Dallas Cowboy Tickets Again Await Winner

The 24th annual Tribune-sponsored Area Merchants Football Contest kicks off today (Friday), and again the Grand Prize is two tickets to see the Dallas Cowboys play.

The lucky winner will receive two tickets to the Dallas Cowboys-New Orleans Saints game on Sunday, Dec. 19, in Texas Stadium. And that's not all! The Grand Prize includes lodging at the Regent Hotel in Dallas, transportation to and from the hotel to the stadium, and \$50 in cash to assist with expenses.

So it's time again for area armchair quarterbacks to sharpen their pencils and don their thinking caps for the weekly guessing game of picking the winners in the contest games. It is also important to have the closest score on the tiebreaker game

as it is used to determine winners in case of a tie.

Each week for the next 12 weeks, the entry blank in the Tribune will list 12 high school, college, and pro games, with a tiebreaker game heading the list. All a participant has to do is circle the name of the team he believes will be the victor in that particular game.

The only number score required is for the tiebreaker game. A score must be listed for the teams selected each week as the spotlight game. This game will not affect the weekly won-loss standings, but will be used to determine the weekly winner in case of a tie. The tiebreaker score is most important since many times the overall contest winner has been decided by the tiebreaker scores.

Two weekly cash prizes will be awarded to the persons having the most correct picks. First place winner will receive a check for \$7.50 and the second place winner will receive \$5.

Rules remain the same as in the past. Entrants must be 12 years of age or over, and only one entry per person will be accepted. Entry blanks are available at the Tribune office, in each issue of the Tribune, and must be returned no later than 5 p.m. CDT to the Tribune office. Any entries mailed

must bear a Friday postmark.

Merchant sponsors and their families are eligible and encouraged to enter; however, Tribune employees and their families are ineligible for the contest.

The Tribune keeps weekly tabulations on the winners and these are always available for public inspection, with each week's outcome ready for viewing Monday mornings.

Remember, it is most important for a contestant to enter each week, as the weekly picks are totaled to determine the Grand Prize winner. No one who missed entering one or more weeks has ever won the overall contest.

Prentice Mills Retires As Head Of County ASCS

Prentice Mills, who has served as County Executive Director of the Parmer County ASCS in Farwell since 1956 is retiring from that office today, Friday, Sept. 3. He will be replaced by Martin Chandler, a former Farwellite, who has also had many years experience in ASCS work.

An open house in honor of Mills will be held at the ASCS office all day today. Refreshments will be served and everyone is cordially invited to come by and wish Prentice a "happy retirement" and to welcome Chandler to the position, as well as to visit with the committee and staff.

Mills started his career with the ASCS (Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service) in January of 1956 as a crop reporter in Briscoe County. In March of 1956 he moved to Hale County to start training for a manager position.

On July 1, 1956, he came to Parmer County and was officially named manager in August of that year. Members of the ASCS County Committee at the time Mills became manager were Roy Euler, Joe W. Magness, and Jack Smith.

At that time, the ASCS office was on the second floor of the county courthouse. The office was moved to the Carver Building on Avenue A (Main Street) in the fall of 1956, and moved to its present location at 114 9th Street in 1961.

Mills notes that there have been a number of programs with lots of changes during his time in the job. He has served under six Secretaries of Agri-

culture. The local county office was named as the outstanding ASCS office in the state in 1981.

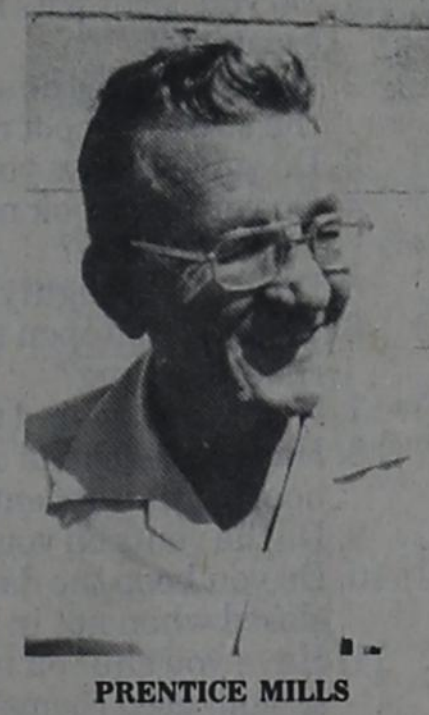
Mills, who plans to become engaged in private business in a small way, travel some and fish some, has also been active in the community while serving the ASCS office. He is a member of the board of the Farwell Youth Commission, member of the board of the Farwell Hospital District, charter member of the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club, charter member of the Texas Association of ASCS Employees, and a Past Master of Farwell Masonic Lodge AF & AM #377.

He and his wife Lavon are members of Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church. Chandler, who says that filling Mills' shoes in the job will be a big task, says that he is looking forward to working with Parmer County farmers again.

He began work in the local ASCS office under Mills in the fall of 1957. After 19½ years here, Chandler then moved to Spearman where he worked in the ASCS office for four years.

Chandler, who attended college at Wayland in Plainview, says he has been in ASCS office work nearly all his working days. "Prentice has done such a good job here that it will be difficult to follow him, but if the farmers will have patience and bear with me, I will do my best to keep things rolling as smoothly as Prentice has done during all the past years," Chandler said.

Chandler and his wife Edith and eight-year-old son have recently moved back to the community where Chandler will re-join the local Rotary Club. The Chandlers have two daughters who live away from home.

Farwell C Of C Sets Long Range Plans

Long-range plans for the beautification of the city of Farwell and other proposed civic activities for the organization were discussed at length Tuesday when 13 members of Farwell Chamber of Commerce met in regular session at noon at Luce's restaurant.

Don Williams, chamber president, presided over the meeting and appointed a committee on civic beautification. To serve on this committee are Fred Chandler, Claude Rose Jr., John Getz, Charles Aycock, Lee Hutchins, Tom Nichols, and Joe Hughes.

This committee will meet to formulate long-range plans for

the beautification projects and then will present an outline of its proposals to a meeting of all local civic organizations. From this group various committees would be selected to serve in different phases of clean up and beautification. Suggested committees included main street committee, vacant lot committee, telephone committee, shade tree committee, junk car and junk on property committee, vacant building committee, legal rights committee, and others as deemed necessary.

Then a meeting of the entire community would be called to set the priorities of the sug-

gested proposals.

Other discussion included planning money-making activities to help with financing of the projects.

The chamber voted to join the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and pay the annual \$100 dues. It was also voted to reactivate the Farwell Development Corporation, and Security State Bank kicked off the new start of the tax deductible corporation with a donation of \$100.

Tom Nichols, Jerry Monk, and Otis McMillan were appointed to a committee to select a speaker for the chamber banquet next spring.

This weekend kicks off the football scene in the Twin Cities. Both the Texico and Farwell gridders take on respected foes, and their supporters ought to get a fair idea of the success of the 1982 football wars.

As part of the local football scene, the Tribune is beginning the 24th annual area merchants football contest. The Tribune can rightfully claim to be the daddy of all the area papers' football contests. This year, due to the rise of unionism in the professional ranks, our first place prize will be in question.

Last year we dropped the traditional Cotton Bowl game played on New Year's Day in Dallas. We opted for a Dallas Cowboy game due to several reasons. This choice appeared to be well received by the army of football buffs that enter the guessing game each fall.

There are time limitations on choosing a Cowboy game. The contest does not close until the third weekend in November; so, of course, cannot send anybody before that date. Next are the home games the 'Pokes will play between then and the end of the pro season, the fourth week in December.

Last year we were able to secure tickets to the Cowboy-Eagle game, but this year, due to the Cowboys' schedule, the only game played at Texas Stadium between the close of the contest and the close of the pro season is the Cowboy-Saints game played on Sunday, December 19th. We have the package bought and paid for, but now the question on the front burner is whether or not there will be a strike and blow up this year's pro football.

All we can do is wait and see. Our only alternative, by the time we know for sure, will be to just award the cash equivalent. We hope the socialistic demands of the Professional Football Players Association are rebuffed, but also fervently hope for an acceptable compromise so that the millions of fans throughout the country are not left holding the collective bag.

It would almost be a mortal blow for the fans in the Southwest not to get to cheer for the Cowboys. So far in pre-season play, they look rougher than Dirk West's stucco bathtub. This could well be another year for Dallas to be in the Super Bowl, and to ruin that prospect for the fans would almost be intolerable for all tried and true Cowboy rooters.

The position of the Pro Players Association amounts to turning management of the game over to the players and their union representatives. It would also seem to favor mediocrity rather than playing excellence. It is worthy of note that several of the very outstanding players do not support the players association. After all if salary depends more on time and position rather than excellence of play, then what is the incentive for personal excellence?

We have seen the stifling hand of unionism resulting in American quality turning into Japanese quality. Let's hope we do not have to go to Japan for our football.

Border Town Days Committee met Monday night at Luce's restaurant for its final wrap-up session for this year, and chose the theme for next year's celebration.

"God Bless America" was the theme chosen for the 1983 celebration, and all float builders are urged to use a patriotic theme when planning float entries for next year.

Committee members, who are representatives of all civic and social organizations in Texico and Farwell, heard reports from all sub-committees in charge of the different

events for the annual Twin Cities celebration.

It was the consensus of all members in attendance that this year's event was truly "the best ever," and they reported that everyone that they had talked to expressed this same opinion. It was the largest crowd ever to view the parade, partake of the barbecue meal, and participate in all the park activities. And this year's parade had more entries than ever before.

It is estimated that 1,500 to 1,600 persons enjoyed the festivities in the park, and over

1,200 persons were served barbecue, which was prepared by Walter Hughes and his Cook Shack Crew and served by the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club.

All phases and events were discussed, and it was decided that the one item that must be improved is the public address system. The present PA system just doesn't have enough speakers out in the park area for the performances in the gazebo to be heard over the tremendous crowd noise.

Don Williams and Lee Hutchins were appointed as a

committee to check into having more speakers installed both in the park area and in the courthouse lawn area. Also, the committee was asked to see about having lights or spotlights installed in the gazebo so that the contestants and performers may be seen better.

Parking around the courthouse and the park area was discussed and plans were made for better disbursement of the parade participants to the park.

One new policy which was voted on and approved was the ruling that there will be no commercial booths or salesmen of resale items in the park area. Park booth spaces will be limited to area and local clubs, churches, and non-profit organizations.

Tribune Wins Press Awards

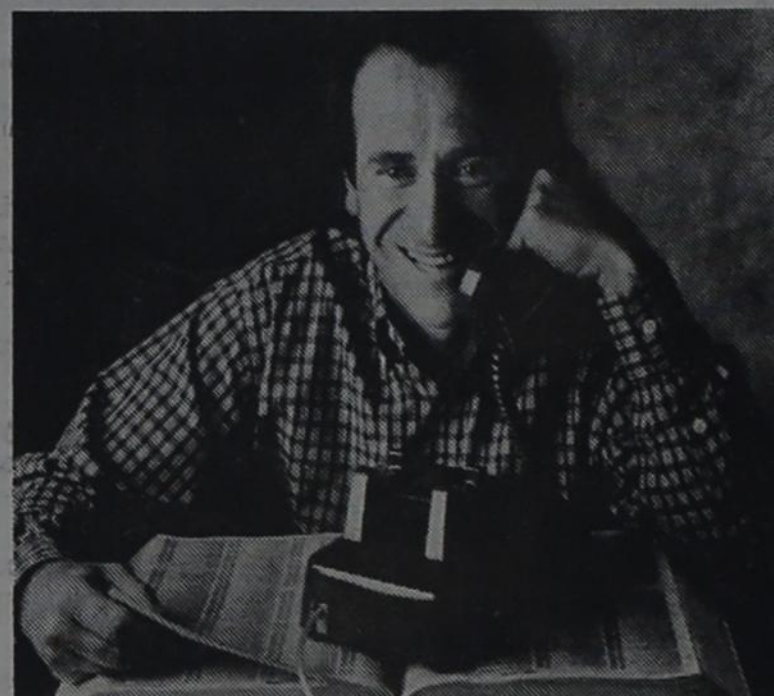
The State Line Tribune has been honored with several press awards at area press conventions recently, presented for outstanding achievement in the field of newspaper publishing.

Texas Press Association at its annual summer convention in San Antonio in June also awarded the Tribune a second place in News Writing for weekly newspapers.

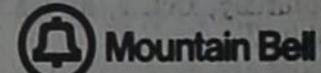

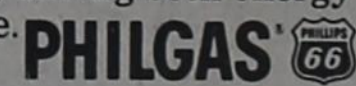

Boys Ranch Rodeo 38th Annual Event

The 38th annual Boys Ranch Rodeo at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch is expected to attract approximately 10,000 people over the Labor Day weekend.

The nationally-famous rodeo will begin at 2:30 each afternoon, September 5 and 6, with a Grand Entry of area riding clubs and the Boys Ranch Honor Patrol. About 250 boys will be riding calves, steers, bulls and broncs, competing for belt buckles and the titles of Junior and Senior All-Around Cowboys.

The rodeo is also a homecoming for the Ranch's graduates who travel from around the United States with their families for the occasion. An

TWO TERMS IS ENOUGH

Texans have a healthy skepticism of their elected officials, a wariness of entrenched power that they have embodied in the state constitution. They have historically refused to keep top state officeholders more than a few terms.

Now my opponent comes along, having spent nearly ten years in the Lt. Governor's office, one of the top state policy-making offices. Mr. Hobby wants yet another term to make it 14 years in that crucial job. That is unprecedented. Never in Texas' history has any Lt. Governor served that long—or wanted to.

His desire, frankly, puzzles me. You would think he would have other goals, other challenges he might want to tackle. As his primary opponent this year said, "If he had anything to get done, you'd think he would have done it by now."

My opponent will tell you that experience is what counts. I think voters need

to look at the experience they have had with him. After ten years, our high-ways are in bad shape, the quality of education has declined, we still do not have a new, statewide water plan and he has refused to tackle the growing crime problem. We can't afford more of that kind of experience.

I have a long-held belief in what I call the citizen-politician: someone who holds a job, serves his country or state for a reasonable time, then returns to that job and private life. For that reason, the first order of business after I am elected will be to have a constitutional amendment introduced in the legislature limiting the Lt. Governor to two terms—eight years. That is enough time for anyone. Too great a concentration of power for too long is bad. That is a principle of democracy.

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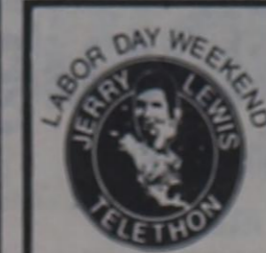

The cost of health care has skyrocketed over the last decade and reached unprecedented heights. Advanced technology has been effective in prolonging life but is very expensive.

And even though most Americans have various insurance plans to pay these charges, the high cost of health may make even insurance plans prohibitive.

Several organizations have grouped together to face this problem, including the American Hospital Association, American Medical Association, Blue Cross/Blue Shield and the Federation of American Hospitals. Their group is called

the Voluntary Effort to Contain Health Care Costs Coalition (VC) and is working with both hospitals and consumers.

The Voluntary Effort Program asks consumers to follow these guidelines:

- Practice good health and safety habits so that you won't need to sue the health care system as often;
- If you have children, make sure they receive all necessary immunizations;
- Make sure you have a personal physician or that you are enrolled in a clinic. This way, there will always be someone who knows your medical history;

*Don't go to a hospital emergency room unless you are truly in a medical emergency situation - call your physician or clinic first and explain your problem;

* If you need treatment, try to stay out of the hospital, because that is the most expensive kind of care. Ask your doctor if your condition can be treated in his office, in an ambulatory care center, or through home care.

* If you must be hospitalized find out if the tests you need can be done on an outpatient basis before you are admitted;

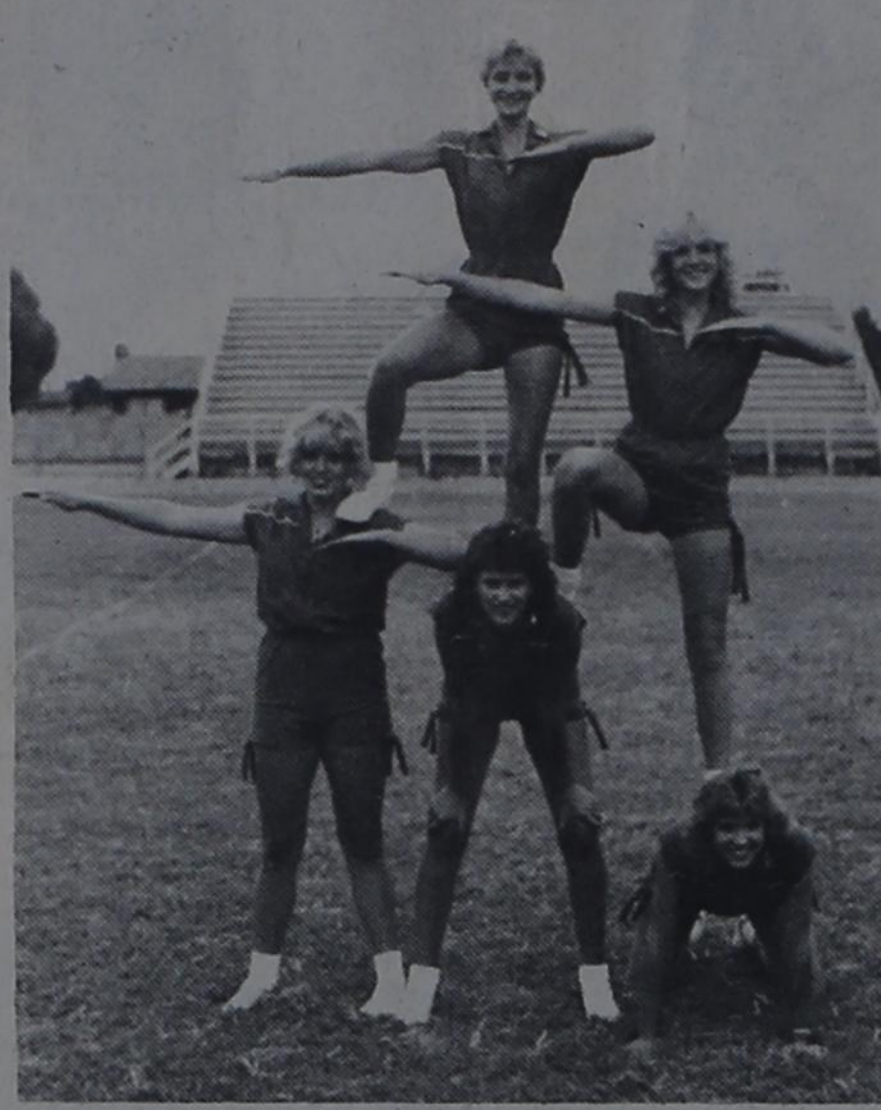
* Don't agree to tests or treatments just because your insurance company is going to pay for them. Find out why you need them and what the alternatives are. Unnecessary treatments result in higher insurance payments for all;

* Ask your doctor whether generic drugs might be appropriate in your case;

* When you get your hospital and doctor bills, study them and be sure you understand all the charges;

* Find out what your health insurance really covers. Does the plan pay for inpatient hospital tests only, not for out-patient tests? Are alternative plans available?

* Become involved in the health care system in your community. Learn what health resources are available - physicians, hospitals, health centers, clinics, nursing homes, and learn what resources are needed.

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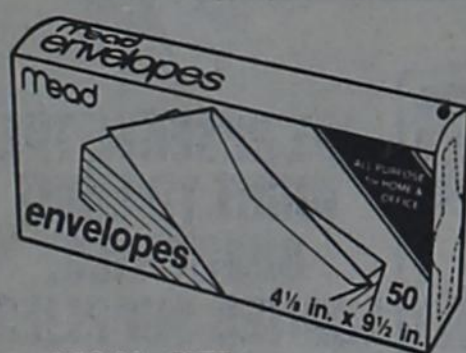

Home Economics Teacher Attends State Meeting

Martha Wheeler, Home Economics teacher at Farwell, attended the Annual State Inservice Education Conference in Dallas, August 9-12. The educational conference, entitled "Futuring with Vocational Home Economics Education," was coordinated by the Department of Occupational Education and Technology for the Texas Education Agency.

Mrs. Wheeler selected from 22 workshops designed to equip Texas Home Economics teachers to teach students current trends in the occupation of homemaking; to be responsive to current needs of home economics related business and industry; to raise student's awareness of private enterprise, entrepreneurship and productivity;

Also, to reduce sex bias and sex stereotyping in personal attitudes, curriculum, and classroom activities; to use improved teaching skills in serving special populations; to provide higher quality programs based on students needs and interests; and to improve classroom management and instruction.

In the opening general session, Dr. Paul Lindsey, Associate Commissioner, Occupational Education and Technology, Texas Education Agency, introduced the focus on the future of education with an update of the swing from civil rights compliance to emphasis on sex equity, ethnicity, and the programs for the vocationally handicapped.

He reviewed HB 246 of the 67th Legislature which mandates evaluation of education and has implications for change in Home Economics education.

New trends in the workplace were reviewed by Dr. Suzanne McCall, Professor, College of Business, East Texas State University. She stated that as of the spring of 1982, there

were more jobs in service occupations than there were in production, and within ten years 80% of all jobs will involve computers.

She emphasized that these new jobs, the changes in the marketplace, and the role of men and women in a changing society require that home economics teachers adjust their attitudes and values to prepare students for a technological society.

The effect of shrinking federal funds on home economics education was discussed by Judith Hetherly, Occupational Education Specialist, Texas Education Agency. She also reviewed steps that have been taken in home economics education in Texas to comply with demands for competency-based education.

Currently, secondary home economics courses offered in Texas include Home Economics I, Home Economics II, and the semester courses of Home and Family Living, Child Development, Foods and Nutrition, Clothing, Consumer Education, and Housing and Home Furnishings.

Courses at Farwell this semester include Home Economics I and II, Home and Family Living, and Child Development. "Survival," a comprehensive introduction to consumer and life skills needed for functioning as an independent adult, will be offered to Farwell High students second semester.

New textbooks have been adopted and are in use in all areas of home economics this year.

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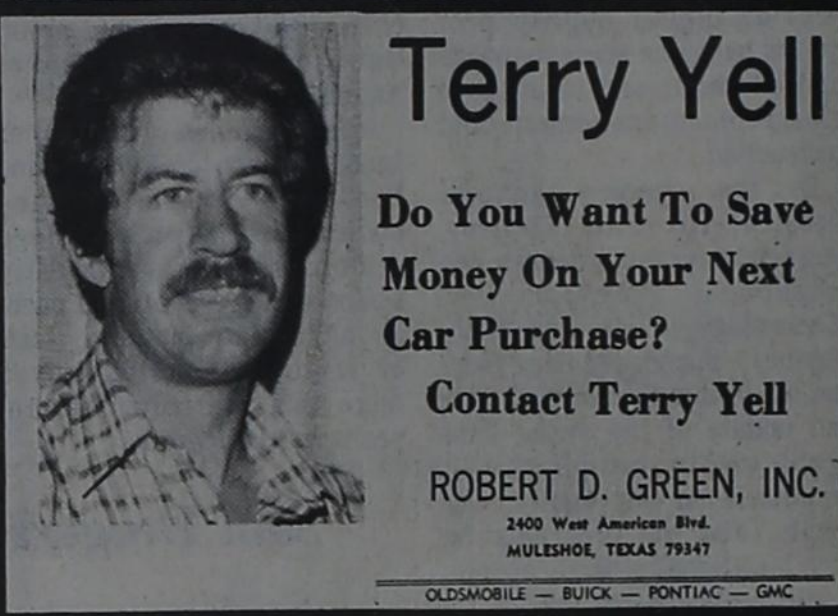

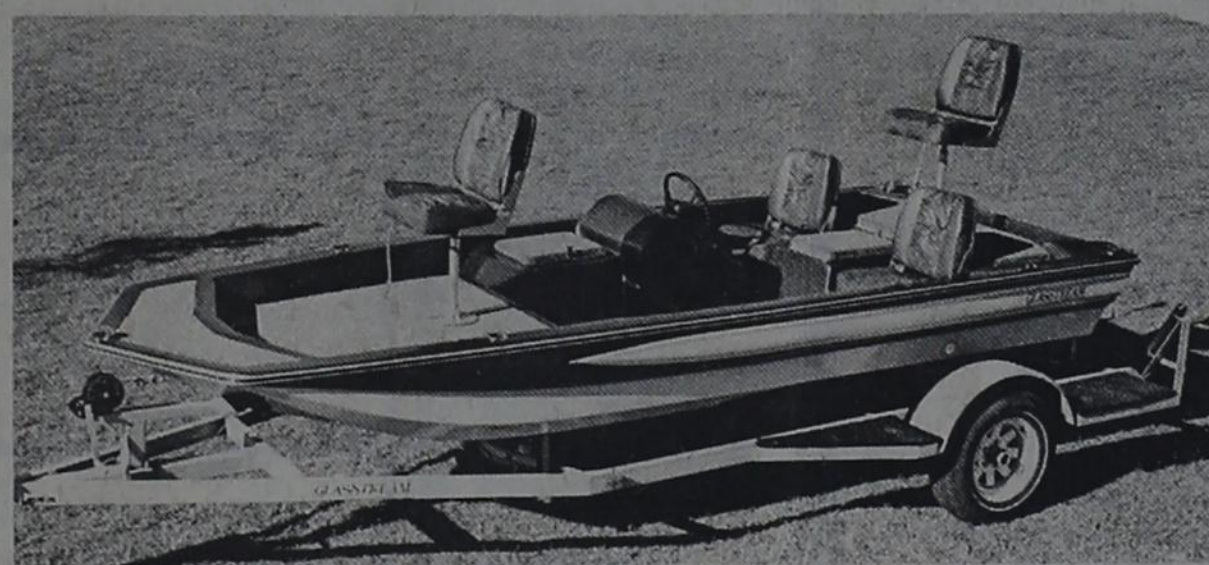

Texas DPS Advises Caution

When Nearing School Buses

The summer vacation is over, and thousands of youngsters have started back to school, many of those for the first time. Last year in Texas, the pedestrian death accounted for approximately 16 percent of our total traffic fatalities,

several of these were school age children. So, once again we are seeing those big yellow school buses back on the streets and highways. The Texas Department of Public Safety wants to remind you that Texas law prohibits the passing of a stopped school bus that is loading and unloading passengers when the lights are flashing.

"If you are in doubt - stop - those few moments you lose may mean a lifetime to some youngster. None of us wants to be responsible for the death or injury of a young child so remember to slow down in the school zones in the mornings and again in the afternoons. "Just because most of the children will be in school, we must not forget the preschooler who will still be playing in the residential areas. Remember, slow down as you are driving through school zones, around buses, and in and around school areas. Drive as if you had a child there because someone has!" caution Texas DPS officials.

Tips for home energy efficiency

COLLEGE STATION - With winter fast approaching, Texas A&M University Center for Energy and Mineral Resources has provided this checklist on ways to save on home heating bills:

- Check for air leaks. Windows and doors are the obvious place to begin, but obscure places such as wall outlets, switch plates and attic doors also can admit unwanted cold air.

- Check heating equipment. Arrange for a maintenance check of home heating equipment by a heating and cooling contractor/repair service. In the case of a gas-burning furnace, the service person will check the equipment and light your pilot for a fee.

- Change filters. Once your furnace is operating, change the filters once a month to ensure the most efficient operation.

- Provide proper attic ventilation. Proper attic ventilation allows for moisture control in the attic where it is important to keep insulation dry. Blocking or closing off turbine ventilators with plastic bags or other devices is not a good practice since it hinders attic ventilation and moisture control.

- Lower thermostat settings. Thermostat settings should be lowered to at least 68 degrees during the day and further lowered at night before going to bed for substantially lower heating bills.

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Parmer County Weather Advisory

August 27, 1982
Scattered precipitation fell in Parmer County for the past week. At Lariat, no rain was recorded for the week while 0.33 inch fell at Friona. Maximum temperatures were 3-4° above normal while minimum temperatures were 3-4° above normal. Except for 18 August when scattered clouds occurred, radiation levels for the week were quite high and conditions very good for the growth and development of crops. Temperatures have continuously warmed after the frontal passage on the 16th.

For medium-late sorghum genotypes planted in early June, physiological maturity is predicted to occur sometime in mid-September. Soil moisture conditions continue to drop with the percentage of available water in the root zone for sorghum in deep soils now near 45%. For irrigated corn planted in mid-April, physiological maturity is predicted for sometime this week with grain drying to occur rather quickly if these warm and dry conditions continue. For cotton, the percentage of available water is low and consumptive use for the past week has been averaging approximately 0.10 inch per day.

Heat unit accumulations continue above normal in Parmer County. At Friona the accumulation of heat units as of 24 August was 1641. The normal for this time is 1576.

Examining precipitation probabilities for Friona shows that the probability of getting 3, 1, and 0.4 inches or more of precipitation in the next 3 weeks is 34, 75, and 91%, respectively. There is a 5% chance of getting no rainfall in the next 3 weeks with the mean value equal to 1.5 inches. The maximum amount ever occurring at Friona for the next 3 weeks is 4.7 inches.

PAUL AND HIS GOOD NEWS

St. Paul opens his *Epistle to the Romans* by declaring that he has been "separated unto the gospel [good news] of God" (1:1). This agrees with Galatians 1:15,16, where he says: "It pleased God, who separated me from my mother's womb, and called me by His grace, to reveal His Son in me..."

The last book of the Bible tells of the coming "revelation of Jesus Christ" in glory, to judge the world and reign on earth, but here in Galatians we have "the revelation of Jesus Christ" in Paul, the chief of sinners, saved by grace.

The salvation of Paul, the one-time leader of the world's rebellion against Christ, indicated God's willingness to save the chief of sinners. Thus, it was appropriate that God should choose him as the Apostle of His grace, making the good news known "to all nations for the obedience of faith."

Let us not suppose, however, that Paul's gospel concerned only himself or God's grace to him. Apart from Christ's payment for sin

at Calvary, God could not justly have saved Paul—or any of us. Thus the Apostle goes on to explain that this good news which God has sent him to proclaim is "concerning His Son, Jesus Christ our Lord" (Rom. 1:3).

All through Paul's epistles he proclaims salvation by grace, on the basis of Christ's finished work of redemption:

"Being justified freely by His grace, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 3:24).

"Who was delivered for our offenses and raised again for our justification. Therefore being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ" (Rom. 4:25; 5:1).

"Where sin abounded, grace did much more abound, that... grace might reign through righteousness, unto eternal life, by Jesus Christ our Lord" (Rom. 5:20,21).

So the message of salvation by grace is essentially good news about Christ and what He has wrought to purchase our redemption.

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
