Had our forefathers not known this truth we would not have the freedoms and standard of living we so enjoy. Today we are the future of those in the past. Tomorrow the future will look back on us as the past. Will we have fulfilled our sacred obligations?


If it becomes apparent that a full pro schedule will be played we will return to our past mix of high school, college, and professional games.

The plan contemplates absorbing the agencies at Vaughn, Texico, Portales, Roswell and Artesia, and consolidating their Fe officials announced plans to hours a day, seven days a

This statement is qualified by several large "ifs." While the acreage of grain is known, the yield per acre is only being guessed at at this time. A drop of one to two thousand pounds per acre could make a vast difference in the total amount of grain to be stored. This is seen as likely because of adverse weather earlier in the year.

### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 77 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to set a four year maximum term of office for board members of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to pro-

vide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 119 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize Tarrant and Bee counties to hold county-wide elections to abolish the county treasurer's office by majority

Should the county treasurer's office be abolished, the duties, powers, and ships as well as to families functions of that office would be transferred to the county auditor or the successor to the auditor's functions.

the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties." PROPOSITION NO. 6

ON THE BALLOT Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the constitutional interest rate limit on state general obligation bonds from 6% to 12%. The new 12% ceiling does not, however, apply to bonds issued by the Veterans' Land





To help that situation, franchise tax money would be deposited in participating banks, which would, in turn, make loans at lower rates to small businesses.

The other recommendation is that we form a group of small business development centers at colleges and universities statewide. Money for the centers would come from the U.S. Small Business Adminticipating schools. The centers would provide training, coun-seling and other help to small business owners so that they could be more competitive in

Due to the length of the project, SCS divided it into two parts. The Running Water Draw Watershed Project includes three dams, the first on the main channel north of Clovis, the second on a tributary northwest of Bovina, and the third four miles northeast of Lazbuddie in Parmer Coun-

The Lower Running Water Draw Project includes four dams, Site 1 about eight miles west of Hart, Site 2 in northwest Hale County on the North Draw, Site 3 near Running Water School (south of Edmonson), and Site 4, four miles west of Plainview on Slaton Draw.

The total construction cost of the entire project is \$6,979,157, according to SCS. The largest dam on the upper portion of the system is at Clovis. Designed for both flood prevention and as a recreational facility, that dam, completed in 1975, cost \$822,513 and has a storage capacity of 12,500 acre-feet. The site near Bovina, completed in 1974, cost \$155,941 and will contain 2,729 acre-feet, while the site near Lazbuddie, finished in 1979, cost \$1,408,639 and will contain 9,316 acre-feet.

On the lower part of the Tribune September 17 and 24, system, Site 1 was completed in 1980 at a cost of \$1,546,151, and has a detention storage capacity of 3,345 acre-feet. Site 2 was completed in 1977 at a cost of \$280,166 with a storage capacity of 3,828 acre-feet. Site 3, finished in February, cost \$2,561,849 and has a storage capacity of 4,781 acre-feet. Site 4 was finished in 1976 and cost \$203,898 and has a storage capacity of 1,179 acre-feet.

By size, the largest dam is near Lazbuddie and consists of 411,260 cubic yards of material in the embankment, followed by the site near Running Water School which contains 343,893 cubic yards.

The dam at Clovis is the tallest at 65 feet, followed by the Lazbuddie dam at 56 feet. The shortest is the Bovina dam at 23 feet, followed by the

Slaton Draw dam at 28 feet. Rather than impound structures, the dams within the system are designed to slow rushing water by releasing it into the channel automatically in controlled amounts. ### A FORGIVENESS THAT CANNOT BE REVOKED

Centuries before Christ, the Psalmist said: "If Thou, Lord, shouldest mark iniquities ... who shall stand? But there is forgiveness with Thee . . ." (Psa.

It is doubtful whether the Psalmist understood the basis upon which a just God, through the ages, has so graciously forgiven sins, but this has since been revealed in the Epistles of

There we read: "God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you" (Eph. 4:32). But this is only part of the truth, for God forgives sinners, not merely because Christ desires this, but because Christ paid for their sins and purchased their redemption. Thus Ephesians 1:7 declares: "In [Christ] we have redemption, through His blood, the forgiveness of sins, according to the riches of His grace."

And thus Paul could proclaim to his hearers in the synagogue at Pisidian Antioch:

"Be it known unto you, therefore, men and brethren, that through this Man is preached

unto you the forgiveness of sins: And by Him all that believe are justified from all things, from which ye could not be justified by the law of Moses" (Acts 13:38,39).

Obviously such forgiveness can never be rescinded or revoked, for it is based upon the full and complete payment of our whole debt of sin by "the precious blood of Christ.'

Sad to say, many people do not feel they need forgiveness, for they have not seen themselves as they truly are in the sight of a holy God, but those who are conscious of their sins and are willing to say with the prodigal son: "I have sinned," may experience the peace and joy of sins forgiven by faith in Christ who paid sin's penalty

Here is forgiveness that can never be revoked because it is based on the "one offering |of Christ at Calvary]" by which our Lord "hath perfected forever them that are sanctified [i.e., set apart as His own]" (Heb.




### Preaching Mission Set At O.L. Methodist

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
