 170 pound senior; and at halfback will be Jimmy Garcia and Ralph Gonzales. Garcia is a 150 pound senior and known for his superior balance and teaching ability; and Gonzales is a 150 pound junior who was the Longhorns' top receiver in 1981.

Other offensive starters will be two very dependable seniors, Daniel Schacher and Joe Dan Tarter. Schacher will be at the wingback position and Tarter will be at center.

Another hopeful starter will be Lee Scott, a 160 pound junior. Scott was selected as best offensive lineman as a sophomore.

All-state potential Jeff Jesko

will probably start at one guard position.

Other starting hopefuls at the same position will be Paul Stanley, a 160 pound sophomore; Rickie Dale, a 170 pound senior who was voted as the Longhorns' most dependable lineman; and Roy Gonzales, a 150 pound junior.

Campbell is expecting great contributions from 195 pound sophomore Shannon Weaver at tackle, and also from Dewayne Ivy on the special teams.

The return of Mark Lust at tight end will be particularly beneficial to the Lazbuddie passing game. The 160 pound senior played every down during the 1981 season.

Tony Waddell will be another hopeful starter in the secondary.

Ray Moran will probably start at one of the linebacking positions on the defensive team, and Danny Powell, a 140 pound senior, will be vying for the starting safety position.

CHANGING ATTITUDES ABOUT DWI

Few things in this country have changed as much during the past few years as public attitudes on drunk drivers. It is a change we can all be thankful for.

Most of that change, in my opinion, can be attributed to the organization of Mothers Against Drunk Drivers (MADD), and the attendant publicity and editorial support they have received from our newspapers. They have succeeded, where others have failed, in drawing attention to the tragedy that has claimed the lives of thousands of Texans.

It was not long ago, for instance, when some public officials who ought to lead by example were openly contemptuous of our laws against driving while drunk. Much of this problem started nine years ago when my opponent became Lt. Governor and helped pass the law reducing the legal drinking age from twenty-one to eighteen years of age. Now Mr.

Hobby, feeling the heat of irate parents and loved ones, and perhaps personal remorse, has said he favors tougher drunk driving laws—another switch from a previous position.

Political promises, however, are easily made. If a politician can't get excited about an issue of this magnitude in nine years, it seems unlikely that he would get excited and pursue corrective legislation in another four years.

So I hope the Mothers Against Drunk Drivers will stick to their guns, and I hope they continue getting support from the people of our state. Their efforts to put an end to this carnage on our highways has my support, and I hope it has yours.

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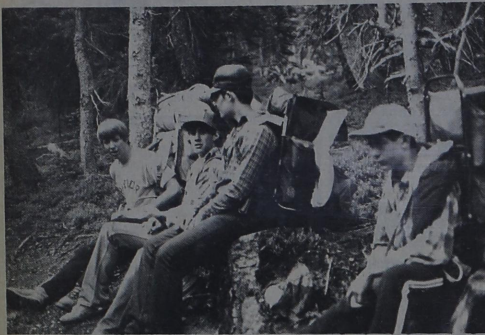
